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### Business Not "Crushed By Taxation"

Is it true, as Wall Street propagandists claim, that Federal taxes are so heavy that they "discourage business" by taking too large a share of profits? Complete figures answering that question are provided in a study published by Senator Joseph C. O'Mahoney's Temporary National Economic Committee

The last year for which complete tax and profit figures were available was 1937. In that year, according to the study, the profits of American corporations totaled \$9,076,000,000, and were divided as follows:

Uncle Sam took \$1,276,000,000, or 14 cents of each \$1, in Federal income, excess-profits, and undistributed-profits taxes.

Bondholders got \$1,700,000,000, or 19 cents of each \$1, in in-The immense sum of \$6,100,000,000, or 67 cents of each \$1,

was left for dividends to stockholders.

Remember, that was 1937 — a year when propagandists told us business was being "starved" and "overtaxed" and when profits were not nearly so big as they are today.

It is to lie about and slander Americans who demand their rights as Americans.

It is to stir up intolerance, division and dissension by Jewbaiting, Negro-baiting, red-baiting, alien-baiting, labor-baiting, and by turning Americans of different races, creeds and beliefs against

It is to advocate inequality by cutting relief, increasing the tax burden on the poor, and permitting the rich to buy unfair

privileges and exemptions. It is all these things and a lot more that violates American ideals of liberty, justice, democracy and equality of opportunity.

If an "I am un-American Day" is proclaimed, it will give quite a string of anti-union employers, exploiters, petty tyrants, labor-baiting politicians, profiteers, propagandists and other enemies of true Americanism a chance to have their day and to stand exposed for what they really are.

### Investing In Democracy

Local 301 has purchased 25,000 dollars of the U.S. Government Defense Bonds.

Our membership knows that the American Way is the Union Way — and defending the American Way of Life is the best way of defending our Union.

Defending the American Way of Life and investing the Unions Funds in DefenseBonds — should not be construed as an indorsement of war. The C. I. O. both Nationally and Locally has gone on record over and over again opposed to war.

#### NON-MEMBERS — POTENTIAL DISRUPTERS

The small minority of non-members are a constant source of irritation to the good union members — thus these non-members are potential disrupters to the smooth flow of production of Defense material.

These non-members who yell about democracy do not know the meaning of true democracy.

True Democracy. In any democratic institution, be it a union. political or otherwise — when the majority pass on some measure — the minority must go along. Suppose the majority of the taxpayers in the city of Schenectady voted to build a new school and new assessments were levied to take care of cost of the school building — according to the non-members, the minority of taxpayers who voted against building a new school would be excluded from paying taxes. This does not make sense. By the same token, the small minority of non-members who got the ten cents an hour increase through the efforts of their fellow-workers — should join the union — and pay their way.

### So-Called Public Opinion Polls

One of the latest refinements in the racket of manufacturing public opinion for private profit is quite whimsical. It consists of an attempt to prove, through so-called public opinion polls, that American labor is anti-labor.

It's all just too cute for words — if your sense of humor runs to knocking crutches from cripples, putting "help yourself" signs on-blind-beggars'-cups, and the like.

#### GALLUP POLL

The Gallup poll weekly advances "evidence" of public belief that labor is more to blame for stoppages than anti-union profiteering employers; that strikes are caused by Communists; that labor. not big business, has too much power; that wages should be kept down and hours lengthened; that union activity should be curbed by law; that new taxation should fall chiefly on the poor.

#### FORTUNE MAGAZINE

Now comes the Fortune magazine "survey of public opinion," with similar evidence of public demand for anti-strike legislation and compulsory arbitration; greater sympathy for anti-union employers than the union pickets; brickbats for union leaders and bouquets for the labor policies of Henry Ford and Bethlehem Steel.

#### TOOTSIE-WOOTSIE TID BITS

So far, it would seem, the polls are trying to prove to the big business publishers which finance them that the public are suckers for their anti-labor propaganda.

It is something like a radio station trying to prove statistically to a sponsor that the radio public is crazy for his Tootsie-Wootsie Tid-Bits. If such a survey showed the public would sooner take its poison straight than with a Tootsie-Wootsie sugar-coating, it just wouldn't be made.

But no Tootsie-Wootsie poll has ever gone quite so far as to "prove" that parents love it when their children get sick from Tootsie-Wootsies; that the kids think candy prices should be raised; and that anyone who hates Tootsie-Wootsies is a communist.

It has been left for the Gallup, Fortune and other similar polls to offer their big business sponsors such super-super-service.

With all sorts of statistical mumbo-jumbo, they now purport to show that the workers themselves want to have their wages "frozen," their hours lenghtened, and the possibility of improving their conditions averted through anti-labor legislation.

#### HERE IS A CUTE ONE

Perhaps the cutest one of the month was the Gallup tax poll. At a time when war profiteers are lobbying to have the poor pay

for their swollen boodle through wage-cutting taxation, a poll is announced that delicately avoids the issue of putting the tax burden

Instead, it asserts that "the public" by a big majority favors the heavy taxation of low incomes. And then - deftest touch of all - the poll announces that

even the poorest, with incomes at near-starvation levels, favor paying additional taxes equivalent to two weeks' wages.

That was such a hot number, that many profiteer lobbyists chuckled themselves into hicoughs.

#### HOW ARE ALL THESE AMAZING RESULTS ACHIEVED?

Ah, that, my friends, is a secret. Even if the publisher's statisticians told, we wouldn't understand

The atmosphere of higher mathematics, statistical controvers and academic bluff is so rarefied that the ordinary mortal gasps for breath and is glad to escape with his life.

But we can at least think these thoughts:

(1) The method of selection of the few thousand human guinea-pigs, who are supposed to represent public opinion, undoubtedly determines poll results.

(2) The phrasing of the questions obviously determines the kind of answers that may be expected.

(3) When you're barely getting by on a low-wage job, and just want to be left alone, and when an official sort of person visits you and starts snooping into your private opinions - wouldn't your first thought be to get rid of him speedily without incriminat-

When the press constantly proclaims that strikes are un-American, that labor must be curbed in the national interest, that patriotism demands sacrifices from the poorest, how many are going to lay themselves open before a snooping stranger even to such phoney charges of being unpatriotic, selfish, etc.

But be all this as it may, we make this offer: Give us the wealth, power and facilities available to the interests that manufacture public opinion — and we will soon offer similar evidence of public belief that not labor, but the domestic cockroach, is responsible for all evil.

With press and radio blaring out daily against the cockroach menace, with intimations of Congresssional. FEI and other investigations of anyone who is sceptical on the cockroach question we guarantee to find enough suckers, milquetoasts and cockroachpowder salesmen to support even the most extreme crusade agains the unfortunate insect.



The cost of living has risen steadily, due to hidden taxes and uncontrolled speculation, and a ceiling for such commodities which we need to exist, is nowhere in sight.

The little man is patriotic, loyal. He knows that it will cost astronomical sums to defend the democratic way of life. He knows that this and future generations will have to pay heavily for enjoying that privilege. But he wants everyone who enjoys these privileges and benefits, to assume their responsibilities in accordance with their ability to pay. Unless the law makers who create our tax legislation seek to distribute our heavy tax burden equitously and fairly, they cannot expect true national unity, from our masses of wage earners, (from the little man), so essential to national welfare.
