Press Credentials ...

All requests for press credentials should be directed to Alison Hischak, Assistant Director of Media Relations, as far in advance of the game as possible. Credentials will be held at the will call table in the lobby of the Recreation & Convocation Center and can be picked up prior to the game. All credential requests will be handled on a space-available basis.

Photographers and Television ...

Photo passes can be obtained in the same manner as regular press credentials. Photographers are permitted to shoot from the baseline only, provided they do not interfere with the flow of the game. Camera crews are asked to call in advance of the game, but will be admitted upon arrival.

Radio Policy ...

All stations planning on broadcasting University at Albany women's basketball games at the Recreation & Convocation Center must obtain permission from the Athletic Media Relations Office. Written requests should be sent at least two weeks prior to the date of the game. Broadcast locations are at courtside. Crews are limited to three people.

Interview Procedures ...

All player and/or coach interview requests must be directed to Alison Hischak or another member of the University at Albany Athletic Media Relations Department. Please do not contact a student-athlete directly by phone or in their dormitories.

Press Facilities ...

Press row is located courtside. Phone lines for radio broadcasts and print media are available along press row. Parking is readily available at the adjacent Recreation & Convocation Center parking lot. The main press row phone number is (518) 442-2566. University at Albany respectfully reminds each person on press row that it is a working area and cheering for either team is prohibited. Your cooperation is appreciated.

Press Row Services ...

All members of the working media will be provided with pre-game notes, statistics and rosters, which will be available at courtside. Live in-game statistics can be viewed on monitors. Computerized halftime and final statistics and detailed final play-by-play summary will also be provided.

Post-Game Interviews ...

Following a mandatory 10-minute cooling off period, UAlbany head coach Trina Patterson and selected players will be made available outside their locker room on the RACC floor level. Any special requests should be brought to the attention of the Athletic Media Relations staff, and we will do our best to assist you. Media can file their stories from press row, which is fully equipped with phone lines and post-game information.

PROGRAM HISTORY: The UAlbany women's basketball program began varsity play in 1965, and has competed at the NCAA College Division, NCAA Division II and III levels prior to 1999. Entering their 40th season, the Great Danes have a 397-400 (.498) record. UAlbany has made five ECAC playoff and two NCAA tournament appearances since 1985. The UAlbany program moved to Division II in 1995-96 and to Division I in 1999-00.

THE HOME COURT: The Great Danes play their home games at the 5,000-seat Recreation and Convocation Center located on campus. Entering the 2004-05 season, UAlbany holds a 87-63 (.580) record in 12 seasons at the RACC.

THE COACHING STAFF: UAlbany enters the 2004-05 basketball season under the guidance of third-year head coach Trina Patterson. Patterson is a seasoned coaching veteran having spent time at the College of William and Mary and the University of Maryland-Eastern Shore. She was the 1993 Colonial Athletic Association Coach of the Year and guided the Tribe to the conference championship game where they fell to Old Dominion. Patterson is joined on her staff by Jim Brunelli, Liz Sahin and Joi Irby. Brunelli starts his fifth year with the Great Danes, while Sahin and Irby begin their second and first year, respectively.

THE CONFERENCE: UAlbany begins its fourth year as a member of the ten-team America East Conference. The Great Danes earned their first trip to the America East Conference Tournament after finishing 9-9. They then went on to defeat fifth-seeded Hartford, 52-50, in the opening round for their first-ever victory in the America East Conference Tournament. UAlbany fell to eventual champion Maine who downed Boston University in the 2003-04 tournament final.

THE CAPTAINS: Selected by the team and coaching staff, senior center Danielle Hutcheson, senior forward Alicia Learn and junior guard Becky Ayers will serve as the captains for UAlbany this season. Hutcheson also served as a co-captain during the 2003-04 season.

THE TEAM: The Great Danes return nine of 13 players from last season's squad. UAlbany's attack will feature their top five scorers from a year ago, including first-team all-conference honoree Danielle Hutcheson. The Great Danes have five freshmen on this season's roster of 14 student-athletes.

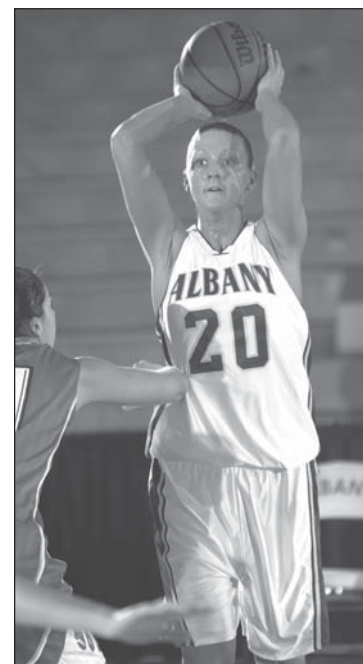

THE SCHEDULE: UAlbany's regular-season slate features 27 games, including 18 contests against America East opponents. The non-conference portion of the schedule features Big East foe Syracuse, as well as Patriot League rivals Bucknell, Colgate and American. UAlbany will travel to Danielle Hutcheson's home state of Arizona for the Northern Arizona Tournament on Nov. 26-27. Then in December, the Great Danes return to Trina Patterson's alma mater, the University of Virginia for the Cavalier Classic on the 28th and 29th.



Danielle Hutcheson

ALL-CONFERENCE ACCOLADES: Senior center Danielle Hutcheson became the program's first-ever America East All-Conference First Team selection last season. She led the Great Danes with 12.7 ppg and 9.6 rpg to go along with 35 steals and 22 blocks. Hutcheson earned all-conference second team honors after the 2002-03 campaign.

REACHING NEW HEIGHTS: UAlbany's 13 victories last season set a new record for most wins in a season since the program moved to the Division I level in 1999-00. The season's success also marked a four-game improvement from the 2002-03 record of 9-18.

CHASING A RECORD: Senior center Danielle Hutcheson is climbing the UAlbany basketball record books in several career categories, including scoring, rebounding and blocked shots. She already holds the record for career rebounding average and needs just 88 boards to surpass Cindy Jensen '95 as the all-time leader.





Head Coach Trina Patterson



Trina Patterson is entering her third season as head coach of the women's basketball program at the University at Albany and her twelfth overall at the collegiate level. During Patterson's two years at the helm, the UAlbany program has made significant strides and become more prominent in America East play.

A new era began in Great Danes women's basketball when Director of Athletics and Recreation Dr. Lee McElroy announced the hiring of Trina Patterson as

the women's head basketball coach on May 6, 2002. Patterson became the ninth head coach in the UAlbany women's basketball program's history.

"Trina has a vision for the program on all levels, and her previous teams have demonstrated success on the playing court, in the classroom and in the community," McElroy said.

Patterson led UAlbany to its first-ever America East Conference postseason tournament appearance in 2003-04. The Great Danes, who finished 13-16 overall, and tied for fourth in the conference standings with a 9-9 mark, defeated Hartford in the quarterfinal round, before losing to eventual champion Maine in the semifinals. The Great Danes' 13 victories, one of which came at perennial NCAA Tournament competitor Florida International, showed a four-win improvement from a 9-18 mark in 2002-03.

Known for her ability to develop post players, Patterson guided center Danielle Hutcheson to America East All-Conference First-Team honors last season. It marked the first time a UAlbany women's basketball player received that award.

During her first season at UAlbany, Patterson helped the Great Danes increase their win total from four games to nine. UAlbany also went from a winless conference season to registering three victories in 2002-03. Under Patterson's guidance, two Great Dane players were named to the America East All-Conference Second Team for the first time in women's basketball history.

Prior to her arrival in Albany, Patterson served as the head basketball coach at the College of William & Mary in Williamsburg,

Virginia, for eight seasons from 1991-99. She took over a program that fought to establish an identity in the Colonial Athletic Association, and had not experienced a winning season at the Division I level. By her third year, Patterson guided the team to a 20-8 record and



a third-place finish in the conference standings. She was voted as the 1993-94 CAA Coach of the Year, and the squad established single-season records in scoring average and assists. During the previous campaign, the Tribe advanced to the championship game of the 1992 CAA Tournament. Patterson, who mentored five all-conference players, remains the school's all-time winningest coach.

In 1999-2000, Patterson spent one year as the head coach at the University of Maryland-Eastern Shore, a member of the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference. Patterson, who began her career as a William & Mary assistant coach in 1988, has also served on the USA Women's Basketball Team coaching staff as an assistant for the R. William Jones Cup in Taipei, Taiwan, and Beijing, China in 1998. The gold-medal-winning squad's roster included current WNBA players Tamika Catchings, a four-time WBCA/Kodak All-American, Becky Hammon and Tamika Whitmore. Patterson again joined the Team USA sidelines for the 2003 Pan American Games, helping guide the squad to the gold medal game. Some of the members of the team included Nicole Powell, Barbara Turner, Rebekka Brunson and Janel McCarville. Patterson coached Brunson, a post-player, who went on to lead the team in scoring and rebounding during the international competition.

As a collegiate player at the University of Virginia, Patterson earned four varsity letters and was a member of four consecutive NCAA Tournament teams. The Cavaliers captured three Atlantic Coast Conference regular-season titles and won 20 or more games in each season of her tenure. In her senior season as team captain, Virginia posted a 26-5 record and reached the NCAA's regional semifinals. The Cavaliers, coached by Debbie Ryan, a seven-time ACC Coach of the Year, ended the season ranked 10th by *USA Today* and 11th in the Associated Press polls.

Patterson was one of five women's basketball coaches chosen by the U.S. Olympic Committee to participate in a coaches' conference. The forum was held in Colorado Springs in October 2003.

A native of Newport News, Va., Patterson earned a B.A. in rhetoric and communication studies from the University of Virginia in 1987. She completed a M.A. in human resource management from National University in LaJolla, Calif. in 2002.

Patterson, who enjoys playing the acoustic guitar, is a member of Delta Sigma Theta and sits on the Capital Region Urban Advisory Board for the YMCA. Her husband, Carl, serves as a Master Sergeant in the U.S. Marine Corps after 20 years of service. The Pattersons have two sons, Carl Jr. "C.J.", 8 and Matthew, 3.

James Brunelli Assistant Coach

James Brunelli begins his fifth season as an assistant coach at UAlbany. He serves as the recruiting coordinator and is involved in other aspects of the program, including game and practice preparations and season scheduling. Brunelli's player development focuses

on the post players.

Brunelli, 31, previously served a two-year stint at Clarion University in Pennsylvania. He was involved with the NCAA Division II program's recruiting, scouting, game and practice instruction, and strength and conditioning.

A native of Force, Pa., Brunelli was a student assistant at Clarion from 1994-96 prior to coaching boys' and girls' high school basketball for two years. He worked at both DuBois (Pa.) and Davie County (N.C.) high schools. Brunelli played for the men's basketball team at Clarion in 1993-94, after making the squads as a walk-on. He originally attended the Pennsylvania State University's DuBois campus, where he played baseball and basketball. Brunelli has an undergraduate degree in education, and is certified in secondary social studies. He earned a M.S. in communication education and mass media from Clarion. Brunelli is also a member of the Women's Basketball Coaches Association and New York State Basketball Coaches Association.

Brunelli and his wife, Stacey, who is a fourth grade teacher at Zoller Elementary in the Schenectady City School District, currently reside in Rotterdam. The Brunellis have one daughter, Baylee Ann, 2.



Liz Sahin Assistant Coach

Liz Sahin begins her second season as an assistant coach at the University at Albany. She is involved in all aspects of the program, including preseason and postseason conditioning, scouting and recruiting. Sahin serves as a liaison with the training room and her player development

focuses on the guards on the team.

Sahin, a native of Hatay, Turkey, completed her collegiate playing career at Virginia as a two-year letterwinner. She was named Most Improved Player in 2002 and was a member of the NCAA tournament and ACC semifinal teams in 2002 and 2003. Sahin previously attended Palm Beach Community College before transferring to Virginia, where she led the team to two Southern Conference Championships, 1999-2001. She was named Southern Conference Player-of-the-Year, to the All-State team and All-Academic team twice. She led the Southern Conference in scoring in 1999 and the state of Florida in assists and was third in free throw percentage, 1999-2001.

A Dean's List student and a member of the Phi Theta Kappa Honors Society, Sahin received a B.A. in Economics from Virginia in May. She is a member of the Turkish National Team and has assisted with Debbie Ryan's girls basketball camps and Dena Evans point guard camps. Sahin speaks three languages (English, Turkish and Arabic) and has six siblings.



Joi Irby Assistant Coach

Joi Irby begins her first season as an assistant coach at the University at Albany. Irby's responsibilities will include coordinating team travel, community service and serving as the academic liaison.

Irby comes to UAlbany from Virginia State University, where she was an assistant coach from October 2003 to July 2004. While at Virginia State, Irby was responsible for several aspects of coaching, including scouting reports, travel arrangements and the monitoring of academic performance.

A native of Richmond, Va., Irby was a four-year member of the Georgetown University women's basketball team that made three National Invitation Tournament (WNIT) appearances and was given the team's Unsung Heroine Award as a freshman.

A 2003 graduate of Georgetown, Irby received a bachelor of arts in psychology with a minor in theology. Irby also served as a resident assistant and youth counselor and coach at the Georgetown Women's Basketball Camp. She has been a member of the Women's Basketball Coaches Association since November 2003.



Tim Ferguson Head Manager



Tim Ferguson takes over as head manager of the Great Danes after working as an assistant manager and practice player last season.

A native of New Hartford, N.Y., Ferguson played basketball and baseball at Clinton Central High School. Ferguson was a center on the basketball team and helped lead his squad to an 18-4 senior season and a spot in the second round of the sectional playoffs. He was named an honorable mention player for the Tri-Valley League and earned a spot on the senior all-star squad. Ferguson played third base on the Clinton baseball team.

Ferguson is in his senior year at UAlbany and is majoring in sociology. He is the son of Charles and Constance Ferguson.

Mary Kate Hedderman Assistant Athletic Trainer



Mary Kate Hedderman is in her sixth season as an assistant athletic trainer at UAlbany. She is one of the primary athletic trainers for women's basketball and works exclusively with the field hockey and softball programs.

Hedderman previously spent five years as an athletic trainer at Columbia Physical Therapy in Schodack, N.Y., where she supervised a clinic outreach program focusing on high school athletes. She also served on the Atlanta Committee's athletic training staff at the 1996 Olympics and has worked men's basketball and women's softball at two Empire State Games.

Hedderman, 35, was a Kellas Scholar at Russell Sage College and earned a B.S. in physical education and athletic training (1991). A native of Albany, she received her master's degree in 1993 from Indiana State University, where she was a graduate assistant. Hedderman is a member of the New York State Athletic Trainers Association and is a certified instructor in CPR and First Aid, as well as being certified as an NSCA-CPT.

Kimberly Doyle Assistant Athletic Trainer



Kimberly Doyle is in her fourth season as an assistant athletic trainer at UAlbany, after working with the field hockey and women's basketball programs as an intern in 2001.

Doyle previously was an athletic trainer at Terre Haute North Vigo High School (Ind.) during the 1998-99 academic year and served as the head student trainer at the State University of New York at Brockport. She is board certified by the National Athletic Trainers Association, and has received certification in CPR, safety and advanced first aid by the American Red Cross.

Doyle received her master's degree in athletic training from Indiana State University, and earned a B.S. in physical education from Brockport. A native of Troy, N.Y., Doyle received her associate of arts from Hudson Valley Community College.

Jack Koelmel Head Athletic Trainer

Koelmel, 56, received a bachelor's degree in physical education from Norwich University in Vermont, where he played basketball and football and worked as a student assistant trainer. An instructor in the care and prevention of athletic injuries, Koelmel earned a M.A. in educational administration from UAlbany in 1973.

From 1992-99, Koelmel served as the NYSATA region representative. He recently received his 25-year service award from the National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA). In addition, Koelmel worked as an athletic trainer at the Empire State Games for seven years.

Koelmel and his wife, Margo Ferrara, reside in Ballston Spa with his stepchildren, Frances, Carl and Ross.

Tony Tullock Strength & Conditioning



Tony Tullock was named as strength and conditioning coach in July 2000. He supervises Albany's 19-sport intercollegiate athletics program.

Tullock, 30, was previously assistant strength coach at Colgate University for two years. He designed and administered strength programs for men's and women's ice hockey, soccer, field hockey, lacrosse and softball, and was active with the football and basketball programs. Tullock also handled daily operations of the University Fitness Center, created off-season workouts for athletes, and used video analysis to correct weightlifting techniques.

Tullock, a certified strength and conditioning specialist, was a graduate assistant at the University of Massachusetts for two years. He received a master's degree in exercise science and physiology from UMass, and earned a B.A. in psychology from Boston College, where he was a student assistant. Tullock and his wife, Sue, live in Guilderland.





Kevin Galuski Equipment Manager

Kevin Galuski was named as head equipment manager in August 2000. He took on additional duties the following year as New York Giants Training Camp liaison. He manages all operational aspects of the summer training camp.

Galuski, 31, was previously the head equipment manager with the Arena Football League's Carolina Cobras for one year. He also worked with the AFL's Albany Firebirds from 1995-99. In his duties with both organizations, Galuski handled the supervision and maintenance of equipment and athletic gear along with game day responsibilities.

Galuski received a B.S. in sports management from Colby-Sawyer College. He is a member of the Athletic Equipment Managers Association. Galuski and his wife, Shannon, reside in the Capital Region.



Eddie Scott Academic Services

Eddie Scott is in his second year as assistant director of athletic academic support services. His department's mission is to maximize the academic potential of student-athletes by providing an atmosphere that enhances learning skills, career development and personal counseling.

Scott, 25, was a captain on the 2002 UAlbany baseball team, and earned first-team All-America East Conference honors. He batted .339 as a senior center fielder, and added 27 RBI, nine doubles and two home runs. Scott finished his career ranked among the program's all-time leaders in stolen bases (52), total hits (154), runs (111) and doubles (24).

Scott was chosen to the Verizon Academic All-America national third-team in the spring of 2002. He received the school's Presidential Scholar-Athlete Award and an ECAC Merit Medal as the top senior male student-athlete. Scott, who served on UAlbany's Student-Athlete Advisory Committee, was a four-time Spellman Award recipient with the highest GPA for an African-American in his class. He graduated magna cum laude with a B.A. in psychology and has a minor in sociology.



Julie Steinke Director, Academic Services

Julie Steinke was named director of athletic academic support services in October 2003. Her department's mission is to maximize the academic potential of student-athletes by providing an atmosphere that enhances learning skills, career development and personal counseling.

Steinke manages services that offer academic counseling, academic monitoring, learning and study strategies, tutoring and study sessions. In addition, individual study plans and a STAAR program designed for students who need extra assistance are offered.

Steinke previously was an assistant athletic director for student services and compliance at St. Bonaventure University. From 1999-2003, Steinke monitored all student-athlete academic progress for degree completion and NCAA eligibility purposes. She also developed St. Bonaventure's Bona's C.A.R.E.S. program (Committed Athletes Responsibly Enhancing Society), an NCAA Life Skills comparable program.

Steinke, 30, was an academic enhancement intern during the 1998-99 academic year at Rider University. She also was an academic tutor and an associate instructor in the department of kinesiology for a two-year period at Indiana University.

A native of Troy, Ohio, Steinke received her B.A. in psychology from Saint Mary's College in Indiana, and has a master's in kinesiology with a concentration in applied sport science and sports psychology from Indiana.

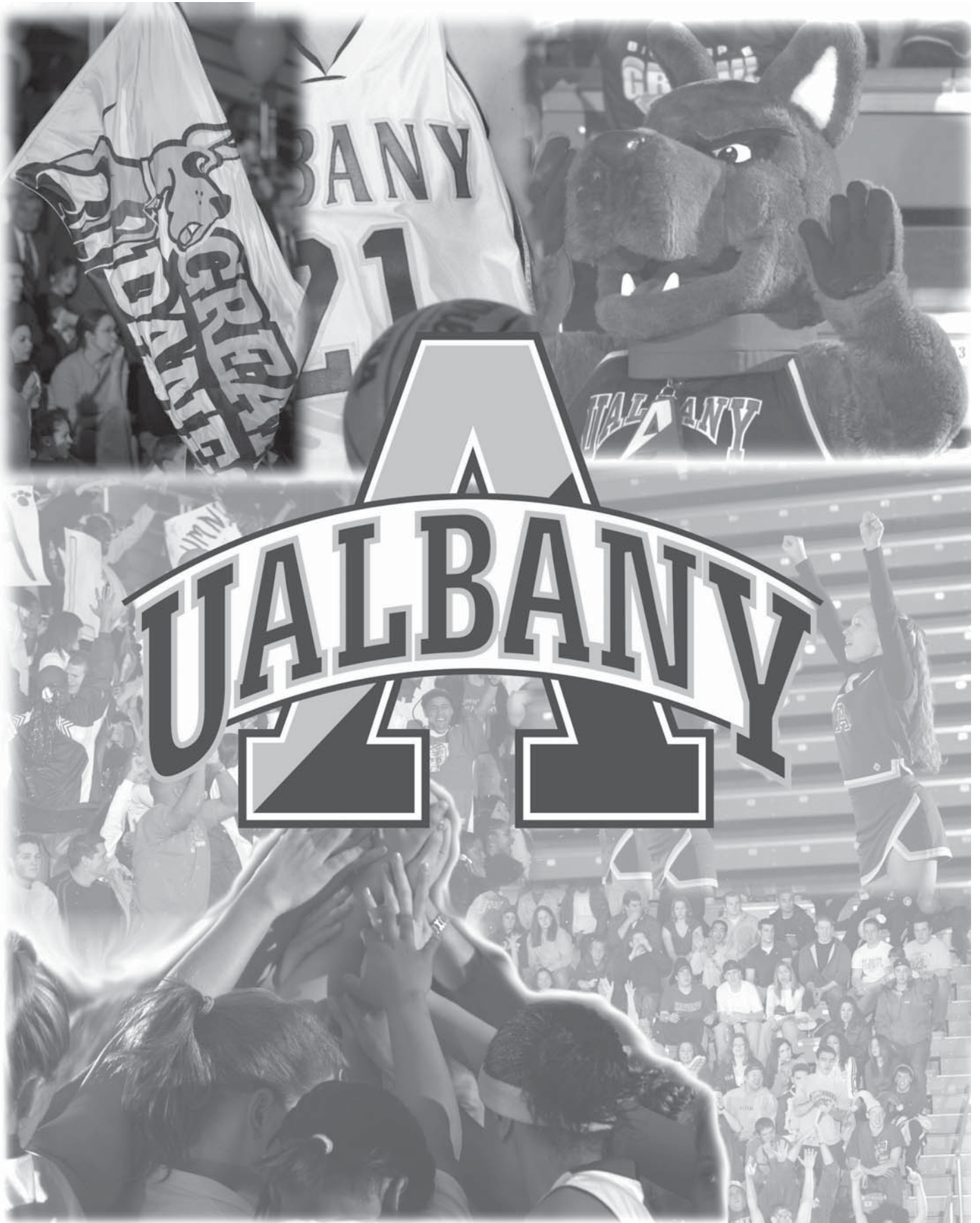

MEET THE TEAM



After making significant strides in America East Conference action each of the last two seasons, UAlbany head coach Trina Patterson will look to nine returning players to keep the program moving higher in conference play.

"The last two years have helped us gain the experience needed to keep the program moving in a positive direction," Patterson said. "The savvy of our returning players coupled with the talent of our freshmen make us capable of accomplishing great things here at the University at Albany."

Senior center **Danielle Hutcheson**, the program's first All-America East First Team selection, leads the list of four returning starters. She is joined by senior forward **Alicia Learn**, junior guard **Becky Ayers** and senior forward **Maree Jones**.

GUARDS

With some of the strongest shooting skills on the team, Ayers will be the leader in the UAlbany backcourt.

After averaging 12.2 points per game that ranked among the America East leaders, Ayers proved she is recovered from a foot injury that saw her miss all of the 2002-03 campaign. She is the Great Danes' most potent threat behind the arc, as she drilled 40 percent (52-of-128) of her attempts. Ayers' shooting skills carry over to the charity stripe as well, as she has made 83 percent of her career attempts.

Another strong sharpshooter from three-point land is junior **Jen Schumacher**, who connected on 47 of 116 attempts and finished with an average of 8.6 points per game. She scored a career-high 23 points and drilled five three-pointers against Stony Brook in a game at the RACC last season.

The Great Danes lost starting point guard Sarah Sweetland to graduation and will need to replace both her consistency and team-best 125 assists. Patterson will have a variety of players with experience to help distribute the ball this season.

Senior **Stacy Johnson** and sophomore **Tanya James** each have

experience at lead guard. Both players saw action as a reserve last season, with Johnson averaging 1.6 points and dishing 10 assists. James handed out 23 helpers and chipped in 1.3 points per game.

Three of the five Great Dane freshmen played in the backcourt on the scholastic level. **Kelly Martinson**



Senior Maree Jones

holds her high school record for three-pointers in a career with 90. She was a two-time All-Big Eight Conference First Team selection and was named All-City Player of the Year as a senior.

An all-state honoree, **Sherri Mikus** holds her high school's records for career points, assists and steals. She comes with championship experience after leading her team to three divisional titles and a district crown.

Tanika Thrower averaged 24 points per game as a senior and helped lead her team to its first district playoff appearance in six years. She was a three-time All-District 21-5A First Team choice during her career.

FORWARDS

Jones and Learn, a pair of talented starters, return at the forward position for the Great Danes. The team's second-leading rebounder a year ago with 6.9 per game, Jones started all but one game and chipped in an average of 7.4 points per contest.

Capable of playing at guard or forward, Learn logged the most minutes of any Great Dane last season. In addition to averaging 10 points per game, she played stifling defense and posted a team-best 45 steals. Learn's career-high 48 blocks last season fell just one shy of the program's single-season record.

Sophomore **Lyndsay Clark** and junior **Sharon Majors** may also figure into the mix at forward. Majors finished with 50 rebounds on the season. Clark blocked 13 shots and collected 35 boards.

Freshman **Gia Sanders** guided her team to a 27-3 record as a senior when she averaged 10 points, nine rebounds and four assists. Like Learn, Sanders is another player able to step in at either the guard or forward position.

CENTERS

Hutcheson, a two-time all-conference honoree, will start at the center position after leading the Great Danes with 12.7 points and 9.6 rebounds per contest in 2003-04. The Phoenix, Ariz. native needs just 88 rebounds to become UAlbany's all-time leader. Her rebounding numbers as a sophomore and junior both rank in the school's top-ten season performances. Hutcheson enters the season just 20 points shy of becoming the eighth Great Dane to break the 1,000-point barrier.

"Dani is one of the best players in the league," Patterson said. "She has become even more focused entering her senior season. With her scoring and rebounding presence she is capable of dominating a game."

A newcomer at the center position, **Kirsten Peterson**, a 6-foot-4 freshman, averaged six blocks per game during her senior season at Newark Valley High School. A first-team All-Interscholastic Athletic Conference selection, Peterson also competed in the high jump for the track team.

THE SCHEDULE

UAlbany's regular-season slate features 27 games, with 18 of those coming against America East opponents. The Great Danes will travel to Hutcheson's home state of Arizona to play in a Thanksgiving tournament at Northern Arizona. Then in December, UAlbany will compete in the Cavalier Classic at the University of Virginia, where Coach Patterson starred as a collegian.

OPPONENTS



America East Conference



America East Conference enters its 17th year of all-sports championship competition with a reputation as one of the most comprehensive NCAA Division I conferences. With a geographic footprint extending from the Mid-Atlantic to the Northeast regions, America East remains committed to broad-based, competitive Division I athletics programs, complementing the academic integrity of the 10 member institutions.

University at Albany, Binghamton University, Boston University, University of Hartford, University of Maine, University of Maryland, Baltimore County (UMBC), University of New Hampshire, Northeastern University, Stony Brook University, and University of Vermont each offers a unique blend of academic and athletic tradition. America East also has an associate membership with Quinnipiac University in the sport of men's lacrosse. America East's proven record of success in its sports will enable the conference to earn admission to 12 NCAA Championships in 2004-05.

Student-athletes in the sports of baseball, men's basketball, women's basketball, field hockey, men's lacrosse, women's lacrosse, men's soccer, women's soccer, softball, men's tennis, women's tennis, and volleyball receive access to NCAA Championships via the conference's automatic qualifiers. Individual champions at the America East Outdoor Track and Field Championship will receive bids to that NCAA Championship. In addition, several America East athletes in sports such as men's and women's cross country, men's and women's indoor track and field, men's and women's golf, and men's and women's swimming and diving will compete in those NCAA Championships. Overall, America East sponsors championships in 22 sports.

America East's success in each of its championship sports has been a benchmark for the conference since its inception as a basketball conference in 1979.

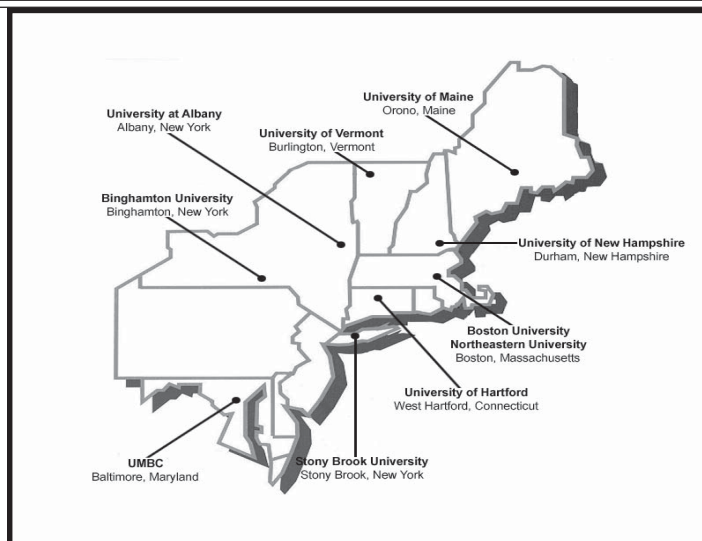
Basketball continues to garner much of the conference's attention with America East sending multiple teams to postseason tournaments seven times in the last eight years. Vermont, the men's basketball champion, and Maine, the women's basketball champion, each appeared in the 2004 NCAA Championship. Boston University, the America East men's regular-season champion, was selected for the Owens Corning National Invitation Tournament (NIT) for the second-straight year. This success comes on the heels of the 2002-03 season when America East sent four teams to postseason tournaments. Both the America East Men's and Women's Basketball Championships continue to be played before large crowds and national (men's championship on ESPN) or regional (women's championship) television audiences. Since 1999, each of the six charter members of America East has appeared in either the NCAA Men's Basketball or Women's Basketball Championship, the NIT or the WNIT.

Basketball has not been the only sport to garner national attention. America East men's soccer champion Binghamton advanced in the NCAA Championships last fall. In the last four years, America East champions have won at least one game at the NCAA Championships in the sports of baseball, field hockey, men's lacrosse, men's soccer, women's soccer and softball.

America East annually recognizes its student-athletes' success in the classroom. All varsity team members who compile a grade-point average between 3.0 and 3.49 during their playing season receive conference recognition by being named to the Academic Honor Roll. Those outstanding student-athletes who compile a grade-point average of 3.5 or higher are named to the Commissioner's Honor Roll. Nearly 1,700 student-athletes received honor roll recognition in 2003-04 with America East's 3,500 student-athletes averaging a 2.97 grade-point average. Lana Khvalina of UMBC and Jacob Jentzer of Maine were the 2003-04 Scholar-Athletes of the Year.

America East also honors the member institution whose student-athletes compile the highest overall team grade-point average in each of its conference-sponsored sports with the America East Academic Cup. Maine won the 2003-04 Academic Cup with a conference-record 3.12 grade-point average.

Boston University was awarded the 2003-04 Stuart P. Haskell, Jr. Commissioner's Cup, which annually recognizes the strongest athletic program in America East as determined by a scoring system which rewards a school for success both during the regular season and at championship competition in the conference's 22 sports. It was the Terriers' third-straight honor. Boston University's point total was



bolstered by championships in women's soccer and women's tennis. In addition, the Terriers were runners-up in women's basketball, women's golf, women's lacrosse and softball. The women's soccer and men's basketball teams were regular-season champions.

The Stuart P. Haskell, Jr. Commissioner's Cup is named in honor of the first commissioner of America East. Haskell served as commissioner of the conference from 1987 until his retirement in 1997.

Several America East athletes have extended their playing careers beyond the collegiate level. Former two-time America East Players of the Year Craig Claxton, Malik Rose and former Hartford star Vin Baker continue the legacy of the late Reggie Lewis (Northeastern), a former NBA All-Star and captain of the Boston Celtics at the time of his death.

America East has also been well-represented in the WNBA as current Hartford head coach Jennifer Rizzotti and former America East Players of the Year Cindy Blodgett (Maine), Jamie Cassidy (Maine) and Katasha Artis (Northeastern) have played in the top women's professional league.

Former Hartford star Jeff Bagwell of the Houston Astros became the 35th player in Major League history to hit 400 home runs when he homered in a game on July 20, 2003. Former Northeastern star Carlos Pena, America East Players of the Year Mark Sweeney (Maine) and Kevin Mench are also on 2004 Major League rosters. Joe Nathan, who played at Stony Brook, was an All-Star in 2004. Several other former America East players, including seven draft choices from 2004 alone, are presently in the minor leagues.

America East also has a number of former men's and women's soccer and men's lacrosse players in various professional leagues.

To see how far America East has progressed, consider the conference was established in 1979 as the ECAC North. The conference at that time consisted of 10 institutions and sponsored league competition only in men's basketball, with the champion receiving an automatic bid to the NCAA Championship.

Men's basketball remained the lone league sport until the 1988-89 academic year. At that time, the conference's Board of Directors made a new commitment to an all-sports association, creating the North Atlantic Conference by establishing an office, hiring a full-time commissioner, and embarking on a building program.

The North Atlantic Conference merged with the Seaboard Conference (the league in which Boston University, Hartford, Maine, New Hampshire, Northeastern and Vermont, among others, competed in women's basketball) in 1989 and the NAC looked to establish conference championships in several men's and women's sports.

The conference changed its name to America East prior to the 1996-97 academic year and later that year hired Chris Monasch as its second full-time commissioner and moved the conference headquarters to its present location in downtown Boston.

Albany, the state capital of New York, offers something for everyone, and is the center of a region remarkable for its natural and cultural resources.

The Capital District area represents the cities of Albany, Schenectady and Troy, and has a population of approximately 875,000. Within a short distance are the Berkshires, the Catskills and the Adirondacks, the largest wilderness area east of the Mississippi River.

Major ski areas such as Killington, Gore, Hunter, Bromley, Stratton and Mt. Snow are within easy commuting distance. Saratoga Springs, 25 miles to the north, is internationally known as a sports, concert, and cultural center, and features outstanding thoroughbred and harness racing at Saratoga Race Track.

Geographically, the city of Albany is only 150 miles from New York City, 175 miles from Boston, and 225 miles from Montreal in Canada. The New York State Thruway and two major interstate highways intersect one mile from the main campus. Bus, rail, and air terminals are all within ten minutes of the University.

Designated an All-America City by the National Civic League in 1991, Albany is dominated by the Nelson A.

Rockefeller Empire State Plaza, a billion-dollar complex. It includes government buildings, a convention center, the state museum, and the state library.

Directly across from the Plaza stands the State Capitol Building. This majestic five-story structure, in existence since 1879, houses the governor's offices and the chambers of the State Senate and Assembly.

The Plaza has spurred the renovation of a large portion of historic downtown Albany. You will enjoy exploring the cosmopolitan area of old townhouses, boutiques and restaurants, or attending major sports, entertainment or cultural events in Pepsi Arena, the host site to the 2001 NCAA Division I Ice Hockey Frozen Four, 2002 NCAA Division I Wrestling Championships, and 2003 NCAA Division I Men's Basketball East Regional.

This \$65.4 million arena seats approximately 17,500 with a 1,700-car parking facility. Pepsi Arena hosts nearly 200 events a year including professional basketball and hockey games, arena football, rock concerts, trade shows, conventions, and is the site for the University's spring commencement.

Four major malls and shopping centers, including Crossgates, Stuyvesant Plaza and Colonie Center, fall within one mile of campus. Nightlife in Albany is lively with concerts, movies, theatre, dancing, and just about every kind of restaurant or eatery you can imagine. Most attractions or activities are a short walk or accessible through the local bus system.



The University at Albany today is an internationally recognized public research university with a broad mission of undergraduate and graduate education, and research. More than 17,000 students are enrolled in nine schools

and colleges offering 176 undergraduate, master's and doctoral degree programs.

Outstanding faculty, an innovative curriculum, award-winning advisors and student-centered services create a distinctive learning environment that nurtures student success. After graduation, more than two-thirds of undergraduates go on for advanced degrees, and acceptances to law and medical schools are well above the national average. UAlbany has more than 128,000 living alumni, including: Catherine Bertini, B.A.'71, under-secretary-general for management, United Nations; Marcia Brown, B.A.'40, three-time Caldecott Award-winning children's book author; Tom Clarke, B.A.'73, president of new business ventures, Nike, Inc.; and SOBE beverages founder Norm Snyder, B.S.'83.

UAlbany programs in sociology, public administration and policy, criminal justice, clinical psychology, reading, accounting, social welfare and atmospheric sciences have earned national renown for excellence. More recently, the University has been building new strengths in such areas as nanotechnology, life sciences, and public informatics and information systems. The latest rankings of graduate programs by *U.S. News and World Report* place seven programs in the top 25 in the nation.

Undergraduates choose from 53 majors in the arts and sciences, business and accounting, public policy, criminal justice, information science, pre-law and pre-health; approximately 30 percent of undergraduates participate in research with faculty. Innovative degree programs with an international focus and more than 300 study-abroad programs prepare students for the global economy. Extensive internship opportunities offer real-world experience in New York's capital and the surrounding region.

Both the UAlbany campus and the region are bustling with extracurricular opportunities. Students participate in more than 150 student clubs, honor societies, and other campus-related groups, and choose from a busy calendar of campus events, including spirited Division I athletic competition in 19 sports and

a rich array of cultural activities.

The University is just a short drive from spectacular natural and recreational centers in New York, Massachusetts, and Vermont. With 13 colleges in the Capital Region, it's easy to see why Albany is also a "great college town."

UAlbany, working with governmental and business partners, plays a vital role in the economic development of the Capital Region and New York State. The University is a major international center for research and development in the fields of nanosciences and nanoengineering. An economic impact study in 2004 estimated UAlbany's economic impact as \$1.119 billion annually in New York State – \$1.005 billion of that in the Capital Region.

UAlbany aims to rank among the top public research universities in the nation and is taking strategic steps across its three campuses to achieve this goal. The Campaign for the University at Albany was publicly launched in April 2003 to help provide necessary private support for achieving UAlbany's goals.

John R. Ryan *Interim President*

SUNY Maritime College President, Vice Adm. John R. Ryan, USN (Ret.) was named as interim president of the University at Albany by the State University of New York Board of Trustees on February 24, 2004.



"I am delighted that Admiral Ryan will be serving as interim president of the University at Albany," said Board Chair Thomas F. Egan, at the time of the announcement. "President's Ryan's significant academic, philanthropic and fiscal achievements at our Maritime College, and at the Naval Academy, combined with his extensive experience and success leading and managing large complex organizations, make him an ideal choice to lead the University at Albany until a new permanent president is chosen. I want to thank him for agreeing to assume additional responsibility."

Ryan said about his appointment, "I am honored the Board has selected me to play a part in leading the campus during a search for a permanent leader. Working with the students, faculty and staff at the campus will be a great pleasure and I am looking forward to the challenges that come with leading a large, dynamic institution such as the University at Albany."

Ryan became president of the Maritime College on October 23, 2001, and started his presidency on June 15, 2002. He will continue in that capacity while serving as interim president at UAlbany. The Maritime College, located at Fort Schuyler in New York City, enrolls approximately 1,100 students, and offers undergraduate and graduate programs in international business, engineering, science and technology.

Ryan served as superintendent (president) of the U.S. Naval Academy in Annapolis, Maryland from 1998 to 2002, overseeing a \$220 million annual budget and 7,000 faculty, staff and students. While at Annapolis, Ryan enjoyed overwhelming faculty support. During his presidency, the Faculty Senate praised the academic focus of his administration and passed a unanimous resolution requesting that he remain for additional four-year term -- a first in the history of the school.

During his tenure, the Naval Academy Foundation launched a \$175 million "Leaders to Serve the Nation" campaign designed to raise the bar of excellence in six key areas: academics; character development; leadership; admissions; athletics and unrestricted support. \$125 million was raised in the first two years of the five-year campaign, with numerous endowed chairs and new programs established.

Ryan received his master's degree from George Washington University in administration in Washington, D.C. and completed the Program for Executives in National and International Security at the John F. Kennedy School of Government, Harvard University.

A native of Mountainhome, Pa., Ryan graduated from the Naval Academy in June of 1967 with his twin brother Vice Adm. Norbert Ryan, Jr. and earned the designation of Naval Aviator in October 1968. He has been a pilot for 35 years.

The first in his class to reach the rank of rear admiral, he distinguished himself as line officer and effective leader, commanding patrol squadrons in the Mediterranean and Indian and Pacific Oceans. He coordinated the overseas operations of six government facilities located in three countries, which included three airports, four naval ports and three hospitals with personnel

totaling more than 10,000. In 1998, Ryan was appointed Vice Admiral by President Clinton and confirmed by the U.S. Senate.

Ryan is married to the former Diane L. Ackerman of Bangor, Pa. They have three adult daughters, Tricia, Kelly, and Julie, and three grandchildren.

James P. Doellefeld *Vice President for Student Affairs*



James P. Doellefeld has served as Vice President for Student Affairs, since he was appointed in July 1996. Doellefeld brings more than 30 years of service and leadership in the Division of Student Affairs to the position. Since 1988, he had been the University's assistant vice president of campus life, and previously was director of student activities.

A well-known advocate for students, Doellefeld has seen the University grow from a newly-minted public university center into a mature research university with outstanding scholars and teaching faculty.

In that time, he served as director of student/university activities and the campus center for a six-year period, beginning in 1978. He was both assistant director and an adviser in student activities during the 1970s.

Through a variety of high-contact capacities, Doellefeld has demonstrated a strong desire to insure a high quality of life for Albany's student population. He has provided important leadership in student development and in contributing to health, safety and quality of life goals. In addition, he has served on a number of University-wide committees and task forces, including the University Budget Panel and Master Planning Group.

A native of Lake City, Minnesota, Doellefeld joined the University community from the New York State Education Department, where he was an assistant chief in the Bureau of Research in Higher and Professional Education.

Doellefeld received his B.A. in history from the State University College at Fredonia in 1968. He later earned an Ed.S. degree in counseling psychology and student development and a M.S. in student personnel services from UAlbany.

Doellefeld is married to Margaret Masercola (M.S. '69), a kindergarten teacher in Albany. Their son, Steven, and daughter, Julia, both received graduate degrees from UAlbany.

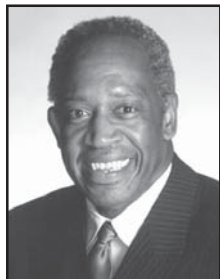

Lee McElroy, *Director of Athletics*



Dr. Lee A. McElroy, Jr., who has more than 30 years of experience in athletic and educational administration, is in his fifth year as the University at Albany's Director of Athletics and Recreation. McElroy, who provides leadership for Albany's NCAA Division I 19-sport intercollegiate athletics program for men and women, spearheaded a successful search for a broad-based athletic conference when the University accepted an invitation to join the America

East Conference in January 2001. He also worked to renew the men's and women's basketball rivalry with Capital Region rival Siena College, led the development of a master plan to upgrade the University's athletic and recreational complex, and has energized the school's athletic development efforts.

McElroy was also a key figure as the University successfully completed the NCAA's second cycle of Division I athletics certification in August 2003. In addition, he recently helped the University hire an architectural firm in an effort to develop a plan to improve the school's athletic facilities, including the feasibility of the construction of a multi-purpose outdoor stadium and an artificial turf facility. He was recently honored with the 2004 General Robert R. Neyland Outstanding Athletic Director Award by the All-American Football Foundation.

McElroy, who played football at UCLA in the late 1960s, spent the previous four years as American University's director of athletics. American, a Division I school in Washington, D.C., competed in the Colonial Athletic Association. During McElroy's tenure, the AU athletic department upgraded to 19 sports, expanded corporate partners by 400 percent, and planned capital projects for a fitness facility, intramural field and soccer stadium. McElroy founded Eagle Club, the department's fundraising arm, and developed a program rated as one of the top ten in the nation in its compliance with NCAA gender equity requirements.

Dr. McElroy served as president of the America East Conference Executive Committee in 2003-04, and has gained national prominence for his roles with numerous professional organizations and NCAA committees. He is currently serving a three-year term on the Division I Management Council as one of four at-large representatives from I-AA or I-AAA conferences, and is second vice president of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA). McElroy previously served on four prestigious NCAA Committees: Athletics Certification, Financial Aid, Degree Completion Program, and the NCAA Special Committee on Agents and Amateurism.

In 1998, McElroy was named to the NACDA Executive Committee for the University Division, and chair of the Sears Directors Cup Committee. The Sears Directors Cup is the only national award and academic scholarship program to recognize all NCAA and NAIA championship sports for women and men.

From 1989-96, McElroy was the director of athletics at California State University-Sacramento. He led the program's transition from Division II to Division I and engineered a move to the Big Sky and Big West conferences. He also implemented a strategic plan that developed a corporate partners plan, created an effective fundraising and marketing program, redesigned academic support services, improved the athletic facilities complex, and provided for campus and community outreach programs.

McElroy also worked at the University of Houston from 1981 to 1988 as an assistant director of men's and women's sports and as an associate director of athletics, and for one year as the director of athletics at The University of the District of Columbia. Before joining the Houston staff, he taught in the public school systems of Santa Monica, California and Beaumont, Texas, and was a high school principal in Beaumont.

Along with his duties for the NCAA and NACDA, McElroy has testified before congressional committees on issues in college athletics, such as gender equity, the welfare of the minority student-athlete, and the academic/athletic balance. McElroy serves on the boards of the National Consortium of Academics and Sports, *Athletic Business* magazine, and the National Minority Golf Association. He is also a fellow at the Institute of Ethics and Sportsmanship at the University of Rhode Island.

McElroy, who resides with his wife, Karen, in Slingerlands, earned his B.S. in political science and history from UCLA in 1970. He later received a M.Ed. from the University of Southern California, and an Ed.D. from the University of Houston.

UALBANY HOF CLASS OF 2004

Xiomara Davila Diaz (1996-99) — Davila Diaz was one of UAlbany's top hurdlers and sprinters in the track program's Division II era. She shared the school's 1998-99 Female Athlete of the Year award. She was voted athlete of the meet at both the 1999 ECAC Division II and New England Collegiate Conference indoor championships. Davila Diaz qualified for the 1999 ECAC Division I outdoor meet in both the 100- and 400-meter hurdles. She competed at the 1997 NCAA Division II meet in three events, and was fifth in the 400-hurdles.

Peter Pedro (1986-90) — One of the top fullbacks in UAlbany football history, Pedro ranks fourth among the school's career rushing leaders with 2,612 yards. He averaged 5.4 yards per carry, ranked ninth in both total offense and scoring, and totaled 22 career touchdowns. Pedro led the Great Danes in rushing as a sophomore and junior with 800-plus yards on the ground in both seasons. He was named Pizza Hut honorable mention All-American in 1987. Pedro's top effort came when he rumbled for 186 yards in a 35-19 win against Norwich.

Kimberly Toone (1985-87) — An All-America track athlete in the mid-1990s, Toone was inducted into UAlbany's Athletic Hall of Fame posthumously. She died, at the age of 22, in a tragic automobile accident. Toone qualified for the 1996 NCAA Division II indoor championships in the long jump and 55-meter hurdles. She had captured both the ECAC and Collegiate Track Conference indoor long jump titles. Toone, who did not compete on the high school level, reached the NCAA Division III national indoor and outdoor championships in 1995. She was a three-event CTC outdoor champion in the long jump, 100-meter hurdles and 400-meter hurdles.

Bill Vanos (1990-94) — A two-time track All-American and accomplished cross country competitor on the NCAA Division III level, Vanos is one of the top distance runners in UAlbany history. In 1994, Vanos finished second in the 10,000-meter run at the NCAA outdoor championships and sixth in the 5,000 at the national indoor meet. He captured the CTC 3,000-meter steeplechase title and was third at Penn Relays in the 5,000. Vanos also competed in three NCAA cross country championships and recorded a pair of top-35 finishes as an individual.

The University at Albany and its intercollegiate athletics program continues to move forward in the 21st century after going through several transitions over the previous decade. UAlbany's athletic teams began competition at the National Collegiate Athletic Association's Division I level, beginning in September 1999. The upgrade elevated all men's and women's programs, and placed football in the NCAA's I-AA classification.

In January 2001, the University accepted an invitation to become a full member of America East Conference. Eighteen of the school's nineteen varsity teams are eligible through America East play for conference championships and NCAA post-season competition. Football, a Division I-AA program, has been an associate member of the Northeast Conference since 1999.

"Conference affiliation for our entire athletics program enhances the institution's Division I growth," says UAlbany's Director of Athletics and Recreation Lee McElroy. "With America East Conference membership, the University's goals and aspirations for intercollegiate athletics have become clearly defined. Our student-athletes and coaches have an opportunity to compete for both conference and NCAA championships. America East also provides increased visibility for athletics and strengthens our identity with the University's students, alumni, faculty and friends."

In 2003-04, the UAlbany men's lacrosse program captured its second consecutive America East Conference championship and secured an NCAA Tournament berth. Men's track and field won the conference's indoor team title for the second straight year, while women's golf also brought home an America East title. Softball won the league's regular-season crown and tied the school's single-season victory record. Football shared its second consecutive Northeast Conference championship.

UAlbany has an athletic history that dates back to the late 1890s when the first known intercollegiate teams arrived on campus. Albany competed at the college division level prior to the NCAA's restructuring in 1972. The athletic program moved from Division III to Division II in 1995-96.

Albany's intercollegiate program has a new direction, but continues to excel in the athletic realm, producing competitive teams, successful coaches, and outstanding student-athletes recognized for their accomplishments both on the field and in the classroom. The University sponsors 19 varsity sports for men and women. Club sports, an intramural program, and recreational opportunities are also offered.

The quality of UAlbany's athletic program is evidenced by some of the finest facilities in the nation. The indoor and outdoor physical education design is among the most comprehensive in the Northeast.

In the spring of 1992, the University opened the Recreation and Convocation Center (RACC), an \$11 million state-of-the-art facility. The RACC is the home for Albany's men's and women's basketball teams, and has an .11 mile indoor track. The 5,000-seat arena also serves as a major venue for community events such as rock and pop concerts, sporting events and University activities. The playing surface on the arena's three basketball courts is scheduled to be completely renovated during the fall of 2004.

In addition, the RACC contains a fitness center with Nautilus and

Universal machines, rowing ergometers and exercise bikes; four racquetball/handball courts and four squash courts; athletic training and rehabilitation facilities with three whirlpool baths, a musculoskeletal evaluation device and other therapeutic machines.

Adjacent to the RACC is the Physical Education Building which houses University Gym; three full-size playing surfaces which can be used for basketball, volleyball, and tennis; four racquetball/handball courts; four squash courts; a swimming pool; a fitness and weight training center with Olympic weights; an aerobic exercise room, and a dance studio.

The RACC and Physical Education Building were air-conditioned in March 1996, as the state appropriated funds for renovations and permanent improvements to the University's facilities. The \$2.3 million in funding was prompted by the New York Giants decision to hold their football training camp on campus. The project brought together the region's community in what has proven to be a successful partnership.

In addition, Albany's air-supported structure, fitted with a brand-new covering with minor interior renovations in the spring of 2003, is located to the east of the Physical Education Building, and may be utilized for tennis, basketball, volleyball, and indoor football practice.

The indoor complex is complemented by fine outdoor facilities, including University Field, which seats capacity crowds of 10,000 for football games, and has an all-weather, 400-meter track surrounding a natural grass surface. There are 24 tennis courts (12 with lighting), four basketball and six volleyball courts; and numerous fields for football, soccer, softball, baseball, lacrosse, field hockey, and other events.

The practice fields on the Western Avenue side of campus were renovated in June 1996 with 263,000 square feet of two-inch thick athletic sod. The irrigation system was refurbished, and the area was surrounded with a 3,100-foot chain-link fence.

In the spring of 1992, the University opened its \$11 million, state-of-the-art athletic facility, the Recreation and Convocation Center (RACC). The RACC contains four racquetball/handball courts and four squash courts; an aerobic exercise room with special synthetic flooring; a fitness center with Nautilus machines; rowing ergometers and exercise bikes; athletic training and rehabilitation facilities with three whirlpool baths, a musculoskeletal evaluation device and other therapeutic machines; and a main arena with a .11 mile indoor track, three full basketball courts and a seating capacity of 5,000. The RACC also serves as a major venue for community events such as concerts and University activities including graduation and freshman orientation.

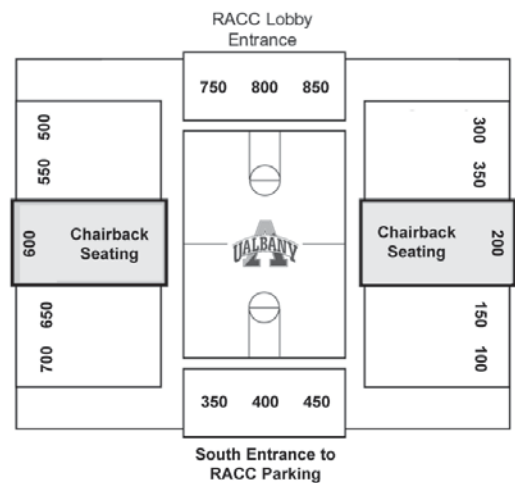
