### UALBANY ATHLETES NAMED TO AMERICA EAST ACADEMIC HONOR ROLL

ALBANY, N.Y. – America East Conference Commissioner Chris Monasch announced today that 46 student-athletes from the University at Albany have been named to the 2001 America East Fall Academic Honor Roll for earning grade-point-averages of 3.0 or higher. UAlbany also had 24 student-athletes selected to the Commissioner's Honor Roll for attaining a 3.5 GPA or better during the fall semester.

"We are pleased that our student-athletes are excelling in the classroom," UAlbany Director of Athletics Lee McElroy said. "It is important that we acknowledge academic success as well as accomplishments achieved on the playing field. These individuals have made our University very proud."

Amy DiMicco, one of the school's all-time scorers in field hockey, leads a group of 14 players recognized by America East. Women's cross country had 12 players named, including Saratoga Springs native Laura Kearns, who had a perfect 4.0 GPA. Jessica Walton (Fonda-Fultonville), Nicole Susser (Colonie Central) and Sarah Best (Granville Central) were also chosen.

Men's soccer and men's cross country each placed eight athletes on the honor roll. **Nick Southworth** (Maple Hill) was a starting midfielder in soccer. **Jamie Rodriguez** (Christian Brothers Academy), **Joe Pienta** (Ichabod Crane) and **Sam Gonzalez** (Fonda-Fultonville) are among UAlbany's top-five cross country runners. Shenendehowa's **Alissa Gibbs**, a first-team all-conference selection, and **Susan Spierre** (Averill Park) are among four volleyball players honored.

In all, 622 student-athletes from the sports of men's cross country, women's cross country, field hockey, men's soccer, women's soccer and volleyball were honored by the conference. Member institutions for the 2001 fall season included UAlbany, Binghamton University, Boston University, University of Delaware, Drexel University, University of Hartford, Hofstra University, University of Maine, Northeastern University, Stony Brook University, Towson University and University of Vermont.



### MEN'S BASKETBALL RECORDS BACK-TO-BACK VICTORIES FOR FIRST TIME IN NEARLY TWO YEARS

Albany, N.Y. – Earv Opong scored 13 of his career-high 25 points in the opening period, as Albany posted back-to-back wins for the first time this season with a 74-57 America East Conference victory over New Hampshire on Wednesday, Jan. 30 at the Recreation and Convocation Center.

Albany (5-14, AE 2-6) leaped to an early 19-10 lead on a jumper by Opong, who added four assists, three rebounds and three steals. The Great Danes later ran off 12 unanswered points to build a 38-17 advantage. Opong buried two 3-point field goals and hit a driving layup in that outburst. Albany made 16 of its first 26 attempts from the field en route to a 20-point halftime cushion. In the final period, Opong's tip-in off the glass pushed his team's lead to 50-26 with 16:31 remaining. However, New Hampshire (7-13, AE 4-5) stormed back with 13 straight markers. Austin Ganly, a 6-foot-6 senior, had seven of his 13 points in that run. The Wildcats, who had won six of their previous eight games entering the contest, could never get closer than 12 points in the stretch. Albany used the free throw line to keep its lead safe and canned 21 of 36 attempts on the night. Opong, a 5-foot-7 junior, made 6-of-6 from the stripe in the final two minutes. "Our defense and rebounding are getting better," said Albany coach Will Brown, whose team won the rebounding battle, 43-32, for the second straight game. "We played with confidence in the first half and made some shots. We've got work to do yet to get out of the cellar in this conference." Antione Johnson scored 15 points for the Great Danes, who last recorded consecutive victories in February 2000, and also avenged a 71-60 loss to New Hampshire in this year's first meeting on Jan. 20. Freshman Chris Wyatt added 11 points and eight rebounds, both season-highs. New Hampshire's Allen Gould and Jeff Senulis tallied 13 and 10 points, respectively. Senior forward Chris Brown, who was averaging 14.2 points and 10.1 rebounds on the season, was limited to one point and three rebounds.



### MEN'S BASKETBALL RECORDS FIRST AMERICA EAST WIN ON OPONG'S LAST-SECOND SHOT

Albany, N.Y. – Earv Opong hit a driving bank shot with four seconds remaining, as Albany snapped a three-game losing streak with a 51-50 America East Conference victory over Northeastern on Saturday, Jan. 26 at the Recreation and Convocation Center.

Albany (4-14, AE 1-6) rallied from a 50-46 deficit in the stretch. Will Brand closed the gap to a single point, as he converted a three-point play when he was fouled on a follow shot in the lane with 1:03 remaining. Opong, a 5-foot-7 junior, then created a turnover on Northeastern's next possession when he tied up Antonio Johnson on the right baseline. The Great Danes, who had lost seven of their previous eight contests, then set

**UALBANY'S 4x800 RELAY QUALIFIES FOR IC4As AT TERRIER CLASSIC** Boston, Mass. – Freshman **Kristof Molnar** anchored UAlbany's 4x800-meter relay to a second-place finish at the Boston University's Terrier Classic. The Great Danes qualified for the IC4A championships in March with a time of 7:45.19, the third fastest mark in school history.

Noel Campbell, Szabolcs Molnar and Ike Cherry joined Molnar, who ran his anchor leg in 1:53, on the relay. The Great Danes bettered the IC4A standard by nearly six seconds at the Boston University Armory. Nike Farm Team won the Terrier Classic title in 7:33.76. UAlbany was also second in the women's 4x800 relay, and was clocked in 9:25.41. Dinnah Decatus went 2:18 on the second leg to lead the way. Naron Stewart captured his third high jump competition of the winter season with a mark of 6-feet, 8-inches.



### WOMEN – Boston U. 77, Albany 71 (OT)

Boston, Mass. – Sophomore forward **Katie Terhune** totaled six of her game-high 24 points in overtime, as Boston University posted a 77-71 America East Conference victory over Albany on Thursday evening at Case Gymnasium.

Boston U. (10-7, AE 3-3) led 70-66 midway through the extra period on a threepoint field goal by Terhune, who was coming off a career-high 35-point effort in her last start. Albany (4-11, AE 0-4) sliced the deficit to a single point, when **Jess McGinlay**, who scored a season-high 21 and added eight rebounds, nailed a long-range jumper from behind the arc. However, Adrienne Norris, who totaled 16 points and eight rebounds, converted a conventional three-point play as she was fouled while hitting a layup for a 73-69 lead. The Terriers won their second straight conference game by making four of five free throws to seal the outcome. In regulation, the Great Danes trailed 53-46, but rallied with nine unanswered points. Freshman center **Danielle Hutcheson**, who grabbed 11 rebounds, sparked the run with six of her 15 points. Hutcheson's fadeaway jumper put her team ahead. Norris, a 6-foot-1 freshman, would later make a follow shot to put Boston U. back on top at 59-58, before Albany's Becky Ayers nailed a three-pointer that gave her club a 61-59 lead. Marisa Moseley's layup tied the game at 61 apiece with 12.1 seconds remaining.

"Turnovers once again hurt us down the stretch," said Albany coach Mari Warner,

whose team committed a season-high 32 miscues, and shot 39.7 percent from the floor.
"I am terribly disappointed because we are close to tasting victory."
Boston U.'s Alison Argentieri had 17 points, including four 3-point field goals,
while Moseley scored 12. Ayers, a freshman guard, had 18 points, one off her season-best.

### MEN – Boston U. 64, Albany 49

Albany, N.Y. – Freshman guard Chaz Carr led three players in double figures with 16 points, as Boston University won its fifth straight with a 64-49 America East Conference victory over Albany on Thursday evening at the Recreation and Convocation Center. Boston U. (12-7, AE 6-1) raced to an 8-0 lead in the opening five minutes, as
Albany (3-14, AE 0-6) missed its first nine shots from the field. The Terriers, who held on to second place in the conference standings behind league-leader Vermont, would later build a 29-12 lead when Carr converted a three-point play as he was fouled on a fastbreak layup.

The Great Danes, who have dropped eight of their last nine games, tallied the final nine markers of the half behind the play of junior guard **Antione Johnson**, who had 11 of his 15 points in the period.

Albany closed within 30-23 early in the second half on **Karim Ouattara's** follow shot in the lane. But the Terriers regrouped with 11 unanswered points to put the game away. **Kevin Fitzgerald** hit a drive in the lane to push the lead back to double figures, before **Billy Collins** sank a three-point field goal. Carr's jumper finished off the run for a 41-23 lead with 14:34 remaining.

Albany's Johnson hit a pair of free throws six minutes later to close the gap to 49-40. However, the Terriers, who employed a full-court zone press defense for the most of the night, came up with 13 of the game's next 14 points.

"They are very good basketball team, and a program that is established and rich in tradition," Albany coach Will Brown said. "They defend the three-point line extremely well, and we were not able to come up with any interior scoring. I am pleased with how we defended, but we missed a lot of open shots."

Collins, a 6-foot-7 junior who had seven rebounds, and **Ryan Butt** each scored 10 points. Boston U., the top defensive club in America East, held Albany to 33.3 percent shooting. **Will Brand** totaled 13 points, four rebounds and four blocked shots for the Great Danes.

New York, N.Y. – At the State University Centers Invitational, **Jamie Rodriguez** (Christian Brothers Academy) won the 1,000-meter run and helped the distance medley relay qualify for the IC4A championships at The Armory Track and Field Center. **Kristof Molnar**, who was also a member of the distance medley relay, set a school record in winning the 800-meter run.

Rodriguez, a senior who hit the tape in the 1,000 in 2:32.06, out-dueled Buffalo's Onile White by 75-hundredths of a second. He anchored the distance medley to an IC4A-qualifying time of 10:12.15. Molnar, a freshman from Hungary, shattered the 800 record with a first-place finish of 1:52.62. He broke the school's standard of 1:54.33 set by Dennis King in 1997. Joe **Pienta** (Ichabod Crane) ran to victory in the 3,000 with a time of 8:46.30. Other winners in the men's competition were Naron Stewart (high jump, 6-9) and the 4x800 relay (7:59.58). Alix Rodriques took third in the 55-meter dash, but qualified for the IC4A meet in March by sprinting 6.45 seconds in the preliminaries. In the women's meet, Cherice Vanderhall threw 40-feet, 9.50-inches to capture the shot put competition. She was three-quarters of an inch better than Binghamton's Laura Yelverton. **Dinnah Decatus** broke her own school record at 800 meters, as she placed second in 2:16.27. Decatus set the previous mark (2:16.88) on this same track two years ago. Meghan Howell (3,000, 10:32.74) and Diane Matthews (500, 1:18.17) also turned in second-place finishes. Freshman Kristen O'Brien established another UAlbany record in the pole vault, as she cleared 9-feet, 6.25-inches. Northeastern, Lafayette, Buffalo, Binghamton and Club Santurce of Puerto Rico competed in both the men's and women's meet. New Hampshire's women's team was also entered.

### New Hampshire 71, Albany 60

Durham, N.H.—Sophomore guard **Marcus Bullock** scored 10 of his 16 points in the second half, as New Hampshire rallied for a 71-60 America East Conference victory over Albany on Sunday at Lundholm Gymnasium.

Albany (3-13, AE 0-5) built a 39-33 lead early in the final period following Antione Johnson's three-pointer and Rhasheed Peterson's 15-foot jumper. New Hampshire (6-11, AE 3-3) regrouped with 13 unanswered points, as the Great Danes went scoreless for six-plus minutes. Chris Brown, who had 12 of his 13 points after halftime, made two free throws to put his team ahead for good at 40-39. Brown, who added eight rebounds and four assists, canned another pair of foul shots for a 46-39 advantage with 11:26 remaining. The Wildcats, who have won five of their last six games, pushed their lead to double-figures at 54-44 with 6:16 to play on Bullock's two free throws. New Hampshire shot 50 percent from the field in the final half, and converted 17-of-19 attempts from the charity stripe. "We need to value every possession, because we are not a good offensive team," Albany coach Will Brown said. "New Hampshire can score from several positions on the floor, but we made it very easy on them in the second half. Others need to step up and handle the ball, and we need to do a better job of limiting teams to one shot defensively."

Albany (3-11) trailed 40-34 with 2:35 remaining, but regrouped with the game's last seven points. **Earv Opong**, a 5-foot-7 guard, canned a three-point field goal from the top of the circle to get his club within 40-39. After Columbia's **Maurice Murphy** missed a jumper in the lane, Opong grabbed the rebound to set up the Great Danes' last possession.

Peterson, who led all scorers with 12 points, hit the game-winner from the left side on a feed from a driving **Will Brand**. ### UALBANY'S BAZAN NAMED FOOTBALL GAZETTE LINEBACKER OF THE YEAR Chris Phillis and Bryan Bagstad Earn Second-Team All-America Honors

Brookfield, III. – University at Albany's **Josh Bazan** has been selected as the Football Gazette NCAA I-AA Mid-Major Linebacker of the Year as announced today by the national football publication. Bazan, a first-team All-America choice, received the award for the second consecutive year.

Split end **Chris Phillis** (Saratoga Springs) and place-kicker **Bryan Bagstad** (Shenendehowa) were named to the Football Gazette All-America second team.

Bazan, a 6-foot, 210-pound inside linebacker, led the Great Danes in tackles (103), hits for a loss (17), fumbles forced (4) and fumbles recovered (4). He added six pass break-ups and 4.0 sacks for minus-38 yards. 
### JANIS PIPIKIS RETURNS TO UALBANY MEN'S BASKETBALL TEAM

In the opening stanza, Albany used a 15-3 run and took a 17-7 lead on McGinlay's layup. McGinlay also added a three-pointer in the sequence while **Chris Gray** posted five points off the bench. With the Great Danes ahead 26-17 and six minutes to play in the period, Lafayette sliced the deficit to 26-24 as **Colleen Fitzpatrick**'s two baskets highlighted seven unanswered markers. Fitzpatrick finished with a team-high 14 points. Albany carried a 32-30 advantage into the intermission.

The Great Danes shot a season-high 49 percent from the field. **Becky Ayers** was Albany's third player in double digits with 12 points, while Hemlock recorded a career-high eight assists. **Lindsay Myers** and **Ashley MacLelland** had 13 and 11 points, respectively, for the Leopards off the bench.

Albany, who has won four of its last seven games, opens America East Conference play on Sunday at New Hampshire.
