While the Committee in common with his friends, and kindred, and family must mourn over the death of such a man, they desire to record their thankfulness that a life so useful and honorable was rounded out to such a completeness of years and labors and achievements.

The president reported that it had been found necessary to employ an assistant to Miss Fracts to play the piano during certain hours of the kindergarten, and recommended the employment of Miss Hall Isaac, a graduate of the school; ✓ whereupon the president was authorized to engage Miss Isaac at \$5.00 a week.

The President reported that 206 out of the 208 seats in the model department were filled; and that there were 24 scholars in the kindergarten; and that about 196 new scholars had been admitted to the normal department.
