UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY ANNOUNCES MEN'S BASKETBALL HEAD COACH SCREENING COMMITTEE

ALBANY, N.Y. -- The University at Albany has named a seven-member screening committee as part of its search process for a head men's basketball coach, Director of Athletics Dr. Milton E. Richards announced today. Dr. Richard Hall, Distinguished Service Professor of Sociology and Chair of the Intercollegiate Athletics Advisory Board (IAAB), will serve as committee chair.

In addition to Professor Hall, the screening committee includes Sheila Mahan, Senior Assistant to the President for Enrollment Management; Carson Carr, Assistant Vice President for Academic Affairs; Gail Cummings-Danson, Associate Director of Athletics; Bob Fortune, Chairman of The University at Albany Foundation Council for Intercollegiate Athletics, and Vice President at Barry, Bette & Led Duke, Inc.; David Anderson, Key Bank Vice President for Community Relations; and Michael J. Castrilli, President, Student Association.

Richard "Doc" Sauers retired as Albany's head coach last Monday after serving in that position since 1955. He finished his career with a 702-330 record in 41 seasons, and is one of 11 coaches in NCAA history reach the 700-career win mark.

"We are very appreciative that these individuals have agreed to be part of the process," said Richards, who will not comment on candidates during the search. "It will be a tremendous challenge to find Coach Sauers' successor, but I feel we have a very dedicated group. Our next head basketball coach must make sure our student-athletes graduate, recruit with the institution's high academic standards in mind, and continue the winning tradition that has been developed here over the last four decades."

The University will accept all applications and nominations until a successful candidate is found. The final decision will be made by Dr. Richards, with the concurrence of Vice President for Students Affairs James P. Doellefeld.

UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY'S RICHARD "DOC" SAUERS ANNOUNCES HIS RETIREMENT AS HEAD BASKETBALL COACH

ALBANY, N.Y. -- University at Albany's **Richard "Doc" Sauers**, one of the winningest head coaches in the history of college basketball with 702 victories, announced today his retirement as head coach, effective June 1, after more than four decades in the position.

"There is no better coach in America -- at any level," said Director of Athletics Dr. Milton E. Richards, who will make known the University's search plans for Sauers' successor at a later date. "Dick has served the coaching profession with dignity for more than 40 years, and has been recognized by his peers on numerous occasions. Now it is time for the University and the Capital Region to stand and honor a coach who has developed a program known for its amazing consistency, winning teams, quality student-athletes and been a constant source of pride for collegiate athletics."

Sauers, who will be 67 years old on April 3rd, finishes his career with a 702-330 record in 41 seasons as Albany's coach. He stands alongside such legendary mentors as Kentucky's Adolph Rupp, North Carolina's Dean Smith, DePaul's Ray Meyer and F.C. "Phog" Allen of Kansas, as one of 11 coaches in National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) annals to reach the 700-career win mark. Sauers achieved that prestigious victory plateau one month ago on February 8 in his team's 89-71 triumph over Bridgeport.

Sauers, whose teams averaged 17.1 wins per season during his tenure, and had just one losing campaign, became the University's head coach in 1955, when the school was known as the New York State College for Teachers and the team's nickname was the Pedagogues. Since that time, the institution has evolved into a top research center with a broad mission of undergraduate and graduate education, and the nickname has become the Great Danes. Meanwhile, the men's basketball program has moved from the NCAA's College Division to Division III, and finally upgraded to the current Division II level.

"I congratulate Doc on his absolutely wonderful career here at the University at Albany," said University President Dr. Karen R. Hitchcock. "Not only is he a national star, but he is a star here, and always will be.

"The love, affection and respect that his players have for him was especially evident that night just one month ago, as they carried him around the arena floor after his 700th win," Hitchcock added. "He is a role model for them, and for us. He teaches us what sportsmanship is all about -- dedication, fairness, giving your all. Though we wish so much that he would stay, we understand that he hears the siren call of the links at Woolfert's Roost, and a wonderful retirement. He is part of our university family, and he, Elaine and their entire family always will be welcome here at the University at Albany."

Added Vice President for Student Affairs James P. Doellefeld, "I have been watching teams coached by Doc Sauers for many years, and I always have admired their focus, their intensity, and their ability to rise to whatever challenge they faced. The rivalries with Potsdam, Hartwick and Siena are particularly memorable.

"Not only is he one of the best coaches I ever have seen, he is one of the best coaches anyone ever has seen," he continued. "He has been an outstanding ambassador for the University at Albany, and we are fortunate that we will still have him for the next few months. After that, I guess, his family and golfing pals at the Roost finally will have him all to themselves."

Sauers, whose UA team went 17-10 as a member of the New England Collegiate Conference in his last season, and rebounded from his lone losing record the previous year, became the 15th person to coach his 1,000th game at the collegiate level in February 1996. In his final year, Sauers and Mount St. Mary's Jim Phelan were the only active coaches with 40 or more seasons at the same school.

Albany teams under Sauers were always geared toward post-season play. Since 1975, the Great Danes made nine NCAA tournament appearances, and prior to that there were four NAIA tournament invitations. In 1993-94, UA established a school record for victories with a 25-3 mark, and reached the Division III East Sectional final. Albany also qualified for the Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) playoffs seven times, and won two championships in 1978 and 1989.

Coach Sauers guided the Great Danes to 20-win campaigns on 10 occasions, and incredibly his clubs have reached the 17-victory mark in 26 different seasons. He was named the 1985 NCAA Division III Coach of the Year after Albany went 22-6 and gained a national tournament berth. In 1994, he was chosen as both the East Region and New York State Coach of the Year for the third time in his career. Sauers was inducted into the New York State Basketball Hall of Fame in 1992.

Sauers and his wife, the former Elaine Sykes of Schenectady, have two children, Cheryl and Stephen, and a grandson, Jordan. Stephen played for his father in the late 1980s, and is presently an assistant basketball coach at Division I Marist College.

Indianapolis, Ind. -- University at Albany's Tonya Dodge (Granville Central H.S.) shattered her own school record in the women's mile run with a time of 4:54.72 to finish fifth at the 1997 NCAA Division II Indoor Track & Field Championships on Saturday afternoon. The Great Danes tied for the 15th in the women's final team standings, and posted the best finish by an eastern school in the two-day event held at the RCA Dome.

Dodge, a senior, became the first woman in school history to earn All-America honors in cross country, indoor track and outdoor track. She was 13th at this year's NCAA cross country championships, and placed sixth in the '96 NCAA outdoor 3,000-meter run.

"I am happy to be the first one (All-American in three sports), but I'm sure other people will follow me," said Dodge, whose previous best in the mile was 4:59.40. "I had not run the mile much during the season, but I knew my distance training would favor me."

Xiomara Davila Diaz, a junior from Rio Piedras, Puerto Rico, and sophomore Ellakisha Williamson (Albany H.S.) also gained All-America recognition in the 55-meter hurdles. Davila Diaz placed fourth in 8.07 seconds, while Williamson, the ECAC and New England Collegiate Conference champion, was fifth in 8.15. Abliene Christian's Delloreen Ennis won her second consecutive NCAA title, and was clocked in 7.74.

Davila Diaz, who was injured in a tragic auto accident just one year ago (March 6, 1996) which took the life of teammate Kimberly Toone, also qualified for the finals in the 55-meter dash and 400-meter dash. She finished seventh in both events, and set a school record for the second straight day in the 400 with a time 56.52 seconds. She sprinted 57.14 in the qualifying round.

"This is more than what I expected," Diaz said. "I was running for my friend. I know she is proud, and will always be proud of me. Every time I stepped to the line, I said to myself this is for her."

Abliene Christian captured its fifth consecutive NCAA Division II indoor crown with 76 points. St. Augustine's was second with 61.

Indianapolis, Ind. -- University at Albany's Xiomara Davila Diaz qualified for Saturday's final in the women's 400-meter dash with a school-record 57.14 seconds on the first day of competition at the 1997 NCAA Division II Indoor Track & Field Championships. The two-day event is being held at the RCA Dome.

Davila Diaz, a junior from Rio Piedras, Puerto Rico, also reached the finals in the both the 55-meter dash and 55-meter hurdles. She was clocked in 7.23 seconds in the dash, and sprinted 8.04 in the hurdles.

Ellaskisha Williamson (Albany H.S.) will be with Davila Diaz in the 55-hurdles championship field. She finished second in her heat, and was timed in 8.18 seconds. Williamson, a sophomore, narrowly missed the finals in the 55-dash by five one-hundredths of a second with a 7.28-second showing.

Tonya Dodge, a senior from Granville Central High, was just off her own school record in the women's one-mile run by cruising to a 4:59.54 time in qualifying. Dodge, who will also run in tomorrow's 5,000-meter final, placed third in her heat.

Finally, Dennis King (Notre Dame-Bishop Gibbons H.S.) ran 4:20.20 in the men's mile to finish sixth in the second heat. His time eliminated him from advancing in the championship.

UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY SENDS FOUR ATHLETES TO NCAA DIVISION II INDOOR TRACK CHAMPIONSHIPS

ALBANY, N.Y. -- University at Albany will be represented by four athletes, including three from area high schools, at the 1997 NCAA Division II Indoor Track Championships, which will be held at the RCA Dome in Indianapolis, Indiana on March 7-8. Albany's NCAA contingent includes **Ellakisha Williamson**, **Tonya Dodge**, **Xiomara Davila Diaz** and **Dennis King**.

Williamson, a sophomore from Albany, N.Y. (Albany H.S.), has the nation's fourth fastest time in the 55-meter hurdles. She won last weekend's ECAC title in 7.96 seconds. Williamson, the East Region's Track Athlete of the Month for February, will also compete in the 55-meter dash. She finished first in the ECAC final with a time of 7.09 seconds. Williamson has led the Great Danes to both the ECAC and New England Collegiate Conference championships in the last three weeks, and was selected as each meet's top athlete as a triple-winner (200, 55-hurdles, 55-dash) in both competitions.

A senior from Granville, N.Y. (Granville Central H.S.), Dodge is no stranger to NCAA competition. She is the first Albany woman to earn All-America honors in both track and cross country. Dodge, who has qualified for this week's one-mile and 5,000 events, was 13th at the '96 NCAA cross country championships, and sixth in the 3,000 at outdoor nationals last spring. Dodge, the ECAC champion in the 5,000 (17:34.61), has run Division II's third-best mile (4:59.40) this season.

Diaz, a junior from Rio Piedras, Puerto Rico, has qualified for NCAAs in three events. She was clocked in 57.51 in winning the NECC 400-meter crown, and is also among the national entrants in the 55-hurdles (8.13) and 55-dash (7.11). Diaz is making her first NCAA appearance. One year ago tomorrow, she was a passenger in the tragic auto accident which took the life of teammate Kimberly Toone, who was scheduled to compete in two events at indoor nationals.

King, a senior from Schenectady, N.Y. (Notre Dame Bishop Gibbons H.S.), will be a competitor in the men's one-mile run. He qualified with a time of 4:12.90 at the Greater Boston Track Club Invitational in January. King, who competed in the '96 NCAA outdoor meet, was the ECAC runner-up last Sunday, and finished third in the IC4A mile at this year's Millrose Games at Madison Square Garden.

In the track program's history, three men have won individual NCAA indoor titles, and all were at the Division III level. Albany's indoor national champions include Geoffrey York, 55-hurdles (1992, 1995); Vernon Miller, 800 meters (1987); and David Walker, high jump (1986).

Roberto Vives Named ECAC Women's Indoor Track Coach of the Year

Centerville, Mass. -- University at Albany's Roberto Vives has been selected as the 1997 Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) Division II Women's Indoor Track Coach of the Year.

Vives, who guided the Great Danes to their first ECAC indoor title on Sunday, received the award for the second straight season. He was chosen as both the New England Collegiate Conference's men's and women's coach of the year two weeks ago.

Vives, a Bronx, N.Y. native, is in his 12th season as Albany's track and field head coach, and has produced 14 individual men's and women's NCAA champions during his tenure. The Great Danes will compete at this week's NCAA championships in Indianapolis, Indiana.

Men's Basketball: Albany has withdrawn from consideration for the ECAC tournament due to injuries. Tom McGoldrick (knee), Brad Dixon (knee), Kris Zeisler (back) and Matthew Haggarty (hip) were all injured in the NECC quarter-final loss to Massachusetts-Lowell on Feb. 24. The Great Danes finish at 17-10 in their second Division II campaign, and rebounded from last year's 12-15 record.

Women's Basketball: ECAC tournament bids will be announced later on Monday. Albany, which reached the NECC championship game, has a 19-9 record. Kelly Paolino (Schalmont H.S.) and Michele Davis were named to the conference's all-tournament team. Paolino, a 5'4" sophomore point guard, averaged 11.7 points and shot 64.7% from the field (11 of 17) in tournament play. She tied a careerhigh with 13 points, and added six rebounds in the final, and scored in double figures in all three post-season contests. Paolino averaged just 4.6 points during the 25-game regular season, and scored in double digits once.

Track & Field: Qualifiers for the NCAA Division II championships at the RCA Dome in Indianapolis, Indiana on March 8-9 will be announced early this week. Ellakisha Williamson (Albany H.S.) is a definite in the national field, and was selected as the Female Athlete of the Meet in leading the Albany to its first-ever ECAC Division II women's indoor track championship on Sunday at Lehigh University's Rauch Field House.

Williamson, who was also the Athlete of the Meet at the NECC championships on Feb. 15, set a school record with a first-place finish in the 55-meter hurdles in 7.96 seconds, and tied another Albany mark by capturing the 55-meter dash (7.09). She also breezed to victory in the 200 with a time of 25.33.

Tonya Dodge (Granville Central) and Janna Johnston (Shenendehowa) also broke school records in winning the 5,000-meter run and pentathlon, respectively. Dodge, a senior who has provisionally qualified for NCAAs in three events, was clocked in 17:34.61. Johnston scored 3,377 points in her competition, and posted the best marks in the long jump (17-3.50) and high jump (5-3.75).

Jason Gurwitz won at 500 meters for the second consecutive year with a time of 1:05.20, and the first-place 880-yard relay team set a school record (1:32.24) in leading the Great Danes to a third in the ECAC men's championship.

LOWELL, Mass.— Junior Sheila Knower (Templeton) scored 12 points and sophomore Jessica Bruce (Mattapan) added 11 points and eight rebounds as UMass Lowell claimed its fourth New England Collegiate Conference Women's Basketball championship this decade with a 70-44 victory over Albany Saturday night at Costello Gymnasium. The River Hawks earn the conference's automatic berth into the NCAA Division II tournament and improve to 24-5 overall, while the Great Danes are 19-9 overall.

UMass Lowell held Albany to just 22 percent shooting in the first half en route to a 34-14 lead at the break, the River Hawks began the game with an 8-0 run and used a 15-4 run in the final 5:58 of the half. UMass Lowell then used a 12-6 run to start the second half to extend that margin to 26 at 46-20, and the River Hawks' largest lead of 30 came with 6:58 to play on a lay in by freshman Jessica Ouellette (Pembroke, N.H.) to make it 62-32. Senior Debbie Henderson (Port Washington, N.Y.) added 10 points and 12 rebounds for UMass Lowell, which shot 46 percent from the field and held a 47-37 edge on the boards. Sophomore Kelly Paolino (Schenectady, N.Y.) paced Albany with 13 points and six rebounds, while senior Samantha Ginsberg (Nanuet, N.Y.) added eight points for the Great Danes.

Sophomore Marsha Blalock (Roxbury) was named as the tournament Most Valuable Player for UMass Lowell, while Knower and senior Diane DiRoma (Belmont, N.H.) were named to the all-tournament team. Paolino and senior Michele Davis (New Hartford, N.Y.) represented Albany on the all-tournament team, and they were joined by Bridgeport's Dana Williams.

UMass Lowell previously won the NECC title in 1991, 1993 and 1995, and the River Hawks are making their fifth appearance in the NCAA Division II tournament in seven years.
