Rockland Vetoes Union Request For Election

NEW CITY, May 25 - A resolution of the Board of Supervisors of Rockland County-which the Civil Service Employees Assn. had branded as "highly discriminatory" - was rescinded last week as the result of direct Intervention by the Employees Assn. and its 4,000 State and local members in the county.

The resolution had called for an election among a small segment of county employees to determine if they wished to be represented by a labor union.

Repeat This! Rockefeller's New Strength Boosts Kennedy, Humphrey

TATE primaries are the big news in the Presidential sweepstakes these days but for Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller the key to his ambitions for the GOP nomination may lie in the annual Governors' Conference, being held this year in Cleveland on June 6, four days after the California primary.

If Rockefeller can do for himself, at that Conference, what Thomas E. Dewey did for Eisenhower at the 1952 Governors' Conference, it is still possible the New York Governor could nail down the nomination in Cleveland. It was at the

The Veteran's Counselor

Several new laws, of interest to veterans, were recently signed by Governor Nelson A. Rockefeller, A resume of these laws follows:

Chap. 15, L. 1964 Benevolent Orders Law

Amends Section 2 of the Benevolent Orders Law by adding thereto subdivision (45a) which recognizes a post, county, district or departmental organization of Ladies' Auxiliary, Italian American War Veterans of the United States, Inc., which is duly chartered and installed according to the regulations of that organization, Section 7 of the Benevolent Orders Law is amended by adding thereto subdivision (16h) which recognizes any member of a unit of the Ladies' Auxiliary. Italian American War Veterans of the United States, Inc., chartered and installed according to the regulations of that organi-

Chap. 3, L. 1964-Conservation Law

Amends Subd. 5 of Section 213, Conservation Law, to extend until July 1, 1965 the right of residents of this state who are members of the United States armed forces in active service and who were not stationed within the state to fish and hunt without a license except for the taking of deer and This amendment further provides that such a member of the armed forces must have in his possession at the time he is hunting or fishing a copy of his furlough or a copy of an order granting him a leave of absence from which it may be determined that he is not stationed within the state and has not been here longer than thirty days on leave or furlough, as well as his service identification tag.

Chap. 807, L. 1964-Conservation Law

Amends Section 220 by adding thereto a new subdivision, subdivision 4, which grants the right to a resident of this state, who has an honorable discharge from the armed forces of the United States and certified as having at least a 60 percent service-connected disability, to receive a fishing license without charge. The only requirements are that such a disabled veteran must show that he has been a resident of the state for at least three months immediately prior to the date of his application for such a license and a statement from either the Veterans Administration or the branch of the armed forces which he served as to the degree of dis ability

Chap. 491, L. 1964-Education Law

Section 609 of the Education Law has been amended so as to provide that children of disabled veterans (50% or better) will be eligible for state regents scholarships if the serviceman is collecting a disability pension from

either the Veterans Administration or a specific branch of the armed forces.

Up to this time such veterans were required to be certified by the Veterans Administration even though they were on disability retirement from a particular branch of the armed forces.

Chap. 273, L. 1964-Education Law

Section 6556, subdivision 5 of the Eductaion Law has been amended to provide that service in the armed forces of the United States shall be deemed the equivalent of having been engaged in the chiropractic practice of this state provided the applicant was engaged in such practice in this state at the time of his induction or entry into the armed forces.

Prior to this amendment it was required that the military service be rendered during any portion of the two year period immediately prior to July 1, 1963.

Chap. 956, L. 1964-Education Law

Section 625, subdivision 3 of the Education Law has been amended so as to allow the award of a regents college teaching fellowship for beginning graduate study so as to include studies on a fulltime basis at any college either within or without of the state of New York, in any of the states, or the District of Columbia, offering a doctorate degree.

The award of a regents college teaching fellowship for advanced graduate study shall entitle the holder of such scholarship to a grant for one year of full time attendance at such college.

Chap. 87, . 1964-Election Law

Article 12, Section 300-319 inclusive of the Election Law has been amended to provide for the continuance of the Division for servicemen's voting, Secretary of State's office.

Buckley Backs

Congressman Charles A. Buckley (D. Bronx) informed The Leader last week that he will vote for a pay raise for Federal employees this year. "This," said Buckley, "is in line with my consistent record of concern for all public employees."

The House Rules Committee only last week voted out a bill to give raises to U.S. aides. An earlier proposal was turned down by Congress and the present measure is a modification of that proposal.

Buckley is chairman of the House Public Works Committee.

Same Arguments

Oddly enough, Rockefeller could use Dewey's same arguments in a general sense. Dewey's main argument for stopping the Taft drive was that the Senator was too conservative and would draw only Republican votes whereas Eisenhower would appeal to Republicans, uncommitted voters and a good sprinkling of Democrats. As it turned out, he was

Rockefeller is convinced that these same arguments apply for himself and against his greatest current rival, Sen. Barry Goldwater. In other words, Rockefeller will argue that Goldwater will draw only conservative Republican voters-and might eventually cost the GOP some regular party votes. The New York Governor will claim, of course, that his generally liberal record, combined with his fiscal policies, basically conservative, will attract voters of all political faiths.

Governors Importance

In many states, convention delegates are controlled by the govenor of the state. One device used by many governors to control the delegation is the "favor-

ite son" technique, whereby they 1952 meeting that Dewey formed go into a convention uncommitted to any particular candidate.

> It is believed that the degree of success Rockefeller will have with his fellow state executives depends a good deal on his showing in the California primary next week. There is no doubt that his big win recently in Oregon did much to boost the Rockefeller stock but the convention road is still a long one-and Rockefeller knows this.

Rockefeller grabbed the headlines at the Governors' Conference in Florida last year by pushing the governors to take a firm stand on civil rights. The Conference never did take a stand but the issue made Rockefeller the dominant figure throughout the meeting. It can be expected that he will bring some equally controversial theme to the Cleveland session-plus all his arguments as to why Goldwater can't win if nominated.

Liberal Dem Needed

What does all this mean as far as Attorney General Robert Kennedy and Sen. Hubert Humphrey go? In essence, it means that the Democrats would need a whollyliberal ticket if Rockefeller's strength continues to grow, particularly if he either gets the GOP nomination or, at the GOP convention, holds the key to the dominating issues of the Republican campaign.

With Barry Goldwater as his opponent, President Johnson would have had little concern over middle-of-the-road and liberal voting elements along the Eastern Seaboard. But with Rockefeller as an opponent Johnson would find himself in battle in the East with a GOP candidate that is generally rated a liberal Republican and is an outspoken advocate of civil

Most Democratic pros feel that a ticket in New York State headed by Johnson, with the liberal Sen. Hubert Humphrey or Bob Kennedy as vice president or Kennedy as Senator, could completely offset the liberal appeal of Rockefeller.

Kennedy's Position

What is most important right now to these same pros is the fact that they feel Kennedy should declare his intent about the New York race and stop hedging. They know he has easily won all the polls conducted by unofficial Democratic sources here, although it is conceded these polls were not conducted in terms of full competition.

If Kennedy wants to run here he will get plenty of backing. But his New York friends want him confuse his intentions with such statements as "it would be better for a New York citizen to run."

Note: Democratic politicos are

not concerned with the question of Robert Kennedy's New York residence because he has lived in New York City as much as any place else. Not only that; they know also that much of the initial impetus for the whole Kennedy civil rights program started here and was accelerated after one particular meeting at a Kennedy residence in New York City, 24 Central Park South, where the Attorney General held his widelyreported meeting with Negro leaders representing their race in cultural, theatrical, religious, educational and organizational groups.

CSEA Protests Removal Of Written Exam For PA Internship Recruits

ALBANY, May 25-The removal of the written examination requirement from the State Civil Service Department's recruitment program for public administration internships this year has been protested by the Civil Service Employees Assn.

The Association's action came after it was learned that the internship recruitment program for basis of merit and fitness with-1964-65 has no provision for a out any interference from variwritten examination, as in the ous influences was to test by writpast. Instead, the examination will be based entirely on oral testing.

Asked Explanation

CSEA, which long has been a foe of oral testing for promotional purposes, took issue with the announced procedure and requested an explanation from the Department so that the Association's Examinations Committee could study the matter. In his request for information, Joseph F. Feily, CSEA president, cited the Association's long standing support for the Civil Service Merit

to assure appointment on the ten examination."

Feily also charged that:

-the positions would be filled on a "first come, first serve" basis rather than through open competition:

-the testing procedure is improper because it does not allow for an appeal of scores, -the educational requirements (a masters degree) are kept so high that they defeat the competition hoped for, and

-the Department should be required to give preference to college graduates who are citizens of New York State before recruiting outside the

Referring to the limited period in which applications would be accepted, Felly said, "This sounds like a first come, first service basis rather than open competitition to which all qualified citizens, possessing the educational requirements, should be admitted on an equal basis."

Murray's Reply

In answer to the CSEA objections, William J. Murray, Administrative Director of the Department of Civil Service, made the following points:

1. There has been a gradual falling-off of competition for the internship positions in recent years.

2. The number of individuals with masters degrees the state has been able to recruit has been constantly diminishing in recent years.

3. One of the reasons given by college representatives and made the state late in signing up people for jobs.

Murray explained, "More than anything else, the written test has been cited as a reason for our failure to get a fair share of the available crop." He said for these reasons we decided that this year we would attempt to streamline our process by eliminating the written test."

Will Keep On

Concerning the Association's claim that the positions would be filled on a "first come, first serve" basis, Murray explained, "until we know that all our jobs are filled, we will keep on accepting applications." He said further, anyone who is seriously interested and can appear for an interview in New York State, at anytime between January 1 and probably May, will have a fair chance of appointment - assuming he can pass the oral test."

With respect to appeals, Murray said there seems to be no interest because anyone who fails usually has other job offers and does not desire to appeal his

As to recruiting outside New York State, it was explained that the department has not been able to get the mandated amount of qualified people from New York State or even in surrounding states.



ONE group of people that President Johnson hasn't completely sold yet is the public employee. This can be attributed to the various statements made by him and for him in connection with the Federal job freeze as well as the lessening of the number of government employees.

Whether he is right or wrong is still being debated and discussed. However, one thing he can do is to promote career people to top spots from within.

Career people have indicated a dedication to staying on the job and giving their entire working life to the service.

Now, Mr. President—how about considering a career employee for the position recently vacated by Mortimer Caplin as Commissioner of Internal Revenue?

Police Review Boards

JOHN Cassese, leader of the Patrolmen's Benevolent Association this week notified all members of the New York City Council, in an 11-page memorandum, that his 25,000 members are against any outside interference by civilian police review boards.

Pointing out that such review board would weaken department discipline, drastically reduce morale and water down the authority of the Police Commissioner, Cassese noted that there was, in fact, no necessity of appointing such a board.

The proposed board, the topic of legislation now before the City Council, would review charges of brutality against policemen and have the power to take action against the defendent policeman.

Cassese argues that the discipline of the department, under Police Commissioner Michael Murphy, is at a high level. Murphy is stern—but just, he says. As a former policeman, he sits as an impartial judge and has been known to hand out stiff sentences where necessary, the PBA feels.

We urge the City Council to study closely the memorandum from Cassese and the PBA.

The Coffee Break

A RGUMENTS for and against that now firm American institution—the coffee break—drew an argument in the affirmative recently from the New York State Grievance Appeals Board.

It seems that employees in the State Insurance Fund offices here in New York felt discriminated against because the coffee break is prohibited to them.

In agreeing that this comprised a grievance that should be remedied, the Board declared "Required hours of work contemplate periods of non-work of from 10 to 20 minutes. Many State departments consider a coffee break a rest period related, if not equal, to personal leave. The practice is of long standing and has been recognized as proper by those who determine work hours.

"In conclusion, the Grievance Appeals Board suggests that the State Insurance Fund seriously consider the fact that so many other State agencies have adopted this practice and the possible effects on employee morale of prohibiting the practice in the State Insurance Fund."

We suggest that those in authority at the SIF get together over a cup of coffee and examine the whole problem. We are sure that they will agree that granting the coffee break is inevitable—and not at all a bad idea.

Social Security


"I am unmarried and am the sele support of my aged mother. Will social security help her if I should die?"

Yes, if you are furnishing over half of her support at the time of your death, she could receive a monthly social security check. So while you are working, you are not only building up a monthly retirement income for yourself, but are also providing a monthly income for your mother in the event of your death.

"Does a person getting social security benefits have to limit his earnings to \$1200 in the year that he becomes 72 if he wants benefits for all months in that year?"

Starting with the month in which he is 72, a beneficiary receives social security benefits no matter how much he earns. But he must total his earnings for the entire years to determine whether he was due any benefits for the months before he reached 72.

Your Public Relations IQ

PR Nuggets From Gaynor

WE PROMISED in last week's column to transmit some more prize public relations nuggets offered by James Wm. Gaynor, New York State Commissioner of Housing and Community Renewal, to government executives in his field at a recent international convention.

HERE ARE some of these nuggets, which won for Commissioner Gaynor our public relations blue ribbon award:

- "THE SKILLFUL public official is ruled by two considerations: first, his obligation to submit himself to appropriate public exposure in connection with his job; second, his obligation to keep his eye on the job, not on the headlines."
- "IT HAS BEEN seriously proposed, by toilers in this particular vineyard (urban renewal), that newspapers have a responsibility to develop public acceptance for renewal activities. The official who recognizes that newspapers have no such responsibility is, in public relations at least, one step ahead of his colleagues who wring their hands at news stories of their ineptitudes and errors and, in effect, call for a cover up."
- BE WARY of instituting a weekly press conference. Heads of nations may need press conferences, "but local directors of local offices can hardly be expected to offer a dazzling array of significant problems to be met, decisions to be made and actions to be taken to justify a weekly press conference."

COMMISSIONER GAYNOR gets down to the nuts and bolts of public relations with "these general guide lines", which should be studied diligently by all puublic officials:

- 1. GIVE INFORMATION when asked. The public has a right to know.
- 2. DRAW A CLEAR distinction between policy and pipe dreams, and keep the pipe dreams to yourself. The (recent) "New York Times" editorial that "there is too much housing

by press release, too little real action" would make a vivid wall motto for this purpose.

- . 3. UTILIZE THE techniques of the professional publicist only if you thoroughly underrstand their function. Otherwise, depend on your own common sense in planning ceremonies, undertaking TV interviews and isssuing reports and news. You cannot gull the public or the presss for long, so play it straight.
- 4. SOLICIT HOW-TO-DO-IT advice from the reporter on your beat, if you can develop an atmosphere of mutual trust.

- . 5. ACCEPT THE public exposure required by your responsibility in whatever form it is commonly presented-TV interviews, forum discussions, public speaking. Exerrcise good judgment by turning down any exposure that will not advance public understanding of your program.
- · 6. DO YOUR HOMEWORK before you appear in public. You won't be very informative if you're not up to date.
- 7. DISMISS THE IDEA that a reporter considers food and drink either a necessary accompaniment to, or a substitute for, news. Don't, in other words, confuse a press party with a press conference.

COMMISSIONER GAYNOR has set a fine example of sharing his PR know-how. We cordially invite all our readers to contribute the PR nuggets they have accumulated over the years. We will publish all such contributions, which, in our professional opinion, would help all in public life do a better job of their public relations.



CSEA Urges Erie Board To Act On Pay Formula

ALBANY, May 25-Joseph F. Feily, president of the 120,000-member Civil Service Employees Association has released the text of a letter to each member of the Erie County Board of Supervisors in regard to the distribution formula for proceeds from the anticipated increase in the proposed Erie County sales tax.

The following is the text of the letter:

"The Civil Service Employees Association has been watching with great interest the actions taken by the Eric County Board of Supervisors with respect to the adoption of a distribution formula to be used in disbursing anticipated proceeds resulting from an increase of from 1 per cent to 3 per cent in the Erie County sales tax.

"Put Away Politics"

"We feel it is time members of the Eric County Board of Supervisors place political considerations in the background and engage in an open expression of statesmanship and diplomacy in resolving the problem of distribution of the aforementioned funds. We are speaking on behalf of more than 8,000 CSEA members in Erie County and particularly on behalf of those who are employees of the City of Buffalo.

"No one can deny that Erie County residents in the employ of the City of Buffalo are currently being paid salaries which are substandard and desperately in need of upward adjustment. Our own analysis of Buffalo City salaries show that an average increase of 19 per cent is needed in order to reach parity with salaries paid by other public jurisdictions and private employers for comparable jobs. The desperate need for city salary increases has also been demonstrated in a survey by a private consulting firm engaged meeting and election results. by City officials.

CSEA Made Case

"We have met with the Mayor of the City of Buffalo and leaders of the City Council for the purpose of presenting our salary comparisons and pointing out the irrevocable necessity of a significant upward adjustment in city salaries this year. Subsequently, we appeared at the recent City budget hearing and again presented our case in support of the upward adjustment of City salaries to all members of the City Council.



Mulroy said no change in the traditional summer closing time is planned this year.

However, he said, a yearround 35-hour work week will be put into effect next year if county supervisors approve his proposed salary plan and job reclassification. This proposal was defeated last year as "too expensive." However, since supervisors do now face election this year-as they did in 1963-the plan is given a better chance of adoption.

New Pay-Reclassification

A new pay-classification plan is slated to be presented to supervisors later this month, said County Personnel Commissioner Louis A. Harrolds.

The Onondaga Chapter letter asks the 10 percent pay boost for all employees now earning less than \$10,000 annually.

The added retirement payment by the county-permissible under a 1964 act of the Legislaturewould boost workers take-home pay by this three per cent. The county's contribution to employees retirement plans would go to eight per cent of salaries.

The letter asks that the retirement cost change be made effective as of July 1.

Kasson states in the letter that 'we feel justified" in recommending the pay boosts and other benefits "to maintain good morale and keep the services of our employees who have dedicated themselves to promoting efficient county government and serving the taxpayers."

The 4 p.m. summer closing also would "maintain morale and keep in line with the majority of other counties," the letter states.
