a letter from Prof. Jewell dated August 7th 1868
tending his resignation as Professor of the English
Language & Literature was read, which was ac-
cepted & the Secretary was directed to ~~express~~ ^{express} to Prof.
Jewell the high estimate which the committee
have of the ability & faithfulness with which he
has discharged the duties of his professorship
& to convey to him their best wishes for his
success in the new field of labor on which he
has entered.

The Secretary read a letter from Prof. Jewell
stating that "he had for some years been gradually
collecting a library of religious books by purchase
and solicited donations for the use of the Normal
school pupils to the number of 189 volumes;
that the books had been extensively used for sabbath
reading by the pupils & is of unquestioned utility."
Prof. J. says "it has always been my design to
make this library own to the school in case I
should at any time leave. That time has now
come, and in accordance with that design
I hereby transfer all my right in it to the school".
The library was accepted and the Secretary was
directed to present to Prof. J. the thanks of the committee.

It was also directed that in view of the purchases which he had made of a part of the library, that the Premium be directed to pursuant to Prof. Jewell fifty dollars.

The President, Dr. Alden stated that he had apportioned the instruction of the classes in English literature and had arranged for the teaching of English Grammar by the present teacher, which might avoid the necessity of the professorship made vacant by the resignation of Prof. Jewell at half for the present term, provided an assistant teacher be employed in the primary department. This arrangement was agreed to and Miss Elizabeth J. Gibbons a graduate of the 48th term was appointed such assistant at a salary of one hundred dollars for the term.

The President also presented a paper in which his views on this subject were embodied. After some consideration the subject was postponed for future consideration.

The Committee then adjourned.
