Passing in the halls must be done quietly! If not, you are bothering other students.

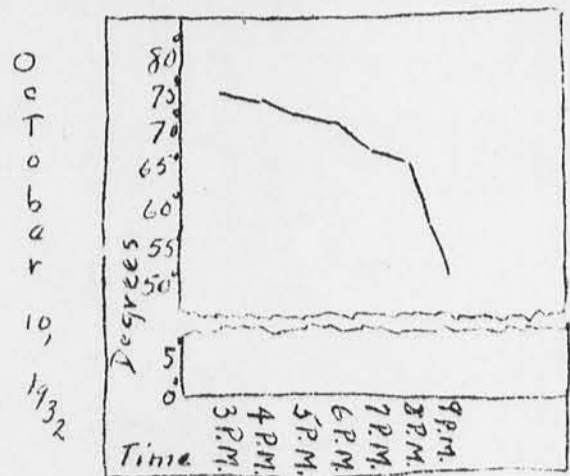
