Musicians Plan Spring Festival

To Feature Wagner, Verdi, Mozart, Strauss

In conjunction with National Music Week, the Music Council will sponsor the instrumental and vocal ensembles in their Spring Festival of Music, announces Joan DeVinny '53, President. The orchestra, under the direction of Dr. Charles Stokes, Professor of Music, will present its concert on Thursday, May 14. The vocal groups, directed by Karl Petersen, Instructor in Music, will perform on Friday, May 15. Both presentations will be given in Page Auditorium at 8:30 p.m.

Among the selections to be rendered by the orchestra will be the "Procession of the Meistersingers" by Wagner; "Perpetual Motion" by Strauss and a special orchestral arrangement by Lambert-Willousky of "When Johnny Comes Marching Home."

Featured with the orchestra will be Louise Petfield '53, singing "Voi che sapete" from Mozart's "The Marriage of Figaro"; and Evelyn Paulus and Richard Jacobson, Seniors, singing "Were You Not To Know I Loved You" from "The Mikado" by Arthur Sullivan. The program will also feature a string ensemble and a woodwind quintet.

The Vocal Ensembles which will present the choral concert are The Collegiate Singers, The Choralets, Men's Glee Club and Women's Chorus.

Frank Giannone '54, will be featured in the baritone solo "Eri Tu" from "The Masked Ball" by Verdi. Some of the choral selections will be "Hospodi Pomili" by von Luov, "Bring Me Men" by Clark, "De Animals A-comin'" by Bartholomew and "The Night Is Young" by Suesse.

SIS To Improve Student - Faculty Communications

The inauguration of a new system of communication between the members of the faculty and the student body has been announced by David Hartley, Dean of Men. This system is being introduced in order to facilitate and speed up communications between the faculty and the students. The new system will take effect Monday morning.

On that day, a number of typewritten lists of students whom various members of the faculty want to see will be posted in conspicuous positions on bulletin boards in each of the buildings on the college campus. All the lists will be replaced by an up-to-date one each day. All students are requested to check one of these lists every day until the end of this semester to see if it is necessary for them to make an appointment to see a faculty member.

This service will be known as the Student Information System (S.I.S.), states Dean Hartley, and is being inaugurated by the administration in view of the fact that the present system of getting in touch with the students through Student Mail has proved to be very ineffective.

SA To Discuss Group Budgets

At the meeting of Student Council Wednesday night three budgets were discussed, amendments to Forum constitution were approved, and reports were heard. The agenda for Friday's assembly will consist of budget discussions and announcements. The budget for MAA was submitted and approved as explained by John McCormick '54. The Student Union Board and the Pedagogy budget were also approved. It is to be recommended to Student Board of Finance that the Ped lines in the individual budgets be eliminated, each of these being inserted only under the regular Ped budget.

The amendment to the Forum constitution will abolish the School of Politics and all its functions. A vice-president has been added to the Forum officers, his duties being to preside in the absence of the president, to succeed the president for the remainder of the year if he should resign, and to act in the capacity of Research director in the organization's files. The duties of the Foreign Affairs chairman have been extended to include high school and community relations.

Palmina Calabrese '54, reported that the Albany Junior Chamber of Commerce had asked twelve boys and twelve girls from State to act as attendants to the Tulip Queen. The administration will pay to rent tuxedos for half the men, and Student Council voted to take \$2400 from surplus to outfit the rest. It was pointed out that this gesture will promote better relations between the city and college.

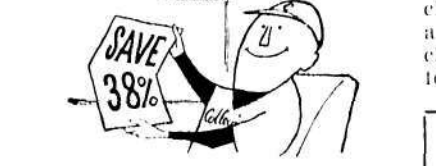

III. Moving-Up.

A. 1. The Juniors in the balcony will move quickly to the right, down the right stairs, and will fill in the seats behind the Juniors downstairs, who will have moved to the left, into the center section.

2. The Seniors move left across the aisle into the Sophomore section.

3. The Sophomores will move into the far aisle, up the left stairs, and fill in the left and center sections of the balcony.

4. The freshmen in the center section of the balcony will move right, down the right stairway, following the Juniors, and fill in the section vacated by the Juniors. The freshmen in the left section will move across the center section and fill in the front part of the right section of the balcony.

IV. Recessional.

A. Myskania leads, going out the right center aisle, and forming a line on either side of Page Hall steps.

B. The four classes follow in order:

1. Seniors will go down the walk by Husted Hall.

2. Juniors will follow the Seniors. At the end of the Page walk, they will turn right and proceed down the walk by Albany High.

3. Sophomores follow the Juniors, turning left at the end of Page walk to go through the Senior lines.

4. Freshmen will follow the Juniors, turning right to go through the Junior lines.

C. The classes will walk out of Page in double file, the couples splitting as they turn either right or left to form a single line on either side of the path. The Sophomores go through the Junior lines. When everyone is out of the auditorium, the Seniors in turn go through the Sophomore lines and the Juniors go through the freshman lines.

V. Forming the Numerals.

The Seniors will turn right and form their numerals in the corner of Page Field nearest Husted. The Sophomores will form their numerals in front of the Seniors near Western Avenue. The Juniors will turn left and form their numerals in the corner nearest Milne. The freshmen will follow the Juniors and form their numerals in front of the Juniors near Western Avenue.

VI. Evening.

A. The Rivalry skits will begin at 7 p. m. in Page Hall. Immediately after the skits the classes will meet in front of Draper and take the following positions:

1. Seniors stand on the steps of Draper.

2. Juniors stand to the right of the Seniors, facing the Library.

3. Sophomores face the Seniors.

4. Freshmen face the Juniors.

The Step Song will be sung first by the Seniors. After they have sung it once, they will move to their left and stand in front of the frosh. The Juniors will sing the Step Song once in place and then will proceed with their banner into the Husted side door of Draper, and will come out the front door of Draper singing the Step Song. The Sophomores will fill in the section vacated by the Juniors.

After the singing of the Step Song, the Seniors will turn and walk down the sidewalk to Western Avenue singing "Great Fires" as they do so.

Seniors To Check List For Graduation Notice
