

CSEA Seeks Elimination Of 'Canvass by Telegram' For Eligible Acceptance

ALBANY, Dec. 17-The Civil Service Employees Assn. has called for the elimination of the "canvass by telegram" section of the State Civil Service Rules.

In its place, the Employees Association has requested that the acceptance required "within five business days" in the case of a mail canvass be the minimum period of time in which a person on an eligible list can respond.

The suggestion was contained in a letter from CSEA President Joseph F. Feily to William J. Murray, administrative director of the State Civil Service Department, following a meeting between CSEA representatives and officials of the Civil Service Dept. last month. At that time, the two groups met to discuss possible changes in the present rule, which requires acceptance by telegram by the end of the following business day.

Loopholes Cited

In his letter, Feily made reference to instances where application of the telegram canvass rule AST WEEK, this column led to complaints, especially in ✓ reported on the emerging cases where a telegram canvass eligibles were indisposed or temporarily unavailable.

Feily said the future of an employee "should not be decided by the requirements of response to the next succeeding business day." | sonnel Council.

Minimum Request

In the event the Civil Service Dept. decides to retain the telegram canvass, Feily said "we think that at least the eligibles should be given until the end of business on the third day following the delivery of the telegram to accept by wire" instead of the following day, as now required.

CSEA has asked that its request be submitted to the State Civil Service Commission for consideration. If no action is taken on the amendment, Felly has asked to meet with the Commission to discuss the request in

SYRACUSE, Dec. 17-Onondaga County's three - man Civil Service Commission will pass out of existence Dec. 31, to be replaced by a Department of Personnel.

Named last week to head the new department was Louis A. Harrolds, now county welfare commissioner. As commissioner of personnel, Harolds will, under the county's new charter, have the duties, responsibilities and powers formerly held by the commission.

These will include preparation and rating of examinations, establishment of eligibility lists for all city and county positions under civil service, maintenance of a personnel roster and certification of payrolls.

8,000 Aides In Jurisdiction

Under his jurisdiction will come some 8,000 civil service jobs in the city and county, including both firemen and police personnel.

Succeeding him as welfare commissioner will be John L. Lascaris, formerly deputy welfare commissioner.

Mr. Harrolds has been in his welfare post since last Jan. 1.

candidacies open to Democrats in 1964, 1965 and 1966 when, in order, there is a U.S. Senate seat to campaign for, a term as Mayor of New York coming up again and, finally, another governor's race. Party leaders throughout the state feel they have a youthful, talented and energetic group of men who can be attractive candidates for any of these posts. But they are reported to becoming increasingly concerned over the ever-steady amount of personal feuding and personality clashing that goes on, most of which they feel is unnecessary and damaging to the over-all image of the Democratic Party.

A Typical Tangle

Here is one example of how Democrats who have a lot in common get tangled up unnecessarily. Friends of Paul R. Screvane, President of the Council, are reported to becoming alarmed over the growing strength and popularity of Comptroller Abe Beame, who has made good headlines for himself these past months and whose public stands on tax cuts and reform have caused even some the most conservative voters to start looking at him with interest. The base of Beame's power is in Brooklyn, where election of a new county leader recently took place. Beame's man for the post was Stanley Steingut and it is reported that pro-Screvane men urged Steingut's defeat, obviously in order to cut down Beame. When Steingut won the post, however, it was not marked publicly as a defeat for Screvane-but for Mayor Wagner. It was the unnecessary involvement of the Mayor in this feud that caused Democratic leaders to wring their hands.

Wagner and Steingut have been close personal friends since the 42-year-old Brooklyn leader first voted. The close relationship between the Mayor and Screvane is wellknown and most feel Screvane deserves this friendship for his role as strongman and administrative "genius" in the fight of 1961 against the bosses. But Wagner has no quarrel with Beame. Yet, through what many feel was bad advice, the Mayor interjected, or allowed himself to be interjected, into a political maneuver that most Democrats feel he should have been above. They are reported to believe that the Mayor has more than enough to do with running a good City without taking on the added burden

In addition, most of them feel that a Wagner above politics would restore the image the Mayor gained when he won the election against party regulars and Comptroller Arthur Levitt, a formidable vote getter in his own right, and earned the reputation as a Mayor unbossed by and unobligated to the politicians.

A Strong List of Candidates

Forward looking Democratic leaders feel that establishment of unity within the party would do much for Democratic victories in the coming years. With President Kennedy seeking re-election in 1964, the man seeking to unseat Sen. Kenneth Keating would be riding on a strong ticket. But Kennedy will want a strong man on that strong ticket and most state wide leaders feel the President should get what he wants. The man could be Wagner. But should he not go for it, the nod could go to Screvane, should the Kennedys decide an Italo-American candidate would insure the best margin of victory, or toward a longtime favorite of U.S. Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy, Manhattan DA Frank S. Hogan. Others feel that U.S. Attorney Robert M. Morgenthau learned and earned a good deal from the last gubernatorial race and would be a strong contender for the Senate seat. If an upstate man were considered the best possibility, Congressman Sam Stratton, who pulled an upset victory this year, would certainly rank as first choice, according to many observers. And then there is Abe Beame. Queens DA Frank O'Connor another candidate that would have to be considered, as would Deputy Mayor Edward Cavanugh.

Should Wagner decide to run for the Senate, any of the men mentioned above, with the exception of Stratton, would be a likely candidate for New York City mayor. The entire group would qualfy for the gubernatorial race in 1966.

ALBANY, Dec. 17-State Comptroller Arthur Levitt, in an opinion, has ruled that a policeman injured in the line of duty must be paid his full salary during the period of absence.

The ruling also states that he must be paid for his medical and hospital care. If the injury causes permanent disability, the policeman can be retired, but the municipality still is required to pay for his medical expenses.

He also feels that the party itself is larger than any single individual. His hope, which has been widely expressed, is for his "talented men" to settle their personal differences for the sake of the party and turn their fighting ability toward Republicans, A settling of inner quarrels, says McKeon, is the key to producing outer victories.

Federal employees and agencies have been ordered by the Budget Bureau to achieve a three percent increases in productivity. The increase has been ordered in an effort to follow the pattern of industry which has been increasing at the rate of three percent a year.

The adoption of this pattern means that if agencies have the same work load facing them during the next year, they must do the the work with three percent less employees than they now have.

Budget Bureau officials don't feel that the new regulations will mean firing present Federal workers. Since the population continues increase, increased Government services are required. This means that the main problem in the years ahead will be to hold Comptroller General down present employment.

Another important factor is the increased use of automatic data vity without requiring employees to work three percent harder.

Although the Government matches the six and one half percent salary contributions made by Federal employees, Civil Service tions for State jobs from local Commission officials estimate that the retirement fund will go bankrupt by 1980 if the Government does not increase their contribution. CSC and other top administration officials are working on proposals to be made to Congress to strengthen the fund but increased salary contributions by Government workers is not among the proposals being considered.

The general feeling is that Congress will not let the fund go bankrupt but there is a possibility that the future annuities and survivor benefits due present Government workers on retirement could be drastically reduced if action isn't taken immediately.



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
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

Suffolk Decision Will **Have Long Term Effects**

SUFFOLK County employees will learn next week the fate of their much-cherished health insurance program, which was stricken from the County budget earlier but was revived, at least for conversational purposes, last week.

County aides were stung by the fact that in denying funds for the needed health plan, the Board of Supervisors voted an amount of \$280,000 for county police pay raises, or \$70,000 more than the health plan, which would affect all county employees, would have cost.

H. Lee Dennison, the County Executive, included funds for health insurance coverage. They were stricken out by the Board, which is predominantly Republican. Arthur Cromarty, Republican county leader, has said he is for the plan. Good! If the Board reconsiders its unfair decision and acts favorably now on the plan we will know where to share the praise. If it doesn't, we will know where to place the blame.

Next week's decision will have far-reaching consequences, one of the most important of which will be evidence or rejection of the idea that there exists a double standard of employee treatment in Suffolk County. The Suffolk chapter of the Civil Service Employees Assn. feels it has been backed to the wall on this issue and has every intention of launching a long, public campaign to air the facts.

The chapter would prefer to see county employees covered with health insurance rather than battle gear. At this writing, the choice of action lies more with the Board of Supervisors. We trust they will see that the health plan is not only deserved-but needed.

Policewomen And Promotions PART TWO

LAST WEEK I promised to report to you on the opinion by Judge Harold A. Stevens of the Appellate Division of the State Supreme Court in the now famous case of Shpritzer v. Lang, as Director of the Department of Personnel, New York Law Journal, 12/3/62, page 1, columns 7 and 8. That case really emancipated civil service women.

THE CASE is far more important than it looks. An administrator will be careful, in the future, about the bases of discrimination. At times, discrimination is, of course, justified. For example, you cannot assign a man to supervise female prisoners, and you cannot assign a woman to supervise male prisoners. There are things which must be done by each sex, independent of the other. But that does not mean, by any stretch of the imagination, that out of approximately 300 policewomen, only men can supervise them as sergants.

Judge Steven's Opinion

JUDGE STEVENS, whom I met when he was an Assemblyman, and for whom I have the greatest regard, ruled on this case perfectly. He is one of the most logical writers I have ever read. The following is a summary of his analysis of this case:

 THE ORGANIZATION, power and duties of the New York City Civil Service Commission are contained in Section 814 of the City Charter, which provides that all promotions shall be made as provided in the State Constitution and the Civil Service Law.

 THE STATE Constitution in Article V. Section 6, provides that all promotions in the Civil Service of the State and the civil divisions thereof (which includes New York City) "shall be made according to merit and fitness" to be ascertained "as far as practicable" by examination. Judge Stevens wrote, as follows:

Under the language quoted above, unless it is not practicable, the constitution mandates promotion regardless of sex for this in the civil service, by or as a result of competitive examination.

 UNDER SUBDIVISION 7 of Section 50 of the Civil Service Law, a civil service commission may limit eligibility to an examination to one sex when the duties of the position involved relate to the institutional care of persons of the same sex "or work of any kind the nature of which requires sex selection."

Sex Selection

ON THE BASIS of the summary above Judge Stevens, in his opinion, considered the New York City Police Department, as to whether the work was of such a kind "which requires sex selection." For his conclusions in this regard, he examined the New York City Administrative Code and found, as follows:

 The duties of the police in New York City, as defined in Section 435 of the City Charter do not differentiate between male and female officers.

 The Commissioner is authorized to appoint policewomen for the moral protection of women and minors and "for the performance of such other duties as he may assign to them (Section 43a-2.0, Administrative Code).

 The same provisions relate to policewomen as relate to policemen in regard to salary, pensions, appointments, etc. (Section 4434a-2.0(b)).

 Sergeants are to be selected from among the first grade patrolmen in which the petitioner and her associates serve (Section 434a-13.0).

THE JUDGE found no restrictions against women!

Conclusion

THE JUDGE wrote, as follows:

We find no prohibition in statute or rule against the eligibility of policewomen to take the promotional examination for sergeant. To place such a construction upon the language of Administrative Code, section 434a-2.0 (d), is unwarranted, unreasonable, and demonstrates an archaic approach in light of modern day conditions. Moreover, such a construction amounts to a denial of petitioner's constitutional rights solely because of her sex unless it be demonstrated that some rational basis exists for the distinction.

Governor Deserves "Thank You" Cards

IT WOULD DO THIS old writer's heart good if State employees would take time out and send Governor Rockefeller a little thank you card in appreciation for his granting holiday time for December 24th and 31st. PUBLIC HEARINGS WERE held recently in Albany, New York City and Rochester by the Temporary State Commission on Revision of the Penal Law and Criminal Code. The

At all three meetings a small minority attended that were interested primarily in abolishment of capital punishment. Where were the Peace Officers during these meetings? Surely they must realize that the deterring factor of capital punishment has saved many peace officers' lives and, if abolished, their status symbol would increase as fair game for all potential killers. Supreme Court Justice, Samuel S. Leibowitz, the exception at the hearing and one of the most experienced Fair's public relations through the jurists in the criminal fields stated "does capital Punishment deter crime?" Judge Leibowitz answered his own question. "You bet it does, not all killers, but some it does deter." It's the old story: we are quick with arm chair criticism, but when the stage is set to say something constructive, we are nowhere to be found.

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
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
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Donald Scarborough Honored For Distinguished Service With State Vocational Schools

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

Details of the five-step 33-category schedules, revealed by Mr. Taylor, shows that the proposed new salaries would range from \$2,600 to \$14,935.

He also said that he was attempting through the salary plan to 'return savings achieved by the city from employees' working harder and more efficiently to the employees.

The plan brought generally favorable reaction from department heads, who termed the plan 'terrific." "a big step in the right direction" and "long overdue."

An exception was the police and fire departments, where an appeal for higher pay was planned, it was reported. Under the plan, police and firemen's beginning salaries would go from the present \$4,000 to \$4,326. The maximum salaries would go in five steps to \$4,888, compared to the current \$4,500 maximum.

Urges 5 Pt. Plan

Mr. Taylor also recommended that the city pick up five percent more of the employees' retirement plan cost, extend accumulated sick leave maximum from 60 to 90 days, and give employees who work holidays an allowance of up to six days off.

Under the salary plan, present employees on Jan. 1 would move up to the salary step higher than their 1962 salary.

However, the annual increase is not automatic: it must be approved by the employee's supervisor and the city manager.

Mr. Taylor noted that this power of approval could be misused. But, he said, "an administrative officer must have some measure of control over his employees."

Commenting on this "potential joker" in an editorial, The Auburn Citizen-Advertiser said: "If used judiciously, this can serve to give the city manager an opportunity to reward merit. This could lead greater efficiency and better job performance throughout the various departments.

"On the other hand, there is the inherent danger that it might be used as a political weapon, too. Only to the extent that the city manager's post can be kept nonpolitical in nature can this danger be eliminated," said the editorial which also praised the plan and Mr. Taylor.

No Pay Loss

The only persons not receiving pay increases under the new plan would be five clerks and senior clerks now getting the maximum salary in their category, However, these employees' pay would not be cut even though the new plan calls for lower maximums in these two categories than the salary schedule now used. (\$3,600 and \$4,800 currently against \$3,140 and \$3,744 in new plan.)

The new plan and salary schedule lumps all 104 various jobs in the city departments into 33 categories. These categories were set after a study of 10 comparable cities, Cayuga County, the Auburn School District and 29 local firms.

In each category, each annual increase is five per cent higher than the previous year's salary.

five per cent higher than that of the next lower category.

Beginning salaries range from \$2,600 in Category 1 to \$11,230 for the 33rd.

Some Examples

In the first category, for example, the five steps are \$2,600, \$2,724, \$2,849, \$2,995 and \$3,140.

The second category begins at \$2,724 and goes to \$3,286. The fifth begins at \$3,140 and rises in four years to \$3,744. And, the 33rd begins at \$11,230 and goes to a high of \$14,935.

Mr. Taylor estimates that the total additional cost in the first year would be \$170,000. But, he said, this would be offset by payroll cutbacks, a reduction in debt service, surplus and other possible savings.

Columbia CSEA Wins Fire Salary Plan In History Of County; 240 Benefit

HUDSON. Dec. 17-More than two hundred and forty Columbia county employees will benefit from a new 27-grade salary plan adopted by the County Board of Supervisors and approved at a recent public hearing. The comprehensive salary schedule, submitted by the Columbia County chapter of the Civil Service Employees Association, is the first of its kind in the history of the county.

The major portion of the new plan, including the first nineteen grades, was accepted as submitted by the CSEA chapter. The remaining eight grades were added or modified by the Salary Committee of the Board of Supervisors.

What It Does

The uniform salary plan, which is effective January 1, 1963, includes the following provisions:

Salary increases for employees whose present salaries are less than the minimum of the recommended salary grade.

-A four step increment scale within each salary grade.

-A two-step longevity scale for employees who have reached the maximum of the salary grade to which the position is allocated.
