The keneral policy regarding ex amination this summer will be that the instructors will give at least there foll-period examinations during the conrse of the sumber ses sion. Instrad of the ctestomary two-hour final examinatuns, single perioul tests will be given.
In making this amouncenemt. 1/r. Nefom explatned that it is pussible that a few of the instructurs may find it advisable to arrange for regular length final examinations, due to the difficulty in iesting the stadonts adegnat ty in simple peroud tests, ink the tare, the mest the the clas- and will arrange to conduct the timal examination at a time to be desigmated.

Ther change in poliey regarding examinations is caused by the large enrollment this sanmaer, and the difliculty in finding enongh romms for the bolding of long final examiinations in two days, which is 1 oll ally given for final tests.
In courses with large enrollments, the instructors may arrange (1) give the examinations in the att diturimm of I'age Ifall. In thas case, lap bacards will be supplied to sthdonts Students are asked to stack the lap boards at the rear of the auditoritu when they have compheted the exammations.

The choice of "I'agliarci" for the first opera on the sound sereen is a wise ome, as Letoneavaliot - hort opera lends iteelf partionarly to sereen requirememts. It wfers sariety, the costanco are effective and the seenes are pietorial: the enfrance of Nedtas and the -trolling players, in the donkey cart being esperially adaptabio for sereen purposes. Then again, the work enjoys a populatity that adrls to its punsbibities as a comanerial velicke. Nowelty has beet motroluced into the pitherization of thi- opera by includings a ballet in the first act and agath at the openimg of the second, adding to the action and picture as well.
Mr. Ciallo selected the cast and enscmble with the same care that is exercised by the major piture comfathies, with due colvideration of the vocal and picture requirements. The musical directur, 'arlo f'eroni, has been Mr. Gallo: opera condurtor for a number of years and one of the mast able in the operatic field.

Professor Bronson performed a real service last Friday in his Forum address when lie exposed the quackery and exorbitant profits of manuacturers who advertise and market so-called "beauty aieds."

In the present day of high powered advertising, the interests of the consumer are practically ignored. The fertile imagination of advertising copy writers bursts into print in such a way as to make one feel a pressing need for the pronluct at vertised. At times, psendorecientific laboratories which are operated for profit. sometimes through subsidy of the advertiser) are guoted as endorsing the product. For example, a favorite stunt of the ycast :man!. facturers is to purchase endorsements of foreign doctors who are not bound by the conde of ethics of the American Medical Association.
At one time, certain makakines assumed an independent attitude; trying to protect their readers rights. Almost without exception such magazines have capitulated to the advertiser, in order to share in the haul of profits. Their testing bureaus, which one time held a promise of service th, the conswner, are thw practically fares
