UNIVERSITY CENTER AT ALBANY MOVES TO NEW DORMS

The first of the new dormitories at the new campus of the University Center at Albany were occupied on Saturday, October 24 by 185 men who had been living in motels on the outskirts of the city. Two sections of the first quadrangle, which will eventually house 1,300 students, were taken over by the center the previous week, and furnished by University crews.

Using University buses and trucks, the move into the new quarters was finished in about four hours. While lounge and recreation areas are not complete, the men are generally pleased with the amount of space they have available and particularly with the size of closet and storage facilities.

Following Edward Durell Stone's plan, the typical accommodations call for 4 or 5 men suites, each including three rooms and a bath. Two of the rooms are bedrooms and one is a study area. Each student has a desk and chest assigned a s

well as a large closet. Luggage storage space is available in the basement of each building.

The move brings the men closer to the academic campus and to commercial facilities. Meals will be taken at the state campus commissary with the girls still living in motels. When the scheduled remaining dorms are completed before the end of the present semester all motel residents will move in and dining areas will be open and operating.

The halls in the new Quadrangle are named for well-known Dutch families, capitalizing on the heritage of the capital city. Presently occupied buildings are known as Van Rennesslaer and Ryckman Halls. David Valle is director and Joseph Silvey is assistant director. They have 4 undergraduate assistants.

Members of the university community were invited to an open house held Sunday, November 1, from 2 to 4:30 p. m.

The world famous Budapest String Quartet will appear at Page Hall, State University at Albany, on Tuesday, November 17, at 8:15 p.m. Under the sponsorship of the Music Council, the Quartet is noted for its wide repertoire, ranging from the works of Haydn, the first great master of the string quartet, to contemporary American music. Members of the quartet are: Joseph Roisman, violin; Alexander Schneider, violin; Boris Kroyt, viola; Mischa Schneider, violincello.

The Budapest is known all over the world for its performances of classical, romantic and modern chamber music but above all for its interpretations of Beethoven. The string quartet is considered by musical connoisseurs to be the purest and most personal form of musical expression and the members of the Budapest have long held their positions as the unchallenged masters of this subtle and beautiful art.

The Quartet has been playing in the United States since 1930 and its members live in this country and are American citizens. For twenty-three consecutive years they gave regular concerts in the Library of Congress. In 1954, they were chosen to open the now famous annual series of chamber music concerts of New York's Metropolitan Museum of Art and their annual series of programs at the Kaufmann Concert Hall in the same city have been popular for the last twenty-five years.

STATE UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY APPOINTS
DIRECTOR OF ANCILLARY SERVICES

The growing group of non-state supported ancillary services surrounding the operations of State University at Albany will be directed by George E. Brewer, former vice president of the Chemical Bank New York Trust Company. These are services rendered to students and faculty in background support of the educational programs of the University, and which receive principal financial support from the Faculty-Student Association, Inc. They include the food service to all dormitories, the university bookstore, the university film service, student loan service, and real estate management.

Mr. Brewer came to State University from a brief assignment with the American Management Association. Prior to that he worked with Heidrick and Struggles, Executive Recruiting Consultants. For seven years he served the New York Trust Company as Assistant Vice President in and later Vice President of the Personnel Division. When New York Trust merged with the Chemical Bank New York Exchange Bank of New York, Mr. Brewer became Vice President for Employee Training, Executive Development and College Recruiting in the resulting institution, Chemical Bank New York Trust Company.

Earlier he was director of labor relations and vice president of the Gary group of Independent Telephone Companies.

The Speakers' Bureau of State University of New York at Albany is one of the university's community-oriented activities. We are now in the process of preparing our 1964-65 Speakers' Bureau Directory with its listings of topics about which faculty members will speak upon request. If you would like to participate in this program, please indicate on the attached sheet your name, degree, faculty title, general classifications of subject, and titles of addresses. A guide to compensation as it will appear in the directory is quoted below:

"The speakers listed in this directory contribute generously of their time and professional competence to a wide variety of community activities. In addition, they welcome the opportunity to speak to interested groups. Since it is generally recognized that they must invest a substantial amount of their own time and effort in preparation and travel for each speaking engagement, we are frequently asked for guidance in determining appropriate compensation. It is hoped that the following information will answer such questions.

"Groups with small budgets customarily present a minimum honorarium of approximately \$35.00 to the speaker. (Special arrangements can sometimes be made to provide a speaker for the group which finds it possible to make only a token payment in lieu of expenses.)

"Speakers for major events in the life of an organization would expect a minimum honorarium of from \$50 to \$100, within a 35-mile radius of Albany. Beyond 35 miles, additional payment for food, lodging, and travel, should be estimated.

University Representatives

"Speakers designated as representatives of the University are reimbursed by the University; additional payment is neither expected nor permitted. Arrangements usually can be made for University representatives to speak on such topics as: curriculum; plant planning and development; alumni affairs; admissions policies; University organization; educational, cultural, and economic impact of the University; and similar topics which deal directly with the policies and plans and status of the University."

SPONSORS AREA SCHOOL BOARD MEETING

How schools get their money will be the subject of the first school board meeting sponsored by the Capital Area School Board Institute, a unit of the State University at Albany. Being held at the Bethlehem Central High School, November 19 at 8:00 p. m., the meeting is open to chief school officers and school board members in the 6 county capital area.

Alan K. Campbell, professor of political science at Syracuse University and former NYS deputy comptroller will address the group on the implications of the nature of school revenues to educational systems and the relative roles of different sources of revenue by levels of government. His topic: "School Finance as Social Investment," will deal specifically with the question of how increasing educational costs are to be financed by school boards.

School Board members from 52 member-school districts in 11 counties surrounding the capital city can send representatives without fee. Others are welcome and may contact the University for information.

ARCHITECTURAL CRITIC
WILL SPEAK AT STATE
UNIVERSITY, ALBANY

Peter Blake, managing editor of Architectural Forum and author of "God's Own Junkyard," will speak Friday afternoon, November 20, at State University of New York at Albany under the auspices of the university's Art Council. The public is invited to attend the lecture set for 1:25 o'clock in Draper 349.

Mr. Blake, who will talk about American architecture, has been a visiting critic and lecturer at several academic institutions including Yale, Cornell and Harvard universities. More recently the architect was one of the leaders of the Action Group for Better Architecture in New York which picketed and protested the imminent destruction of Pennsylvania Station, regarded by many architectural historians and conservators as one of the monuments of American architecture.

Subtitled "The Planned Deterioration of America's Landscape," Mr. Blake's latest published work sets forth the case against the collusion of politics, business, and public indifference which is degrading the American landscape. It has continued to be discussed widely since its publication early this year.

As you will note from the enclosed release, an event of unusual local interest will take place in your viewing area this weekend. The two-day geologic excursion, described in the enclosed release, has attracted a large number of eminent geologists who welcome the opportunity to inspect the unique pattern of geologic formations found in the Taconic region and about which controversy continues to swirl.

Perusal of the field trip guide, with its detailed account of the intriguing geologic aspects of the Taconic region and a history of the problems of the undeciphered geology, may prompt you to consider the possibility of preparing an educational documentary film on the subject. You will note that Dr. John M. Bird, Associate Professor of Geology at our university and editor of the field trip guide, has considerable knowledge of the area.

A list of geologists expected to participate is attached to the press release. Dr. Bird has advised me that there are many outstanding geologists included among them. Should you care to plan a televised interview, you might care to have your reporter talk with Marshall Kay of Columbia University, G. H. Crowl, Department of Geology and Geography, Ohio Wesleyan University, Delaware, Ohio; or John C. Maxwell, Geology Department, Princeton University, Princeton, N.J., among other eminent guests.

The field trip starts each of the two mornings, Saturday and Sunday, at 7:15 o'clock and you will note that there is detailed information in the guide about the stops. On Saturday the group plans to return to Albany at about 5 p.m. The geologists will be at the Inn-Towne Motel until 7 p.m. when they will come to Waterbury Hall here for dinner.

A two-day geologic excursion in the southern Taconic region of eastern New York State will begin Saturday with Dr. John Bird, associate professor of geology at State University of New York at Albany, as a leader. The trip is being held in conjunction with the 75th anniversary meeting of the Geological Society of America to be held in New York City November 17-20, with an estimated attendance of 5,000 geologists expected.

The excursion is designed to permit inspection of unique aspects of geologic formations in the Taconics by those who attend the annual meeting. Participants on the trip, which is being supported by the Albany university, will include about 80 geologists from many parts of the world, including Europe, South America, the Middle East and Japan, as well as many of the states of this country and provinces of Canada. Beginning early Saturday morning at Albany, the excursion will proceed with frequent bus stops to geologically interesting localities in Rensselaer County and near Bennington, Vt. The evening will be spent in Albany where a dinner will be served at Albany University's Waterbury Hall. Sunday morning the trip will start from Albany again, and end late in the day in New York City. Co-leaders with Dr. Bird are Dr. E-an Zen, U.S. Geological Survey, Washington; Dr. William D.N. Berry, University of California at Berkeley; and Dr. Donald D. Potter, Hamilton College.

A publication describing the field trip and discussing the geology at the numerous stops has been prepared for the participants under the editorship of Dr. Bird. It concentrates on the geologic aspects of the Taconic area east of the Hudson River from Troy to Poughkeepsie, emphasizing structural, stratigraphic, sedimentologic, and paleontologic aspects, problems and synthesis of the region in terms of recent studies by the leaders and others.

The geology of the Taconic sequence of rocks in western Vermont, western Massachusetts and eastern New York is classical in the geological literature because of the many baffling problems it presents and over which there is much controversy. Compounding the problems of the decipherment of Taconic geology is the 1961 discovery that the Taconic rocks clearly have undergone two generations of folding, of which the earliest is the most intense while only the latest episodes are observed in the rocks of the synclinorium sequence. One aim of the field trip is to contrast and compare the rocks from Sudbury, Vt. to Poughkeepsie, New York, and to show the differences in the structural relations of the rocks to the surrounding rocks of the synclorium sequence.

Plans are underway for a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree at this University. Patterened after traditional BFA programs at other universities the proposal was approved without dissent at a recent general faculty meeting.

The design now pending approval by the Trustees of State University and the Board of Regents calls for 54 semester hours in Liberal Arts & Sciences; (See attached for distribution) a major in Art, Music or Drama of 66 hours and 4 hours of free electives. Concentrated fields within Art are painting, sculpture and graphics; in Music they are: applied music, theory and composition, or history and literature. Now determination has yet been established in Drama.

Since the legislation founding the University calls for approval of new programs by the Board of Regents after recommendation by the State University Board of Trustees, the program is not official until then. The proposal had previously been approved by the college of Arts and Sciences faculty and the Undergraduate Academic Council.

There are programs leading to a B. A. and M. A. degree in drama now in operation. Programs for the B. A. in art and music have been approved and will be offered beginning in 1966 or as soon as facilities are available.

TAX CODE SEMINAR**

More than 170 Albany area tax consultants, lawyers, and accountants will receive certificates signifying successful completion of an eight week course dealing with the changes in the Internal Revenue Code caused by the 1964 Revenue Act. The course was sponsored by the State University at Albany with instructional service and technical assistance provided by the Albany office of the Internal Revenue Service.

George O'Hanlon, Albany Internal Revenue Agent, will address the group at a closing dinner session being held at the Schine Ten-Eyck Hotel on Monday, November 23 at 7:30 p. m. His topic will deal with the Federal Regulations concerning practitioners and powers of attorney. Course Director Reno Knouse, professor in the School of Business at the State University, announced that remarks will be made by IRS district director Edward J. Fitzgerald, Jr., and certificates will be awarded by dean of the University's School of Business, Milton C. Olsen.

The eight sessions conducted by four Albany IRS agents were designed to prepare local tax preparing agencies and businesses with the latest information on the 1964 IRS regulations and to provide more efficient service for area taxpayers. "The time a person requires to perceive that a tone is being produced seems to have a strong relation to how well he can learn and understand speech. And it also seems to have a strong relation to the health of some parts of his nervous system," Dr. Paul C. Boomsliter, professor of speech at the State University of New York at Albany told west coast audiences on Tuesday, November 24.

Dr. Boomsliter presented two research papers at the fortieth annual convention of the American Speech and Hearing Association at the Hilton Hotel in San Francisco.

The first of the two papers, written with Mr. Warren Creel and Dr. Samuel R. Powers, Jr., of the Albany Medical College, is titled "Threshold of Tonal Perception in Central Pathway Damage." The second, written with Mr. Creel, is titled "The Boomsliter-Creel Test of Tonal Processing."

"About two-thirds of the difficulties that a nerve-deafened person has in understanding speech aren't adequately explained by contemporary diagnostic testing," Dr. Boomsliter said. "But somewhere in the middle ground between speech itself and present tests there must be explanations. The Boomsliter-Creel Test uses time as a test device, and it shows up sources of difficulty in a number of previously unexplained cases. We think that this test, or a refinement of it belongs in the system of diagnostic testing used for hearing."
