Beethoven to Lukas Foss : Five Concerts Offer Variety

Five concerts are scheduled on campus during the next few days and they're varied enough to appeal to many tastes.

This evening at 8:30 Dennis Helmrich of the faculty will be heard in a piano recital featuring the works of Schubert, Liszt, and Beethoven. The program will be held in the PAC Recital Hall.

The Guarneri String Quartet will perform tomorrow evening, beginning at 8:30 in the Main Theatre. Tickets at \$3 are available at the PAC box office.

In the quartet are Arnold Steinhardt and John Dalley, violins; Michael Tree,

viola; and David Soyer, cello. Since their sensational New popular and praised quartet of the era.

SUNYA's Wind Ensemble will perform Thursday evening, also in the Main Theatre, with Charles Boito conducting. The program, open to the public without charge, will begin at 8:30.

Featured during the evening will be Ruth McKee, bassoon, and Helen Ghiradella, piano. Compositions on the program are by Cowell, Phillips, Stravinsky, Grainger, Mehul, Bach-Holst, Strauss, Wagner, Berlioz, and Surinach.

The Creative Associates from SUNY Buffalo will be heard in a concert of contemporary music Friday at 8:30 p.m. in the Laboratory Theatre. They'll perform Lukas Foss's "Nap." Admission to the program sponsored by the Music Council is \$1 with tax card and \$3 without.

Saturday night Foss will direct Department of Music students and faculty in a spontaneous event called "Premiere" beginning at 8:30 in the Main Theatre. The concert is open to the public without charge.

Holiday Season Parties Slated

On Saturday evening, Dec. 9, the Puerto Rican Christmas festival program with a dinner, dance, and show will start at 6 in the CC ballroom. There'll be an orchestra for dancing. Tickets will be \$4 in advance and \$4.50 at the door.

FSA Board To Sell Property, End Patroon Room Dinners

Drastic revisions in Faculty-Student Association operations and programming are being put into effect or under study as a result of action taken at the Board of Directors meeting on Nov. 20. Following a report by acting director Norbert Zahm, the board moved to discontinue service in the Patroon Room in the evening as well as special function meals effective with the end of this semester. Special functions will be available for groups large enough to carry cost of staff. Rates may increase for such services.

The board also authorized sale of the Waverly Place property and established a committee to review the balance of FSA-owned property and to recommend action.

FSA President John Hartley was instructed to attempt to find university funds to cover the annual rental of FSA office space or to locate suitable space on university-owned property.

A committee was established to study the feasibility of closing dining facilities in all but one residence quadrangle during commencement week. Also under study are a proposal to consider possibilities of altering the use of the Campus Center cafeteria and the question of subsidy of meal plans for residence hall directors. Other aspects of food service operations will be studied.

Linguists Meet

The Linguistics Colloquium, sponsored by the Committee to Develop a Linguistics Program here, will meet Wednesday at 8 p.m. in HU 290.

Leo Pap, professor of linguistics at SUC New Paltz, will speak on "Linguistic Terminology As a Source of Verbal Fictions." He will examine the possible consequences of some of the ways in which linguists talk about language. He also will deal with the Whorf-Sapir hypothesis as applied to linguistics terminology.

All interested are invited to attend.

The board has asked Messrs. Hartley and Zahm to investigate and report on the possibility of transferring the operation of the bookstore to an independent franchise. Discussed, but not acted upon, were proposals to increase the charge for check cashing to \$.20 and to remove support of the programs at the Mohawk Campus, the Glen House, and university functions. It was pointed out that the first two items are approaching the break-even point and soon will be carrying themselves.

The next meeting is scheduled to be held on Dec. 15 at 3 p.m. in CC 375.

Education Dean Search Begins

J. Ralph Tibbetts, director of teacher education, is chairman of the newly-formed search committee to find a successor to Dean Randolph S. Gardner, School of Education, whose resignation becomes effective next August. Serving as committee secretary is Nicholas DeLuca, principal of The Milne School.

Others on the committee are Morris Berger, educational foundations; Vernon Buck, Educational Opportunities Program; Robert Carmack, anthropology; Fred Childs, graduate student; Margaret Farrell, mathematics; James Fleming, reading; Peter Flyzek, undergraduate student; I. Moyer Hunsberger, dean, College of Arts and Sciences; Kenneth Kimball, principal, Farnsworth Middle School, Guelderland; James Powers, educational psychology and statistics; Helen Safford, business education; and Marc Salisch, graduate student.

Dr. Tibbetts has emphasized that the committee is anxious to receive nominations. They may be sent to him, to Dr. DeLuca, or to any other member of the committee. The committee's final report is expected no later than Apr. 1.

The committee was formed by Vice President for Academic Affairs Phillip Sirotkin at the request of President Benezet.

Biologist To Lecture on Limb Deformity

John W. Saunders, Jr., professor of biological sciences and a nationally known developmental biologist, will give the third lecture in the 1972-73 University Series here Thursday evening in the Recital Hall of the Performing Arts Center. The program, to which the public is invited, will begin at 8 p.m.

Professor Saunders' subject will be "Control of Limb Development and Deformity". The illustrated lecture has been described as providing a scientist's glimpse at an enigma of life-puzzling "conversations" between layers of cells which control the pattern of development of human limbs soon after conception.

Dr. Saunders, who joined the faculty here in 1967, has been awarded many federal grants for research studies in

developmental biology and has occupied executive positions with various professional societies and editorships with journals. He has been president of the Society for Developmental Biology, the national society of developmental biologists, and has served as chairman of the Division of Developmental Biology of the American Society of Zoologists.

Professor Saunders is the author of a large number of scientific articles and of two books dealing with the role of programmed cell death in embryogenesis. Presently he is writing a major text for developmental biology courses.

Prior to coming to SUNYA Dr. Saunders was professor of anatomy at the Veterinary School of the University of Pennsylvania.

Edward M. Jennings, assistant professor of English, has been appointed assistant to President Benezet for the current academic year. He will concentrate on regionalization and educational planning and will remain in close contact with the Office of Academic Affairs.

President Benezet stated that Dr. Jennings, who last year held an American Council on Education internship, would bring focus to SUNYA commitments to regional developments in educational co-operation. The university is involved in local intercollegiate arrangements in the SUNY coordinating area III regional system and in the Regents' Advisory Council on Regionalism, embracing private institutions as well as units of SUNY.

Dr. Jennings also serves on the SUNYA Master Plan Long-Range Planning Task Force.
