# UAlbany Athletics

The University at Albany athletics program enjoyed one of its most successful seasons during the 2004-05 athletic year. The Great Danes were awarded the Stuart P. Haskell, Jr. Commissioner's Cup, which recognizes the strongest athletic program in America East Conference as determined by a scoring system which rewards a school for success both during the regular season and at championship competition in the conference's 22 sports.

UAlbany won America East championships in volleyball, men's lacrosse, men's outdoor track and field, and softball. In addition, the Great Danes were runners-up in men's indoor track and field, and women's golf. Men's soccer, volleyball, men's lacrosse and softball also won or shared conference regular-season titles.

In addition, men's lacrosse captured its third consecutive NCAA Tournament berth. Volleyball and softball became the first women's sports to qualify for NCAA post-season play at the Division I level. Meanwhile, Kurt Campbell became the first UAlbany football player to be selected in the NFL Draft when he went in the seventh round to the Green Bay Packers.

UAlbany sponsors 19 NCAA Division I intercollegiate athletic programs, with 18 teams competing in the America East Conference. Football, a Division I-AA program, has been an associate member of the Northeast Conference since 1999.

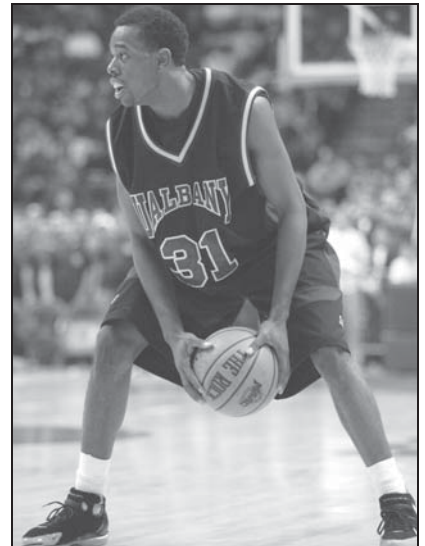

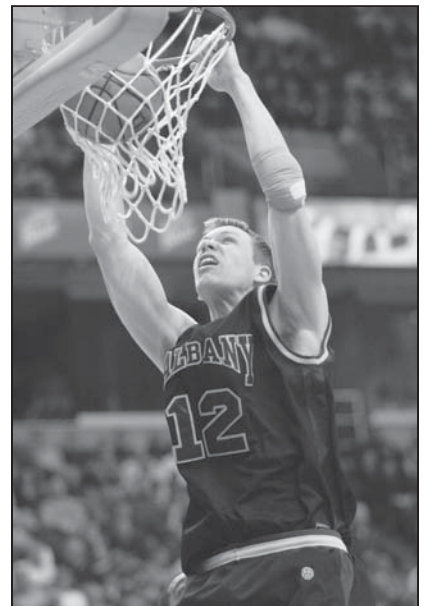

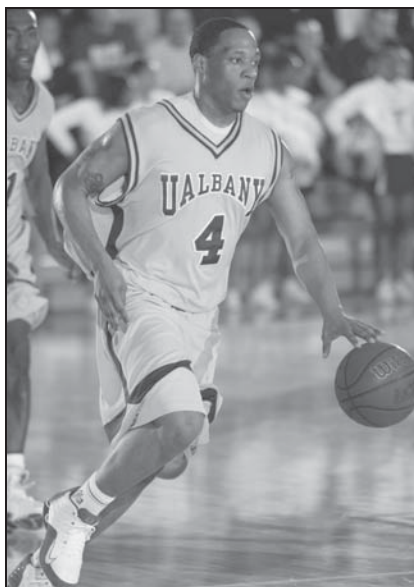

The University at Albany and its intercollegiate athletics program continues to move forward in the 21st century. UAlbany's athletic teams began competition at the National Collegiate Athletic Association's Division I level in September 1999. The upgrade elevated all men's and women's programs, and placed football in the NCAA's I-AA classification.

In January 2001, the University accepted an invitation to become a full member of the America East Conference. Eighteen of the school's nineteen varsity teams are eligible through America East play for conference championships and NCAA post-season competition. Football, a NCAA Division I-AA program, has been an associate member of the Northeast Conference since 1999.

In 2004-05, UAlbany was awarded the Stuart P. Haskell, Jr. Commissioner's Cup, which annually recognizes the strongest athletic program in the America East Conference based on success both during the regular season and at championship competition. UAlbany's point total was bolstered by America East titles in volleyball, men's lacrosse, men's outdoor track and field and softball. The Great Danes were also runners-up in men's indoor track and field and women's golf.

In addition, the UAlbany men's lacrosse program captured its third consecutive America East championship and secured an NCAA Tournament berth. Volleyball and softball became the first UA women's sports to qualify for NCAA post-season play at the Division I level. Meanwhile, Kurt Campbell became the first UAlbany football player to be selected in the NFL Draft when he went in the seventh round to the Green Bay Packers.

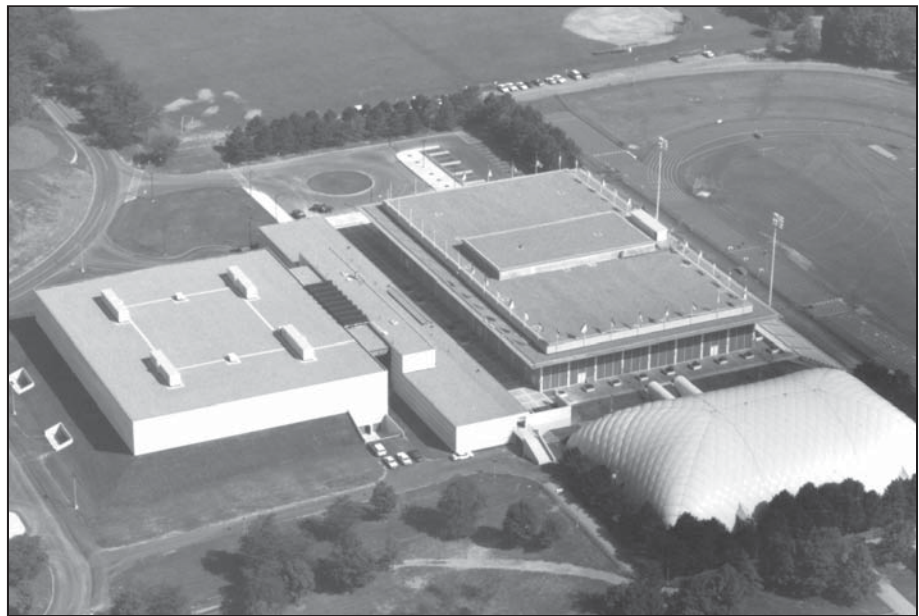
UAlbany has an athletic history that dates back to the late 1890s when the first known intercollegiate teams arrived on campus. Albany competed at the college division level prior to the NCAA's restructuring in 1972. The athletic program moved from Division III to Division II in 1995-96.

UAlbany's intercollegiate program has a new direction, but continues to excel in the athletic realm, producing competitive teams, successful coaches, and outstanding student-athletes recognized for their accomplishments both on the field and in the classroom. The University sponsors 19 varsity sports for men and women. Club sports, an intramural program, and recreational opportunities are also offered.

The quality of UAlbany's athletic program is evidenced by some of the finest facilities in the nation. The indoor and outdoor physical education design is among the most comprehensive in the Northeast.

In the spring of 1992, the University opened the Recreation and Convocation Center (RACC), an \$11 million state-of-the-art facility. The RACC is the home for Albany's men's and women's basketball teams, and has an .11 mile indoor track. The 5,000-seat arena also serves as a major venue for community events such as rock and pop concerts, sporting events and University activities. The playing surface on the arena's three basketball courts and the surrounding track were completely renovated during the December of 2004.

In addition, the RACC contains a fitness center with Nautilus and Universal machines, rowing ergometers and exercise

bikes; four racquetball/handball courts and four squash courts; athletic training and rehabilitation facilities with three whirlpool baths, a musculoskeletal evaluation device and other therapeutic machines.

Adjacent to the RACC is the Physical Education Building which houses University Gym; three full-size playing surfaces which can be used for basketball, volleyball, and tennis; four racquetball/handball courts; four squash courts; a swimming pool; a fitness and weight training center with Olympic weights; an aerobic exercise room, and a dance studio.

The RACC and Physical Education Building had air-conditioning installed in March 1996, as the state appropriated funds for renovations and permanent improvements to the University's facilities. The \$2.3 million in funding was prompted by the New York Giants decision to hold their football training camp on campus. The project brought together the region's community in what has proven to be a successful partnership.

In addition, The Bubble, UAlbany's air-supported structure, fitted with a brand-new covering with minor interior renovations in the spring of 2003, is located to the east of the Physical Education Building, and may be utilized for tennis, basketball, volleyball, and indoor football practice.

The indoor complex is complemented by fine outdoor facilities, including University Field, which seats capacity crowds of 10,000 for football games, and has an all-weather, 400-meter track surrounding a natural grass surface. There are 12 lighted tennis courts, four basketball and six volleyball courts; and numerous fields for football, soccer, softball, baseball, lacrosse, field hockey, and other events.

The practice fields on the Western Avenue side of campus were renovated in June 1996 with 263,000 square feet of two-inch thick athletic sod. The irrigation system was refurbished, and the area was surrounded with a 3,100-foot chain-link fence.

UAlbany broke ground on the site of what will become two all-weather athletic fields in May 2005. "John Fallon Field" will be home to the men's and women's lacrosse teams. An adjacent surface known as "Alumni Turf Field" will be for women's field hockey in addition to serving as a multi-use recreational field for UAlbany students. The first phase of construction, which will include lighting, landscaping and fencing, is expected to be completed during the fall of 2005.

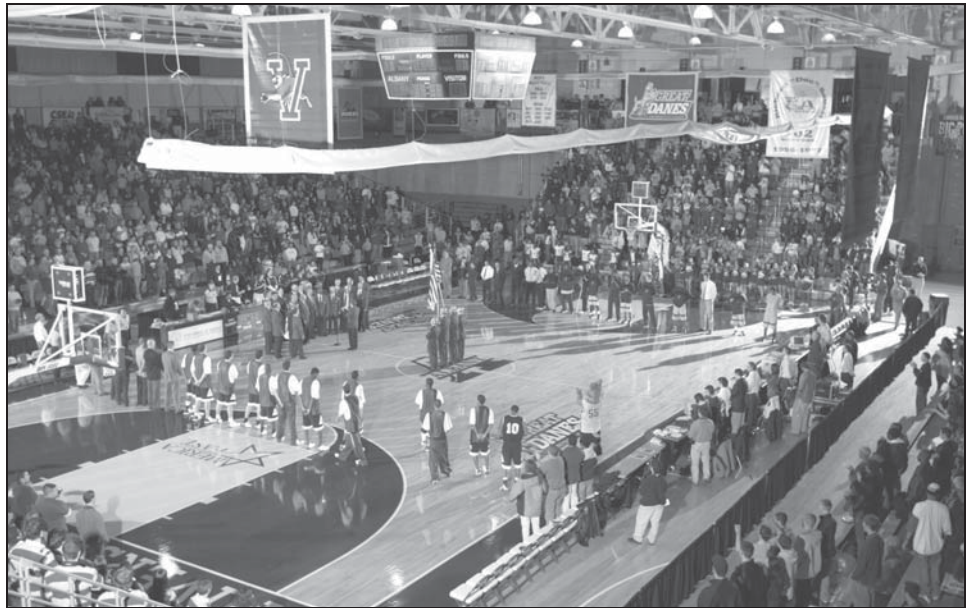

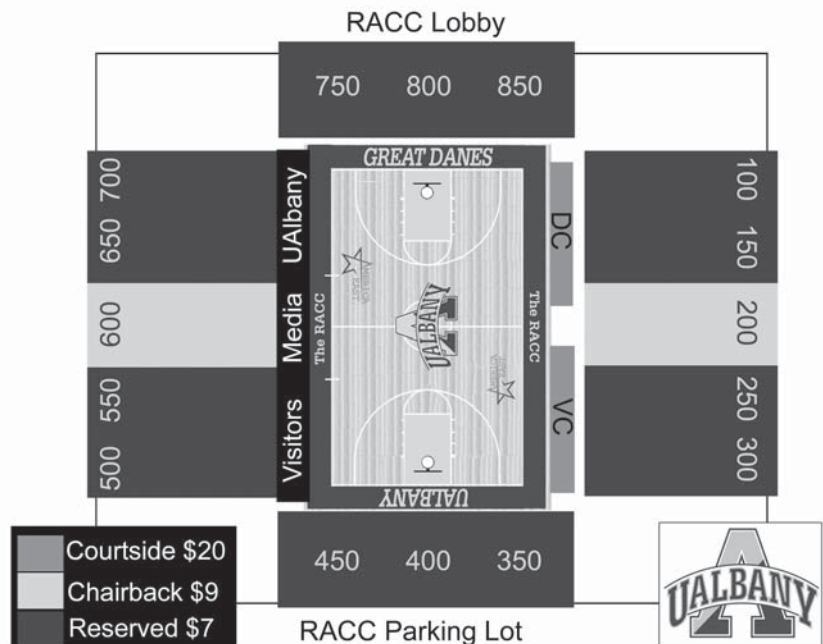

Will Brown begins his fifth season as the University at Albany's head men's basketball coach. In 2004-05, Brown led UAlbany to a 13-15 record, an eight-win improvement from the previous season. The Great Danes also posted their best-ever conference record with a 9-9 mark and a fourth-place finish.

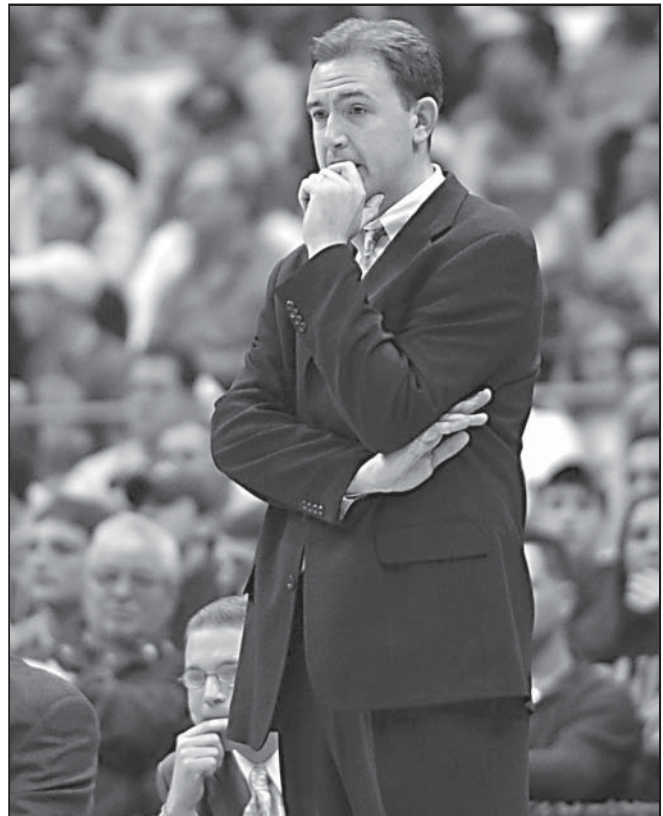
UAlbany also tied the fourth-best improvement among Division I teams which recorded single-digit victories in 2003-04, as only Texas A&M, San Diego and Houston were better. The Great Danes recorded six road wins, the highest total in the program's Division I history. In addition, Jamar Wilson and Lucious Jordan were selected to the America East All-Conference Team.

Brown was appointed as UAlbany's head coach on March 13, 2002, and has worked on the collegiate level since 1995. He became the 15th head coach in the history of the program. At age 34, Brown is one of the youngest Division I head coaches in the nation.

Brown, who joined the UAlbany staff as an assistant in September 2001, was promoted to interim head coach on Dec. 20 of that year, and guided the Great Danes to a 7-13 record over the last 20 games. Albany was among the conference leaders in scoring defense. He coached the team to several impressive victories, including a win over Vermont, the America East Conference's regular-season champion.

At the press conference to announce Brown as head coach Director of Athletics Lee McElroy made the following remarks. "Will Brown has proven over the last three months that he has the leadership skills and coaching expertise to manage a Division I program. He has high energy, commitment and integrity, plus values the student-athlete. I have been impressed with his professionalism and his ability to handle challenging circumstances."

Brown previously served as the head coach at Sullivan County Community College in Loch Sheldrake, N.Y. from 1998-2001. He led the Generals to a 90-10 record over a three-year period with two regional and two district titles. Sullivan County C.C. posted a 30-2 record and reached the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) championship



game in 2000-01. Brown's first SCCC squad appeared in the NJCAA "Final Four" and finished 32-3 overall. The Generals were ranked second nationally in scoring at 92.9 points per game, and ninth in team defense with a 67.1 average.

Brown was chosen the New York State Coaches Association junior college coach of the year in 1999. He also earned Mid-Hudson Conference coach of the year honors three times, and was District V's top coach twice. In addition, he worked at Sullivan County C.C. as an associate athletic director and as an adjunct professor of sports management.

Previous to his appointment at Sullivan County C.C., Brown spent three years at The College of Saint Rose as an assistant coach on Brian Beaury's staff. The Golden Knights made two NCAA Division II "Elite Eight" appearances in that span, and captured three New York Collegiate Athletic Conference (NYCAC) championships and two Northeast Regional crowns. St. Rose compiled an 88-13 record from 1995-98.

As a collegiate player, Brown was a two-time NYCAC all-star and three-year starter at Dowling College, an NCAA Division II program on Long Island. He is the only player in school history to combine for more than 1,000 points and 500 assists. Brown completed his career as Dowling's all-time leader in assists (591), three-point field goals (181) and free throw percentage (.859). He also played second singles on the school's tennis team.

A native of Miller Place, N.Y., Brown earned first-team Class B all-state recognition as a high school senior, when he averaged more than 35 points per game. He was chosen All-Long Island and was a three-time All-Suffolk County selection.

Coach Brown resides in Clifton Park with his wife, Jamie, and their three-year-old son, Jackson. Brown has a master's degree in management and a B.A. in marketing from Dowling College. His father, William, Jr., has served as director of athletics at Miller Place High School, where he previously was head basketball coach for 17 years. His teams won three Suffolk County League VII scholastic titles.







# WILL BROWN

## COACH BROWN TALKS ABOUT:

**America East Conference:** "The conference has changed dramatically due to heavy graduation losses at Vermont and Boston U. and Northeastern's departure. The opportunity is there for another program to make some noise. The race for the championship is wide open in terms of both the regular season and postseason tournament. There are three new coaches who will bring three new systems with regard to style.

"Boston U. is as good as always and well coached. Binghamton is mature and physical. Maine is talented on the perimeter. Hartford could be a wild card as Hofstra transfer Kenny Adelke is as talented as any player in the conference."

**Program's Invitation to Basketball Events:** "UAlbany's participation in both the Coaches vs. Cancer tournament and Bracket Buster Saturday is an example of how much the program has grown over the last four years. Coaches vs. Cancer is a nationally recognized tournament for a great cause. It is an honor to represent the America East in the Bracket Buster against one of the better mid-major teams. The possible television coverage is plus for our basketball program's exposure and recruiting, plus for our entire university and athletic department."

**Big Purple Growl:** "I am a big fan of the Big Purple Growl. It's a basketball homecoming for current students, alumni, and the Capital Region community. It's a basketball carnival with a great atmosphere that brings excitement to the game."

**His Coaching Philosophy:** "Offensively, I would like to push the basketball, put points on the scoreboard, plus get some points from our defense. We intend to go up and down the floor. We need to create easy baskets for ourselves, get second-chance points, get to the free throw line and put pressure on our opponents.

"I would like to guard man-to-man for forty minutes on defense and limit teams to one shot every time down the floor. We need to challenge shots on defense to be effective. It's one thing to be tough and talented, but knowing how to play is the key to success."

**What Brown Looks For in a Recruit:** "We want someone who is a good person and a good student. He needs to be talented, but also have a high basketball intelligence. It's important that he knows the game, wants to get better and wants to win. I believe too many coaches are caught up in the "great athlete" concept of recruiting.

"I would recruit anyone in the United States or world if I thought he was the right fit for our program and we could put all the pieces of the puzzle together. The University is a strong academic school, so the student-athlete must want that challenge and realize that the school can prepare him for the future.

"Finally, I think we have to recruit people who want to be part of something special, who want to win conference championships and get to the NAAs every year."

**What Albany Offers a Prospective Student-Athlete:** "The University provides an opportunity to obtain a meaningful education. You can meet all types of people and go to school in a diverse population.

"The University is located in a city with many colleges and universities, plus you have the best of both worlds with access to the capital of New York and a nice campus setting. We have great resources and outstanding facilities, and a university that is growing in terms of prestige and stature.

"What also appeals to me is that Lee McElroy, our athletic director, is committed to the success of the program. He is very driven and supportive, and we have the same goals."

## ASSISTANT COACHES



### **PAT FILIEN** **ASSISTANT COACH**

Pat Filien was named an assistant coach on June 9, 2005. He previously was a four-year assistant at the University of Vermont.

Filien had worked on Tom Brennan's UVM staff since July 2001, where he was responsible for recruiting, scouting and skill development. The Catamounts enjoyed unparalleled success during his years with the program. Vermont made three NCAA Tournament appearances, captured three America East Conference championships and posted four consecutive 20-win campaigns.

Coach Filien played a key role in the progress of three-time America East player of the year Taylor Copenrath, who led UVM to a 25-7 overall record in 2004-05 and an NCAA first-round upset of Syracuse.

A native of Queens, N.Y., Filien was a two-year starter at the College of Saint Rose, where he received a B.A. in public communication in 1993. He was named to the All-ECAC-South second team as a senior, when the Golden Knights posted a 25-6 record and reached the NCAA Division II Tournament.

Filien began his coaching career at Southern Vermont College, where he worked from 1994-96. He then moved to Lock Haven University in Pennsylvania for two years, before a three-year stint at C.W. Post-Long Island in Brookville, N.Y.

Filien, and his wife, Tiffani, have two children, Marcus and Lauren, and reside in the Capital Region.



### **CHAD O'DONNELL** **ASSISTANT COACH**

Chad O'Donnell is in his second year as a member of Will Brown's coaching staff. He was hired as an assistant on July 6, 2004. O'Donnell was recently the director of basketball operations at the College of Charleston.

O'Donnell, who has worked on the collegiate level since 1993, assisted Charleston coach Tom Herrion in the program's day-to-day operations in 2003-04. He was responsible for academic monitoring, directing conditioning and weightlifting, managing recruiting efforts and organizing summer camps. The Cougars finished with a 20-9 record.

Prior to Charleston, O'Donnell served in the same capacity for one season at Robert Morris University after spending two years in the private sector. He was also an assistant coach at the University of New Hampshire in 1999-2000, and worked for a three-year period at the College of the Holy Cross, a Patriot League member school. At Holy Cross, he directed all national recruiting efforts for the Crusaders and coached the junior varsity squad.

O'Donnell, 34, began his college coaching career as an assistant at Worcester State College in Massachusetts. From 1993-95, he handled the Division III program's recruiting, scouting and practice preparation, plus was the junior varsity head coach. He went to work at Bryant College in Rhode Island the following year.

A native of Mendon, Mass., O'Donnell received his B.S. in physical education from Springfield College in 1994. He has authored several articles in coaching magazines and published a book on college basketball recruiting.



### **ERIC EATON** **ASSISTANT COACH**

Eric Eaton is in his first season as an assistant coach. Eaton, who was appointed on June 9, 2005, was previously an assistant at the College of the Holy Cross for four years.

Eaton coached at Holy Cross from 2000-04 as a member of Ralph Willard's staff. He assisted in all aspects of the program, including recruiting, player development and scouting. The Crusaders won the Patriot League championship and reached the NCAA Tournament in three consecutive seasons. In 2000-01, Holy Cross achieved one of the greatest turnarounds in school history by posting a 22-8 record. The 2002-03 squad tied the program's standard for most wins in a season with a 26-5 record.

During that period, Eaton recruited the Patriot League's rookie of the year and assisted in the development of 15 players who earned all-league and/or all-rookie recognition, including three player-of-the-year award winners.

Previous to Holy Cross, Eaton was an assistant coach for one year at Assumption College in Worcester, Mass. He also worked at Anna Maria College from 1997-99 and was a volunteer assistant at UMass-Dartmouth when that program won 20 games and made an NCAA Division III Tournament appearance.

A member of the UMass-Dartmouth Athletic Hall of Fame, Eaton played on three Little East Conference championship teams that reached the NAAs in the mid-1990s. He averaged 11.7 points per game as a senior, when the Corsairs won the Little East regular-season title and advanced to the ECAC semifinals. He earned his undergraduate degree in business management.

Eaton, 32, is married to the former Alexis Leacu, who played as a collegian on the Assumption College basketball team.



### **JEREMY FRIEL** **BASKETBALL OPERATIONS**

Jeremy Friel was appointed to the position of director of basketball operations on August 4, 2005. He handles administrative duties, videotape exchange, travel and coordinates summer basketball camps.

Friel earned his undergraduate degree in sociology from the University of New Hampshire, where he was a member of the basketball team from 2002-05. He gained a roster spot as a walk-on before receiving a full athletic scholarship in his final season. Friel appeared in 31 career games for the Wildcats. **Paw Prints:** UAlbany defeated crosstown-rival Siena, 86-65, before nearly 9,000 fans at Pepsi Arena on Nov. 23, 2004. The Saints had won the previous three meetings since the series was revived following a 24-year absence. The two programs had played on 40 occasions from 1940-77.

Galuski came to the University as head equipment manager in August 2000. He took on additional duties the following year as New York Giants Training Camp liaison. He manages all operational aspects of the summer training camp.

Galuski, 32, was previously the head equipment manager with the Arena Football League's Carolina Cobras for one year. He also worked with the AFL's Albany Firebirds from 1995-99. **JAN BROWN, ASSOCIATE ATHLETICS DIRECTOR, STUDENT-ATHLETE ENRICHMENT**

Jan Brown was recently elevated to the position of associate athletics director for student-athlete enrichment. Brown, who joined the UAlbany athletic staff in the spring of 2005, will oversee academic support, enrichment, sports medicine, compliance and campus affairs. She also serves as the department's senior women's administrator.

Brown served as the NCAA's Director of Division II and Governance Liaison to the Executive Committee and as Assistant Chief of Staff for Division II for nearly six years prior to her present appointment. In that position, she provided counsel, advice and leadership to the main governing entities of Division II intercollegiate athletics, the NCAA President and other NCAA staff regarding current Division II issues and policies. Brown was also the on-site staff liaison for the 2001 Division II Women's Lacrosse Championship and three national outdoor track and field competitions.

From 1994-99, Brown worked for the NCAA as an enforcement representative. She investigated allegations of violations of NCAA legislation committed by member institutions and presented findings to the NCAA Committee on Infractions.

A native of Niskayuna, N.Y., Brown has coordinated and planned NCAA Title IX Seminars and NCAA Leadership Conferences. In addition, she has presented information at NCAA Regional Compliance Seminars with regard to athletics governance issues, membership requirements, convention proposals and student-athlete issues. She was a panelist at the 2004 National Association of Collegiate Women Athletic Administrators (NACWAA) HERS Institute and has been a presenter at several NACWAA Fall Forums.

Brown, 42, received both a B.A. in economics and an M.A. in urban and environmental policy from Tufts University in Massachusetts, where she competed in both track and field and soccer. She went on to earn a Juris Doctorate degree from the College of William & Mary's Marshall-Wythe School of Law in 1992. Brown is a member of the Pennsylvania State Bar Association and has worked in two law firms in the areas of environmental law, employment discrimination and family law.



**BRIAN DEPASQUALE ASST. ATHLETICS DIRECTOR, MEDIA RELATIONS**

Brian DePasquale was appointed as UAlbany's assistant athletics director for media relations in 1994. He is responsible for the publicity and promotion of the school's 19 men's and women's varsity sports, producing a television and radio package for football and basketball, managing the development of the athletic web site, and publicizing New York Giants football training camp.

Prior to joining the UAlbany administrative staff, DePasquale served as assistant sports information director at Colgate University (1988-94), sports information director at Drexel University (1985-88), and information director for the East Coast Conference (1983-85).

A native of Canton, Ohio, DePasquale has been on the media relations staff at NCAA men's basketball and men's lacrosse championships. He was a staff member at the 1996 Final Four at The Meadowlands in New Jersey and five lacrosse "Final Four" events.

DePasquale received a B.A. in journalism with a concentration in broadcasting and a master's degree in athletic administration from The Ohio State University.



**MATT ROCHE ACADEMIC SERVICES**

Matt Roche was installed as interim director of athletic academic support services in the fall of 2005. His department's mission is to maximize the academic potential of student-athletes by providing an atmosphere that enhances learning skills, career development and personal counseling.

Roche manages services that offer academic counseling, academic monitoring, learning and study strategies, tutoring and study sessions.

A native of Niskayuna, N.Y., Roche earned a B.A. in history with a minor in business from Ithaca College in 2004. He also was an exchange student at University College of Dublin in the 2003 fall semester. He presently is working on a M.A. in history at UAlbany.

Roche received three varsity letters in both indoor and outdoor track athlete and is Ithaca's recordholder in the 4x800 relay. He was a member of the UAlbany track team in 2005, when he placed fifth in the 800-meter run at the America East Conference championships.



**ROMAN DUBIEL COMPLIANCE ASSISTANT**

Roman Dubiel, a former UAlbany baseball player, is working as a graduate assistant in compliance. Dubiel is assisting Jan Brown with the school's NCAA compliance and rules education program. He monitors student-athlete eligibility, supervises recruitment of prospective athletes and enforces NCAA By-Laws pertaining to recruiting.

Dubiel graduated summa cum laude from UAlbany in May 2005 with a B.A. in urban studies and a minor in Spanish. He is currently pursuing a master's degree in urban and regional planning.

A native of Longueuil, Quebec, Dubiel won four varsity letters and made 60 career appearances as a pitcher for the Great Danes. UAlbany qualified for the 2004 America East Conference Tournament and established a school-record for single-season victories with a 37-14 campaign.

A Chancellor's Scholar-Athlete Award recipient, Dubiel received the school's Presidential Scholar-Athlete Award and was Phi Beta Kappa.



If the University at Albany basketball program can make the same strides as last year, the Great Danes will have an opportunity to make a run at their first-ever America East Conference championship.

UAlbany finished with a 13-15 record in 2004-05, an eight-win improvement from the previous season. The upgrade was even better in conference play where the program achieved its best-ever league mark with a 9-9 record and a fourth-place finish in the standings.

"We have an interesting combination of talent and depth," says UAlbany coach **Will Brown**, who begins his fifth season. "This is the deepest team that we have had since I've been here. We can play small and quick or big and strong. My biggest concern is right now we are good on paper."

The Great Danes return four starters, including two all-conference players, from a squad that made their home arena a more difficult place to play. They also recorded six road wins, the most in the school's Division I history. The roster is balanced in its make up with four seniors, four juniors, four sophomores and two freshmen.

"We have the talent and the mindset," Brown offers. "I have seen this program grow quickly, and now the goal is to win a championship and put ourselves in a position to earn an NCAA berth."

### UALBANY BY POSITIONS

**GUARDS:** UAlbany has an all-conference backcourt in **Jamar Wilson** and **Lucious Jordan**. Wilson, a 6-foot-1 junior, can score in transition and in a halfcourt situation with his ability to knife through the defense. Jordan made the most of his first season with the program after transferring from Loyola, Md. The senior's leadership and physical presence is also important on the defensive end of the floor.

"They complement each other well," Brown states. Jamar and Lucious put pressure on the defense because they are always in an attack mode and are difficult for teams to defend."

Wilson, who was coming off a fractured patella last year that forced him to miss the 2003-04 campaign, ranked fourth among the America East leaders in both scoring (16.9 ppg) and assists (4.2 pg). A second-team all-conference selection, Wilson starts the season with a 28-game, double-figure scoring streak.

"I think he will be even better," Brown says. "He had never run an offense as a point guard before last year. He has gotten familiar with the responsibilities of the position."

Jordan, a 6-foot-2 athlete, was among the America East's top scorers at 14.8 points per game. A second-team all-conference performer, he scored in double figures 24 times and canned three or more 3-point field goals on six occasions.

**Jon Iati**, a sharp-shooting sophomore, returns following a medical redshirt season to have shoulder surgery. Iati logged the most minutes of any Division I player in 2003-04 with 40-plus against 21 opponents. He was later voted the America East Rookie of the Year in that season.

"He stretches the defense and has unlimited range with a quick release," Brown states. "He makes the people around him better."

**Brian Lillis** (6'5") stuffed the stat sheet as one of the top players off the bench as a freshman. Lillis, who had surgery to repair a fracture in his right foot during the preseason, is expected to work at all three backcourt positions.

"He's the one guy who can make a difference without taking a shot," explains Brown, about a player who averaged 4.0 points, 2.4 rebounds and 1.3 steals last year.

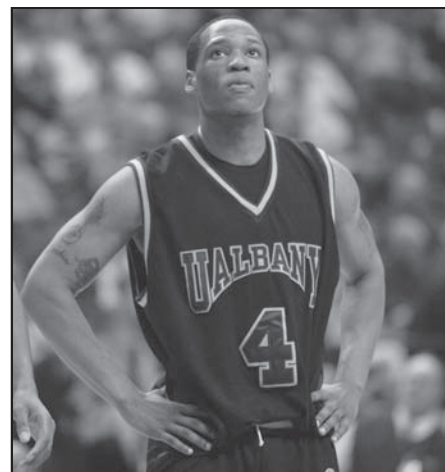
**Courtney Johnson** (6'1") is a dependable guard who has played in 49 games over the previous two seasons. Sophomore **David Bauman** (6'2") and junior college transfer **Jason Siggers** (6'4") are also available.

**FORWARDS:** The Great Danes' frontcourt features a multi-faceted player who has been a consistent force throughout his career. Senior **Levi Levine**, who has an inside game to match his outside skills, will be in the starting lineup for the fourth consecutive season.

Levine, a 6-foot-6 combo forward who has started 81 games as a collegian, averaged 10.4 points and 6.0 rebounds one year ago. He became the 26th player in school history to reach the 1,000-point plateau and is ranked among the career leaders in 3-pointers and steals.

"Levi is our fiercest competitor and is passionate about winning," Brown says. "He is a strong rebounder on the offensive and defensive glass with tremendous post-up capabilities."

**Brent Wilson**, a 6-foot-8 sopho-

more, was named to the 2005 America East All-Rookie Team, the third straight year a UAlbany player has been chosen to the unit. Wilson, who averaged 7.0 points and 4.2 rebounds, is another forward with an inside-outside style.

"He's as good a four-man as there is in this conference," Brown comments. "He has worked on his low post game and added a jump hook to go with his three-point shooting skills."

**Jerrad Knotts**, a 6'6" senior, has the experience of playing in more than 60 games as a collegian. **Brian Connelly** (6'8") and **Jimmie Covington** (6'7") were standout high school players in New Jersey and Illinois, respectively.

**CENTERS:** The Great Danes have a legitimate presence in the paint with 7-foot-1 German native **Kirsten Zoellner**, who averaged 6.6 points and 5.2 rebounds as a junior. Zoellner, the tallest player in the program's history, was dominant at times in his first season as a Boston College transfer.

"He takes up space and forces the offense into jump shots," Brown says. "Kirsten needs to be more confident in his ability and play with a mean streak."

**Kiel Graham** (6'9") can play at the four and five positions and is coming off an all-conference season at the junior college level. He has athleticism to go with rebounding and shot-blocking skills.

**OUTLOOK:** UAlbany became competitive in the America East last year and now looks to take the next step. "I think we realize we could have been even better last year," Brown explains. "We know the importance of a consistent 40 minutes with no lapses. Our team will defend, rebound and compete, but we must value the basketball and get a shot every time down the floor."

**AMERICA EAST:** UAlbany is in its fifth year as a member of the America East Conference. Eighteen of the school's 19 intercollegiate teams compete for conference championships and NCAA post-season play. The America East basketball membership includes UAlbany, Binghamton, Boston University, Hartford, Maine, UMBC, New Hampshire, Stony Brook and Vermont. UAlbany elevated its entire men's and women's athletics program to the Division I level in the 1999-2000 academic year.

**SCHEDULE HIGHLIGHTS:** UAlbany begins its America East schedule on Dec. 20 against Binghamton and concludes the season with the America East Conference Tournament on March 3-11. The Great Danes' non-conference schedule is highlighted by appearances in the 2K Sports College Hoops Classic benefiting Coaches vs. Cancer (Nov. 9-10) and ESPN Bracket Buster (Feb. 18), plus a trip to the West Coast, where UAlbany will face San Diego State (Nov. 26) and UCLA (Nov. 29). The annual meeting with Siena is slated for Saturday, Dec. 3 at Pepsi Arena. Other non-conference opponents include Cleveland State and three Ivy League foes in Harvard, Brown and Cornell.

**COACHES VS. CANCER:** The Great Danes will play in the 2K Sports College Hoops Classic at the Florida Regional on Nov. 9-10 in Gainesville. UAlbany meets Oakland, last year's NCAA play-in winner, in the first round. Florida, the 2005 Southeastern Conference Tournament champion, meets St. Peter's.

**BRACKET BUSTER:** UAlbany has been invited to participate in the ESPN Bracket Buster Saturday series on Feb. 18, 2006. The Great Danes are among 100 teams representing 18 conferences in the event. Pairing decisions for the 11 televised games on ESPN, ESPN2 and ESPNU will be announced on Jan. 29. The schedule for the remaining 39 contests will be known on Feb. 2.

**CROSTOWN RIVALRY:** UAlbany and Siena renewed their crosstown rivalry in 2001 at Pepsi Arena, a 15,500-seat downtown facility. The two schools had not met since 1976-77. The Saints, who compete in the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference, hold a 26-18 lead in a series that dates back to January 1940.

**NEW & IMPROVED:** The Great Danes finished with a 13-15 record in 2004-05, an eight-win improvement from the previous year. UAlbany also posted its best-ever league record with a 9-9 mark in America East Conference play and a fourth-place showing in the standings. Albany also recorded six road wins, the highest total in the program's Division I history.

**COACH BROWN:** Hired as one of the youngest head coaches in the nation, UAlbany's **Will Brown** was named to the position on March 13, 2002. Brown, 34, was the head coach at Sullivan County Community College in upstate New York for three years and an assistant at Division II College of St. Rose from 1995-98.

**ACROSS AMERICA:** The UAlbany roster is represented by eight states and Germany. Four players are from New York, while a pair are from Pennsylvania and Iowa. Albany has one player from California, Illinois, New Jersey, Texas and Wisconsin.

**ALL-LEAGUE BACKCOURT:** UAlbany's **Jamar Wilson** and **Lucious Jordan** were each selected to the 2005 All-America East Conference second team. Wilson, a 6-foot-1 junior, ranked fourth among the conference leaders in scoring (16.9 ppg) and assists (4.2 pg). Jordan, a 6'2" senior, was also among the league's top-10 scorers at 14.8 points per game.

**1,000-POINT SCORER:** Senior forward **Levi Levine** became the 26th player in school history to reach the 1,000-point plateau on Feb. 16, 2005. He averaged 10.4 points and 6.0 rebounds in his third season as a starter last year. A 6-foot-6 athlete, Levine has scored in double figures in 60 of 82 games as a collegian.

**THE RETURN OF IATI:** UAlbany guard **Jon Iati** returns to the lineup after having season-ending shoulder surgery in 2004-05. Iati, a 5-foot-9 sophomore, was the America East Rookie of the Year as a freshman when he scored at a 14.0 clip. He led the nation in total minutes played with 1,121 for a 40.0 average.

**THREE-PEAT:** Sophomore **Brent Wilson** was named to the 2005 America East All-Rookie Team, the third consecutive year a UAlbany player had been voted to the squad. Wilson, a 6'8" forward, averaged 7.0 points and 4.2 rebounds in his rookie campaign. He tallied a career-high 18 points and grabbed eight rebounds against Binghamton in the A-East quarterfinals.

**THE TALLEST:** UAlbany center **Kirsten Zoellner** is the tallest player in school history at 7-feet, 1-inch. Zoellner, a native of Hannover, Germany, transferred from Boston College. He averaged 6.6 points and 5.2 season in his first year as a Great Dane. His brother Klaas played as a collegian at Akron.

**IOWA CONNECTION:** Sophomore **Brian Lillis** partners with Brent Wilson as UAlbany's Iowa connection. He and Wilson played together on an AAU under-19 national championship team. Lillis can have an impact without taking a shot, as he contributed 4.0 points, 2.4 rebounds, 1.2 assists and 1.3 steals as a freshman. His sister was a three-time All-Big Ten performer.

**NEW GUYS:** UAlbany has four new faces on the roster, including junior college transfers **Kiel Graham** (6'9") and **Jason Siggers** (6'4"). Graham, a native of Milwaukee, comes from Feather River C.C. in California, where he earned first-team all-conference recognition. Siggers, who hails from Dallas, was a second-team all-region swingman at New Mexico J.C. **Brian Connelly** (6'8") and **Jimmie Covington** (6'7") were standout high school players in New Jersey and Illinois, respectively.

**NCAA STATS:** The Great Danes ranked among the NCAA leaders in three categories last year. UAlbany was 38th in three-point field goal percentage (.379), 64th in free throw percentage (.722) and 71st in scoring defense (64.9 ppg). Albany was among the top foul shooters for the third straight season.

**HOME FLOOR:** UAlbany's Recreation and Convocation Center opened in December 1992. The on-campus facility seats capacity crowds of 5,000. UAlbany has a combined 95-60 record in the arena. Last year, the Great Danes posted a 7-3 mark at home, the most wins at the RACC since 1999-2000. UAlbany averaged 2,040 fans in 10 home dates.

**WINNING RECORD:** UAlbany began varsity play in 1909-10 and has competed at the NAIA, NCAA College Division, NCAA Division III and NCAA Division II levels prior to 1999-2000. The Great Danes have a 997-737 record in 91 seasons.

**BIG PURPLE GROWL:** The ninth annual Big Purple Growl and Ferocious Feast is scheduled for Saturday, Feb. 4. UAlbany's Winter Homecoming will feature a men's and women's double-header against America East opponent Boston University. Last year's crowd of 4,091 was the largest in the event's history.

## What is a Great Dane?



The University at Albany adopted the nickname "Great Danes" in the spring of 1965. UAlbany's mascot was founded in a contest on campus for a \$25 savings bond. The judging committee made the choice noting, "The Great Dane is noted for its grandeur, its alertness, and its intelligence. It is an animal whose prowess and strength are easily recognizable and readily admired." Contest winner Kathy Earle explained the Great Dane was renowned for its "size, weight, strength, character, courage, speed, and stamina."

In the 1960s, UAlbany grew from a college for teachers to a top research university. The old school mascot, "Pierre the Pedguin," representing the Pedagogues, seemed inappropriate as the University's mascot and nickname.

**ESPN Bracket Buster 2006**

The University at Albany men's basketball team has been invited to participate in the ESPN Bracket Buster Saturday series on Feb. 18, 2006. The Great Danes are among 100 teams representing 18 conferences in the event. UAlbany is joined by defending America East Conference champion Vermont in the field.

Now in its fourth year, Bracket Buster Saturday is an ESPN television property that provides potential NCAA Tournament-caliber teams the opportunity to meet in a one-day, 50-game event. The format involves "wild-card" pairings for the pool of participating teams, with half of the Bracket Buster Saturday teams pre-designated as "home" and the remaining half as "road" teams.

In an effort to provide an even greater showcase for these programs, the event has expanded its pool of teams each year (18 in 2003, 46 in 2004 and 64 in 2005) to produce a better cross section of squads. The actual pairings take place three weeks in advance of the event, and those match-ups are determined on the basis of regular-season play.

A total of 11 games will be televised, including six games on ESPN or ESPN2, and five games on ESPNU -- ESPN's new collegiate network that was launched on March 4, 2005. ESPN, in consultation with the conference commissioners, will make pairing decisions for the 11 televised games on Sunday, Jan. 29. Pairing decisions for the remaining 39 contests will be announced on Thursday, Feb. 2.

"We are extremely excited to have two of our members be selected to this year's Bracket Buster pool," America East Commissioner Patrick Nero said. "Having the chance to get national exposure through ESPN's various networks is a tremendous opportunity for both Albany and Vermont as well as America East."

Another important component for Bracket Buster Saturday participants is future scheduling. Each team that participates in the event agrees to enter into a home-and-home series with its to-be-named opponent. The return game is made in November or December of the following season. This contest allows for completion of the two-game series contract and is not part of the Bracket Buster Saturday in that second year.

"UAlbany's participation in ESPN's Bracket Buster is an example of how much the basketball program has grown over the last four years," said UAlbany coach Will Brown, whose team finished with an eight-win improvement from the previous season. "We continue to gain national respect with this announcement. It's a tremendous honor for a young program."

This year's Bracket Buster Saturday pool features teams with 31 appearances in the last two NCAA Tournaments, including two Sweet Sixteen Squads -- Wisconsin-Milwaukee (2005) and Nevada (2004).

The 100-team field will feature 12 teams from the Mid-American Conference; 11 from the Ohio Valley Conference; 10 from the Missouri Valley and Metro Atlantic Athletic; nine from the Western Athletic Conference and Horizon League; eight

**Kermit L. Hall**  
*President*



Kermit L. Hall, a constitutional law scholar and legal historian, is president and professor of history at the University at Albany, State University of New York. He took office as the University's 17th president on Feb. 1, 2005.

Hall previously served as president and professor of history at Utah State University for four years. Before that, he was the provost and vice president for academic affairs and a professor of history at North Carolina State University for two years. From 1994-99, he served at The Ohio State University where he was executive dean and a professor of history and law of the College of Arts and Sciences from 1996-99, and dean of the College of Humanities from 1994-99. He has held other academic and administrative positions at the University of Tulsa, the University of Florida, Wayne State University and Vanderbilt University.

Hall is the author of five books on the American legal system, including *The Magic Mirror: Law in American History* (Oxford, 1989), and editor-in-chief of *The Oxford Companion to the Supreme Court of the United States* (2nd ed. revised, 2005), winner of the Gavel Award from the American Bar Association, and *The Oxford Guide to Supreme Court Decisions* (1999). Both books were main selections of the History Book Club. He also served as the editor-in-chief of *The Oxford Companion to American Law* (2002), which was named one of the top books for 2002 by Booklist.

He was one of five Americans appointed by President Bill Clinton and confirmed by the Senate to the Assassination Records Review Board in 1992 to review and release public documents related to the assassination of U.S. President John F. Kennedy. For his commitment to openness in government, the American Library Association bestowed its James Madison Award on him in 1999.

Actively engaged in higher education issues, Hall is currently a member of the boards of the American Council on Education, the National Association of State University and Land Grant Colleges, the International Student Exchange Program, the NCAA Presidential Task Force on the Future of Intercollegiate Athletics and the Research Foundation of the State University of New York. He was formerly a member of the board of the Research Triangle Institute, one of the nation's most successful private research enterprises.

Hall has held fellowships and grants from the National Endowment for the Humanities, the National Science Foundation, the American Council of Learned Societies, the American Bar Foundation, and the Fullbright Education Foundation.

At Utah State, the land grant university of Utah with 23,500 students and a \$600 million budget, Hall led efforts to improve freshman retention rates, attract better prepared undergraduates, and increase the number of doctoral students. He also implemented a program for students seeking nationally competitive scholarships, increase resources for graduate fellowships, and boost sponsored research. He attracted \$10 million for a new recital hall, the largest single gift in Utah State's history.

Hall received his Ph.D. in 1972 from the University of Minnesota. He earned his bachelor's degree from the University of Akron, a master's degree in 1967 from Syracuse University and a master of studies in law degree from Yale Law School in 1980. He is a graduate of two Harvard University professional

education programs: the Harvard Seminar for New Presidents in 2001 and the Harvard Institute for Educational Management in 1993.

Hall was born and raised in Akron, Ohio. The son of a tiremaker and a bookkeeper, he is a first-generation college graduate and a Vietnam-era veteran.

The SUNY Board of Trustees approved Hall's appointment unanimously on Dec. 29, 2004 at a meeting in New York City, capping a 10-month search.

Charlie Voelker came to the UAlbany athletic department in the summer of 2003, and was recently promoted to associate director of athletics for external affairs. He directs the department's marketing and corporate sales division, plus oversees

media relations and ticket operations.

Voelker previously worked for two minor league baseball organizations. He served as director of player personnel for the Berkshire Black Bears, and was vice president and general manager of the Albany-Colonie Diamond Dogs. He was named Northern League General Manager of the Year twice.



## DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



Dr. Lee A. McElroy, Jr., who has more than 30 years of experience in athletic and educational administration, is in his sixth year as the University at Albany's Vice President and Director of Athletics. McElroy, who provides leadership for UAlbany's NCAA Division I 19-sport intercollegiate athletics program for men and women and is a member of the University's Executive Committee, spearheaded a successful search for a broad-based athletic conference when the University accepted an invitation to join the America East Conference in January 2001. He also worked to renew the men's and women's basketball Capital Region rivalry with Siena College, led the development of a master plan to upgrade the University's athletic and recreational complex, and has energized the school's athletic development efforts.

McElroy was also a key figure as the University successfully completed the NCAA's second cycle of Division I athletics certification and as UAlbany captured the 2004-05 Commissioner's Cup. In addition, he helped the University hire an architectural firm in an effort to develop a plan to improve the school's athletic facilities, including the current construction of a multi-purpose outdoor artificial turf facility with lighting. He was honored with the 2004 General Robert R. Neyland Outstanding Athletic Director Award by the All-American Football Foundation.

McElroy was also a key figure as the University successfully completed the NCAA's second cycle of Division I athletics certification and as UAlbany captured the 2004-05 Commissioner's Cup. In addition, he helped the University hire an architectural firm in an effort to develop a plan to improve the school's athletic facilities, including the current construction of a multi-purpose outdoor artificial turf facility with lighting. He was honored with the 2004 General Robert R. Neyland Outstanding Athletic Director Award by the All-American Football Foundation.

McElroy, who played football at UCLA in the late 1960s, was previously American University's director of athletics for four years. American, a Division I school in Washington, D.C., competed in the Colonial Athletic Association. During McElroy's tenure, the AU athletic department upgraded to 19 sports, expanded corporate partners by 400 percent, and planned capital projects for a fitness facility, intramural field and soccer stadium. McElroy founded Eagle Club, the department's fundraising arm, and developed a program rated as one of the top ten in the nation in its compliance with NCAA gender equity requirements.

Dr. McElroy served as president of the America East Conference Executive Committee in 2003-04, plus has gained national prominence for his roles with numerous professional organizations and NCAA committees. He has served a three-year term on the Division I Management Council as one of four at-large representatives from I-AA or I-AAA conferences. McElroy is first vice president of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA). He previously served on four prestigious NCAA Committees: Athletics Certification, Financial Aid, Degree Completion Program, and the NCAA Special Committee on Agents and Amateurism.

In 1998, McElroy was named to the NACDA Executive Committee for the University Division, and chair of the Sears Directors Cup Committee. The Sears Directors Cup is the only national award and academic scholarship program to recognize all NCAA and NAIA championship sports for women and men.

From 1989-96, McElroy was the director of athletics at California State University-Sacramento. He led the program's transition from Division II to Division I and engineered a move to the Big Sky and Big West conferences. He also implemented a strategic plan that developed a corporate partners plan, created an effective fundraising and marketing program, redesigned academic support services, improved the athletic facilities complex, and provided for campus and community outreach programs.

McElroy also worked at the University of Houston from 1981 to 1988 as an assistant director of men's and women's sports and as an associate director of athletics, and for one year as the director of athletics at The University of the District of Columbia. Before joining the Houston staff, he taught in the public school systems of Santa Monica, California and Beaumont, Texas, and was a high school principal in Beaumont.

Along with his duties for the NCAA, McElroy has testified before congressional committees on issues in college athletics, such as gender equity, the welfare of the minority student-athlete, and the academic/athletic balance. McElroy serves on the boards of the National Consortium of Academics and Sports, *Athletic Business* magazine, and the National Minority Golf Association. He is also a fellow at the Institute of Ethics and Sportsmanship at the University of Rhode Island.

McElroy, who resides with his wife, Karen, in Slingerlands, earned his B.S. in political science and history from UCLA in 1970. He later received a M.Ed. from the University of Southern California, and an Ed.D. from the University of Houston.

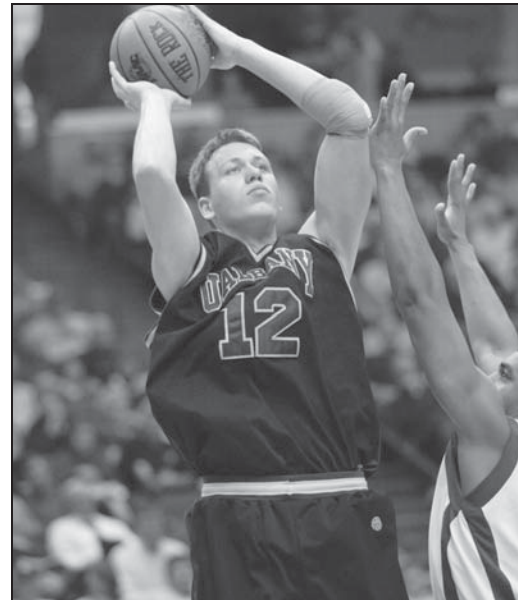

Since its modest beginning as a men's basketball-only conference in 1979, America East has evolved into one of the most comprehensive NCAA Division I conferences with a commitment to broad-based, competitive athletics programs, complementing the academic integrity and missions of the member institutions.

Each of the nine institutions - University at Albany, Binghamton University, Boston University, University of Hartford, University of Maine, University of Maryland, Baltimore County (UMBC), University of New Hampshire, Stony Brook University, and University of Vermont - offers a unique blend of academic and athletic tradition.

Progressive in its approach to its more than 3,500 student-athletes, America East recognizes champions in each of its 22 sports: men's and women's basketball, baseball, men's and women's cross country, field hockey, men's and women's golf, men's and women's indoor track and field, men's and women's lacrosse, men's and women's outdoor track and field, men's and women's soccer, softball, men's and women's swimming and diving, men's and women's tennis, and volleyball.

America East also conducts the nation's most comprehensive academic recognition program for student-athletes. Nearly 1,700 student-athletes with grade-point averages of 3.0 or better were honored in 2004-05 alone.

With a geographic footprint covering the Mid-Atlantic to Northeast regions of the United States, America East has a population base of more than 50 million people and nearly 30 million television homes. America East member institutions include more than 106,000 students on the nine campuses and boast nearly one million living alumni.

**Athletic Success...**

America East enters its 18th year of all-sports championship competition on the heels of one of the most successful seasons in history as five of its 10 team sport champions won at least one game in the NCAA Championship. Vermont advanced in the NCAA Men's Basketball Championship with a 60-57 overtime win over Syracuse in the first round. In addition, America East sent two teams to the National Invitation Tournament. Of the nation's 20 Division I-AA and I-AAA conferences, only five placed as many as three men's basketball teams in the postseason. For only the second time in conference history, America East advanced five men's and women's basketball teams combined to the postseason.

Boston University earned the highest national seeding for an America East team when



it entered the NCAA Women's Lacrosse Championship as the No. 3 seed. The Terriers also enjoyed a successful men's soccer season, advancing to the second round. It marked the fourth-straight year the America East men's soccer champion had won at least one game in the NCAA Championship. America East baseball champion Maine advanced to the NCAA Regional for the 14th time in school history, defeating Southern Mississippi while falling a game short of the championship round. The America East field hockey champion advanced to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Championship for the second time in three years.

In addition, America East sent 42 student-athletes to the NCAA East Outdoor Track and Field Regional and saw two student-athletes compete at the both the NCAA Indoor Track and Field and Outdoor Track and Field Championships.

**Academic Success...**

America East institutions boasted six Academic All-Americans in 2004-05 while another 37 were named All-District.

The conference also honored a top-scholar athlete in each of its 22 championship sports. Repeat winners from 2003-04 included Andy Allstadt of the Albany men's cross country and track and field teams, Kim Corbitt of the Maine women's basketball team, Jill Friedman of the Albany women's golf team, Adam Grossman of the UMBC men's track and field teams, David Hehn of the Vermont men's basketball team, and Aaron Izaryk of the Maine baseball team. First-time winners were: Caitlin Hayes (women's cross country) of New Hampshire, Lauren Vendetti (field hockey) of Boston University, Jeff Wolniewicz (men's golf) of Binghamton, Marisa Ryan (women's indoor track and field), of Boston University, Kevin Rae (men's lacrosse) of Albany, Katie Leland (women's lacrosse) of New Hampshire, Erin Hatch (women's outdoor track and field) of Maine, Stephan Hall (men's soccer) of Albany, Amy Cochran (women's soccer) of Vermont, Jamie Haas (softball) of Boston University, Hui-Jue Cai (women's swimming and diving) of Binghamton, Robert Kaczynski (men's swimming and diving) of Binghamton, Dan Hanegby (men's tennis) of Binghamton, Aimee Charest (women's tennis) of Boston University, and Susan Spierre (volleyball) of Albany.

Nearly 1,700 of America East's 3,500 student-athletes were named to the Academic Honor Roll after receiving grade-point averages of 3.0 or better.



Included in that total were 753 student-athletes who earned a 3.5 or better.

Vermont, whose student-athletes maintained a 3.14 grade-point average, won the 2004-05 America East Academic Cup, presented to the institution whose student-athletes post the highest grade-point averages during that academic year. It was the highest grade-point average in the 10-year history of the award, breaking the mark of 3.12 set by Maine during the 2003-04 academic year. Maine (3.12), Hartford (3.08) and New Hampshire (3.04) were other institutions to compile grade-point averages of 3.00 or better in 2004-05.

### Commissioner's Cup...

Albany was awarded the 2004-05 Stuart P. Haskell, Jr. Commissioner's Cup, which annually recognizes the strongest athletic program in America East as determined by a scoring system which rewards success both during the regular season and at championship competition. The Great Danes unseated three-time defending champion Boston University to win their first Commissioner's Cup. Albany's point total was bolstered by championships in volleyball, men's lacrosse, men's outdoor track and field, and softball. In addition, the Great Danes were runners-up in men's indoor track and field, and women's golf. The men's soccer, volleyball, men's lacrosse, and softball teams either won or shared the regular-season titles.

### America East in the Pros...

Several America East athletes have extended their playing careers beyond the collegiate level. Former two-time America East Players of the Year Craig Claxton of the New Orleans Hornets, and Malik Rose of the New York Knicks, helped lead the San Antonio Spurs to a World Championship in 2003. Former Hartford star Vin Baker of the Houston Rockets, continued the legacy of the late Reggie Lewis, when he was selected as an NBA All-Star. In addition, three-time America East Player of the Year Taylor Coppenrath and T.J. Sorrentine, each of whom graduated from Vermont in 2005, recently signed summer contracts with the Boston Celtics and Milwaukee Bucks, respectively.

America East has also been well-represented in the WNBA as current Hartford head coach Jennifer Rizzotti and former America East Players of the Year Cindy Blodgett (Maine), Jamie Cassidy (Maine) and Katasha Artis have played in the top women's professional league.

Former Hartford star Jeff Bagwell of the Houston Astros became the 35th player in Major League history to hit 400 home runs when he homered in a game on July 20, 2003. Joe Nathan, who played at Stony Brook and is now a top reliever for the Minnesota Twins, was selected to the Major League All-Star game in both 2004 and 2005. Former America East Players of the Year Mark Sweeney (Maine) of the San Diego Padres and Kevin Mench of the Texas Rangers, are joined by former all-conference player Carlos Pena of the Detroit Tigers, on 2005 Major League rosters. Jay Witasick of the San Diego Padres, who played at UMBC, is in his 10th season in the majors. Several other former America East players, including 11 draft choices from 2004-05, are presently in the minor leagues.

Hartford's Jerry Kelly, who won two PGA Tour events in 2002, joined the tour in 1996 after turning professional in 1989. Kelly, who has earned more than \$2 million in each of the last three seasons, is joined by former Hawk golfers Tim Petrovic and Patrick Sheehan on the PGA Tour.

America East also has a number of former men's and women's soccer and men's lacrosse players in various professional leagues, including former Boston University standout Andrew Dorman, who is in his second season with the New England Revolution of the MLS.

### History...

To see how far America East has progressed, consider the conference was established in 1979 as the ECAC North. The conference at that time consisted of 10 institutions and sponsored league competition only in men's basketball, with the champion receiving an automatic bid to the NCAA Championship.

Men's basketball remained the lone league sport until the 1988-89 academic year. At that time, the conference's Board of Directors made a new commitment to an all-sports association, creating the North Atlantic Conference by establishing an office, hiring a full-time commissioner, and embarking on a building program.

The North Atlantic Conference merged with the Seaboard Conference (the league in which Boston University, Hartford, Maine, New Hampshire, and Vermont, among others, competed in women's basketball) in 1989 and the NAC looked to establish conference championships in several men's and women's sports.

The conference changed its name to America East prior to the 1996-97 academic year and moved the conference headquarters to its present location in downtown Boston in 1997.

In 2005, America East hired Patrick Nero, most recently the Director of Athletics at Maine, as the conference's third commissioner.

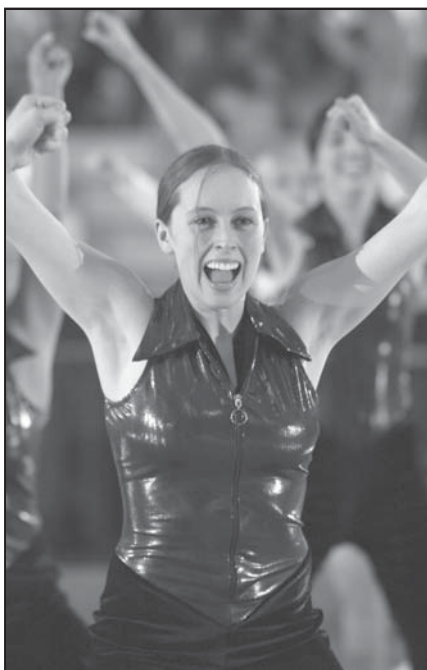

# ALBANY

## NEW YORK'S CAPITAL

Albany, the state capital of New York, offers something for everyone, and is the center of a region remarkable for its natural and cultural resources.

The Capital District area represents the cities of Albany, Schenectady and Troy, and has a population of approximately 875,000. Within a short distance are the Berkshires, the Catskills and the Adirondacks, the largest wilderness area east of the Mississippi River.

Major ski areas such as Killington, Gore, Hunter, Bromley, Stratton and Mt. Snow are within easy commuting distance. Saratoga Springs, 25 miles to the north, is internationally known as a sports, concert, and cultural center, and features outstanding thoroughbred and harness racing at Saratoga Race Track.

Geographically, the city of Albany is only 150 miles from New York City, 175 miles from Boston, and 225 miles from Montreal in Canada. The New York State Thruway and two major interstate highways intersect one mile from the main campus. Bus, rail, and air terminals are all within ten minutes of the University.

Designated an All-America City by the National Civic League in 1991, Albany is dominated by the Nelson A. Rockefeller Empire State Plaza, a billion-dollar complex. It includes government buildings, a convention center, the state museum, and the state library.

Directly across from the Plaza stands the State Capitol Building. This majestic five-story structure, in

existence since 1879, houses the governor's offices and the chambers of the State Senate and Assembly.

The Plaza has spurred the renovation of a large portion of historic downtown Albany. You will enjoy exploring the cosmopolitan area of old townhouses, boutiques and restaurants, or attending major sports, entertainment or cultural events in Pepsi Arena, the host site to the 2001 NCAA Division I Ice Hockey Frozen Four, 2002 NCAA Division I Wrestling Championships, and 2003 NCAA Division I Men's Basketball East Regional.

This \$65.4 million arena seats approximately 17,500 with a 1,700-car parking facility. Pepsi Arena hosts nearly 200 events a year including professional basketball and hockey games, arena football, rock concerts, trade shows, conventions, and is the former site for the University's spring commencement.

The city of Albany has experienced unprecedented progress and development during the past ten years. Over \$1 billion in economic development projects have been implemented. The historic link between downtown Albany and the Hudson River was restored with the opening of the Hudson River Way Pedestrian Bridge and the construction of a multi-purpose amphitheatre at the Corning Park. The restoration of the historic Palace Theatre now provides a venue that complements the Pepsi Arena as a host to world class entertainers and cultural events.

Four major malls and shopping centers, including Crossgates, Stuyvesant Plaza and Colonie Center, fall within one mile of campus. Nightlife in Albany is lively with concerts, movies, theatre, dancing, and just about every kind of restaurant or eatery you can imagine. Most attractions or activities are a short walk or accessible through the local bus system.

The latest rankings of graduate programs by *U.S. News and World Report* place ten programs in the top 25 in the nation.

Undergraduates choose from 54 majors in the arts and sciences, business and accounting, public policy, criminal justice, information science, pre-law and pre-health; approximately 30 percent of undergraduates participate in research with faculty. Innovative degree programs with an international focus and more than 300 study-abroad programs prepare students for the global economy. Extensive internship opportunities offer real-world experience in New York's capital and the surrounding region.

Both the UAlbany campus and the region are bustling with extracurricular opportunities. Students participate in more than 150 student clubs, honor societies, and other campus-related groups, and choose from a busy calendar of campus events, including spirited Division I athletic competition in 19 sports and a rich array of cultural activities.

The University is just a short drive from spectacular natural and recreational centers in New York, Massachusetts, and Vermont. With 13 colleges in the Capital Region, it's easy to see why Albany is also a "great college town."
