**Description:** Added two upper division required courses. ALCS 300 is an interdisciplinary course required by all majors to ensure a holistic understanding and interdisciplinary nature of studying Latin American, Caribbean, and US Latino cultures and peoples. A Senior Seminar is now also required for students in this major to ensure students have experience with significant research and writing in the discipline. Many lower division courses were removed from the requirements but are still elective options within the major. An increase to elective requirements is to ensure students have options to choose courses along their interests.
