Description:

To increase the academic rigor and student's holistic knowledge of the discipline, courses and requirements have been added to the theatre degree. The addition of ATHR 121 Play Analysis provides students a foundational course in understanding the analytical tools and critical approaches to the understanding of plays. The addition of ATHR 330 Contemporary Theatre adds an upper level survey course that teaches significant trends and developments in western theatre and theory from the 20th century to now. This course includes information about American Theatre History; therefore, THR 225 was removed from the requirements. Adding the requirement of ATHR 235 Fundamentals of Theatrical Design gives foundation to all students in aspects of design in theatre. Requiring ATHR 240 Acting I gives all students a foundation in acting training. ATHR 300 Plays in Process is a capstone course that provides all students within the major with an in depth examination at the arc of dramatic event. Three credits of practicum were added to the requirements to provide laboratory participation in production crew activities (scenery, publicity, props, electrical, costume, etc.). Requiring students to take one course in the three different sections of course options allows students to choose options that match their interest, while providing structure to ensure students will have courses within craft, production, and theatre history. Requiring one course in the 400 level options gives students further options within their interests but gives them mastery of their interests through the 400 level course. Requiring one additional elective within the 300/400 range increases the overall program's rigor and allows freedom to choose an upper level course in a different area.
