

### STATE CONFERENCE ON ASIAN STUDIES AT ALBANY UNIVERSITY

An estimated 200 people are expected to attend the annual meeting of the New York State conference on Asian Studies here, beginning Friday afternoon, Oct. 8, at The University at Albany. DeWitt Ellinwood, professor of history at the university, is chairperson of the program committee.

The comprehensive program of lectures, panel discussions, films, and concerts will continue through Sunday, Oct. 10.

Also serving on the program committee is Theodore Wright, professor of political science.

Subjects will encompass many facets of the Asian experience.

An indication is revealed in a sampling of program titles: "Effects of Recent Hindu Movements on American Life," "Perspectives on Asian Art History," "United States Policy toward the Philippines," "The Uses of Asian Literature in Other Disciplines," "The Impact of Government on New York's World Trade," "The Himalayan Region's Future," "Women in Asia," and "Varieties of Chinese Military Experience."

Bruce Long, Cornell University, is chairperson of the conference's executive committee. Other members are Romesh Diwan, Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute; Tau Kang, SUNY - Buffalo; Savak Katrak, SUNY - Oneonta; Richard Rosen, Utica College; and Professor Ellinwood.

### SCULPTURE AND PHOTOGRAPHY AT ALBANY UNIVERSITY ART GALLERY

Two exhibitions, one of sculpture and the other of unusual photography, will open Sunday, Oct. 3, at The University at Albany Art Gallery, continuing through Sunday, Nov. 7.

John Ferro, of Stone Ridge, will show a large selection of his steel sculptures together with some recent small bronzes and a portfolio of drawings. The current exhibition of work by the State University College at New Paltz assistant professor of sculpture is his largest to date.

The large steel works come out of constructivism and are described as being "full of energy, exciting visually, and impecablly made." The small bronzes are a recent development, made by joining sheets of wax with a soldering iron and casting them by the lostwax process. The drawings give glimpses of the artist's mind at work.

Melanie Walker, who teaches photography at The University at Albany, has organized the invitational exhibition of eight artists from across the country which she calls "Light Manipulation." It contains 40 examples of "new" kinds of photographs which will be of particular interest to area camera artists, both amateur and professional.

The artists are John Divola, John Wood, Judith Golden, James Henkel, John Craig, Tricia Sample, Jo Ann Callis, and Melanie Walker. They come from all sections of the United States, providing a fair sample of progressive work today.

With a group of distinguished scholars from throughout the nation participating, a three-day symposium on linguistic approaches to the poetry of Edna St. Vincent Millay will be held at The University at Albany beginning Friday, Oct. 8. Sessions of the conference, sponsored by the university's Linguistics Program, will be held in the Alumni House and in Humanities 354. There also will be a dinner meeting in the Patroon Room and a visit, on Sunday, to "Steepletop", the Millay home in Austerlitz.

The symposium will be unique among those of its type in its concentration on the work of one writer. Participants will include Archibald Hill, University of Texas; Irene Fairley, Northeastern University; Martha Chatterjee, New York; Bonniejean Christensen, University of North Dakota; Suzanne Downs, Boston; Walter Minot, Gannon College; John Patton, Atlantic Community College; Jane Stanbrough, University of Colorado; Philip West, Skidmore College; and Donald Freeman, University of Massachusetts.

12,000 persons have been on campus for the tri-faceted celebration in recent years.

Homecoming begins Friday evening with "The Way We Were" nostalgia night at the Alumni House, beginning at 7:30. An old-fashioned jukebox will play golden oldies for dancing and there will be refreshments, old movies, and cartoons.

Saturday will be the busiest day of the fall on campus, with most of the events centering around the C-U Day open house. Visitors and returning alumni will have a myriad of activities from which to choose, beginning at 10 a.m. and continuing—for most events—until 5 p.m.

Several activities will center around the football game between Albany and Cortland, which will begin at 1:30 p.m. The Homecoming parade.will start an hour before kick-off, while at halftime there will be a special ceremony on the field in honor of Merlin Hathaway, who retired from the Physical Education Department this fall after 34 years of service as professor, chairman of the department, and director of athletics. Of the 600 books submitted both by commercial and university publishers from the United States and Canada, the 50 best books bring prestige to the printers, typographers, and suppliers as well as to the publishers.

# NATURAL HISTORY LECTURE SERIES OPENS OCT. 26 AT THE UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY

Neil Frank, director of the National Hurricane Center in Miami, Fla., will be the speaker at the opening lecture of the natural history series at The University at Albany on Tuesday, Oct. 26. He will address his remarks to the question, "Are We Building Toward a Hurricane Diaster in the United States?"

The free public lectures, sponsored by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation and the university's Atmospheric Sciences Research Center, are held every other Tuesday at 8 p.m. in Lecture Center 18 on the university's main campus.

Mr. Frank, who will discuss the possibility of increased hurricane activity in the nation, points out that there are nearly 37 million people who live in the coastal zone from Texas to Maine who are susceptible to hurricane damage. Of that number 28 million never have experienced a true hurricane other than possibly the fringe effects of one.

Other lectures scheduled in the fall series are "Studying Wildlife and Endangered Species by Radio and Satellite", Frank Craighead, senior research associate with the ASRC, Nov. 4; "Solar Energy--Promise and Pitfalls", Dan Lufkin, solar energy consultant, Nov. 9; "Alaska--Wild Lands for Tomorrow", Richard C. Rhindress, Northeastern Representative of the National Audubon Society, Nov. 23; and "Voyage to the Bottom of the Sea", Paul J. Fox, assistant professor, department of geology, The University at Albany, Dec. 7.

### 500 EDUCATORS TO DISCUSS BILINGUAL EDUCATION

More than 500 educators are expected to attend "Languages in Education", a convention concerned with second language teaching and learning and with bilingual education scheduled for Oct. 22-24 at the Albany Hyatt House and chaired by Richard Light, of the teaching-English-as-a-second-language and the bilingual education programs at The University at Albany. The sixth annual conference is being sponsored by the New York State English to Speakers of Other Languages and Bilingual Educators Association.

Major speakers will include Migdalia Romero de Ortiz, Hunter College, "English for the Bilingual Student: A New Challenge to an Old Dilemma", Friday, Oct. 22, 8 p.m.; Ewald Nyquist, New York State Commissioner of Education, "Bilingual Education and the Teaching of ESL in New York State", Saturday, Oct. 23, 9 a.m.; William Labov, University of Pennsylvania, "What is the Competence of a Bilingual Child?", Saturday, Oct. 23, 2 p.m.; and Christina Bratt Paulston, University of Pittsburgh and president, TESOL Organization, "On TESL and Bilingual Education", Sunday, Oct. 24, 11:15 a.m.

Among special activities will be a visit to the Adult Learning Center, Albany; a workshop on legislative process and lobbying at the State Capitol; walking tour of the State Capitol and Empire State Plaza; and workshop on evaluating bilingual education programs.

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### KODAK GRANT TO UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY NOTES FIVE-YEAR EMPLOYEE

The University at Albany has received \$1,000 in a direct grant through Eastman Kodak Company's 1976 Educational Aid Program.

Responding to the contributions made by college and university graduates to the company's business success, direct grants of \$750 to privately-supported schools and \$250 to publicly-supported institutions, are awarded for each undergraduate or graduate year completed by those who graduate and join Kodak within five years of their graduation. The grants are made during the graduate's fifth year of employment.

Kodak's grant to The University at Albany is on bahalf of James G. Vande Velde who received a Bachelor of Science in mathematics from the university in 1969. He is employed by the Kodak Park division.

Recipient schools are requested to distribute grant dollars to the departments indicated by a person's degree. Individual departments are asked to use the money for innovative programs or for undergraduate scholarships rather than operating expenses.



## UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY'S VOLUNTEER AMBULANCE SERVICE TO NOTE WEEK PROCLAIMED BY GOVERNOR CAREY

Five Quad Volunteer Ambulance Service, Inc., a student organization at The University at Albany, will conduct a series of informational displays daily next week at noontime in the lobby of the university's Campus Center in conjunction with the statewide observance of Volunteer Ambulance Week, Sunday, Oct. 24, through Saturday, Oct. 30, as proclaimed by Governor Hugh L. Carey. It is one of only five student-operated volunteer ambulance services in New York State.

Governor Carey, in his proclamation, praised the 28,000 men and women volunteers serving in approximately 900 volunteer ambulance and first aid units as "a vital benefit to the lives of all New Yorkers." He stated that they save "hundreds, perhaps thousands, of lives every year," adding, "It is fitting we honor them and give due recognition to the life-saving role they play in our communities."

The Five Quad Volunteer Ambulance Service was established at the university three years ago by Barry Bashkoff, then a

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Albany city area or within a five-mile radius of its base and who are not served by other volunteer ambulance services.

All the student volunteers are trained extensively. Most are certified New York State Emergency Medical Technicians.

Besides providing for outside training by the American Red Cross, the Five Quad weekly gives in-service training for each of the positions its members hold on the team.

Although the Quad's major responsibility is to provide ambulance services to the university community, it does render other services such as on-the-spot coverage for concerts and athletic events. Realizing that ambulance service personnel rarely are first at the scene of an accident or emergency, Five Quad provides opportunities for anyone wishing to attend classes in first aid, emergency medical techniques, and cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR). Consequently, the possibliity of immediate and appropriate assistance rendered until the ambulance service volunteers arrive is increased. As a result of the educational effort, more than 600 persons have been trained in first aid. Looking to the future, Five Quad hopes to extend its classes to groups in the Albany area.

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## CRIMINAL JUSTICE PROFESSOR AT UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY NAMED NATIONAL COMMISSION DIRECTOR

Lawrence W. Sherman, assistant professor at the School of Criminal Justice, The University at Albany, has been appointed executive director of a commission formed by the Police Foundation to examine the purpose and future of higher education for police officers. The foundation is a private, non-profit independent institution dedicated to supporting innovation and improvement in policing.

Dr. Sherman said, "The most pressing concern of the Commission is one that applies to all of higher education today: How do we open the University to more kinds of people and still maintain a high level of quality in both instruction and scholar-ship?". He added that those interested in expressing their views on higher education for police may write to him at the School of Criminal Justice,

Warren Bennis, president of the University of Cincinnati, is chairman of the National Advisory Commission on Higher Education for Police Officers. He indicated that a major objective of the commission is to consider the quality and content of current programs for the police, what police officers should be learning, and the relationship between higher education and improving police organizations.

A distinguished group of educators, citizens, and public officials has agreed to service on the commission. They include Mayor Tom Bradley of Los Angeles; Lee P. Brown, director of justice services of Multnomah County, Ore.; Chief of Police Hugo J. Masini of Hartford, Conn.; Dean Norval Morris, University of Chicago Law School; Robert M. O'Neil, vice president, Indiana University for the Bloomington Campus; and Charles B. Saunders, director of governmental relations, American Council on Education.

The commission at its first meeting in Washington, D.C. decided to seek as wide a participation as possible from all those concerned with the education of the police. Chairman Bennis said the commission planned to sponsor a series of reports on aspects of education for the police and eventually would issue a body of recommendations.

Dr. Sherman served as associate-in-research, Department of Sociology, Yale University, and co-project director of "Controlling Police Corruption" before joining the faculty of The University at Albany. Earlier he was program research analyst for the New York City Police Department in planning, inspections, and internal affairs, and projects director for the Office of the Police Commission in New York. He holds an undergraduate degree from Denison University and graduate degrees from the University of Chicago and from Yale University where he received his doctorate. He also has a Diploma in Criminology from Cambridge University.

The Police Foundation was established in 1970 with a \$30-million commitment from the Ford Foundation.

#### COLOR FILM ON TRACKING WILDLIFE TO BE SHOWN AT UNIVERSITY NOV. 4

"Tracking Wildlife by Satellite", a 70-minute color movie, produced by Frank Craighead, senior research associate with the Atmospheric Sciences Research Center, The University at Albany, and his brother, John Craighead, associated with the Montana Cooperative Wildlife Research Unit at the University of Montana, will be shown at a special program for the public without charge in the current natural history lecture series at the university. It is scheduled for Thursday, Nov. 4, at 8 p.m. in Lecture Center 18 on the main campus and sponsored by ASRC and the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation.

The film was shown recently in Constitution Hall in Washington, D.C., as one of the National Geographic Society's Bicentennial Lectures. After covering earlier tracking work with the black bear and elk, the motion picture features the use of satellites for tracking large animals. Radio-tracking of birds also is shown.

The habitat mapping of grizzly bear range in the Scape-goat Wilderness Area, using the Earth Resources Satellite multi-spectral imagery, is another highlight of the program. Also included are sequences of rafting the Snake River in winter and footage of polar bears in James Bay.

An illustrated weather briefing by Raymond Falconer,

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#### POLITICAL SCIENCE SPECIAL SPRING SEMINAR SLATED AT UNIVERSITY

The Graduate School of Public Affairs at The University at Albany will offer a special seminar in political science, "The Public Intelligence: Political Theory at the Nexus of Knowledge and Power," during the spring session. Instructors will be Professors John G. Gunnell and Charles D. Tarlton.

The course (POS 603), to be held Thursdays from 7:45 p.m. to 10:15 p.m. in Humanities 20, will offer a comprehensive inquiry into the historical and contemporary dialogue regarding the relationship between thought and action in the realm of public affairs. Particular attention will be devoted to a critical examination of current assumptions and arguments about the role and responsibility of social and natural scientists as well as other scholars in the formulation and implementation of public policy.

An invitation is extended to interested participants from all disciplines. Weekly seminar discussions will be based on an extensive, but selective, bibliography. Those taking the course for credit will be required to submit a written project.

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
