DENNIS KING AND DEBBIE AUGUST NAMED AS THE UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY'S ATHLETES OF THE YEAR

ALBANY, N.Y. -- **Dennis King**, an all-conference cross country and middle distance runner, and **Debbie August**, one of the nation's scoring leaders in lacrosse, have been selected as the University at Albany's 1995-96 Male and Female Athlete of the Year. The athletes were chosen in voting by the head coaches of Albany's 19-sport intercollegiate athletics program.

King, a senior from Schenectady, N.Y. (Notre Dame Bishop Gibbons H.S.), competed in the 1,500-meter finals at the NCAA Division II track & field championships last weekend. He finished 10th in the event, and was the only Albany male athlete to qualify for nationals. King reached the NCAAs with a school-record 3:50.49 at the Baldwin-Wallace Invitational in Ohio. His time eclipsed a standard set by Joseph McCullen at the 1991 NCAA Division III meet.

King was the Collegiate Track Conference 1,500 champion, and also captured titles at the '96 Florida State Relays, Albany Invitational and Albany Spring Classic. In addition, he won the CTC indoor 1,000 meters (2:33.30), and finished second in the 1,000 and fourth in the one-mile run at the ECAC championships. His performances helped Albany win both the CTC indoor and outdoor crowns. A captain on the Albany cross country team, King was a second-team all-New England Collegiate Conference selection. He placed 13th at the NECC championships, when he was clocked in 33:51.42 over 8,000 meters. King was also 12th at CTCs, 29th at ECACs and 46th at the NCAA Division II Regionals.

A senior from Rye, N.Y. (Rye H.S.), August ranked among the NCAA Women's Collegiate Lacrosse scoring leaders throughout the season. In the latest national rankings for Division I and II players, she was fifth in both points per game (5.27) and goals per game (4.09). August, who led Albany to an 8-4 record and an ECAC championship appearance in the program's first Division II campaign, broke her own single-season scoring record with 62 points (49 goals, 13 assists). She tallied a career-high seven goals vs. LeMoyne, and recorded four or more goals in nine contests.

August finished her career as the school's all-time leading scorer with 164 points (132 goals, 32 assists), and established the single-season record for goals with 50 as a junior. During her career, the Great Danes produced four winning seasons, two ECAC tournament appearances, and posted a combined 32-17 record.

FORMATION OF EASTERN FOOTBALL CONFERENCE ANNOUNCED 12-Team Division II Conference Will Debut in 1997

SPRINGFIELD, Mass. --- A dozen Division II institutions from New England and New York have joined together to form the Eastern Football Conference, Bentley College athletic director Bob DeFelice announced today at a press luncheon at American International College. DeFelice will serve as the conference's first commissioner.

Half of the conference members are from Massachusetts: American International, Assumption College, Bentley, UMass-Lowell, Merrimack College and Stonehill College.

They will be joined by the University at Albany, C.W. Post, Pace University, Sacred Heart University, Southern Connecticut State University and the University at Stony Brook.

The 12-team conference will be divided into two divisions, with play beginning with the 1997 season. Each member school will play eight EFC games, five against the other teams in the same division and three versus teams in the other division. The two divisional winners will meet at the conclusion of the regular season in a championship game.

The two divisions will be based upon geographical lines, with the six Massachusetts schools comprising one and the remaining six the other.

Half of the new conference's members (Assumption, Bentley, Merrimack, UMass-Lowell and Sacred Heart) will shift from the Eastern Collegiate Football Conference, which includes both Division II and III schools. Stony Brook has been a member of the Freedom Football Conference while AIC, Albany, C.W. Post, Pace, and Southern Connecticut were competing as independents.

Southern Connecticut was also a member of the old Eastern Football Conference, where it won five league titles from 1965-70. At that time, the EFC consisted of Trenton State, Montclair State, Glassboro State, Bridgeport, Central Connecticut and Southern.

Bentley has been one of the winningest teams in the nation in recent years, compiling a 40-3 record since 1992, including a 30-game winning streak, the longest by a New England school in this century. Stonehill, which ended Bentley's streak in the 1995 season finale, is the defending ECFC champion. C.W. Post was the 1993 ECAC Intercollegiate Football Conference Division II Bowl champion and also faced Bentley in the 1994 Bowl.

AIC featured the 1995 ECAC Division II Player of the Year Rashid Thomas, and UMass-Lowell was a participant in the NCAA Division III playoffs in 1991. UMass-Lowell and Assumption both have new coaches this coming season, and Merrimack will be launching its varsity football program this fall.



UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY SIGNS THREE WOMEN'S SCHOLASTIC HOOP PLAYERS

ALBANY, N.Y. -- The University at Albany has received signed commitments from three women's basketball players as head coach **Mari Warner** announced today. The list includes **Megan Buchanan**, a 5'11" forward-center from Arkport, N.Y. (Hornell H.S.), **Dawn DiMicco**, a 5'5" guard from South Salem, N.Y. (John Jay-Cross River H.S.) and **Marlana Wheelwright**, a 5'10" forward from Roosevelt, N.Y. (Roosevelt H.S.).

The Great Danes awarded scholarships to five players for the 1996-97 academic year. **Mary Harrison**, an all-state forward from Cold Spring Harbor, N.Y. and **Melissa Schoonover**, a 6'1" forward-center from Painted Post, N.Y., committed to the Albany program during the early signing period last November.

"This certainly was the most successful recruiting season in our program's history," said Warner, whose team posted a 13-14 record and reached the New England Collegiate Conference tournament's semi-final round in its first NCAA Division II campaign. "The caliber of players joining our team solidifies the post position for next year. All five athletes will fit well into our system, and should contribute immediately."

Buchanan, an all-Greater Rochester choice by the *Democrat & Chronicle*, averaged 19.0 points and 12.2 rebounds as a senior. A three-time all-Sullivan Trail Conference selection, she was named the most valuable player at the Ronald McDonald Exceptional Seniors all-star game. Buchanan led Hornell High to a 15-7 record and the Section V, Class B semifinals.

DiMicco, a first-team all-state selection, averaged 19.1 points, 7.2 assists and 5.1 steals. She was named the Area Player of the Year by both *Gannett Suburban Newspapers* and the *Patent Trader*, and was a member of the all-Westchester County team. DiMicco, who will also play lacrosse at Albany, led her club to the Class B state basketball title and a 26-1 record. A three-time all-section and all-league guard, she was chosen as the state tournament MVP.

Wheelwright, who averaged 15.2 points and 12.5 rebounds as a senior, was twice picked as an all-Conference IV forward. She was the co-most valuable player at the Nassau County Exceptional Seniors all-star game. Wheelwright, a track & field athlete at Roosevelt High, has earned all-county recognition and a divisional championship in the shot put.

UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY SENDS THREE ATHLETES TO NCAA DIVISION II TRACK & FIELD CHAMPIONSHIPS

ALBANY, N.Y. -- Dennis King, Mary Ingram and Tonya Dodge will represent the University at Albany at the 1996 NCAA Division II Track & Field Championships, which will be held at the University of California-Riverside on May 23-25. All three athletes are former area scholastic track standouts.

King, a senior from Schenectady, N.Y. (Notre Dame Bishop Gibbons H.S.), ran a school-record 3:50.49 at the Baldwin-Wallace Invitational in Ohio to qualify for the 1,500-meter run. King's time eclipsed a mark set by Joseph McCullen at the 1991 Division III nationals. King won the Collegiate Track Conference (CTC) 1,500 championship in early May, and also captured titles at the Florida State Relays, Albany Invitational and Albany Spring Classic.

Ingram qualified for NCAAs in both the women's 100- and 400-meter hurdles. She established a school record in the 400-hurdles, when she won the Albany Invitational in 1:01.41. Ingram, a senior from Albany, N.Y. (Albany H.S.), captured the CTC championship and was second in the Division II race at the Florida State Relays. A '96 NCAA indoor qualifier in the 55-hurdles, Ingram posted a personal-best 14.25 seconds in the outdoor 100-hurdles to make the national field.

Dodge, a junior from Granville, N.Y. (Granville Central H.S.), is making her second consecutive appearance in the NCAA 3,000-meter championship. She qualified for the NCAA Division III event last year, and ran 9:59.10 at Penn Relays in April to set a school record and become one of 12 competitors in the Division II national meet.

Freshman Janna Johnston (Shenendehowa H.S.) missed the NCAA field in the women's heptathlon by just 27 points. Johnston had provisionally qualified last weekend, when she finished ninth in an all-Division I field at the ECAC championships. Her 4,536 points in the seven-event competition broke a school record she had previously set two weeks earlier.

Albany has had four men and one woman win a combined 10 individual NCAA outdoor championships at the Division III level in the track & field program's history.

Fairfax, Va. -- Freshman Janna Johnston (Shenendehowa H.S.) provisionally qualified for next weekend's NCAA Division II track & field championships in the heptathlon with a school-record 4,536 points at the ECAC championships on Saturday at George Mason University.

Johnston's previous best performance was a total of 4,366 points, when she won the Collegiate Track Conference title on May 4. She ran ran a personal-best 2:27 in the 800 meters, and also went 17-feet, 8-inches in the long jump on the final day of competition.

Xiomara Diaz and Albany's 1,600-meter relay team failed in their attempts to qualify for NCAAs, but did establish school records. Diaz was clocked in 14.68 seconds in the 100-meter hurdles. Mary Ingram (Albany H.S.) ran 56.7 on the relay's second leg, as the team finished in 3:54.67.

UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY SIGNS MASSACHUSETTS CAGE STANDOUT

ALBANY, N.Y. -- The University at Albany has received a signed commitment to play basketball from **Matthew Haggarty**, a 6'2", 180-pound guard from Wayland, Mass. (Catholic Memorial H.S.) as head coach **Richard Sauers** announced today. Haggarty is the third and final scholastic hoop star to be awarded a scholarship for 1996-97. **Todd Cetnar**, an all-state guard from Amsterdam, N.Y., and 6-foot, 6-inch forward **Kris Zeisler**, of Tabernacle, N.J., made known their intentions to play for the Great Danes last month.

Haggarty, a second-team *Boston Globe* all-scholastic selection, averaged 19.8 points and shot 48 percent from three-point range as a senior. He was named to the Catholic Conference all-star team, and received his team's Outstanding Senior award. Haggarty, who was chosen first-team Academic All-State with a 3.8 cumulative grade point average, presently is a member of the Greater Boston 19-and-under AAU team.

As a junior, Haggarty averaged 10.3 points per game off the bench for head coach Joe Day. Catholic Memorial finished with a 23-3 record, won the South sectional and conference titles, and reached the Class IA state semifinals in the Boston Garden.

"I like Matthew as a two-way player," said Sauers, who has 685 career victories in 40 seasons as Albany's head coach. "He is an excellent offensive player and an outstanding three-point shooter, but more importantly he plays terrific defense. We sorely needed help on defense, and he will improve our ability to guard the other team's perimeter players."

Albany recently completed its first season as an NCAA Division II program, and is a member of the New England Collegiate Conference. In addition to the three incoming freshmen, all eleven letterwinners return to next year's team.

"We had a great recruiting year," Sauers commented. "We were able to find exactly what we needed. The freshman class has quality, and should make an immediate impact as a group."

UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY ATHLETES AWARDED ECAC MERIT MEDALS Rich Tallarico, Gigi Legendre and Karen Gaudiello Are Selected

ALBANY, N.Y. -- The University at Albany's **Rich Tallarico**, **Gigi Legendre** and **Karen Gaudiello** were awarded Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) Merit Medals today as the school's top senior male and female scholar-athletes during the 1995-96 academic year.

Tallarico, a three-year starter on the Albany football team's offensive line, has a 3.93 cumulative grade point average as a pre-med student in biology with an English minor. Legendre, an outside hitter in volleyball, and Gaudiello, who plays second base on the softball team, shared the female scholar-athlete award. Legendre has a 3.41 GPA in psychology with a double minor in English and communcation. Gaudiello is majoring in history with a Spanish minor, and has a 3.78 GPA.

A three-year regular on Albany's offensive line, Tallarico made 30 consecutive starts at both left and right guard and played in 38 career games. The Great Danes averaged 364 yards (199.6 rushing, 164.4 passing) in total offense and 21.8 points per game last fall. Tallarico, of Wantagh, N.Y., became just the third Albany football player to be chosen to the GTE College Division Academic All-America first team. He was also selected as the Division II Burger King Scholar-Athlete of the Week in December, and was a national finalist for an NCAA post-graduate scholarship. Tallarico, a Phi Beta Kappa student, recently received the President's Outstanding Senior Award, and has been accepted into medical school. He serves as president of Pi Kappa Phi Fraternity and works with Push America, an organization which aids the disabled.

Legendre, who earned the volleyball program's most valuable player award on two occasions, averaged 3.6 kills and 3.9 digs in 20 matches played for the Great Danes in 1995. She led Albany to a 15-12 record and the semifinals of the New England Collegiate Conference tournament. Legendre, a tri-captain, finished among the school's career leaders in several statistical categories, including second in digs (854) and sixth in kills (614). A native of Port Jefferson, N.Y., she intends to pursue a doctorate in clinical psychology, and has worked for the last two years as teacher/counselor with both disabled adults and children.

A two-year starter at second base, Gaudiello batted .223 with 16 runs scored and nine RBIs in all 30 games played. The Albany co-captain led the team with 12 sacrifice hits and had a .926 fielding percentage. Gaudiello, of East Quogue, N.Y., is a Phi Beta Kappa student, and a member of both the Presidential and Golden Key honor societies. She recently was accepted into the Peace Corps, and is awaiting her assignment.

Albany, N.Y. -- University at Albany's Dennis King (Notre Dame Bishop Gibbons H.S.) provisionally qualified for the NCAA Division II championships with his victory in the 1,500-meter run at the Albany Spring Track & Field Classic on Friday evening at University Field.

King, a senior, ran a personal-best 3:53.20 to finish ahead of Rochester's Andy Evans (3:53.31) and Jason Hart (3:53.72). Both Rochester runners ran provisional times for the NCAA Division III championships in Naperville, Illinois on May 22-25. The Division II nationals are scheduled for May 23-25 in Riverside, California.

Binghamton's John DeMatteo also qualified for Division III nationals in winning the pole vault with a mark of 15-feet, 4.25-inches.

Meanwhile, Albany's Janna Johnston (Shenendehowa H.S.) narrowly missed qualifying in the women's long jump, but still posted the second-best mark in school history at 18-8.25. Freshman Tim McMurray (Glens Falls H.S.) won the javelin with a school-record throw of 177-10.50.

Other local winners were Rensselaer's Shawn Hanranhan in the hammer throw (171-3) and Union's Nick Conway in the 800-meter run (1:58.07).

The final four events (400 hurdles, 200, 5,000 and 1,600-meter relay) were cancelled when a thunderstorm and lightning hit the area around 8:00 p.m.

NOTE: Geoffrey York, of Troy, N.Y., won both the 110 hurdles (13.95) and 100-meter dash (10.85) at tonight's meet. York was running for the New York Pioneer Club, and edged out Rensselaer's Krishaun Gilmore (Christian Bros. Academy) in the 100. Gilmore was second in 10.93.



UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY ANNOUNCES 1996 FOOTBALL SCHEDULE

ALBANY, N.Y. -- The University at Albany has released its 1996 football schedule as Director of Athletics Dr. Milton E. Richards announced today.
