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FACULTY APPROVES HI-Y PLAN **SENIOR NEWS** SENIOR HIGH PLAYS TO FORM  
LIMITING ADMISSION OF OUT- PROGRAM FOR ANNUAL MILNE  
SIDERS TO BASKETBALL GAMES RECEPTION, FRIDAY, NOV. 9

A plan for controlling the outsiders who will be admitted to the basketball games was approved by the Milne School faculty at their weekly meeting on Tuesday morning at 8:00. Under this plan, which is sponsored by the Athletic Council, and is backed by the Student Council, the Varsity Club, and the Hi-Y Club, an outsider is equipped with a card, which has on it the name of the guest, the name of the person who is bringing the guest, and the signature of the president of the Athletic Council.

The card must be presented at the door in order to buy a ticket to the basketball game. If the guest misbehaves, he will be put out, and the student who brought the guest is deprived of the right to bring any more guests to the basketball games. These cards may be obtained from any member of the Athletic Council, and more than one guest may be brought.

Frederick Dearstyne, president of the Milne Athletic Council, wished to ask the Milne students to co-operate with this plan in every respect. Dearstyne continues, "If this plan is misused, there will be no further dancing after basketball games in Milne."

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## "100% OR BUST!"

The Milne students' unanimous vote to approve the 1934-35 school budget, last Wednesday in assembly, is proof of two things. It testifies, first, to the fact that their faith in the Student Council, representatives of the student body, was not misplaced. Secondly, their approval suggests a new spirit of co-operation; a co-operation that will enable school social affairs to get underway with a renewal of speed; a co-operation that will result in a hundred per cent payment of the Student Tax by December 3, deadline set by the Student Council.

It shouldn't be necessary to reiterate the several reasons why the Student Tax should be paid as promptly as possible. One is almost safe in saying that there is not a single student in Milne who is not aware of the necessity for a prompt payment, since all social organizations will be closed to students delinquent in this respect. There is only one legal excuse for non-payment of the Student Tax--special permission from Prof. Sayles, principal of Milne.

So, students, be consistent. Live up to the standard you set for yourselves when you approved the budget appropriations of the Student Council. Fulfill their expectations by paying your Student Tax promptly, if you have not already paid it. Achieve a one hundred per cent payment of the Student Tax!

## IT'S UP TO YOU, MILNITES!

Last year, after certain circumstances had made it necessary, the Milne faculty voted to discontinue dancing as a regular feature of the Milne basketball games. Now, although it is a recognized fact that the largest discipline problems had arisen from incidents concerning these games, many students feel that they are being treated unjustly.

Therefore, Professor Sayles announced to the Student Council early this year, that the faculty would be glad to reconsider this question as soon as the Milne students gave evidence of constructive thinking on the subject.
