Art Department, had the good fortune to secure nine oils and eight watercolors of Richard Crist, a nationally known abstract painter. Mr. Crist is currently employed as a draftsman with IBM, Kingston, New York. Abstractions

When you visit the gallery, one of the first questions that comes to mind is the reason for the great dissimilarity between his earlier watercolors of plant life and his canvasses. If the viewer will keep in mind the fact that these are abstractions, or paintings that have no recognizable objects in them, and have no association with nature, he will then be able to appreciate and understand the artist's attempts more fully. Number One

For example, if you were to study


the painting just to your left as you enter the door you would find that while the forms hint at indefinite amorphic qualities, they actually have a definite arrangement, consisting of larger geometric shapes which the artist has softened through an overlapping of shapes.

Contrast

He gives contrast through the juxtapo ition of his color masses and the nuances of color that he hints at. The central portion of this canvas, by far the strongest, is broken down into smaller, sub-dom inant areas through the use of vague negative lines and the reechoing of colors found in other portions to the canvas.

This intensity falls away as your eye approaches the edge of the canvas, assuring this central dominance. Crist breaks up the surface of the canvas by building up large portions of paint, possibly to reduce the eye tension that might occur otherwise. You don't believe it?? . . . Alright
