Kapner Offers Insurance Policy

Any student who has not obtained his insurance policy is requested to see Arthur Kapner, local representative of Mutual of Omaha which sponsors the policy, at a table outside the Commons, any noon hour during the next two weeks. The price of the insurance coverage

Kapner has explained that the policy now being offered differs from last year's policy in that payments are arranged on a schedule basis. For sickness or accident, the company will pay \$3 per doctor's visit starting with the first visit. The policy also covers medical bills and prescriptions and provides \$10 for operating room costs and x-rays, \$40 for special medicines, up to \$150 for surgery, \$15 for ambulance fees, and up to \$100 for dam-


