Research Laboratory working in the laboratory of the late Dr. Irving Langmuir, discovered a method for seeding subcooled clouds with dry ice. This led to the large worldwide effort now being directed toward determining the possibilities and limitations of weather control. Dr. Schaefer spent an exploratory visit of a week in Yellowstone last winter. He is responsible for the general arrangements and plans to prepare ice crystal replicas, measure atmospheric nuclei, take time




