Drums. By James Boyd. Pictures by N. C. Wyeth. 409 pages. \$2.50. New York: Scribners
N. C. Wyeth, who has illustrated several other of the books in the Scribner's series for younger readers, now illustrates Mr. Boyd's highly suceess ful Drums with seventeen color pages and nearly fifty black and white sketches The novel is famous in itself. With these noteworthy illustrations, the publishers have given the public an inimitable combination. The book has been recommended by many teachers of history as worthy supplementary realing in high school classes. If the school library has a copy of the

Drums is the story of John Fraser, a youngster in the South during the Revolution.
