# 1844-STATE'S NINETY YEARS SERVICE TO EDUCATION-1934

For nearly a century New York State education has been served, first by the Albany Normal school, then by the State Normal college of 1890, and now by the New York State College for Teachers. In 1844, on the seventh of May, the State legislature passed "an act for the establishment of a normal school which authorized the expenditure of money for the support of a Normal School for the instruction and practice of teachers of common schools in the science of education and in the art of teaching," to be located in Albany. The school was opened December 18, 1844.

On Monday morning, June 18, the traditional academic procession will leave the portals of Draper hall, solemnly wend its way through the Draper court, and thence to Page hall auditorium. Here, John Erskine, noted author, will deliver the commencement address, and College degrees will be awarded to over four hundred candidates.

The class of 1934 will bid farewell to the Alma Mater which has been theirs for four years. Moving-up Day, May 18, has already symbolized the entry of the 'grand old seniors' into the uncertain future, or as the song goes "the wide, wide, world." Again the spirit of succeeding classes at State will become a poignant reality—then a golden memory, achievements for other classes to aim at, personalities and friendships which will last—


