DISCUSSION CONCERNING GENERAL DISORDER IN ASSEMBLY LEADS TO APPOINTMENT OF PUPIL MONITORS

All male members of the Student Council are now authorized to report to the faculty any person who, during an assembly program, acts discourteously either to the performers or to the audience.

Miss Mary E. Conklin, faculty member in charge of assembly programs, was present at last Tuesday's meeting of the Student Council where she requested that members of the council suggest methods whereby the outrageous conduct of the audience during assemblies may be corrected. A resulting discussion concerning the past misbehaviors of Milne students in assemblies and the types of programs which would appeal to Milne in general led to the appointment of the Student Council boys as monitors.

Several suggestions as regards the situation were to abolish assembly programs entirely or to seat the students in home room groups with a supervisor in each section.

MILNE VARSITY ENDS BASKETBALL SEASON WITH BRILLIANT VICTORY

The Milne High School Basketball Team closed its season with a brilliant victory over the State College Freshmen Saturday night in Page Hall Gymnasium.

On Friday night the game with Delmar was marked by a great amount of fouling on both teams, Milne making 19 fouls and Delmar 13. The score at half time was 12-10 in favor of Delmar, and in the third quarter Milne held only a two or three point lead, but in the fourth quarter when four of the Milne Varsity were put out of the game on fouls, the team play was broken and Delmar forged ahead. The game ended with a score of 33-27 in favor of Delmar.

Although Milne went into the game with the State Frosh a slight favorite the State Team outplayed them in the first half, the score being 16-9 in favor of the Frosh.

Milne spurted on in the third quarter but could not overcome the lead. In the fourth quarter Milne tied the score and the lead see-sawed back and forth between the two teams.

Rosenstein was high scorer for Milne in the State Game making 11 points while Stutz was high scorer in the Delmar Game making 9 points.

ST. AGNES DEFEATS MILNE GIRLS' VARSITY IN VERY CLOSE GAME

The Milne High Girls' Varsity Basketball Team met defeat at the hands of Delmar in a very close game at the First presbyterean Church on Wednesday afternoon. The two teams were very evenly matched and there were several times throughout the game when the teams were tied.

At the end of the first quarter the score was 4-4, at the end of the second 11-10 in St. Agnes' favor, and at the end of the third 14-14. However the game ended with a score of 19-18 in St. Agnes's favor. St. Agnes had the advantage over Milne in the accuracy of their foul shots.
