UAlbany basketball broadcasts begin with a 15-minute pregame show segment that includes head coach Will Brown and selected guests. Coach Brown returns for an on-court postgame interview, along with the game's standout players.

The University at Albany and its intercollegiate athletics program continues to move forward in the 21st century after going through several transitions over the previous decade. UAlbany's athletic teams began competition at the National Collegiate Athletic Association's Division I level, beginning in September 1999. The upgrade elevated all men's and women's programs, and placed football in the NCAA's I-AA classification.

In January 2001, the University accepted an invitation to become a full member of America East Conference. Eighteen of the school's nineteen varsity teams are eligible through America East play for conference championships and NCAA post-season competition. Football, a Division I-AA program, is committed to the Northeast Conference as an associate member through 2006.

"Conference affiliation for our entire athletics program enhances the institution's Division I growth," says UAlbany's Director of Athletics and Recreation Lee McElroy. "With America East Conference membership, the University's goals and aspirations for intercollegiate athletics have become clearly defined. Our student-athletes and coaches have an opportunity to compete for both conference and NCAA championships. America East also provides increased visibility for athletics and strengthens our identity with the University's students, alumni, faculty and friends."

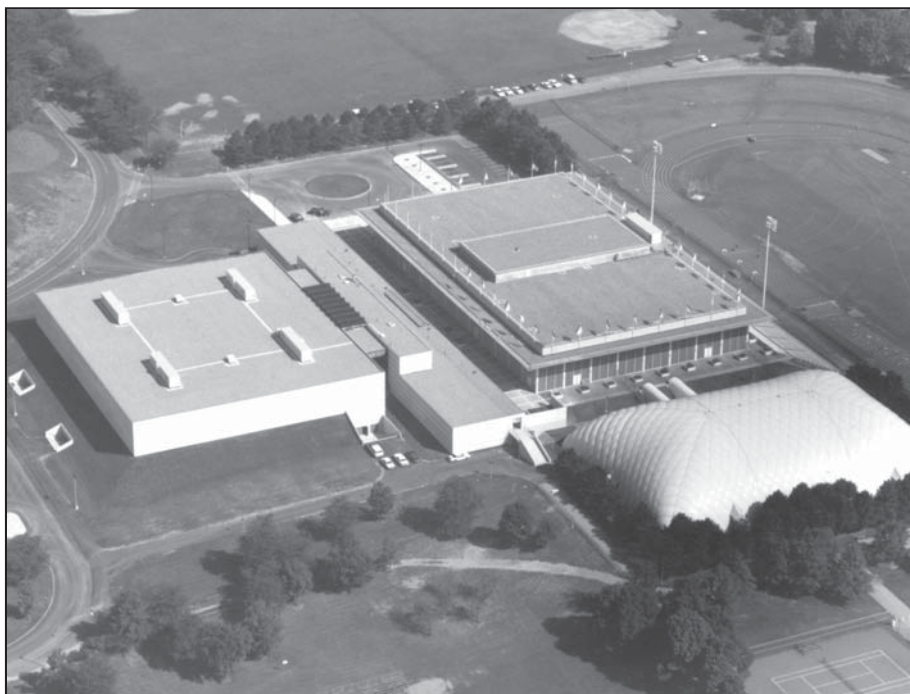
In 2003-04, the UAlbany men's lacrosse program captured its second consecutive America East Conference championship and secured a NCAA Tournament berth. Men's track and field won the conference's indoor team title for the second straight year, while women's golf also brought home an America East title. Softball won the league's regular-season crown and tied the school's single-season victory record. Football shared its second consecutive Northeast Conference championship.

UAlbany has an athletic history that dates back to the late 1890s when the first known intercollegiate teams arrived on campus. Albany competed at the college division level prior to the NCAA's restructuring in 1972. The athletic program moved from Division III to Division II in 1995-96.

Albany's intercollegiate program has a new direction, but continues to excel in the athletic realm, producing competitive teams, successful coaches, and outstanding student-athletes recognized for their accomplishments both on the field and in the classroom. The University sponsors 19 varsity sports for men and women. Club sports, an intramural program, and recreational opportunities are also offered.

The quality of UAlbany's athletic program is evidenced by some of the finest facilities in the nation. The indoor and outdoor physical education design is among the most comprehensive in the Northeast.

In the spring of 1992, the University opened the Recreation and Convocation Center (RACC), an \$11 million state-of-the-art facility. The RACC is the home for Albany's men's and women's basketball teams, and has an .11 mile indoor track. The 5,000-seat arena also serves as a major venue for community events such as rock and pop concerts, sporting events and

University activities. The playing surface on the arena's three basketball courts is scheduled to be completely renovated during the fall of 2004.

In addition, the RACC contains a fitness center with Nautilus and Universal machines, rowing ergometers and exercise bikes; four racquetball/handball courts and four squash courts; athletic training and rehabilitation facilities with three whirlpool baths, a musculoskeletal evaluation device and other therapeutic machines.

Adjacent to the RACC is the Physical Education Building which houses University Gym; three full-size playing surfaces which can be used for basketball, volleyball, and tennis; four racquetball/handball courts; four squash courts; a swimming pool; a fitness and weight training center with Olympic weights; an aerobic exercise room, and a dance studio.

The RACC and Physical Education Building were air-conditioned in March 1996, as the state appropriated funds for renovations and permanent improvements to the University's facilities. The \$2.3 million in funding was prompted by the New York Giants decision to hold their football training camp on campus. The project brought together the region's community in what has proven to be a successful partnership.

In addition, Albany's air-supported structure, fitted with a brand-new covering with minor interior renovations in the spring of 2003, is located to the east of the Physical Education Building, and may be utilized for tennis, basketball, volleyball, and indoor football practice.

The indoor complex is complemented by fine outdoor facilities, including University Field, which seats capacity crowds of 10,000 for football games, and has an all-weather, 400-meter track surrounding a natural grass surface. There are 24 tennis courts (12 with lighting), four basketball and six volleyball courts; and numerous fields for football, soccer, softball, baseball, lacrosse, field hockey, and other events.

The practice fields on the Western Avenue side of campus were renovated in June 1996 with 263,000 square feet of two-inch thick athletic sod. The irrigation system was refurbished, and the area was surrounded with a 3,100-foot chain-link fence.



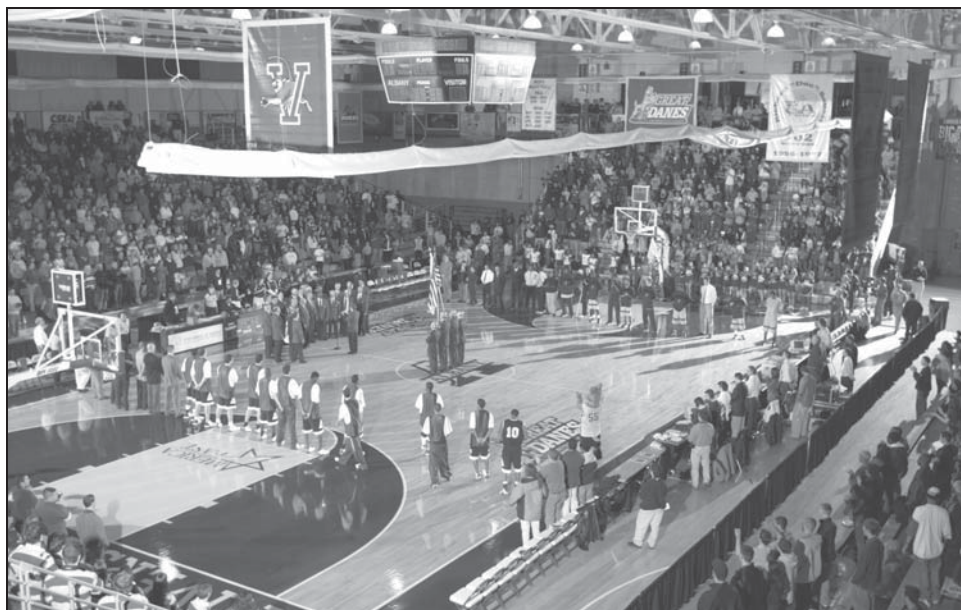

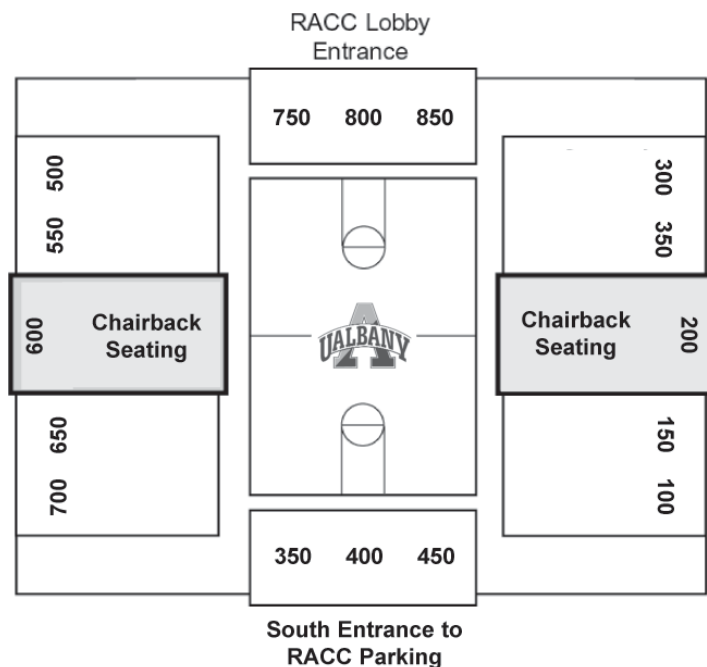

Will Brown begins his fourth season as the University at Albany's head men's basketball coach. Brown was appointed as head coach on March 13, 2002 by Director of Athletics and Recreation Lee McElroy. Brown, who has worked on the collegiate level since 1995, became the 15th head coach in the UAlbany basketball program's history. At age 33, Brown

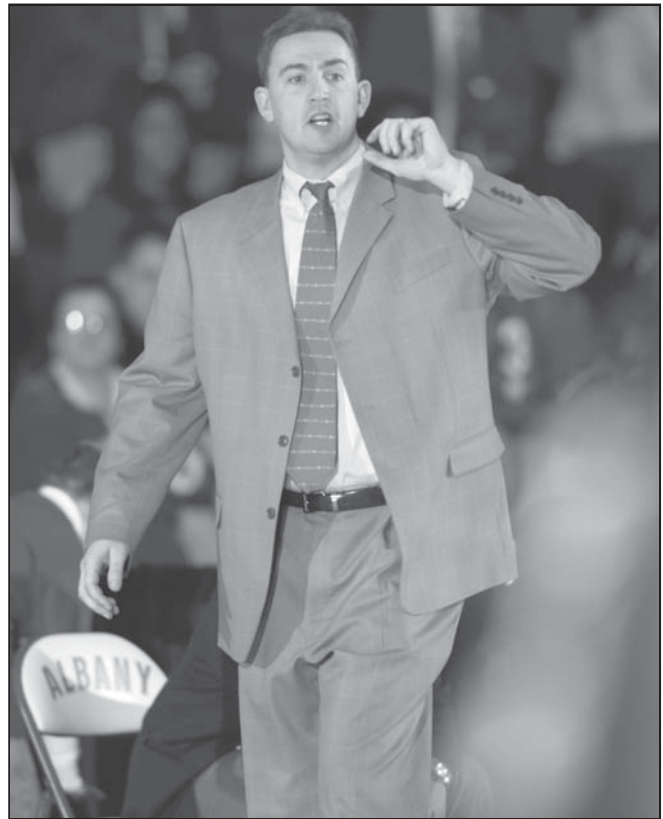
is one of the youngest Division I head coaches in the nation.

Brown, who joined the UAlbany staff as an assistant in September 2001, was promoted to interim head coach on Dec. 20th of that year, and guided the Great Danes to a 7-13 record over the last 20 games. Albany was among the conference leaders in scoring defense. He coached the team to several impressive victories, including a win over Vermont, the America East Conference's regular-season champion.

Although the Great Danes have finished in the lower division of the conference the last two seasons, Brown has put together a competitive and full 15-player roster for the future. In addition to this year's incoming class, Lucious Jordan and Kirsten Zoellner are now eligible as transfers from Loyola (Md.) College and Boston College, respectively.

At the press conference to announce Brown as head coach McElroy made the following remarks. "Will Brown has proven over the last three months that he has the leadership skills and coaching expertise to manage a Division I program. He has high energy, commitment and integrity, plus values the student-athlete. I have been impressed with his professionalism and his ability to handle challenging circumstances."

Brown previously served as the head coach at Sullivan County Community College in Loch Sheldrake, New York from 1998-2001. He led the Generals to a 90-10 record over a three-year period with two regional and two district titles. Sullivan County C.C. posted a 30-2 record and reached the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) championship in 2000-01. Brown's first SCCC squad appeared in the NJCAA



"Final Four" and finished 32-3 overall. The Generals were ranked second nationally in scoring at 92.9 points per game, and ninth in team defense with a 67.1 average.

Brown was chosen the New York State Coaches Association junior college coach of the year in 1999. He also earned Mid-Hudson Conference coach of the year honors three times, and was District V's top coach twice. In addition, he worked at Sullivan County C.C. as an associate athletic director and as an adjunct professor of sports management.

Previous to his appointment at Sullivan County C.C., Brown spent three years at The College of Saint Rose as an assistant coach on Brian Beaur's staff. The Golden Knights made two NCAA Division II "Elite Eight" appearances in that span, and captured three New York Collegiate Athletic Conference (NYCAC) championships and two Northeast Regional crowns. St. Rose compiled an 88-13 record from 1995-98.

As a collegiate player, Brown was a two-time NYCAC all-star and three-year starter at Dowling College, an NCAA Division II program on Long Island. He is the only player in school history to combine for more than 1,000 points and 500 assists. Brown completed his career as Dowling's all-time leader in assists (591), three-point field goals (181) and free throw percentage (.859). He also played second singles on the school's tennis team.

A native of Miller Place, N.Y., Brown earned first-team Class B all-state recognition as a high school senior, when he averaged more than 35 points per game. He was chosen All-Long Island and was a three-time All-Suffolk County selection.

Coach Brown resides in Clifton Park with his wife, Jamie, and their two-year-old son, Jackson. Brown has a master's degree in management and a B.A. in marketing from Dowling College. His father, William, Jr., has served as director of athletics at Miller Place High School, where he previously was head basketball coach for 17 years. His teams won three Suffolk County League VII scholastic titles.





COACH BROWN TALKS ABOUT:

America East Conference: "Vermont has six seniors and four of their five starters back with two former players of the year in our league. They've got to be the team to beat. Boston University has been the best program in this conference the past couple of years. I look at them as a team that has lost a lot, but have three starters and a transfer from Notre Dame. Maine has a veteran group and they've added a transfer from UNLV. Northeastern is always loaded with talent. You never know which team is going to show up. But they can beat anyone on a given night. Everyone has gotten better since I've been in the league. Each team has really improved. You really have to be on top of your game to win on the road. It's so important to hold serve at home."

Non-Conference Schedule: "We wanted to play some big-time programs, and we were able to schedule Syracuse and Villanova. Villanova, without question, will be an NCAA team this year with five starters back. Syracuse has a chance to win the national championship. When we meet Siena, we will be playing in front of 13,000-14,000 people. It's become an intense game. The talent level has narrowed greatly between the two programs."

Style of Play: "My goal is to not have to call a play the entire game. But if you are going to be really good and beat good teams and win championships, then you've got to be able to execute on both ends of the floor in a halfcourt set."

His Coaching Philosophy: "Offensively I would like to push the basketball, put points on the scoreboard, plus get some points from our defense. We are still probably a year away from going up and down the floor. We need to create easy baskets for ourselves, get second-chance points, get to the free throw line and put pressure on our opponents."

"I would like to guard man-to-man for forty minutes on defense and limit teams to one shot every time down the floor."

We need to challenge shots on defense to be effective. It's one thing to be tough and talented, but knowing how to play is the key to success."

What Brown Looks For in a Recruit: "We want someone who is a good person and a good student. He needs to be talented, but have a high basketball intelligence. It's important that he knows the game, wants to get better and wants to win. I believe too many coaches are caught up in the "great athlete" concept of recruiting."

"I would recruit anyone in the United States or World if I thought he was the right fit for our program and we could put all the pieces of the puzzle together. The University is a strong academic school, so the student-athlete must want that challenge and realize that the school can prepare him for the future."

"Finally, I think we have to recruit people who want to be part of something special, that want to win conference championships and get to the NCAAs every year."

What Albany Offers a Prospective Student-Athlete: "The University provides an opportunity to obtain a meaningful education. You can meet all types of people and go to school in a diverse population."

"The University is located in a city with many colleges and universities, plus you have the best of both worlds with access to the capital of New York and a nice campus setting. We have great resources and outstanding facilities, and a University that is growing in terms of prestige and stature."

"What also appeals to me is that Lee McElroy, our athletic director, is committed to the success of the program. He is very driven and supportive, and we have the same goals."

Gallagher Driscoll was named as assistant coach on April 4, 2002. He spent two years as an assistant at Loyola College in Maryland prior to his present appointment.

Driscoll previously worked at UAlbany on Scott Hicks' staff from 1997-2000, as the basketball program made the transition from Division II to the Division I level. The Great Danes reached the ECAC Division II tournament on two occasions, and posted an 11-17 record in the program's inaugural Division I campaign.

During his two-year stay at Loyola, Driscoll was responsible for on-court instruction, plus handled scouting and film exchange. He worked with two of the top freshman players in the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference.

Driscoll, 34, also coached at Le Moyne College in Syracuse, New York. The Dolphins qualified for the NCAA Division II Tournament in 1996 and 1997.

A 1992 graduate of The College of Saint Rose, Driscoll earned honorable All-America honors and was an All-New York Collegiate Athletic Conference (NYCAC) point guard. A four-year starter and three-year captain, he led the Golden Knights to four consecutive 20-plus win seasons and a '92 NCAA Tournament berth.

Driscoll, who received a B.S. in political science, graduated as St. Rose's all-time leader in assists (878) and steals (359). He is currently fourth on the NCAA Division II all-time assists list. Driscoll attended Bishop Ludden High School in Syracuse, where he was a two-time all-state and All-Central New York selection. Bishop Ludden reached the 1987 Class A state final.

Driscoll, and his wife, the former Missy Gehres, reside in the Capital Region. He serves as the conference's NABC assistant coaches representative.



CAREY EDWARDS ASSISTANT COACH

Carey Edwards is in his first season as an assistant coach. Edwards, who was appointed on June 29, 2004, was previously director of basketball operations at the University of Massachusetts.

Edwards worked at Massachusetts for two years as a member of Steve Lappas' staff. He was responsible for coordinating team travel, organizing team purchases and allotments, scheduling opponents and practice times, handling budgetary items, and organizing the UMass summer camp program.

Prior to his collegiate experience, Edwards was director of player personnel for the Chicago Blaze, a National Women's Basketball League (NWBL) franchise. His primary duties were to assist in the hiring of a head coach, assist in the negotiation of player contracts, organize the draft, and conduct preseason workouts. The Blaze captured the NWBL regular-season championship.

A standout college player at Manhattan College, Edwards was a two-time All-Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference selection and a career 1,000-point scorer. He served as team captain in his final campaign, when the Jaspers reached the NIT Tournament. As a junior, Edwards' squad posted a 23-7 record en route to the MAAC championship and a NCAA berth.

A native of Bristol, Conn., Edwards earned his B.S. in

finance from Manhattan in 1993, and has completed some coursework toward a master's degree in education. He was drafted in the third round by the United States Basketball League's New Haven Skyhawks and attended the 1994 rookie camp of the Continental Basketball Association's Connecticut Pride.

Edwards, 33, was a three-time all-state selection at Saint Paul Catholic High School. He was named the conference player of the year on three occasions, and is the school's all-time leading scorer.



CHAD O'DONNELL ASSISTANT COACH

Chad O'Donnell is in his first year as a member of Will Brown's UAlbany coaching staff. He was hired as an assistant on July 6, 2004. O'Donnell was recently the director of basketball operations at the College of Charleston.

O'Donnell, who has worked on the collegiate level since 1993, assisted Charleston coach Tom Herrion in the program's day-to-day operations last year. He was responsible for academic monitoring, directing conditioning and weightlifting, managing recruiting efforts and organizing summer camps. The Cougars finished with a 20-9 record.

Prior to Charleston, O'Donnell served in the same capacity for one season at Robert Morris University after spending two years in the private sector. He was also an assistant coach at the University of New Hampshire in 1999-2000, and worked for a three-year period at the College of the Holy Cross, a Patriot League school member. At Holy Cross, he directed all national recruiting efforts for the Crusaders and coaches the junior varsity squad.

O'Donnell, 33, began his college coaching career as an assistant at Worcester State College in Massachusetts. From 1993-95, he handled the Division III program's recruiting, scouting and practice preparation, plus was the junior varsity head coach. He went to work at Bryant College in Rhode Island the following year.

A native of Mendon, Mass., O'Donnell received his B.S. in physical education from Springfield College in 1994. He has authored several articles in coaching magazines and published a book on college basketball recruiting.



BRIAN BARNES BASKETBALL OPERATIONS

Brian Barnes was appointed to the position of director of basketball operations in the 2003. He handles administrative duties, videotape exchange, travel and coordinates summer basketball camps.

Barnes was a tri-captain on the 2002-03 UAlbany basketball squad, after making the team as a walk-on in 1999. Barnes, who appeared in 40 games as a collegian, was later awarded a basketball scholarship. He graduated last spring with a B.A. in communication, including a minor in education, and is presently working on a master's degree in educational administration.

Barnes, 23, played for Gary Hunter as a senior at Catholic Central High School in Troy, New York. He was also a member of Lou Cioffi's Colonial Conference championship squad at Averill Park High School in 1997-98. Barnes has worked at both the Eastern Invitational and Five-Star summer camps.

Tony Tullock was named as strength and conditioning coach in July 2000. He supervises Albany's 19-sport intercollegiate athletics program.

Tullock, 30, was previously assistant strength coach at Colgate University for two years. He designed and administered strength programs for men's and women's ice hockey, soccer, field hockey, lacrosse and softball, and was active with the football and basketball programs. Tullock also handled daily operations of the University Fitness Center, created off-season workouts for athletes, and used video analysis to correct weightlifting techniques.

Tullock, a certified strength and conditioning specialist, was a graduate assistant at the University of Massachusetts for two years. He received a master's degree in exercise science and physiology from UMass, and earned a B.A. in psychology from Boston College, where he was a student assistant. 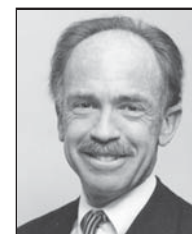

GAIL CUMMINGS-DANSON
ASSOCIATE A.D./COMPLIANCE

Gail Cummings-Danson has helped manage UAlbany's intercollegiate program since being hired as associate director of athletics in 1994. She has been responsible for the department's day-to-day operations as head of personnel.

Cummings-Danson, 38, recently took on additional duties with regard to compliance and student services on an interim basis. She will administer the school's NCAA compliance and rules education program, plus oversee athletic academic student services.

Cummings-Danson served as interim director of athletics and recreation in 1999-2000. She also was interim assistant vice president for student affairs in the previous academic year. In that role, she oversaw the division's multi-million dollar operating budget, and was responsible for all student affairs' human resource issues.

An assistant director of athletics at Temple University prior to her move to UAlbany, Cummings-Danson was also Connecticut College's assistant athletics director and business manager in 1989-90. She coached women's lacrosse at the collegiate level, and was the head coach at both UAlbany and Connecticut College.

A native of Huntsville, Ontario, Cummings-Danson was an All-America attack on Temple's 1988 Division I national championship lacrosse team. She was enshrined into the school's Athletic Hall of Fame in 2000. A member of the 1993 World Championship squad, Cummings-Danson became the first woman to be inducted into the Ontario Lacrosse Hall of Fame.

Cummings-Danson has a Ph.D. in sports management from Temple University. She also earned a master's degree in athletic administration and a B.S. in physical education from her alma mater.

Cummings-Danson has served on the NCAA Division I Peer Review Team and the ECAC's Executive Council and Eligibility and Infractions Committee.



EDDIE SCOTT
ACADEMIC SERVICES

Eddie Scott is in his second year as assistant director of athletic academic support services. His department's mission is to maximize the academic potential of student-athletes by providing an atmosphere that enhances learning skills, career development and personal counseling.

Scott, 25, was a captain on the 2002 UAlbany baseball team, and earned first-team All-America East Conference honors. He batted .339 as a senior center fielder, and added 27 RBI, nine doubles and two home runs. Scott finished his career ranked among the program's all-time leaders in stolen bases (52), total hits (154), runs (111) and doubles (24).

Scott was chosen to the Verizon Academic All-America national third-team in the spring of 2002. He received the school's Presidential Scholar-Athlete Award and an ECAC Merit Medal as the top senior male student-athlete. Scott, who served on UAlbany's Student-Athlete Advisory Committee, was a four-time Spellman Award recipient with the highest GPA for an African-American in his class. He graduated magna cum laude with a B.A. in psychology and has a minor in sociology.



There is a sense of anticipation and excitement in the air as the University at Albany prepares for its sixth season at the Division I level. The Great Danes labored through a tough season one year ago with an eye toward the future and a limited roster.

"This is the first time I feel expectation from people," said UAlbany coach **Will Brown**, whose team was shackled by injuries and reduced to a six-man rotation last year. "I have my own basketball team now, and as a coach you want to have your own kids that fit your type of personality.

"We had to play ugly to survive in the past. This team expects to be good, but it's going to take work. We have the pieces of the puzzle in place to be successful, but we all have to be on the same page."

The Great Danes, who return all five starters, have a balanced roster that consists of two seniors, six juniors, three sophomores and four freshmen.

"We have a chance to be pretty good," Brown offers. "We have a lot of talent. There's only five positions on the floor, forty minutes at each position and 200 minutes in a game. We need to divide those up. That's competitive, it's healthy, and it shows you have arrived as a program. Now we have to go out and win games."

UAlbany BY POSITIONS

GUARDS: UAlbany is fortunate to have the America East Conference's top rookies from the previous two seasons in **Jamar Wilson** and **Jon Iati**. Wilson, a sophomore, is fully recovered from last year's season-ending knee surgery, while Iati (5'9") returns from an impressive freshman campaign.

Wilson, who was second among the conference scoring leaders in 2002-03 with an 18.9 average, established the school's single-season freshman record with 509 points. A second-team all-conference selection, Wilson (6'1") tallied 20-plus points 12 times and 30 or more against four opponents.

"He is gifted offensively," Brown states. "He can score in transition and in a halfcourt situation, and is always in an attack mode."

Iati logged the most minutes of any Division I player in 2003-04, and played 40-plus against 21 opponents. Iati, who averaged 14.0 points and was among the league leaders in assists (3.0 pg) and three-point field goals (2.4 pg), won't carry the same burden.

"Less minutes will help him," Brown

offers. "He's added 12 pounds and looks great. I think you'll see how good a shooter he is this season."

Courtney Johnson went from walk-on to starter in just a couple of month's time. Johnson (6'1") was the surprise of last year's team, as he averaged 5.6 points, 3.8 rebounds and 2.4 assists. His defensive play also stifled the opposition's offensive threats.

Lucious Jordan and **Brandon Perry**, a pair of transfers, should contribute immediately. Jordan was Loyola College's top scorer for two seasons before arriving on the UAlbany campus. Perry, who played on the junior college level in Texas, is an exceptional shooter.

"Lucious has already become our leader on and off the floor," Brown says. "He's a slasher, who shoots well enough, and has the ability to get to the basket and free throw line. He can also frustrate a good offense with his physical presence on the perimeter."

Freshmen **Brian Lillis** (6'5") and **David Bauman** (6'2") will also have something to contribute as their UAlbany careers unfold. Each had illustrious high school careers in Iowa and Pennsylvania, respectively.

FORWARDS: The Great Danes' frontcourt features a pair of proven scorers and rebounders with **Levi Levine** (6'6") and **Aquawasi St. Hillaire** (6'6") patrolling the baseline.

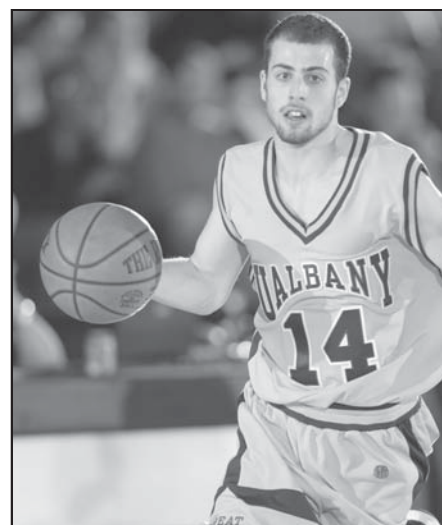
Levine, who has started 56 consecutive games as a collegian and scored in double figures 47 times, played nearly 38 minutes each time out last season. He was eighth in the A-East with a 14.3 scoring average as a sophomore, and added 6.1 rebounds.

"Levi is a tough match-up, because he can do many things," Brown says. "He can score and rebound, and knows how to play. His minutes will go down, but that should make him better."

St. Hillaire, who received the team's most valuable player award, has made great strides in the off-season. With his athleticism, he averaged 9.8 points and 6.8 rebounds, and capped off the year with an 18-point, 12-rebound effort in the opening round of the America East postseason tournament.

"He's stronger and wants to build on last year's performance," Brown says. "He is very explosive off the floor and a good offensive rebounder."

Christopher Wyatt has been through the ups and downs with regard to his health. However, the 6-foot-6

forward put in a full season as a junior and became a major contributor. He averaged 6.3 points and 5.0 rebounds.

"Chris wants to go out on a positive note," Brown says. "He has the experience to be a leader."

Jerrad Knotts (6'6") and **Brent Wilson** (6'8") also figure to see playing time. Knotts, who has improved his conditioning, contributed 3.8 points and 2.2 rebounds as a sophomore. Wilson, arguably the most skilled frontline player in the program, was a first-team all-state selection on the Iowa high school scene. His defense and rebounding will have a positive impact.

CENTERS: The Great Danes have their first legitimate low post player since upgrading to Division I in Boston College transfer **Kirsten Zoellner**, a 7-foot-1, 275-pound center.

"He adds a dimension to our team that we have not had," Brown comments. "He has the size and strength to score or get fouled in the lane, and can clog up the middle. We can't forget about him; he must get touches."

Freshman **Joe Dyson** (6'9") earned all-state recognition in his native Delaware by combining size with touch. He will have the luxury of learning in practice on a daily basis.

OUTLOOK: The Great Danes are expecting to be more competitive in the America East. "If we do the things we have done in the past, that is play good defense and rebound, then we will be successful because we can score with the ball," Brown explains. "The keys to our season are role acceptance, work ethic, a defensive mind set, sharing the ball, leadership and having fun."

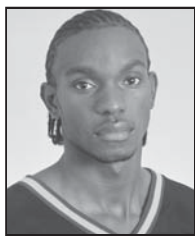


What is a Great Dane?

The University at Albany adopted the nickname "Great Danes" in the spring of 1965. UAlbany's mascot was founded in a contest on campus for a \$25 savings bond. The judging committee made the choice as, "The Great Dane is noted for its grandeur, its alertness, and its intelligence. It is an animal whose prowess and strength are easily recognizable and readily admired." Contest winner Kathy Earle explained the Great Dane was renown for its "size, weight, strength, character, courage, speed, and stamina."

In the 1960s, UAlbany grew from a college for teachers to a top research university. The old school mascot, "Pierre the Pedguin," representing the Pedagogues, seemed inappropriate as the University's mascot and nickname.

AMERICA EAST: UAlbany is in its fourth year as a full member of America East Conference. Eighteen of the school's 19 intercollegiate teams compete for conference championships and NCAA post-season play. The America East basketball membership includes UAlbany, Binghamton, Boston University, Hartford, Maine, UMBC, New Hampshire, Northeastern, Stony Brook and Vermont. UAlbany elevated its men's and women's athletics program to the NCAA Division I level in 1999.

SCHEDULE HIGHLIGHTS: UAlbany begins its America East schedule on Jan. 2 against Boston University, and concludes the season with the America East Conference Tournament on March 4-12. The Great Danes' non-conference slate is highlighted by a pair of Big East Conference teams in Syracuse and Villanova. The Orangemen finished 23-8 last year, and reached the NCAA Phoenix Regional. UAlbany faces Villanova, a 2004 NIT participant, on Dec. 22 and meets Siena on Nov. 23 at Pepsi Arena.

CROSTOWN RIVALRY: UAlbany and Siena renewed their crosstown rivalry in 2001 at Pepsi Arena, a 15,500-seat downtown facility. The two schools had not met since 1976-77. The Saints, who compete in the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference, hold a 26-17 lead in a series that dates back to January 1940.

CONSISTENT LEVINE: Junior forward **Levi Levine** scored in double figures in 23 of 28 games last season. He tallied 20-plus points for the eighth time in his career with 20 markers against Northeastern on Feb. 29. Levine, a member of the 2003 America East All-Rookie Team, has made 56 consecutive starts.

MOVING FORWARD: UAlbany's **Aquawasi St. Hillaire** became a consistent force on the baseline last year. St. Hillaire recorded his fifth double-double with an 18-point, 12-rebound effort against New Hampshire in the America East Conference Tournament. He averaged 9.8 points and 6.8 rebounds en route to earning the program's 2004 most valuable player award.

JAMAR'S RETURN: Sophomore **Jamar Wilson**, the 2002-03 America East Rookie of the Year, returns after having season-ending knee surgery last December. Wilson finished second in the league in scoring with an 18.9 average as a freshman. He set the school's single-season scoring record by a freshman. Wilson's 509 points eclipsed a standard established in 1955-56.

TOP ROOKIE: Sophomore guard **Jon Iati** followed in Jamar Wilson's footsteps as the America East Conference's Rookie of the Year in 2003-04. Iati, who received the league's rookie of the week award seven times last year, ranked ninth among the A-East leaders in scoring at 14.0 points per game. He was also fifth in assists (3.0 pg) and sixth in 3-point field goals made (2.4 pg).

AT THE LINE: The Great Danes ranked among the NCAA Division I leaders in free throw percentage for the second consecutive year. Coach Brown's squad was 22nd nationally at 73.8 percent. UAlbany was 46th the previous season (.734).

IRON MEN: UAlbany's **Jon Iati** and **Levi Levine** each played more than 1,000 minutes last season. Iati, who registered 40-plus on 21 occasions, led the nation with 1,121 minutes for a 40.0 average. Levine, who averaged nearly 38 minutes per outing, played 40 or more minutes in 13 contests.

TRANSFERS: Capital Region native **Lucious Jordan** is one of three UAlbany captains after transferring from Loyola (Md.)

College. Jordan scored at a 13.2 clip in his final year with the Greyhounds. **Kirsten Zoellner**, a 7-foot-1 center, comes to the Great Danes from Boston College. Zoellner's brother, Klaas, played at Akron from 1997-2001. **Brandon Perry** performed at the community college level, when he once made 14 three-point field goals to set a conference single-game record.

BEING A LEADER: Senior **Christopher Wyatt** will serve as a tri-captain this season. Wyatt was one of 321 NCAA student-athletes to attend the 2004 NCAA Leadership Conference. Wyatt, who averaged 6.3 points and 5.0 rebounds last year, is a member of UAlbany's Student-Athlete Advisory Committee.

WALK-ON: UAlbany's **Courtney Johnson** made the team as a walk-on in the fall of 2003 and became a starter in late December. Johnson, a solid defender, totaled 5.6 points, 3.8 rebounds and 2.4 assists in his first collegiate season.

COACH BROWN: UAlbany's **Will Brown** was named head coach on March 13, 2002, after serving on an interim basis the previous season. Brown, 33, is one of the youngest Division I head coaches in the nation. He was the head coach at Sullivan County Community College in Upstate New York for three years and an assistant coach at Division II St. Rose from 1995-98.

RACC ARENA: UAlbany's Recreation and Convocation Center opened in December 1992. The on-campus facility seats capacity crowds of 5,000. The RACC's three playing surfaces, located on the arena level, have been completely changed over to Robbins biochannel flooring, plus a new synthetic surface covers the 170-meter indoor track. The facility's sound system, wiring, and telecommunication and data line have been upgraded. UAlbany has a combined 88-57 record in the arena.

WINNING RECORD: UAlbany began varsity play in 1909-10, and has competed at the NAIA, NCAA College Division, NCAA Division III and NCAA Division II levels prior to 1999-2000. The Great Danes have a 984-722 record in 90 seasons.

BIG PURPLE GROWL: The eighth annual Big Purple Growl and Ferocious Feast is scheduled for Saturday, Feb. 5. UAlbany's Winter Homecoming will feature a men's and women's double-header against New Hampshire. Last year's crowd of 3,721 marked the fourth time the event has drawn 3,000-plus fans.

The University at Albany today is an internationally recognized public research university with a broad mission of undergraduate and graduate education, and research. More than 17,000 students are enrolled in nine schools and colleges offering 176 undergraduate, master's and doctoral degree programs.

Outstanding faculty, an innovative curriculum, award-winning advisors and student-centered services create a distinctive learning environment that nurtures student success. After graduation, more than two-thirds of undergraduates go on for advanced degrees, and acceptances to law and medical schools are well above the national average. UAlbany has more than 128,000 living alumni, including: Catherine Bertini, B.A.'71, under-secretary-general for management, United Nations; Marcia Brown, B.A.'40, three-time Caldecott Award-winning children's book author; Tom Clarke, B.A.'73, president of new business ventures, Nike, Inc.; and SOBE beverages founder Norm Snyder, B.S.'83.

UAlbany programs in sociology, public administration and policy, criminal justice, clinical psychology, reading, accounting, social welfare and atmospheric sciences have earned national renown for excellence. More recently, the University has been building new strengths in such areas as nanotechnology, life sciences, and public informatics and information systems. The latest rankings of graduate programs by *U.S. News and World Report* place seven programs in the top 25 in the nation.

Undergraduates choose from 53 majors in the arts and sciences, business and accounting, public policy, criminal justice, information science, pre-law and pre-health; approximately 30 percent of undergraduates participate in research with faculty. Innovative degree programs with an international focus and more than 300 study-abroad programs prepare students for the global economy. Extensive internship opportunities offer real-world experience in New York's capital and the surrounding region.

Both the UAlbany campus and the region are bustling with extracurricular opportunities. Students participate in more than 150 student clubs, honor societies, and other campus-related groups, and choose from a busy calendar of campus events, including spirited Division I athletic competition in 19 sports and

a rich array of cultural activities.

The University is just a short drive from spectacular natural and recreational centers in New York, Massachusetts, and Vermont. With 13 colleges in the Capital Region, it's easy to see why Albany is also a "great college town."

UAlbany, working with governmental and business partners, plays a vital role in the economic development of the Capital Region and New York State. John R. Ryan
Interim President



SUNY Maritime College President, Vice Adm. John R. Ryan, USN (Ret.) was named as interim president of the University at Albany by the State University of New York Board of Trustees on February 24, 2004.

"I am delighted that Admiral Ryan will be serving as interim president of the University at Albany," said Board Chair Thomas F. Egan, at the time of the announce-

ment. "President's Ryan's significant academic, philanthropic and fiscal achievements at our Maritime College, and at the Naval Academy, combined with his extensive experience and success leading and managing large complex organizations, make him an ideal choice to lead the University at Albany until a new permanent president is chosen. I want to thank him for agreeing to assume additional responsibility."

Ryan said about his appointment, "I am honored the Board has selected me to play a part in leading the campus during a search for a permanent leader. Working with the students, faculty and staff at the campus will be a great pleasure and I am looking forward to the challenges that come with leading a large, dynamic institution such as the University at Albany."

Ryan became president of the Maritime College on October 23, 2001, and started his presidency on June 15, 2002. He will continue in that capacity while serving as interim president at UAlbany. The Maritime College, located at Fort Schuyler in New York City, enrolls approximately 1,100 students, and offers undergraduate and graduate programs in international business, engineering, science and technology.

Ryan served as superintendent (president) of the U.S. Naval Academy in Annapolis, Maryland from 1998 to 2002, overseeing a \$220 million annual budget and 7,000 faculty, staff and students. While at Annapolis, Ryan enjoyed overwhelming faculty support. During his presidency, the Faculty Senate praised the academic focus of his administration and passed a unanimous resolution requesting that he remain for additional four-year term -- a first in the history of the school.

During his tenure, the Naval Academy Foundation launched a \$175 million "Leaders to Serve the Nation" campaign designed to raise the bar of excellence in six key areas: academics; character development; leadership; admissions; athletics and unrestricted support. \$125 million was raised in the first two years of the five-year campaign, with numerous endowed chairs and new programs established.

Ryan received his master's degree from George Washington University in administration in Washington, D.C. and completed the Program for Executives in National and International Security at the John F. Kennedy School of Government, Harvard University.

A native of Mountainhome, Pa., Ryan graduated from the Naval Academy in June of 1967 with his twin brother Vice Adm. Norbert Ryan, Jr. and earned the designation of Naval Aviator in October 1968. He has been a pilot for 35 years.

The first in his class to reach the rank of rear admiral, he distinguished himself as line officer and effective leader, commanding patrol squadrons in the Mediterranean and Indian and Pacific Oceans. He coordinated the overseas operations of six government facilities located in three countries, which included three airports, four naval ports and three hospitals with personnel totaling more than 10,000. In 1998, Ryan was appointed Vice

Admiral by President Clinton and confirmed by the U.S. Senate.

Ryan is married to the former Diane L. Ackerman of Bangor, Pa. They have three adult daughters, Tricia, Kelly, and Julie, and three grandchildren.

James P. Doellefeld
Vice President for Student Affairs



James P. Doellefeld has served as Vice President for Student Affairs, since he was appointed in July 1996. Doellefeld brings more than 30 years of service and leadership in the Division of Student Affairs to the position. Since 1988, he had been the University's assistant vice president of campus life, and previously was director of student activities.

A well-known advocate for students, Doellefeld has seen the University grow from a newly-minted public university center into a mature research university with outstanding scholars and teaching faculty.

In that time, he served as director of student/university activities and the campus center for a six-year period, beginning in 1978. He was both assistant director and an adviser in student activities during the 1970s.

Through a variety of high-contact capacities, Doellefeld has demonstrated a strong desire to insure a high quality of life for Albany's student population. He has provided important leadership in student development and in contributing to health, safety and quality of life goals. In addition, he has served on a number of University-wide committees and task forces, including the University Budget Panel and Master Planning Group.

A native of Lake City, Minnesota, Doellefeld joined the University community from the New York State Education Department, where he was an assistant chief in the Bureau of Research in Higher and Professional Education.

Doellefeld received his B.A. in history from the State University College at Fredonia in 1968. He later earned an Ed.S. degree in counseling psychology and student development and a M.S. in student personnel services from UAlbany.

Doellefeld is married to Margaret Masercola (M.S. '69), a kindergarten teacher in Albany. Their son, Steven, and daughter, Julia, both received graduate degrees from UAlbany.

Dr. Lee A. McElroy, Jr., who has more than 30 years of experience in athletic and educational administration, is in his fifth year as the University at Albany's Director of Athletics and Recreation. McElroy, who provides leadership for Albany's NCAA Division I 19-sport intercollegiate athletics program for men and women, spearheaded a successful search for a broad-based athletic conference when the University accepted an invitation to join the America East Conference in January 2001. He also worked to renew the men's and women's basketball rivalry with Capital Region rival Siena College, led the develop-

ment of a master plan to upgrade the University's athletic and recreational complex, and has energized the school's athletic development efforts.

McElroy was also a key figure as the University successfully completed the NCAA's second cycle of Division I athletics certification in August 2003. In addition, he recently helped the University hire an architectural firm in an effort to develop a plan to improve the school's athletic facilities, including the feasibility of the construction of a multi-purpose outdoor stadium and an artificial turf facility. He was recently honored with the 2004 General Robert R. Neyland Outstanding Athletic Director Award by the All-American Football Foundation.

McElroy, who played football at UCLA in the late 1960s, spent the previous four years as American University's director of athletics. American, a Division I school in Washington, D.C., competed in the Colonial Athletic Association. During McElroy's tenure, the AU athletic department upgraded to 19 sports, expanded corporate partners by 400 percent, and planned capital projects for a fitness facility, intramural field and soccer stadium. McElroy founded Eagle Club, the department's fundraising arm, and developed a program rated as one of the top ten in the nation in its compliance with NCAA gender equity requirements.

Dr. McElroy served as president of the America East Conference Executive Committee in 2003-04, and has gained national prominence for his roles with numerous professional organizations and NCAA committees. He is currently serving a three-year term on the Division I Management Council as one of four at-large representatives from I-AA or I-AAA conferences, and is second vice president of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA). McElroy previously served on four prestigious NCAA Committees: Athletics Certification, Financial Aid, Degree Completion Program, and the NCAA Special Committee on Agents and Amateurism.

In 1998, McElroy was named to the NACDA Executive Committee for the University Division, and chair of the Sears Directors Cup Committee. The Sears Directors Cup is the only national award and academic scholarship program to recognize all NCAA and NAIA championship sports for women and men.

From 1989-96, McElroy was the director of athletics at California State University-Sacramento. He led the program's transition from Division II to Division I and engineered a move to the Big Sky and Big West conferences. He also implemented a strategic plan that developed a corporate partners plan, created an effective fundraising and marketing program, redesigned academic support services, improved the athletic facilities complex, and provided for campus and community outreach programs.

McElroy also worked at the University of Houston from 1981 to 1988 as an assistant director of men's and women's sports and as an associate director of athletics, and for one year as the director of athletics at The University of the District of Columbia. Before joining the Houston staff, he taught in the public school systems of Santa Monica, California and Beaumont, Texas, and was a high school principal in Beaumont.

Along with his duties for the NCAA and NACDA, McElroy has testified before congressional committees on issues in college athletics, such as gender equity, the welfare of the minority student-athlete, and the academic/athletic balance. McElroy serves on the boards of the National Consortium of Academics and Sports, *Athletic Business* magazine, and the National Minority Golf Association. He is also a fellow at the Institute of Ethics and Sportsmanship at the University of Rhode Island.

McElroy, who resides with his wife, Karen, in Slingerlands, earned his B.S. in political science and history from UCLA in 1970. He later received a M.Ed. from the University of Southern California, and an Ed.D. from the University of Houston.

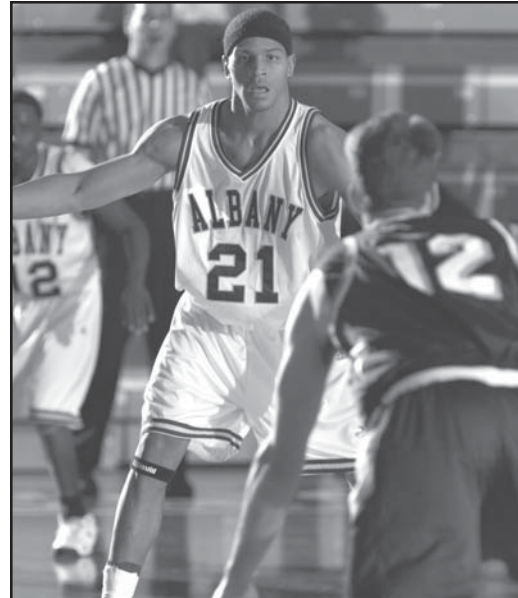

UAlbany HOF Class of 2004

Xiomara Davila Diaz (1996-99) — Davila Diaz was one of UAlbany's top hurdlers and sprinters in the track program's Division II era. She shared the school's 1998-99 Female Athlete of the Year award. She was voted athlete of the meet at both the 1999 ECAC Division II and New England Collegiate Conference indoor championships. Davila Diaz qualified for the 1999 ECAC Division I outdoor meet in both the 100- and 400-meter hurdles. She competed at the 1997 NCAA Division II meet in three events, and was fifth in the 400-hurdles.

Peter Pedro (1986-90) — One of the top fullbacks in UAlbany football history, Pedro ranks fourth among the school's career rushing leaders with 2,612 yards. He averaged 5.4 yards per carry, ranked ninth in both total offense and scoring, and totaled 22 career touchdowns. Pedro led the Great Danes in rushing as a sophomore and junior with 800-plus yards on the ground in both seasons. He was named Pizza Hut honorable mention All-American in 1987. Pedro's top effort came when he rumbled for 186 yards in a 35-19 win against Norwich.

Kimberly Toone (1985-87) — An All-America track athlete in the mid-1990s, Toone was inducted into UAlbany's Athletic Hall of Fame posthumously. She died, at the age of 22, in a tragic automobile accident. Toone qualified for the 1996 NCAA Division II indoor championships in the long jump and 55-meter hurdles. She had captured both the ECAC and Collegiate Track Conference indoor long jump titles. Toone, who did not compete on the high school level, reached the NCAA Division III national indoor and outdoor championships in 1995. She was a three-event CTC outdoor champion in the long jump, 100-meter hurdles and 400-meter hurdles.

Bill Vanos (1990-94) — A two-time track All-American and accomplished cross country competitor on the NCAA Division III level, Vanos is one of the top distance runners in UAlbany history. In 1994, Vanos finished second in the 10,000-meter run at the NCAA outdoor championships and sixth in the 5,000 at the national indoor meet. He captured the CTC 3,000-meter steeplechase title and was third at Penn Relays in the 5,000. Vanos also competed in three NCAA cross country championships and recorded a pair of top-35 finishes as an individual.

America East ...

America East Conference enters its 17th year of all-sports championship competition with a reputation as one of the most comprehensive NCAA Division I conferences. With a geographic footprint extending from the Mid-Atlantic to the Northeast regions, America East remains committed to broad-based, competitive Division I athletics programs, complementing the academic integrity of the 10 member institutions.

University at Albany, Binghamton University, Boston University, University of Hartford, University of Maine, University of Maryland, Baltimore County (UMBC), University of New Hampshire, Northeastern University, Stony Brook University, and University of Vermont each offers a unique blend of academic and athletic tradition. America East also has an associate membership with Quinnipiac University in the sport of men's lacrosse.

America East's proven record of success in its sports will enable the conference to earn admission to 12 NCAA Championships in 2004-05. Student-athletes in the sports of baseball, men's basketball, women's basketball, field hockey, men's lacrosse, women's lacrosse, men's soccer, women's soccer, softball, men's tennis, women's tennis, and volleyball receive access to NCAA Championships via the conference's automatic qualifiers. Individual champions at the America East Outdoor Track and Field Championship will receive bids to that NCAA Championship. In addition, several America East athletes in sports such as men's and women's cross country, men's and women's indoor track and field, men's and women's golf, and men's and women's swimming and diving will compete in those NCAA Championships. Overall, America East sponsors championships in 22 sports.

Athletic Success ...

America East's success in each of its championship sports has been a benchmark for the conference since its inception as a basketball conference in 1979.

Basketball continues to garner much of the conference's attention with America East sending multiple teams to postseason tournaments seven times in the last eight years. Vermont, the men's basketball champion, and Maine, the women's basketball champion, each appeared in the 2004 NCAA Championship. Boston University, the America East men's regular-season champion, was selected for the Owens Corning National Invitation Tournament (NIT) for the second-straight year. This success comes on the heels of the 2002-03 season when America East sent four teams to postseason tournaments. Both the America East Men's and Women's Basketball Championships continue to be played before large crowds and national (men's championship on ESPN) or regional (women's championship) television audiences. Since 1999, each of the six charter members of America East has appeared in either the NCAA Men's Basketball or Women's Basketball Championship, the NIT or the WNIT.

Basketball has not been the only sport to garner national attention. America East men's soccer champion Binghamton advanced in the NCAA Championships last fall. In the last four years, America East champions have won at least one game at the NCAA



Championships in the sports of baseball, field hockey, men's lacrosse, men's soccer, women's soccer and softball.

Individual sports were also well represented as Boston University's Jochen Dieckfoss was one of two at-large selections to the NCAA Men's Cross Country Championship. He was also one of six America East student-athletes to compete at the NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships. Dieckfoss, who finished sixth in the 3,000-meter steeplechase, was joined by Derek Anderson, who earned All-America status in the shot put, Zara Northover, who was 12th in the shot put, and Laura Chmielewski of Northeastern, and Teresa Covert and Brandon Howlett of Albany. Adela Gavozdea of Northeastern, the Most Outstanding Diver at the America East Swimming and Diving Championship, competed in the platform, one-meter and three-meter events at the NCAA Swimming and Diving Championships. In addition, Binghamton's men's golf team earned an at-large bid to the NCAA Golf Championship for a second-straight year.

Academic Accolades ...

America East institutions saw nine of their student-athletes earn Academic All-America honors in 2003-04 alone. This total ranked fifth-highest among all Division I-AA and I-AAA conferences. Included in the group were first-team selections Lana Khvalina of the UMBC women's tennis team, who was named for the second-straight year, and Alon Lubezky of the Hartford men's soccer team, the school's career goal scoring leader.

America East annually recognizes its student-athletes' success in the classroom. All varsity team members who compile a grade-point average between 3.0 and 3.49 during their playing season receive conference recognition by being named to the Academic Honor Roll. Those outstanding student-athletes who compile a grade-point average of 3.5 or higher are named to the Commissioner's Honor Roll. Nearly 1,700 student-athletes received honor roll recognition in 2003-04 with America East's 3,500 student-athletes averaging a 2.97 grade-point average.

Additionally, the conference annually determines the top scholar-athlete in each of its championship sports. The scholar-athlete must maintain a minimum 3.2 cumulative grade-point average and be a starter or prominent reserve on the team for the duration of the playing season. From the pool of 22 outstanding scholar-athletes, one male and one female America East student-athlete are further honored as the conference's Scholar-Athletes of the Year.

Lana Khvalina of UMBC and Jacob Jentzer of Maine were the 2003-04 Scholar-Athletes of the Year. Khvalina completed her bachelor's degree in political science in three years with a perfect 4.00 grade-point average. She was selected one of 174 student-athletes from the more than 360,000 student-athletes at NCAA Division I, II and III institutions to receive an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship and will apply that scholarship toward her first year at the College of William and Mary Law School. On the tennis



court, she finished her singles career with a record of 62-20. The first two-time First Team Academic All-American in UMBC history, Khvalina twice earned all-conference honors and competed on teams which went to the NCAA Championships in 2002 and 2003.

A biochemistry and psychology major with a premedical studies minor, Jentzer graduated with a 3.99 grade-point average. He won the 100-freestyle at the 2002 America East Swimming and Diving Championships and also had three second-place finishes, as well as a fourth and fifth place finish at the conference championships in his four-year career. He was a second-team Academic All-American in 2002-03. Jentzer will attend University of Rochester Medical School in the fall.

Other individual sport Scholar-Athletes for 2003-04 included: Aaron Izaryk, Maine, baseball; David Hehn, Vermont, men's basketball; Kim Corbitt, Maine, women's basketball; Andy Allstadt, Albany, men's cross country; Julia Nazzer, Boston University, women's cross country; Rebecca Ouellett, Maine, field hockey; Brad Moulton, Binghamton, men's golf; Jill Friedman, Albany, women's golf; Adam Grossman, UMBC, men's indoor track and field; Kristal Kostiew, Vermont, women's indoor track and field; John Elbey, Albany, men's lacrosse; Marris Trachtenberg, Stony Brook, women's lacrosse; Grossman, men's outdoor track and field; Lesley Read, New Hampshire, women's outdoor track and field; Alon Lubezky, Hartford, men's soccer; Jeanette Akerlund, Hartford, women's soccer; Andee Lindgren, Albany, softball; Yun Qu, Binghamton, women's swimming and diving; Egil Anonsen, Stony Brook, men's tennis; and Rachel Goldsmith, Stony Brook, volleyball.

America East also honors the member institution whose student-athletes compile the highest overall team grade-point average in each of its conference-sponsored sports with the America East Academic Cup. Maine won the 2003-04 Academic Cup with a conference-record 3.12 grade-point average. Binghamton, Hartford, New Hampshire and Vermont have also won the Academic Cup in recent years.

Commissioner's Cup ...

Boston University was awarded the 2003-04 Stuart P. Haskell, Jr. Commissioner's Cup, which annually recognizes the strongest athletic program in America East as determined by a scoring system which rewards a school for success both during the regular season and at championship competition in the conference's 22 sports. It was the Terriers' third-straight honor. Boston University's point total was bolstered by championships in women's soccer and women's tennis. In addition, the Terriers were runners-up in women's basketball, women's golf, women's lacrosse and softball. The women's soccer and men's basketball teams were regular-season champions.

Maine, which enjoyed its highest rank in the 15-year history of the award by finishing second, won championships in women's basketball and softball and had runners-up finishes in field hockey, women's soccer, men's basketball and baseball.

Northeastern had a conference-best five champions. The Huskies' field hockey, women's swimming and diving, women's indoor track and field, men's outdoor track and field and women's outdoor track and field teams were all victorious.

Binghamton, which improved five places from 2002-03, won championships in men's soccer and men's tennis and had runners-up finishes in men's swimming and diving, men's golf and men's lacrosse.

Albany (men's indoor track and field, women's golf and men's lacrosse) and New Hampshire (men's cross country, women's cross country, volleyball and women's lacrosse) also won multiple championships.

Each of the 10 member institutions won at least one championship. Stony Brook won the baseball championship. UMBC won the men's swimming and diving championship in its first year in the conference. Hartford won the men's golf championship. Vermont won its second-straight men's basketball championship.

The Stuart P. Haskell, Jr. Commissioner's Cup is named in honor of the first commissioner of America East. Haskell served as commissioner of the conference from 1987 until his retirement in 1997.

America East in the Pros ...

Several America East athletes have extended their playing careers beyond the collegiate level. Former two-time America East Players of

the Year Craig Claxton, of the Golden State Warriors, and Malik Rose, of the San Antonio Spurs, and former Hartford star Vin Baker, of the New York Knicks, continue the legacy of the late Reggie Lewis (Northeastern), a former NBA All-Star and captain of the Boston Celtics at the time of his death.

America East has also been well-represented in the WNBA as current Hartford head coach Jennifer Rizzotti and former America East Players of the Year Cindy Blodgett (Maine), Jamie Cassidy (Maine) and Katasha Artis (Northeastern) have played in the top women's professional league.

Hartford's Jerry Kelly, who won two PGA Tour events in 2002, joined the tour in 1996 after turning professional in 1989. Kelly, who has earned more than \$2 million in each of the last three seasons, is joined by former Hawk golfers Tim Petrovic and Patrick Sheehan on the PGA Tour.

Former Hartford star Jeff Bagwell of the Houston Astros became the 35th player in Major League history to hit 400 home runs when he homered in a game on July 20, 2003. Former Northeastern star Carlos Pena is now with the Detroit Tigers while former America East Players of the Year Mark Sweeney (Maine) of the Colorado Rockies and Kevin Mench of the Texas Rangers are also on 2004 Major League rosters. Joe Nathan, who played at Stony Brook, was an All-Star with the Minnesota Twins in 2004. Jay Witasick of the San Diego Padres, who played at UMBC, is in his ninth season in the majors. Several other former America East players, including seven draft choices from 2004 alone, are presently in the minor leagues.

America East also has a number of former men's and women's soccer and men's lacrosse players in various professional leagues.

History ...

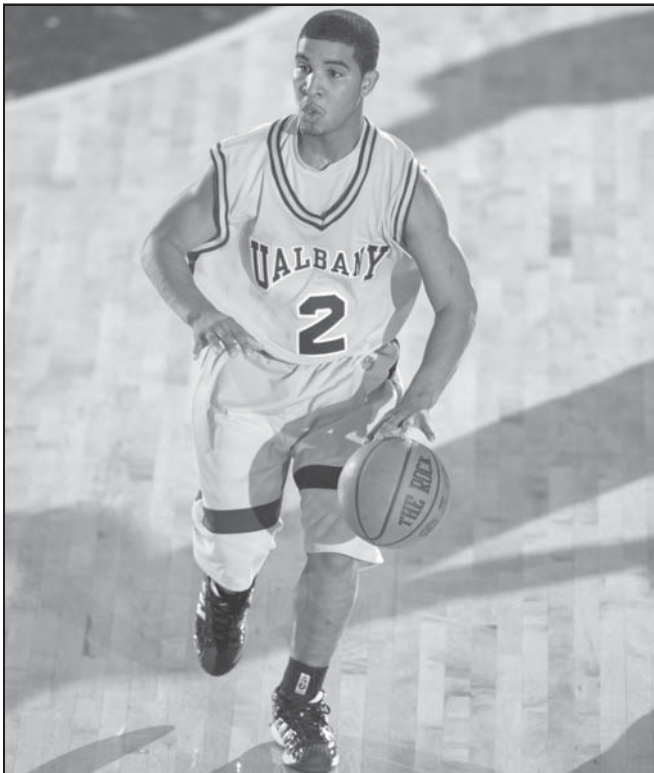
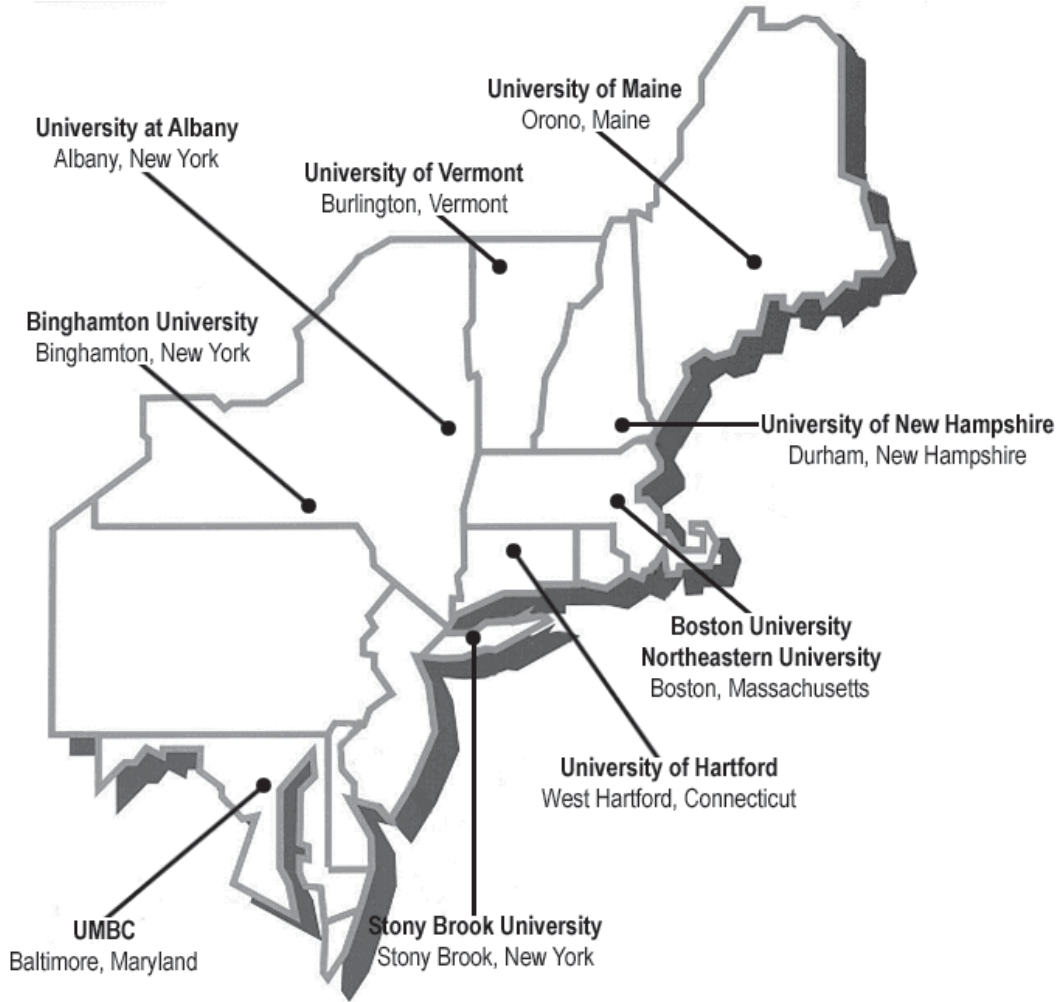
To see how far America East has progressed, consider the conference was established in 1979 as the ECAC North. The conference at that time consisted of 10 institutions and sponsored league competition only in men's basketball, with the champion receiving an automatic bid to the NCAA Championship.

Men's basketball remained the lone league sport until the 1988-89 academic year. At that time, the conference's Board of Directors made a new commitment to an all-sports association, creating the North Atlantic Conference by establishing an office, hiring a full-time commissioner, and embarking on a building program.

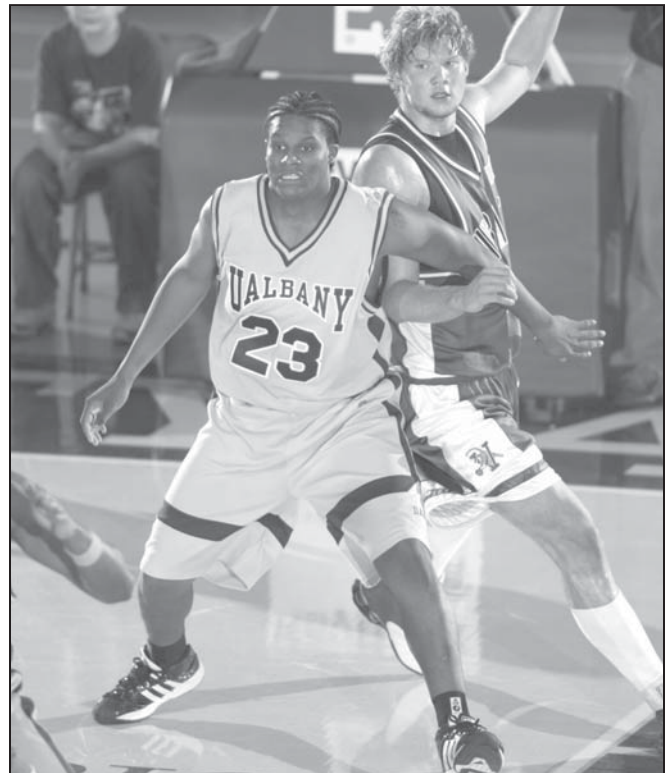
The North Atlantic Conference merged with the Seaboard Conference (the league in which Boston University, Hartford, Maine, New Hampshire, Northeastern and Vermont, among others, competed in women's basketball) in 1989 and the NAC looked to establish conference championships in several men's and women's sports.

The conference changed its name to America East prior to the 1996-97 academic year and later that year hired Chris Monasch as its second full-time commissioner and moved the conference headquarters to its present location in downtown Boston.

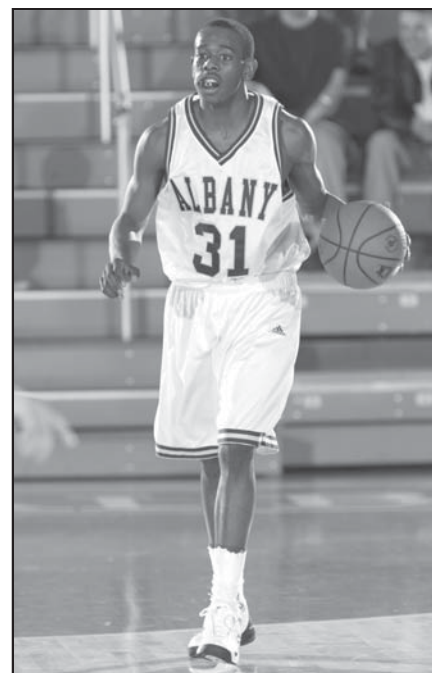

ALBANY

NEW YORK'S CAPITAL

Albany, the state capital of New York, offers something for everyone, and is the center of a region remarkable for its natural and cultural resources.

The Capital District area represents the cities of Albany, Schenectady and Troy, and has a population of approximately 875,000. Within a short distance are the Berkshires, the Catskills and the Adirondacks, the largest wilderness area east of the Mississippi River.

Major ski areas such as Killington, Gore, Hunter, Bromley, Stratton and Mt. Snow are within easy commuting distance. Saratoga Springs, 25 miles to the north, is internationally known as a sports, concert, and cultural center, and features outstanding thoroughbred and harness racing at Saratoga Race Track.

Geographically, the city of Albany is only 150 miles from New York City, 175 miles from Boston, and 225 miles from Montreal in Canada. The New York State Thruway and two major interstate highways intersect one mile from

the main campus. Bus, rail, and air terminals are all within ten minutes of the University.

Designated an All-America City by the National Civic League in 1991, Albany is dominated by the Nelson A. Rockefeller Empire State Plaza, a billion-dollar complex. It includes government buildings, a convention center, the state museum, and the state library.

Directly across from the Plaza stands the State Capitol Building. This majestic five-story structure, in existence since 1879, houses the governor's offices and the chambers of the State Senate and Assembly.

The Plaza has spurred the renovation of a large portion of historic downtown Albany. You will enjoy exploring the cosmopolitan area of old townhouses, boutiques and restaurants, or attending major sports, entertainment or cultural events in Pepsi Arena, the host site to the 2001 NCAA Division I Ice Hockey Frozen Four, 2002 NCAA Division I Wrestling Championships, and 2003 NCAA Division I Men's Basketball East Regional.

This \$65.4 million arena seats approximately 17,500 with a 1,700-car parking facility. Pepsi Arena hosts nearly 200 events a year including professional basketball and hockey games, arena football, rock concerts, trade shows, conventions, and is the site for the University's spring commencement.

Four major malls and shopping centers, including Crossgates, Stuyvesant Plaza and Colonie Center, fall within one mile of campus. Nightlife in Albany is lively with concerts, movies, theatre, dancing, and just about every kind of restaurant or eatery you can imagine. Most attractions or activities are a short walk or accessible through the local bus system.
