For '62 Action

ALBANY, Sept. 11 - The basic legislative program of the Civil Service Employees Association has been hammered out in a series of resolutions approved to date by the Resolutions Committee of the Employees Assn.

Henry Shemin, committee chairman, reported that the salary resolution is still in the formative stage and will be announced at a later date. In the meantime, 79 resolutions have been approved and it is expected that the list will be added to during the CCSEA delegates meeting here next

The approved resolutions con- time credit accumulated. tain programs on salary and work benefits for political subdivisions, pay and retirement benefits on the State level, general pension improvements and fringe benefits.

Resolutions disapproved or referred for further study also are reported. Starting wth the Number 2 resolution, here is the list to date:

- 2. Time and a half pay for overtime of state employees.
- 3. Adjust pay scales per hour for laborers and mechanics to rates established by Labor Department.
- 4. Require salary plans in all public achool systems.
- 5. Require salary plans in political subdivisions.
- 6. Withhold State aid for salaries of County Welfare Department employees where not equal to State salaries.
- 7. 10 percent premium pay for night shift work for State employees
- 8. State pay at end of fiscal year at time and a half rates for over-

ALBANY, Sept. 11- State laborers who feel their classification or reallocation under the administrative reclassification program was in error, have until October 1 to apply for a review and change, Thomas Coyle, of the Civil Service Employees Assn. sal- have not been able to find any ary research staff, informed The Leader.

Director of Classification and while responding to emergency Compensation prior to October 1, will be effective retroactive to May 1, 1961. Successful appeals filed after October 1 will take effeet on the date of final decision.

Appeals may be made directly to the director of Classification and Compensation or through the employee's own department.

Under the reclassification program, gained through the efforts of the Employees Assn., the state examined approximately 4,000 laborer positions in determining new salary grades and titles.

About 3.200 of the positions remained laborer, Grade 4. Nearly 700 positions were placed in other titles such as maintenance man, truck drive, equipment operator and mail and supply helper, with salaries ranging from Grade 1 through Grade 11.

CSEA Resolutions Suffolk CSEA Jolted Lay Groundwork By 'Double Standard' **Action of County Board**

(From Leader Correspondent)

RIVERHEAD, Sept. 11 - The leaders of the Suffolk County chapter of the Civil Service Employees Association were voicing some unpleasant second thoughts this week about the County's recently adopted salary and reclassification plan.

CSEA officials, who at first were generous in their praise for the new program, which increases wages for 2,500 county workers by \$378,000, were this week demanding "equal rights and treratment" for all county employees. The Suffolk pay raise was the first since 1956.

The CSEA leaders were joited by two developments after the holes which left about 200 county adoption of the Suffolk salary program, in which raises ran from five to eight percent of cur-

The second development was the granting to the 685-man County police force of a 10 per cent salary boost costing \$368,000.

Both occurrences caused Eugene Gregory, president of the Suffolk chapter, to appeal this week to the Board of Supervisors for relief which would grant at least a \$200 a year pay boost to workers other than police.

In an open letter to the Board. Gregory said: "On August 14 we expressed our gratitude to you for the adoption of the new salary and classification plan. Our thanks were sincere, stemming from our acceptance of statements

Progress Report

ON SEPTEMBER 22, a committee consisting of Ed O'Leary of Elmira, Charles Lamb of Sing Sing Prison and this writer will meet in Albany to put the final O.K. to the Correction Officers appeal for the R-13 grade. The appeal will then go to the office of Commissioner McGinnis, who has assured us of his full support.

THE COMMISSIONER WILL personally appear before the Reclassification Board and fight for this up-grading. From the boss's office the appeal will go to J. Earl Kelly the Director of Reclassification and a hearing will be held sometime in October we hope. At this time I would like to correct a mistaken belief upon the part of some Correction Officers. The legislature has nothing to do with this hearing or appeal. It is possible to get an upgrading to the R-13 grade and then on April 1, 1962 receive a general pay raise which might be granted all state workers.

ALL THE LATEST figures available for New York City and Pederal Correction Aides are now incorporated in this appeal. The main reason for the delay up until now was a desire to bolster our case by waiting for the Mayor's announcement in N. Y. City that City C. O.'s were going on a 40 hour week with no pay loss.

A comparison of the N. Y. City and State pay for Correction officers is shown.

THE CITY ALSO provides one meal a day for its officers, which at a minimum figure of 40 cents a meal adds up to an additional \$100 a year. Add to this a cash uniform allowance of \$95 each year and we can figure the total N. Y. City pay as \$7,003. yearly. The sum of \$139 yearly in cash is also paid to N. Y. City men for 8 paid holidays. This, sum is omitted for comparison purposes because of holiday time off allowed to State Correction Officers.

J. EARL KELLY in a previous decision denying a request for upward reallocation stated that it was not his job to see that N. Y. State employees were paid the highest of all governmental jurisdictions but rather somewhere near the top. In other words, some happy medium. This appeal is such a medium. Maximum pay of the R-13 grade is \$6500, which is still \$500 behind the N. Y. City

MY PERSONAL OPINION is that never before were our chances better for being reallocated to a higher grade. The Civil Service Employees Association and Correction Conference have done a swell job in putting this appeal together. Our Commissioner is supporting us in every possible way. Letters of support are coming in from State Legislatures and Lt. Gov. Wilson wishes us well. At the hearing we will be represented by the full staff of the C.S.E.A., plus the Correction Conference Officers. This is it, we are on the way.

SALARY OUTLOOK FOR 1962: The McKinsey report recommended 60 million dollars to bring State worker in line with private employment. The Administration at the 1961 session implemented this report two third of the way; leaving state workers according to this report still some 20 million dollars behind private industry. Since this study was made factory wages have risen 3%. The cost of living has also increased nearly 2% leaving state workers about 10% behind at this time.

Prediction: The delegates at the October meeting will vote for a general pay raise between 10 and 15%.

Manager Development Programs For All Depts. Ordered By Rockefeller

ALBANY, Sept. 11 - Governor Rockefeller has written all state department and agency heads to request the immediate establishment of management development programs.

Attaching great importance to the training and development of state employees in management jobs, Mr. Rockefeller told state agencies he would like to have a "progress report" from each agency by Sept. 1, 1962 on how their programs were being conducted.

The Governor's letter referred to programs al sady underway in soem state agencies, which provide for selected employees to be rotated in various jobs to give them wider experience.

Letter directs Goals

The letter amounted to a policy directive. Its full text follows:

In a large and complex administrative organization such as our state government, the need for a management development program is clear. The President of the Civil Service Commission will have the responsibility for coordinating the various departmental management development programs. The Director of Management Development in the Department of Civil Service will be available for consultation with and to assist departments in the establishment, conduct and evaluation of their programs.

State University To Be Used It also is contemplated that the State University, through its new Graduate School of Public Affairs, and other institutions of learning throughout the state will be able to provide additional professional assistance in the furtherance of the overall management development program.

On or before Seeptember 1, 1962, I am asking each department head to submit a progress report on these programs in his department to me through the President of the Civil Service Commission. These reports should include a description of both the long-range departmental program together with a statement of initial steps taken and plans for the immediate future.

One Millionth Federal Aide Selects Blue Cross

The world's largest group of persons protecting themselves against the cost of hospital and medical care and sharing a common employer, the United States Government, marked the enrollment last week of their onemillionth member in special ceremonies in the Senate dining room. He is John R. Norpel, personnel investigator for the State as the millionth subscriber selecting Blue Cross and Blue Shield protection under the Federal Employees Health Benefits Plan.

About two and one-half million federal employees, including 179,-734 in New York State, are eligible for hospital and medical benefits under a Congressional act passed in 1959 providing for the government to pay part of the cost for protection and leaving the choice of carrier to the individual employee from thirty-eight approved insurance and prepayment organizations

Attending the luncheon honoring Norpel were his wife and two daughters, also covered under his enrollment, State and Congressional leaders, and officials of Among the speakers were Senator Olin D. Johnston (D-S.C.) chairman of the Senate's Post Office and Civil Service Committee, Senator Hiram Fong (R Hawaii), Walter J. Mc Nerney, president of the Blue Cross Association, and Dr. William Howard, president of the National Asociation of Blue Shield Plans.

Mr. Mc Nerney and Dr. Howard praised the Federal Employee Health Benefits program. 





Social Security

Below are questions in Social Security problems sent in by our expert in the field. Anyone with a question on Social Security should write it out and send it to the Social Security Editor, Civil Service Leader, 97 Duane St., New York 7. N. Y.

In 1951 I had a small shoe repair business which I turned over employee. They withheld social security from my wages for three years, then found out that a father employed b yhis children is not covered by social security. for benefits?

Beginning January 1961, work that a parent does for a son or daughter in a trade or business is covered by social security. Since you write that you are still working for your sons, you will now be earning social security credits.

How long will I have to continue working for my sons before I can get benefits?

Based on your age of 75, you need six quarters of coverage altogether, or about 18 months of work. Better check with your local social security office, however, to find out whether you already have some quarters from early days that you don't now re-

I will be 60 years old March 10. with 25 years of service as a male came under social security in 1956 reduced to 20. and will have 21 quarters of coverage at the end of March 1961. I do not expect to work again. Will I be entitled to bene-

Civil Service LAW & YOU

Attendance Rules—Resignations (?)

ONE OF THE State rules provides: "When an employee is absent without leave and without an explanation therefor for a period of ten work days, such absence shall be deemed to constitute a resignation." (Rule 37 (4), Rules for the Classified Service).

That Rule is "tough." I do not say than an employee should be absent without leave and without an explanation for ten days or more. However, if he is absent for ten days and does not give an explanation, it should not mean an automatic resignation. Tenure is too valuable to be disposed of automatically in any case. There should always be time for hearing the employee's side and time for consideration.

THE CIVIL SERVICE Law, Section 75, requires a hearing on notice before an employee may be removed. Can the Civil Service Commission nullify that law by calling a set of facts a "resignation," which really is not a resignation? I never knew the answer to the question. I got it the easy way-in the mail.

The Answer

A FEW DAYS ago I received a letter from Filley, Decatur and Finnan, Esquires, Troy attorneys, which read, in part, as follows:

"Arthur J. Dunn v. Secretary of State Dear Mr. Herzstein:

We read with interest your column "Civil Service Law & You" in the Civil Service Leader. The above Article 78 proceeding for re-instatement of a civil service employee was recently decided by Supreme Court Justice, Louis G. Bruhn of our judicial district. Photocopy of his decision is enclosed herewith."

THE DECISION WAS the first on the automatic resignation provision in Rule 37. It fully answered the question I asked above.

THE EMPLOYEE WAS a Senior Clerk, Corporation Search, in the office of the Secretary of State, a position in the competitive class of the civil service. He claimed that on September 19, 1960, he became ill and was placed under the care of a physician until November 22, 1960. There was some question as to whether he 'called in" and explained his absence.

ON NOVEMBER 23, 1960, the employee reported for work but was not permitted to return. He demanded a hearing but it was refused. No charges were ever served on him. He brought the proceeding for reinstatement.

Court's Action

IN THE COURT proceeding, the Secretary of State contended that under Rule 37 the employee's actions constituted a resignation. and that therefore she did not have to serve charges on the employee or give him a hearing under the Civil Service Law. Judge Bruhn seemed impatient with that argument. He wrote, as follows:

"While it may be argued that this case involves a 'resignation' rather than a 'removal' such argument is one of semantics because the net effect, as far as this petitioner is concerned, has been to foreclose him from his former position in spite of his desire to return."

"This result without a hearing to establish whether the absence was unauthorized or whether timely notice had been given is inconsistent with the spirit and intent of Section 75."


