IT IS UE FOUR TO ONE, PLANT SURVEY SHOWS

The victory of GE workers over the CIO gang which came to Schenectady from many cities to disrupt our negotiations and split our ranks will be overwhelming and complete on Friday.

Every sign points to a UE landslide on September 14. This climax to an election whose outcome was never in doubt would enormously strengthen the bargaining strength of GE workers on September 15.

Not only does the building-by-building survey of UE stewards forecast a decisive UE victory, but other signs point in the same direction.

Many Join UE

Nearly 1000 GE workers joined UE Local 301 in the last two weeks in an amazing demonstration of confidence in the Union.

GE workers laid up in the hospital have phoned and written in requesting transportation to the polls so that they could vote for the Union which won hospitalization, fought for them in the compensation courts and protected them on lost time.

Sacrifice Vacations

Many are sacrificing a precious vacation day to come in to cast their ballots for the Union which won paid vacations and holidays.

Men and women, living on UE-won pensions, have volunteered radio and television appeals for a big UE victory.

The Stewards' survey of the employees in the bargaining unit shows 4 to 1 for UE.

Demonstrate For UE

Most dramatic evidence that IUE-CIO is essentially a movement of outsiders against the GE Schenectady workers was presented at the shop gates, especially the Subway gate where among dozens of IUE-CIO agitators not a single GE shop badge was visible. In the UE parades at this gate, in which 1,000 and more participated, every marcher without exception, wore the GE badge next to his or her UE button or ribbon.



Membership Roars Victory Pledge

A membership meeting that packed and overflowed UE Local 301's Union Hall last night roared its approval of GE Conference Board demands for a general wage increase, increases for day workers, women, the skilled trades, and for improved pension and insurance plans. This made Conference Board demands official, although previous votes in the plant had made adoption certain.

In addition to this action, the membership meeting voiced its in-

dignation at the meddling of politicians acting on behalf of the company union IUE-CIO in the coming NLRB election.

UE General President Albert J. Fitzgerald expressed the confidence of the National Union in UE Local 301's victory on Friday. UE Sec.-Treas. Julius Emspak, a member of UE Local 301, and James J. Matles, UE Director of Organization addressed the meeting, fresh from grand jury proceedings in New York, where they had been summoned as a result of political meddling from Washing-

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What We Have Won

- 1936** UE Local 301 wins NLRB election. Becomes bargaining agent in Schenectady GE.
- 1937** 5-cent selective wage increase.
- 1938** First national union contract with GE. Established national grievance procedure. One week vacation after one year, two weeks after 10 years. Stopped 10 percent wage cut that salaried workers and foremen had to take.
- 1939** First step toward establishing seniority protection. Pro rata vacations for laid off employees. Improved grievance procedure.
- 1940** Established two-week vacations after five years. First protection of piece work prices.
- 1941** 10-cent general wage increase. First general wage increase in GE history. Time and a half for Saturday, double time for Sundays and holidays.
- 1942** 5 1/2-cent general wage increase. Grievance procedure improved.
- 1943** Guaranteed protection of piece work prices.
- 1944** Established step rates and automatic progression schedule, resulting in 1/2 to 4 1/2-cent increases. Pro-rata vacations from one to two weeks for employees with from one to five years' service. Call-in and reporting pay improved.
- 1945** Established length of service as governing factor in layoffs and rehiring, eliminating family status, physical fitness and ability as factors. Increased women's rates from 3 to 16 cents an hour.
- 1946** 18 1/2-cent an hour general wage increase. Improved pension plan.
- 1947** 11 1/2-cent general wage increase, six paid holidays, three weeks vacation after 20 years.
- 1948** 9 to 16-cent general wage increase, one more paid holiday, pensions improved.
- 1950** 10-cent general wage increase, \$125 minimum pensions, insurance and hospitalization plan. Five cents additional for skilled trades and some groups of day workers.
- 1951** 9-cent general wage increase.

What We Are Fighting For

1 A substantial wage increase, based on accurately measured living costs — not the phony PLS index — to compensate for increased living costs, burdensome and increasing taxes and for the increased productivity of GE workers.

2 Substantial increases in day rates for all day workers, in line with skill and abilities required. Elimination of present inequities in earnings between day workers and other production workers. Rates in skilled trades to receive special consideration.

3 Removal of discrimination against women's rates. The hiring-in rate and the lowest job rate for women to be no less than the common labor rate.

4 More money for each step in the automatic

progression, with no step increase less than five cents and 10 cents in the higher classifications.

5 A minimum pension of \$165 a month, with retirement permissible at 60 years of age. Eliminate 15-year requirement for pension rights and broaden coverage to include those now on pension.

6 Improved insurance plan with minimum sick benefit of \$1 an hour; \$40 a week to sick and disabled workers. Surgical, hospital and maternity benefits to cover full cost. Improve administration of plan to eliminate present delays.

7 Eliminate geographical differentials which allow the company to open up plants and move jobs to low pay areas and undercut rates in established plants.

Senate Hearing Record Proves Subpoenas Political Frameup

Under questioning at a formal hearing of the U. S. Senate Appropriations Committee March 12, 1951, the Chief of the Criminal Division of the U. S. Dept. of Justice, Asst. Atty General McInerney, admitted under oath:

"I have looked at the UE cases myself, and I recall statements in the FBI reports which are unusual in FBI reports, such as, 'No evidence of Communist Party activities since execution of non-Communist oath.'"

Members Hear Record

This was made public at the Local 301 membership meeting last night, when part of the official record of the Senatorial hearing was read. These official proceedings prove as well that heavy po-

litical pressure was brought upon the Dept. of Justice to prosecute UE officials, on their Taft-Hartley affidavits, though there was not a trace of evidence to justify it.

Asking for Money

Atty General McInerney was before the Senate Committee asking for money for his department. The following is taken from the printed proceedings of the committee.

Speaking of the UE, Sen. McCarthy, anti-labor Senator from Wisconsin, said:

"You have cases, have you not, in which the FBI furnished proof of Communist Party membership prior to the signing of the non-Communist oath and Communist Party membership subse-

quent to the signing of the oath?"

No Evidence

Atty General McInerney: No, sir.

Sen. McCarthy: Communist Party activities?

Mr. McInerney: No, sir.

Sen. McCarthy: Attending Communist meetings?

Mr. McInerney: No, sir.

Sen. McCarthy: Are you sure of that?

Mr. McInerney: We process these cases at least four times. We have sent them out to the U. S. attorneys to institute grand jury proceedings on them if they can develop the proof.

Sen. McCarthy (later) I do not want to take the time of the committee now, but I will see you immediately after the hearing.



hatched in Washington to smear UE at all costs, although a high official of the U. S. Department of Justice admitted officially in Washington that the FBI had no evidence to support prosecution against the UE officers.

Greetings and expressions of solidarity with UE Local 301 were given the meeting by Sally Smith of UE Local 128, Allentown GE; Jack Terry of UE Local 332, Ft. Edward GE; James Connolly, UE Local 429, Newark GE; William Waite, UE Local 201, Lynn GE; John Singleton, UE Local 204, Taunton GE; William Martin, UE Local 422, Bloomfield GE; Bernard Sewicki, UE Local 506, Erie GE; and Lester Patmore, UE Local 506, Erie GE. Louis King, President of UE District 3, reported a 14-cent-an hour wage settlement by UE at the Buffalo Wire Co.

The meeting cheered the report of Local 301 Business Agent Leo Jandreau and pledged an overwhelming victory for UE in the election Friday. UE Local 301 Pres. William Kelly chaired the meeting.



Women Solid for UE

The UE Women's Committee which drew up the women's leaflet circulated in many buildings yesterday, reports that the overwhelming majority of women in the plant will vote UE on Friday.

Former IUE-CIO Backers Now Work For UE Victory

Former IUE-CIO supporters continue to abandon the company union and declare for UE Local 301 as the NLRB election September 14 draws near.

Among them are John Rakvica of ANO, Campbell Ave., and John Clancy of the Campbell Ave. Machine Shop.

Rakvica says: "A year's experience has shown me that IUE-CIO talks big and does nothing. They never proved any of their communist smears, and they have hurt the conditions of GE workers instead of helping them."

Clancy says: "I found out communist domination of UE is a lie, and that the UE is run by the membership... I am a veteran of World War II and I am no communist."

"They know what the Union has done for them," Committee spokesmen said. "One woman recalled that when she started working for GE in 1919 she received \$3 a week; now, she's making nearly that much in two hours."

Another woman who started at 40c an hour in 1940 pointed out that US has more than tripled her rate.

The Women's Committee, formed to carry on a continuing fight against women's wage inequities, will meet on September 24 in a combined business meeting and a birthday party for one of the girls in Bldg. 81.

Some 275 women signed the women's leaflet. About 60 more called after the leaflet went to press asking that their names be added.

"GE has the old and profit-making idea that women, because they are women, should be paid less than men and far below their skills," the statement declares.

"One of UE's major wage demands is that no woman should receive less than \$1.38 which is the rate for common labor."

Here's What They Said Last Year; Can You Believe Them Today?

Do you remember the threats that IUE-CIO used last year in its attempt to scare GE workers into voting for the political, company-union IUE-CIO?

First they said that if UE Local 301 won, GE workers would have no union.

FACT: Every UE Local is stronger and solidier this year than last, while organization where IUE-CIO fooled the workers is breaking up.

IUE-CIO said that if Schenectady workers voted for UE, they would have no contract.

FACT: UE has a contract, better than IUE's, running to September, 1952, with wage reopeners every 6 months. It is IUE-CIO whose contract expires the day after the election and is forced to

take any handout the company offers to save its check-off.

IUE-CIO said that if Schenectady voted for UE, the U. S. Government would take away all work from the plant.

FACT: Official government figures show that Schenectady did more work than any other GE plant during the past year. Carey at his last Convention admitted it.

It has to, and always does, resort to last minute lies, forgeries, tricks, slanders, forged documents, and false claims in an effort to fool the people and stampede the voting. Remember, these men are desperate, and they are liars. Disregard all sensational last minute announcements from IUE-CIO.



IUE-CIO has given up the fight for higher wages and other contract improvements!

The signatures of the IUE-CIO ruling clique would be dry on a sellout contract today if it weren't for the fact that they would be exposed before ALL GE Schenectady workers on the eve of the election and before GE workers throughout the country.

That's the meaning of the IUE-CIO's announcement yesterday that it is willing to continue its present contract with GE and is, at the same time, ready to settle for 2 1/2% or 4¢ - a difference of 8 tenths of 1¢.

This means a sellout of GE workers who need a substantial across-the-board wage increase to meet higher prices and taxes.


It means a sellout for all day workers whose weekly earnings are too low. It means a sellout of the underpaid women workers. It means a sellout for skilled workers whose rates are way out of line. It means no improvements in pensions, insurance, holidays and vacations.

It means that all IUE-CIO is interested in is the dues check-off. The "Mighty" IUE-CIO!

A vote for IUE-CIO is a vote for the sellout of GE workers.

Because of the desperate crisis in IUE-CIO, the ring-leaders have arranged for the indictment of UE leaders, Matles and Emspak, to divert attention from IUE betrayal.
