Realities in Testing

NYPIRG is sponsoring a "Truth in Testing" before the New York legislature. which would require that questions and answers to standardized tests such as the Scholastic Aptitude Test, the Graduate Record Exam, etc., be published within the 30 days following an exam. This may seem on the surface to be only fair and reasonable, but such disclosure is unfortunately incompatible

with standardized testing.

Standardized tests are valuable precisely because they are standardized, and thus provide a uniform national standard of comparison, independent of time, place and variation of the overall ability of those taking a given test at a given time. Has NYPIRGever wondered how the Educational Testing Service is able to assert that a 650 on, for example, the Graduate Record Verbal exam taken in May, 1978, is equivalent to the same score on the GRE Verbal taken in January. 1979 or March 1969? The answer is that every version of the GRE and other exams contains questions that have appeared in previous versions (though not in immediately preceding ones, to avoid giving an advantage to those retaking a test). By comparing ormance on these repeated questions, the FTS is able to determine how students taking a particular test at a given time compare to previous takers of this test, and, thus, for previous takers of this test, and, thus, for example, to decide whether raw scores (number of questions right) are higher because students are better prepared or because a particular version of an exam is easier than previous versions. If questions had to be fully disclosed and answers published. the ETS could not repeat the questions, and could not standardize the exams and convert raw scores to the reported scores (on a scale of 200-800 for most exams) whose meaning is independent of which version of an exam was

If NYPIRG were seriously interested in improving testing, it would withdraw the disclosure requirement. But of course NYPIRG would like to eliminate or curtail testing, as their literature makes clear. (A candid sign over the NYPIRG table in the Campus Center several weeks ago read

Against Standardized Testing.")
Those who oppose standardized testing right ponder the consequences of eliminating places in law and medical schools, nor would

admission (which, indeed, are often excessive). The result would be greater reliance upon grades and reference letters.

But perhaps the worst consequences of eliminating tests is that higher education would become less flexible, with fewer opportunities to move from a two year or four year college to a university, or from a good university to a better one. Grading standards vary immensely among universities, and even more so among four year and two year colleges. Even a straight A student at a poor school may not be as able or as knowledgeable as an average student at a first rate school. But community college students could do well anywhere. Their best chance to prove it is in a contest (like the GRE) where all are evaluated by the same standards. In the absence of some uniform measure, graduate and professional schools would tend to accept students only from what they could regard as "safe" schools. Ivy League professional and graduate schools would be more prone to accept each others' undergraduates and less prone to accept outsiders.

If grading standards were more uniform the GRE would still be useful, though not essential. There are nations whose colleges exhibit far less variety than do American schools. In England, for example, final examinations in all courses are made up by committees that include professors from other institutions, and grades from different consequence. Stokely Still Talking Revolution

Appearances can be deceiving, however. The man was Black activist Stokely Carmichael, and he wasn't talking jobs or starting salaries. He was talking revolution.

In the mid and late sixties, Stokely Carmichael was one of the most ominant figures in the Black activist novement. Carmichael was born in 1941 n Trinidad and came to the United States at the age of ten. He is a graduate of Howard University, where he began his civil rights work. From his extensive vork in registering Black voters in the Student-Non-violent Coordinating Committee (SNCC) and its nation-wide fforts for social change. Using this power base. Carmichael helped change the direction of the Black movement in America - away from Dr. Martin Luther King's passive resistance policies and toward more aggressive action. Carmichael popularized the phrase "Black Power" and later served as Honorary Prime Minister of the Black Panther Party.

Ten years after leaving the Black Panthers, Stokely Carmichael has not mellowed. He still fights for change and does not rule out violence as a method to create that change. For most of this decade, he has lived in Guinea and has worked for worldwide Black liberation as an organizer of the All African's People's Revolutionary Party.

Though the cry of "Black power" hasn't been heard in this country for years, Carmichael maintains that "the struggle continues, only the form changes." Continuing his effort to muster support for his party among Black ollege students, Carmichael visited SUNYA Friday as part of the Albany State University Black Association's Black Week" activities.

As he spoke during the reception. Carmichael was quick to state his goal: evolution. "I am a revolutionary, not a eformist," he said. "My goal is to destroy he capitalist system and replace it with he socialist system.":

Carmichael sees capitalism as a perpetuator of racism. As a Pan-Africanist, he believes that Blacks all over the world should consider hemselves Africans, and they should rganize against capitalism.

"The only advice against racism is either to submit or to fight - and we're not going to submit," he said.

When queried by a student on how iolence plays a part in the revolution, Carmichael said, "Overthrowing the eapitalist system is not going to happen thout people picking up arms.

This approach is directly opposed to Martin Luther King's non-violent policies in the civil rights movements of ne sixties. Carmichael and King often ound themselves at odds on this matter; at one point King vainly attempted to talk Carmichael out of using the "Black

"King, though a great man, made an error," said Carmichael. "It (nonviolence) was a tactical principle.

Carmichael said that he believes in the dialectical process that everything changes all the time and this will help the revolution occur. "Everything affects everything else. Man is greedy and altruistic. But that can change. For instance, by the time you're 21 in this sytem, if you are not competitive, you are ot normal. That can be changed to 'cooperative'."

After his speech, Carmichael fielded juestions from the audience. The anti-Zionist stand of his party was questioned -- when asked how he felt about a Jewish presence in the Middle East, Carmichael naused then responded 'A Zionist is not a lew. Begin is not a Jew, just like (Rhodesian Prime Minister Ian) Smith is not a Christian... Zionism is opposed to Judaism. Once Zionism is destroyed, Jews, Christians and Moslems will live in

Another position of Carmichael's which came under fire was his exclusion of whites in the revolutionary movement In his earlier writings, he had stated that the white working class would be an country.

"The white youth has a responsibility "My responsibility is not to convince to organize the white working class for Korea and was defeated., in Vietnam and since blacks have lacked any it was defeated...in Cuba, Angola and organization, they have been excluded Iran... and was defeated. Diamond case." O'Heaney "scooped the country," according to Michael, in December, 1931, when Jack "Legs" Diamond, a NYC gunman and pootlegger, was found slain in a rooming use on Dove Street. "He got the tip rom an informer and accompanied the police to the house.

Joe O'Heaney covered some of the Capital District's "hottest stories," according to his 1968 Times Union obituary. His list of credits includes covering the surrender of gangster Dutch Schultz in Albany and the O'Connel kidnapping case in Albany, in 1933, O'Connel, nephew of Daniel P O'Connel, an Albany County Democratic Chairman, was held for 23 days before being released on payment of \$40,000 ranson


"Joe, himself, was the main attraction," Michael said, and smiled in remembrance. "It was more his attitude and personality that kept the place going than the bar itself. He knew tons of people from being a reporter. He was a lively old guy, very friendly and outgoing. I guess that's what made him a good

Reporting was not a novelty in Joe's family. His father, an Irish immigrant was head bookeeper for the old Press-Kniekerbocker-Express, and was there when it became the Knickerbocker Press. Joe also worked as Rensselaer correspondent for the Times Union and as acting sports editor. His wife, Mary, worked for the Times Union advertising department. O'Heaney ended his 35 year newspaper career in 1950 and opened the

"Joe bought the whole building and opened the bar in the basement," Michael explained, "Back then, Alumni Quad SUNYA's downtown dorms) was the State Teachers College, It slowly started o change into a students" bar in the late '50's. Now it's all students." Michael mentioned that that fact is "a major topic conversation at family gatherings.

Although the beer is still green at O'Heaney's tavern on March 17, few patrons know why. The bar is simply referred to as "O's" and the name O'Heaney represents nothing but a bar to its collegiate customers. Joe O'Heaney. however, is still at the roots of the tavern. It remains a small place good to sit. drink, and talk. No modern luxuries just bar room essentials in a rustic. homey atmosphere. And although the talk isn't quite as gripping as "Legs Diamond," and there aren't too many "tales of the old days," conversation is the number one attraction at O'Heaney's tavern.

"I think that's one thing that's unchanged: Joe's not the star anymore, but the format is still the same," Michael concluded. "It's his kind of place





Hazards of the Field

Justice Byron White in the majority opinion in the Herbert-CBS case ruled that since Colonel Herbert, the plaintiff, must network to win his libel suit, the editors and reporters of the news organization involved should not have the privilege of removing the editorial process from Herbert's discovery of the evidence.

To me this opinion is legally impeccable. To prove malice in a libel suit over a story the plaintiff might need to know information about the reporter's thought process and his communication with his editor. But I also believe the expectation of a broad discovery interrogation and the time and money involved will have a chilling effect on the practice of journalism especially for small community papers which don't have the legal counsel at their elbow and can't "check with legal" every time they print something controversial.

The problem is with the original N.Y. Times v. Sullivan opinion which wrongly gave public officials the right to sue for libel over attacks on their behavior as public officials. When this was decided by the liberal Warren Court it was considered a victory for freedom of the press. It was not.

Justice Arthur Goldberg disagreed with the majority opinion in the Sullivan case. He anticipated the legal difficulty news organizations now face. Goldberg argued that "The vigorous criticism by press and citizens of the conduct of the government of the day will soon yield to silence if officials in control of government agencies, instead of answering criticisms, can resort to friendly juries to orestall criticism of their official conduct. He pointed out that public officials have ready access to the media to correct false information. He was not saying that the Constitution protects defamatory statements directed against the private conduct of a public official or private citizen.

Justice Hugo Black recognized that the

"active malice" standard represented a poor compromise, an elusive concept. concluded: "An unconditional right to say what one pleases about public affairs is what I consider to be the minimum guarantee of the First Amendment. I regret that the Court has stopped short of this holding indispensible to preserve our free press from destruction."

Education On A Shoestring


