



The writer of the study included several recommendations for the administration to improve retention. There are suggestions for (1) reexamining policies and regulations relating to housing, hours, attendance, probation, and marking, (2) seeking ways of preserving and improving faculty relationships with the students as persons, and (3) making withdrawal a more difficult and guided process.

The ideas set forth in the Retention Report are of prime concern to the student body. Retention is of essential importance in adding and withdrawing, liberal arts, educational and co-curricular courses, in housing and in student activities. The faculty has set a retention rate of 74.8 as the most desirable goal. It is definitely not impossible and is most likely probable that this goal can be reached if Student Association and the Administration communicate on a more compatible and
