Tax Investigation

Far-reaching steps for investigation leading to a future compulsory student tax were recommended to the student body when the student Board of Finance unanimously accepted a resolution to toplicary score. After making the resolution public, the Board of Finance reported that to date 711 students have paid the \$10.00 tax, six have made half payments, and several have made definite arrangements to fulfill their financial obligations to the board before the end of the year. This represents a fifty-eight per cent collection on a budget calling for \$12,292,00

In 1929-30 and in 1931-32, the student tax was \$14,00. The budget was (Continued on page 3, column 1)

ent in 1932-33 to \$13.00 and remained at the same level for last year. This year's budget, requiring a ten dollar tax, shows reductions in almost all of the organiza-tions. These amounts were based upon the assumption that there would be a 100 per cent collection. However, since there was no improvement in collections, there was no improvement in collections, these budgets were cut forty per cent, which necessitated curtailments in the year's programs. The activities which suffered include: music association, State College News, Ecuto, Dramatics and Art association, Lion, Myskania, basketball, baseball, tennis, ireshman handbook, Girls' Athletic association, debate remail. council, and infirmary find. The board further reported that the percentage of payment of taxes is greatest in the fresh-

The following recommendation is proposed to the student association by the student Board of Finance:

forty per cent of the student body have failed to co-operate in the present plan of voluntary student tax payments, And

WHEREAS, the failure of this percentage of the student body to assume this obligation defeats a democratic system of student selfgovernment and seriously curtails all student activities, And

WHEREAS, the benefits that accrue from the united support of the student body are to be desired,

WHEREAS, a similar situa-tion has existed for the past four years with no noticeable evidences of improvement although reductions in the amount of the tax have been effected each year,

BE IT RESOLVED: That this student Board of Finance re-commend to the Student Association that an investigation be made immediately to ascertain the pro-cedures by which a compulsory payment of student tax may be effected.
