**Description:** Changes have been made to offer students more options and increase rigor of the overall program. They only required course now is our Senior Seminar course, to ensure graduates of the program have in depth research and writing experience within the field. The other courses in the core now allow students to choose three of the five courses based off student interests. We also increased the number of upper division electives required to ensure academic rigor of the program.
