

April 17 Deadline for Changes

Article 27, "Amendments to the Constitution," specifies that the Constitution can be amended only at the first members' meeting (special call) in the months of February, May, August and November of each year. Inasmuch as there have been no copies of the Constitution printed in a long time and there are none available for use by the representatives of the organization, the Executive Board and officers are asking that the membership study the document as it now stands and to submit any proposals for amendments to a member of the Constitution Committee on or before April 17, so that any action desired by a majority of the membership may be taken at the May meeting. The Constitution specifically states that "Copies of any motion, framed to amend the Constitution shall be in the hands of the Constitution Committee twenty-eight (28) days before the specified membership meeting." The document will then be printed in booklet form.

Realizing that the old craft form of trade union organization is unable to defend effectively the interests and improve the conditions of the wage earners, WE, THE ELECTRICAL, RADIO AND MA-CHINE WORKERS form an organization which unites all workers in our industry on an industrial basis, and rank and file control, regardless of craft, age, sex, nationality, race, creed or political beliefs, or affiliations to any lawful organization, and pursue at all times a policy of aggressive struggle to improve our conditions.

We pledge ourselves to labor unitedly for the principles herein set forth, to perpetuate our union and work concertedly with other labor organizations to bring about a higher standard of living of the workers. CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I

Name and Affiliation SECTION A-

Local 301 shall be affiliated with the UNITED ELECTRICAL RADIO & MACHINE WORKERS OF AMERICA. ARTICLE II

SECTION A-

It shall be the object of this local union to protect, maintain, and advance the interests of the workers; to organize the unorganized in conformity with its jurisdiction and promote the advancement of such

> ARTICLE III Government of the Union

SECTION A--

The government of all committees, assemblies and boards of Union shall be vested in the members of the Union, to which all matters of general importance shall be referred and whose decision is final. Any matter may be reconsidered by the members should a two-thirds vote in favor so decide, at a special-called meeting. (A special called meeting is one that has been advertised in the two local newspapers or by placards on the bulletin board in the Schenectady GE plant, at least seven days before the date specified for the meeting, except in a case of labor trouble, designating the purpose for which it is called. Regular business may be transacted as a special-called meeting.) The General Meeting of Shop Representatives may authorize a special-called meeting; or, in case of an emergency, by the Executive Board. ARTICLE IV

SECTION A-The officers of this organization shall be: President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Assistant Recording Secretary, Treasurer, Chief Shop Steward and Business Agent. There shall also be three trustees, a Sergeant-at-Arms and a Guide.

SECTION B-All officers shall be elected for one year (January 1st to December 31st). All officers, unless otherwise provided for in this constitution, shall be elected by secret ballot. All candidates for office must be members of the local in good standing for at least one year.

ARTICLE V Duties of the President

SECTION A-The President shall preside at all General Membership meetings of the Union; enforce order, the Constitution, the Rules and By-Laws of the Union. He shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for; declare all members suspended who shall be reported in arrears by the Executive Board, subject to the approval of the membership. He shall preside at all special meetings called under the auspices of the Union, and shall have the right to east a vote only in case of a tic. Where not otherwise provided for, he will be governed by Robert's "Rules of Order."

ARTICLE VI

Duties of the Vice-President SECTION A-

HE Vice-President shall assist the President in the discharge of his duties, and in the absence of the President, shall preside and perform the duties of the President, in which case a Vice-President pro tem may be chosen.

ARTICLE VII

Duties of the Recording Secretary

The Recording Secretary shall keep a fair and impartial record of the proceedings of all meetings, regular or special, which shall be kept in the office of the Union, under his control, in a place so designated for the purpose. He or she shall be furnished with books by the Union. ARTICLE VIII

Duties of the Assistant Recording Secretary

The Assistant Recording Secretary shall assist the Recording Secretary in the discharge of his duties, and by mutual agreement between the President and the Recording Secretary and himself, may

> ARTICLE IX Duties of the Treasure

SECTION A-

The Treasurer shall be co-signer of all checks. He shall receive the bank statement each month and make record of the same. The bank balance should conform with the Business Agent's monthly report. He should report either concurrence or non-concurrence. He shall be bonded by the Executive Board,

ARTICLE X

Duties of the Business Agent

The duties of the Business Agent shall be outlined from time

time by the Executive Roard to whose orders he shall be subject. He shall receive copies of all grievances taken up by the Shop Representatives and shall keep a complete record of the same. He shall prepare all grievances that have not been settled by the shop representatives and present same to Executive Board for disposition. He shall furnish all supplies pertaining to the local union; be in charge of all office help; report monthly to the local union, giving an account of all receipts and expenditures; furnish a monthly report to the national office; turn over all money to the treasurer within five business days of the receipt of the same; give bond which shall be satisfactory to the local Executive Board, this bond shall be paid for by the local union and must cover the amount entrusted to his care; and perform such other duties, with the approval of the local Executive Board, as may be necessary to the proper and effective administration of the financial affairs of the Union. He shall sign checks jointly with the Treasurer and keep a constant check on the status of the membership.

The Assistants to the Business Agent shall be selected by the Executive Board subject to the approval of the Membership, that is, if and when the amount of work of the Business Agent increases to warrant additional help. The selection of such assistant business agents shall be on the basis of their ability and experience to qualify for the job.

> ARTICLE XI Duties of the Chief Shop Steward

The Chief Shop Steward shall preside over all General Meetings of Shop Representatives. He shall be ex-officio member of all special committees formed by that body. In the event of the absence of the Chief Steward from a regular General Meeting of Shop Representatives, a temporary chairman shall be elected from the floor to preside standing in a particular group by secret ballot conducted under the

> ARTICLE XII Duties of Trustees

The duties of the Trustees shall be to audit all books and records of the local Union at least once every three months, or by order of the local Executive Board. They shall take inventory at least once a year and safeguard all properties of the Union.

They shall receive a record of all dues stamps from the Business Agent monthly. This record shall be the record submitted to the national office by the Business Agent.

A report shall be made to the membership at least quarterly on the findings of each unit.

The Trustees shall also retain the services of a Certified Public Accountant to audit the financial accounts of the Union, together with a committee of three (not officers or committeemen), elected at large from the membership. This audit shall be taken once a year, prior to the election of officers, a complete report made to the membership, and turned over to the incoming officers. This audit may also be taken upon request of the General Meeting of Shop Representatives affairs. ARTICLE XVI

Shop Representative

A Shop Representative may be elected by the members in good supervision of the Executive Board. Elections should take place an-

The Executive Board may authorize an election upon receiving a petition of ten names from a group of members in good standing. SECTION A-The Executive Board may make temporary appointments if such actions are deemed advisable.

Shop Representatives should strictly adhere to the duties as outlined in the Representatives' Manual. They may appoint collectors for whom they shall be responsible. SECTION C-

4. Prices for sub-rentals and rules affecting members of the House Committee shall be outlined by the House Committee.

There shall be a regular grievance committee consisting of not more than four Executive Board members including the Business Agent. The Business Agent shall appoint one of the committee to take notes and another shall be picked by the Board according to the nature of the grievance, etc. However, the Executive Board shall determine the number on the committee in times of emergency.

ARTICLE XXIX Rules for Union Delegates

SECTION A-

Should any delegate be appointed or elected by any board, assembly or committee of the Union to be a member of, or confer with any other body, not controlled by the Constitution of this Union, he or they will be subject at all times to the Constitution of the Union. Any delegate holding such office shall be at all times subject to the control of the Membership; or subject to the control of the body which appoints or elects them, subject to the approval of the Membership.
