The Superintendent submitted to the consideration of the Committee the subject of increasing the charge for tuition in the Experimental Department. After full discussion of the subject

in consideration of the increased expenditures  
for the department, and that rates of tuition  
for corresponding studies in the Academies  
of the city very considerably exceed those  
in this school, it was resolved that from  
the commencement of the term in Feb<sup>r</sup>  
next, the charge for tuition in the Experimental  
department of the Normal School  
shall be Twenty five dollars a year, and  
that the Principal be directed to give due  
notice of this increase to the parents of  
pupils.

The following letter was sent,  
To the Executive Committee

of the State Normal School.

A year's absence from the Normal School has  
failed to induce the health newspaper to resume  
teaching in the school; I must therefore entirely  
resign my place in it.

and that he has not means at his command for paying the salaries of the teachers one month of which will be due on the 16th inst. Mr. Townsend submitted the following:

Whereas from the failure of the Legislature to pass the Annual Appropriation bill at its last session, the Treasury of the ~~School~~ <sup>Institution</sup> has become exhausted, and there remains no other mode of supporting the school until the usual appropriations are made, than borrowing the money required, on the individual responsibility of the members of the Executive Committee, it is hereby Resolved that the Treasurer be authorized to borrow in the manner proposed, a sum not exceeding three thousand dollars, and that the said loan be paid out of the first moneys appropriated by the legislature.

This resolution, after due consideration, was unanimously adopted.
