

The program of the UE calls for immediate action on the part of Congress to pass laws providing help for workers who are the

Laws have been presented which give that kind of security. One of these proposed laws is called the Murray Full Employment bill. But Congress hasn't even given consideration to it yet.

Another bill has been proposed by President Truman which increases unemployment compensation to \$25 a week for at least 26 weeks. Congress linknit budged an inch on this proposal either.

These are just some of the campaigns led by the CIO to win security by action of Congress. At the same time our Union fights for security through improving our union contract.

Our Union is demanding that the security of our members be -guaranteed by means of our contract with the General Electric Company. We are demanding a minimum hiring rate of 72 cents-an-hour. We have demanded severance pay for workers who are laid off due to cut-backs. By making such payments, the Company gives workers a necessary break who have stuck to their jobs in order to get out war goods. Severance pay, which our Union is demanding,

without starving to death, after cut-backs come.


