**Easton, Pa. -- Rob Dill** scored 16 of a career-high 24 points in the first half, and Lafayette shot 57 percent from the field in posting an 83-75 non-conference victory over Albany on Monday evening at the Kirby Sports Center.

Albany (2-7) came back from an 11-point deficit in the opening period to grab a 46-41 lead with 17:10 remaining. Freshman **Jamar Wilson**, who had 18 points, hit a three-pointer before **Antione Johnson** followed his own missed jumper in the lane.

Lafayette (4-5) later wiped out that lead with a run of nine straight points. Dill, a 6-foot-10 junior, who also had a career-high 15 rebounds put his team ahead, 50-48, before **Justin DeBerry** made a layup to finish off that spurt. The Great Danes went back in front, 53-52, on a three-point field goal by Johnson, who scored a team-high 21 points.

The Leopards, who have won four straight after opening the season with five losses, regrouped to take the lead for good. DeBerry, who scored all 11 of his points after halftime, buried back-to-back three pointers for a 58-53 advantage with 10:47 remaining. Lafayette still led 61-59 two minutes later, but then pulled away for good when **Andrew Pleick** canned a three-pointer and **Mike Farrell** scored in the lane for a seven-point cushion.

"Their size was a difference," said Albany coach **Will Brown**, who benched freshmen **Jerrad Knotts** and **Herman Banks** for being late for a team function. "But this game came down to a couple of possessions. We didn't make enough winning plays on the defensive end of the floor. Lafayette is a good team because they don't beat themselves. We just didn't have enough size to match up with them."

Farrell finished with 19 points for the Leopards, while Winston Davis added 18 points and nine rebounds. Albany's **Rhasheed Peterson** scored a season-high 20 points, his fifth straight game in double figures.

### Syracuse 109, Albany 79

Syracuse, NY – Freshman **Carmelo Anthony** scored 28 points to pace five players in double figures as Syracuse defeated Albany, 109-79, on Saturday evening before 18,683 at the Carrier Dome. Syracuse (7-1) shot a staggering 76.5 percent from the field in the first half on 26-of-34 attempts. The Orangemen, who have won seven straight since an opening-game loss to Memphis, led 62-43 at halftime.

Anthony, a McDonald's high school All-American, who had 19 first-half points, helped his team break away early. Anthony canned one of his five 3-pointers, before Craig Forth, a 7-0 sophomore, hit a follow shot in the lane for a 14-7 lead.

The Orangemen, who finished the game by shooting 63.4 percent, pushed out to a commanding 35-12 advantage behind the play of **Hakim Warrick**, who had 14 of his 22 points in the stanza.

In the second half, Albany (2-6) stayed in the hunt when **Levi Levine** was fouled as he converted a lay-up in the lane. His three-point play closed the gap to 69-53 with 16:52 remaining.

However, Syracuse would eventually pull away. **Jeremy McNeil** came off the bench to score 10 of his 14 points in the final period. The Orangemen would later run off 13 consecutive points that resulted in a 95-61 lead with 8:51 to play.

"We did a better job defensively in the second half," Syracuse coach **Jim Boeheim** said. "We had a good stretch for a four to five minute period. They have quick little guys and they are tough for us to guard."

The Great Danes, who tied a Carrier Dome record with 14 three-pointers, was led by freshman guard **Jamar Wilson**, who had 29 points. **Antione Johnson** scored 19 and connected on a career-best five long-range jumpers.

"I think this game helped us," said Albany coach **Will Brown**, who had just seven players available due to injuries. "They're good physically and athletically. We were not going to get a rebound. But we did a good job on the offensive end of the floor, and you're starting to see the real Jamar Wilson."

**Kueth Duany** and **Gerry McNamara** had 14 and 11 points, respectively, for the Orangemen. Albany's **Rhasheed Peterson** scored in double-figures for the fourth straight game with 14 points. Levine finished with 12 points, five rebounds and five steals.

## ALBANY MOVES ABOVE .500 WITH 58-39 WIN OVER TOWSON

Albany, N.Y. —Sophomore center **Danielle Hutcheson** matched a season-high with 20 points, one off her career high, as Albany pulled away from Towson in the second half for a 58-39 victory on Saturday afternoon at the Recreation and Convocation Center. The victory puts the Great Danes (5-4) over the .500 mark for the first time since Jan. 23, 1999 when the school was a member of Division II. The win also surpasses last season's victory total as the team finished 4-23.

The Great Danes, who recorded their largest margin of victory since a 76-47 win over Green Mountain College on Dec. 5, 2000, used a 10-3 run at the end of the first half and into the start of the second half to take a 31-22 lead with 17:34 remaining. Hutcheson, who also collected a game-high nine rebounds, scored five points during that stretch, closing the run with a lay up and sinking a free throw as **Kelli Talbot** fouled her on her way up.

Towson (0-7) answered with back-to-back baskets by LaShay Rose and Mia Chapman, but the Great Danes tallied 22 of the game's next 28 points to create a commanding 21-point lead, 53-32, with 2:42 left in the contest. Once again, Hutcheson sparked the run with 11 points, mostly on lay ups, and senior guard Jess McGinlay added six of her 16 points during the burst. Junior guard Kathryn Hemlock, who was third on the team with nine points, also dished out four of her game-high six assists in that span.

In the opening stanza, Mia Chapman scored seven of her team-high 11 points to give the Tigers an early 13-10 lead with 10:29 left. McGinlay then connected on back-to-back three-pointers to give the Great Danes a lead they would never relinquish at 8:20. Towson cut the lead to one on a couple occasions, but then Albany began the aforementioned 10-3 run to go into halftime with a 26-21 lead.

"Before the game I challenged our team to hold Towson under 33 percent shooting from the floor and they handled that challenge," said first-year head coach **Trina Patterson**. "Danielle ignited the team both emotionally and with her play on the court. Kathryn rebounded from a couple of bad games and came on strong this afternoon. Jess is the steady player on our squad who will do what it takes to help us win games."

The 39-point output by Towson was the lowest by an UAlbany opponent since Feb. 11, 2000 when St. Joseph's (Vt.) was defeated 78-30.

The Great Danes will play host to Lafayette on Jan. 2 at 5:00 p.m. as part of a doubleheader with the men's team.

Albany, N.Y. – **Jeremy Bishop** had 17 points and a career-high 18 rebounds to pace five players in double figures, and Quinnipiac held off a late rally to post a 78-65 victory over Albany in a non-conference game on Monday evening at the Recreation and Convocation Center.

The Bobcats, who are off to their best start since the 1977-78 season with a 6-1 record, built a 50-31 cushion with 14:17 remaining, when **C.J. Vick** scored in the lane. Vick, a 6-foot-8 sophomore, finished with 16 points, seven rebounds and four blocked shots.

Albany (2-5) would rally with 13 of the game's next 15 points. Freshman guard **Jamar Wilson** had five of his team-high 19 points in that spurt, and then fed classmate **Levi Levine** in the paint to close the gap to 52-44 with 10:24 to play.

The Great Danes, who would later again trail by a double-digit margin, then sliced the deficit to 62-60 on **Rhasheed Peterson's** bank shot with 4:35 left. Peterson, a 6-foot-5 swingman who had a season-high 18 points, buried two of his four 3-pointers in his team's second run at the visitors.

However, **Kason Mims** came to Quinnipiac's rescue over the next one minute and 32 seconds as he poured in eight of his 17 points to help his team pull away for good. Mims, a junior guard, nailed two consecutive three-point field goals, before he converted a driving layup for a 70-60 lead.

In the first half, the Bobcats trailed 16-15, before ripping off a 14-4 run. Bishop, whose rebound total was one off the arena record, was fouled on a layup that put his club ahead. Bishop, at 6-foot-6 and 225 pounds, then made the free throw to complete the three-point play. **Craig Benson**, who had 12 of his 14 points in the period, came off the bench to hit three consecutive 3-pointers in that stretch. Quinnipiac would lead 38-24 at halftime.

"There's no consolation in coming close," said Albany coach Will Brown, whose team made 28.1 percent of its field goals in the opening period. "We lost the game in the first half. We made too many mistakes and failed to execute simple things. We gave a solid effort in the second half, but (Kason) Mims broke our back."

Rashaun Banjo was the fifth player in double figures with 12 points for the Bobcats, who shot 50.8 percent from the field on 31-of-61 shooting and held a 47-29 rebounding advantage. Albany's **Antione Johnson** scored 14 points.

Albany (2-4) had taken a 67-65 lead with 51 seconds remaining, when freshman **Jamar Wilson**, who totaled a career-high 30 points and 11 rebounds, nailed a three-point field goal from the left corner. Robert Morris (3-3) drew even at 67 apiece on a pair of foul shots by senior guard **DaMarcus Ellis** with 19 seconds left.

Opong, who had seven assists, was then fouled on a drive to the basket by **Maurice Carter** to set up his winning free throws, his only points of the game. Carter, who had 16 of his team-high 24 points in the final half, heaved a 30-foot shot at the buzzer that hit the backboard and went off the front rim.

"I was very confident when I went to the line," said Opong, whose attempts were delayed by a Robert Morris timeout. "I have been working to relax and shoot in practice. I just concentrated and made the free throws."

The Great Danes, who won for the first time at home this season, built a 49-38 cushion midway through the final period. Wilson, a 6-foot-1 swingman who posted the fourth highest scoring total by an Albany freshman, hit a jumper in the lane off a dribble-drive to give his squad its biggest lead.

However, Robert Morris rallied with 13 of the game's next 15 points. Ellis scored off a goaltending call, before Carter canned a three-pointer to tie the contest at 51 apiece. The Colonials would eventually go ahead, when **Aaron Thomas** converted a three-point play when he was fouled on a shot in the lane. Thomas, who had 16 points and eight rebounds, made the free throw for a 58-55 advantage with 4:21 remaining.

The contest featured nine ties and four lead changes and went back-and-forth in the stretch. Carter, a 6-foot sophomore sank two foul shots for a 65-62 lead, before Wilson, who had 20 second-half points, hit a driving layup and put his team in front with a three-pointer.

"That was an incredible performance for a freshman," said Albany coach **Will Brown**. about Wilson who was 3-of-18 from the field in his previous two starts. "That was much needed because he puts too much pressure on himself. It's a good win for us after the Long Island game (78-62 loss on Dec. 11)."

Albany's **Rhasheed Peterson** had 10 of his season-high 17 points in the opening period, as the Great Danes led 32-26 at halftime and were coming off a 10-day layoff for exams. **Levi Levine**, a 6-foot-6 freshman, finished with 12 points.

### GARY JONES ON SPORTS NETWORK ALL-AMERICA FOOTBALL TEAM

Albany, N.Y. – University at Albany's **Gary Jones** (Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk) has been named to the 2002 Sports Network I-AA All-America Football Team as a third-team selection. Jones, a junior tailback, made the Associated Press All-America second team last Wednesday.

### GARY JONES ON ASSOCIATED PRESS ALL-AMERICA FOOTBALL TEAM

Albany, N.Y. – University at Albany's **Gary Jones** (Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk) has been named to the 2002 Associated Press I-AA All-America Football Team, as announced on Wednesday evening by the national wire service. McNeese State, who plays Western Kentucky for the national title on Friday, Dec. 20, had three players selected.

Jones, a second-team running back, is the second UAlbany player to be chosen to the Division I-AA All-America squad. Offensive tackle J.T. Herfurth earned first-team honors in 2000.

Jones established two Northeast Conference records and nine school single-season marks as a junior. He rushed for 1,509 yards, scored 23 touchdowns, accounted for 1,949 all-purpose yards, and became the first Albany player to run for 100 or more yards nine times in a season.

The UAlbany tailback is third among the nation's rushing leaders at 125.8 yards per game. He is fourth in Division I-AA in scoring (11.5 points/game) and seventh in all-purpose yards (162.4 pg).

Jones, the NEC Offensive Player of the Year, was previously named to the Sports Network I-AA Mid-Major All-America Team earlier this month. He led Albany to its first-ever Northeast Conference championship with an 8-4 record. Jones rushed for 194 yards and two touchdowns in an upset of previously unbeaten Duquesne to earn the ECAC Football Classic MVP award.

### **UALBANY MEETS NATIONALLY-RANKED PITTSBURGH IN 2003-04**

Albany, N.Y. – University at Albany Director of Athletics and Recreation Lee McElroy announced today that the men's basketball program has signed a contract to meet the University of Pittsburgh on Saturday, Nov. 29 in the 2003-04 season.

The contest will be played at Pittsburgh's Petersen Events Center, a 12,508-seat on-campus facility that opened in the spring of 2002. The Panthers' new 430,000-square foot basketball home features all chairback seating, a permanent wood floor, and courtside seats for 1,200 students.

Pittsburgh is currently ranked in both the ESPN/USA Today (No. 3) and Associated Press (No. 4) national polls with a 6-0 record. The Panthers have risen to their highest national ranking since January 1987.

Ben Howland, last year's consensus National Coach of the Year, led Pittsburgh to a 29-6 record in 2001-02, the winningest season in school history. The Panthers reached the NCAA Tournament's Sweet Sixteen and captured the Big East Conference's West Division with a 13-3 mark. Pittsburgh won multiple NCAA tournament games for the first time in 28 years.

UAlbany, a member of the America East Conference, will be meeting its fourth Big East Conference program since upgrading to the NCAA Division I level in 1999-2000. The Great Danes have previously faced Syracuse, Notre Dame and Rutgers.

### UALBANY'S LEVI LEVINE NAMED AMERICA EAST ROOKIE OF THE WEEK

Boston, Mass. – University at Albany's Levi Levine has been selected as the America East Conference Rookie of the Week in men's basketball. Levine, a 6-foot-6 freshman, is just the second UAlbany player to receive the conference's weekly award since the Great Danes joined the league in 2001-02.

Levine averaged 16.5 points, 5.0 rebounds and 2.5 steals in two games last week, plus shot 50 percent from the field (13-26) and 83.3 percent from the free throw line. He had nine points, four rebounds and three steals in a 47-43 victory at Army on Dec. 9, as Albany won on the road for the first time since last February.

A New York City native, Levine scored a game-high 24 points and grabbed six rebounds in a loss to Long Island on Dec. 11. His scoring total was the most by a UAlbany freshman in two years. Levine ranks sixth among the America East scoring leaders at 14.6 points per game.

Albany (1-4) is in the middle of a 10-day layoff for fall semester exams. The Great Danes return to the floor later this week for home games against Robert Morris (Dec. 21) and Quinnipiac (Dec. 23) at the Recreation and Convocation Center.

Albany, N.Y. – Junior guard Ashley Linscott had 14 of her 24 points in the second half to lead Wagner to a 74-66 non-conference victory over Albany on Sunday afternoon at the Recreation and Convocation Center.

Wagner (2-4) ran off six straight points to break a 50-50 deadlock midway through the final period. Vanessa Wyffels split a pair of free throws, before Carrie Walker converted in the lane from a driving Linscott. Walker, a 6-foot junior who had 20 points and seven rebounds, also scored on an in-bounds play during that spurt.

Albany (3-4) closed within 58-56 with 6:08 remaining as Maree Jones, who recorded her second consecutive double-double with 14 points and 12 rebounds, canned a foul-line jumper.

However, the Seahawks would pull away for good with eight unanswered points for a 66-56 lead with 3:42 to play. Linscott, who made 9-of-16 from the floor, and added four assists and five steals, buried a jumper off a screen to ignite that stretch. Kim McGhee, who had 12 points off the bench, added an 8-foot jumper and a fastbreak layup in that decisive run.

"Wagner's guard play was the difference, especially (Ashley) Linscott," Albany coach Trina Patterson said. "Their pressure and defensive intensity were factors. Sarah (Sweetland) was in early foul trouble, and we are not as good a team without her on the floor."

In the first half, Wagner jumped out to a 21-11 lead as McGhee nailed a threepointer from the right side. The Great Danes, who were bidding for their first three-game win streak since February 2000, sliced that deficit to 32-26 on 3-point field goal by Jess McGinlay, who tallied 18 of her team-high 21 points in the period.

The Seahawks, who shot 50.9 percent from the field and forced 25 turnovers with full-court pressure, led 36-28 at the intermission. But Albany regrouped early in the final stanza to tie the contest at 38 apiece on Jones' follow shot in the lane. The second half featured five ties and three lead changes.

Albany's Danielle Hutcheson, a 6-foot-4 sophomore center, finished with 16 points and 11 rebounds, while teammate Sarah Sweetland scored 12, all in the second half.

# WOMEN - Albany 65, Army 49

Albany, N.Y. – Sophomore **Maree Jones** had 15 points and 12 rebounds, both career-highs, to pace four players in double figures in leading Albany to a 65-49 non-conference victory over Army on Thursday evening at the Recreation and Convocation Center.

The Great Danes, who are at the .500 mark for the first time since December 1999 with a 3-3 record, led wire-to-wire. Albany leaped to a 22-9 lead midway through the first half, behind the play of **Danielle Hutcheson**, who had 14 points and nine rebounds. The 6-foot-4 center scored her team's opening eight points, while **Sarah Sweetland** and **Jess McGinlay** converted consecutive three-point field goals in that run.

Army (4-4) chipped away at the margin, and closed within 32-26 at halftime. **Katie Mcfarlane**, who totaled 15 points, including the 1,000th of her career, and added seven rebounds, led the charge. She hit a bank shot off her steal in transition, and then split a pair of free throws at the end of the period.

In the second half, Albany opened with 10 of the game's next 14 points. Jones, a 6-foot-1 sophomore who recorded her first career double-double, and made 7 of 10 shots from the field, converted a follow shot in the lane for a 42-30 advantage.

The Black Knights, who had their three-game win streak halted, closed within single digits on four occasions in the stretch. **Christine Gassman's** baseline jumper sliced the deficit to 55-47 with 4:36 remaining. However, Jones, who had six assists, fed McGinlay for a back-door layup and found **Kathryn Hemlock** for a short jumper on Albany's next two possessions to give her team a 12-point spread.

"It feels good to be at .500," said Jones, who averaged just 1.5 points per game as a freshman. "The team needs me to score and rebound, and be aggressive on the defensive end. I am starting to be relaxed on offense and defense; I just need to start looking from my shot more."

McGinlay, a senior guard, finished with 14 points. Sweetland added 10 for the Great Danes, who have won back-to-back games for the first time since early January of last season.

"This was no surprise," said first-year Albany coach Trina Patterson about Jones' performance. "She broke out with a solid effort in our last game (against Long Island). She is starting to feel comfortable out on the floor."

### ALEX ARGULEWICZ NAMED TO ECAC DIVISION I-AA ALL-STAR TEAM

Cape Cod, Mass. – University at Albany's **Alex Argulewicz** has been named to the ECAC Division I-AA All-Star Football Team. Argulewicz was a first-team selection, while **Gary Jones** (Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk) earned honorable mention recognition.

He received the ECAC Football Classic MVP award, when he rushed for 194 yards and two touchdowns against Duquesne.

CAPE COD, Mass. -- This year's ECAC Division I-AA Player of the Year accomplished something that neither his father nor grandfather did as quarterback at Villanova. Senior Brett Gordon set the school's single-season passing yards record and led Villanova to the 1-AA semifinals for the first time in school history. Albany, N.Y. – Antawn Dobie and Maurice Yearwood each had 17 points to lead Long Island to a 78-62 non-conference victory over Albany on Wednesday evening at the Recreation and Convocation Center.

Long Island (2-4) snapped an early tie, when Dobie converted a fastbreak layup off his steal and Yearwood, who came off the bench, canned a three-point field goal from the right wing for a 14-9 advantage. LIU's lead grew to 26-16 on Brandon Thomas' layup in transition.

Albany (1-4) was still within striking distance at 28-20, when Levi Levine, a 6-foot-6 freshman who led all scorers with 24 points, worked his way into the lane for a basket. He made 11 of 18 shots from the floor and added six rebounds.

In the second half, Yearwood, who made 5 of 6 shots from beyond the three-point arc, buried a long-range jumper for a 42-26 cushion with 16:26 remaining. But the Great Danes rallied with 10 of the game's next 12 points, as Earv Opong nailed a 3-pointer to slice the deficit in half at 44-36.

LIU regrouped with a run of 14 unanswered points to put the game away. Dobie and Yearwood each made three-point shots in that decisive stretch, while Derek Bell, who had 14 points and 12 rebounds, scored twice in the paint.

"We are real disappointed with the loss, especially on our home floor," said Opong, a senior captain. "We played flat for the whole game, and it started on the first possession when we gave up four offensive rebounds."

JaJa Bey was the fourth LIU player in double figures with 13 points. The Blackbirds shot 50.8 percent from the field, including a torrid 18-of-28 in the final half. Rhasheed Peterson tallied a season-high 14 points off the bench for the Great Danes, who suffered their worst home loss as a Division I program.

"The rebounding really hurt us," said Albany guard Antione Johnson, the team's top scorer who was held to seven points on 2-of-9 shooting. "We were lazy, didn't keep them off the glass, and gave up too many second-chance points."

Ithaca, N.Y. – Sophomore forward **Maree Jones** (Albany H.S.) scored the go-ahead basket on a hook shot off the glass with 29 seconds remaining to lead Albany to a 55-52 victory over Long Island in the consolation of the Cornell Classic on Saturday evening at Newman Arena.

Jones' basket gave the Great Danes a 53-51 lead. After LIU's **Kecia Rosado** split a pair of free throws, **Sarah Sweetland** sank two foul shots with five seconds left to give Albany (2-3) breathing room. # JOSH BAZAN, ALEX ARGULEWICZ & GARY JONES ON SPORTS NETWORK I-AA MID-MAJOR ALL-AMERICA FOOTBALL TEAM

Philadelphia, Pa. – The University at Albany has placed three players on The Sports Network I-AA Mid-Major All-America Football Team. Linebacker **Josh Bazan** and offensive guard **Alex Argulewicz** are on the All-America squad for the second straight year, while tailback **Gary Jones** (Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk) have been voted to the team for the first time by a panel of I-AA media and sports information directors.

Bazan, a senior from Bronx, N.Y., led the Great Danes with 124 tackles, including 82 unassisted hits and 16 for losses. He added 3.5 sacks, six pass break ups, one fumble recovery and two forced fumbles. Bazan, a three-time All-Northeast Conference first-team selection, finished his career as the school's all-time tackles leader with 354.

Argulewicz, a 6-foot-1, 295-pound left guard, made 33 consecutive starts on UAlbany's offensive line. The Great Danes are seventh nationally among NCAA Division I-AA teams at 252.3 rushing yards per game and 26th in scoring with a 29.8 average. Albany also led the NEC in total offense at 371.4 yards per game.

Jones, who broke nine school single-season records as a junior, rushed for 1,509 yards and scored 23 touchdowns. Jones became the first Albany player to record nine 100-yard rushing games in a season. He ran for 194 yards and two touchdowns in a 24-0 upset of previously unbeaten Duquesne to earn the ECAC Football Classic MVP award on Nov. 23.

#### ALBANY RECEIVES VOTES IN INSIDE LACROSSE PRESEASON COACHES POLL

Towson, Md. – UAlbany is among others receiving votes for Inside Lacrosse Magazine's 2003 Preseason Coaches Top 25 National Men's Lacrosse Poll. Ithaca, N.Y. – Junior **Karen Force** scored a game-high 13 points to lead Cornell to a 57-41 victory over Albany in the opening round of the Cornell Classic on Friday evening at Newman Arena. The Great Danes fall to 1-3 and meets Long Island in the consolation on Saturday at 5:00 p.m. Colgate upended the Blackbirds, 49-41, in the other first-round contest.

Albany jumped out to a 6-4 lead as sophomore **Danielle Hutcheson** tallied four of her team-high 11 points. Force hit a three-point field goal that ignited a run that gave Cornell (3-3) a 15-10 advantage with 9:56 left in the period. The Big Red led 25-21 at halftime, as both teams traded baskets the rest of the period.

In the second half, the Great Danes tallied nine of the period's opening 13 points. **Jess McGinlay's** three-pointer gave her team the lead at 30-29. Cornell then went on an 8-1 spurt sparked by **Lynell Davis**, a 6-foot-1 senior who had six of her 12 points in that stretch.

Albany closed within 37-35 on **Teryn O'Bannon's** jumper with 9:32 remaining. But Cornell produced 20 of the game's final 27 points to pull away. Force, a 5-foot-8 guard, led that charge by making all six of her free throw attempts in that span.

"Our team played a tough game for about 32 minutes," said Albany coach Trina Patterson, whose team shot 26.3 percent from the field on 15-of-57 shooting. "At the end we were not able to handle their offensive run. Our bench players performed well, especially Alicia Learn, but that's not enough. It was a tough night for us offensively, but we will learn from it and get better in the future."

Hutcheson, a 6-foot-4 center, added 11 rebounds to record her 10th career double-double. McGinlay and **Kathryn Hemlock** each finished with eight points. Learn, a 6-foot-1 sophomore, had a career game with six points and eight rebounds in 22 minutes.

Ify Ossai was the third Cornell player in twin figures with 10 points, while Dani Aretino had four points and a team-high 11 rebounds. The Big Red have won all four meetings in this series which began in 1999.

### MACLEAN NAMED TO VERIZON ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICA FOOTBALL TEAM

Stamford Conn. – University at Albany's Ryan MacLean has been named to the Verizon University Division Academic All-America Football Team. The team was chosen by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA).

MacLean, a senior roverback, was a national second-team selection. He has a 3.72 cumulative grade point average in management information systems with a minor in economics. He is the second UAlbany player to make the national academic all-america squad since the program moved to the Division I-AA level. Offensive tackle J.T. Herfurth was named to the first team in 2000.

MacLean was second among UAlbany defenders with 67 tackles, including 49 unassisted, plus he totaled three interceptions, eight pass break-ups, two fumble recoveries, two forced fumbles and 2.0 sacks. He picked off two passes in Albany's 24-0 upset of previously unbeaten Duquesne in the ECAC Football Classic on Nov. 23. The Great Danes, who finished 8-4 overall, won their first-ever Northeast Conference championship.

MacLean, who is a three-time District I all-academic choice, is eighth on the school's all-time tackles list with 243. He was a member of the 2001 Division I-AA Athletic Directors all-academic squad, and was intern for the New York Giants' computer services department in summer of 2002.

## SACRED HEART 69, ALBANY 63

Fairfield, Conn. – Senior forward **Brooke Rutnick** scored all 12 of her points in the second half, as Sacred Heart won its home opener, 69-63, over Albany at the William H. Pitt Center on Sunday afternoon. The Pioneers improved to 2-1 on the season, while Albany drops to 1-2 under first-year head coach **Trina Patterson**.

Albany jumped out to a 10-2 lead at the start. **Kathryn Hemlock** and **Danielle Hutcheson** had five points apiece for the Great Danes. Sacred Heart's **Nicolle Rubino** started a run of 10 consecutive points, as she scored her team's first basket with 14:12 remaining. Rubino finished with 11 points.

Albany went back in front at 14-12 midway through the period, but **Ashley Kohl's** layup sparked a 13-6 run. Sacred Heart would eventually build a 27-20 lead with 5:34 left before the intermission. In a see-saw affair, **Jess McGinlay's** three-point field goal gave Albany a 30-29 advantage with 31 seconds left, but junior guard **Shannon Quinlivan** hit a long-range jumper at the buzzer to send the Pioneers to the locker room with the lead.

The teams traded baskets throughout most of the second half. However, Sacred Heart's **Ashley Durmer** (15 points) sank a pair of free throws to begin a string of seven straight points. Sophomore guard **Allie Bagnell's** three-pointer with 7:05 remaining ended that spurt, and the Pioneers had a 57-47 lead.

The Great Danes tallied 13 of the game's next points to get back into the contest, a stretch ignited by one of Hemlock's three 3-pointers. Hutcheson, a 6-foot-4 center, hit a layup to get her team within 62-60 with 2:15 left. But Albany would not get any closer as Rubino made two free throws on her team's next possession and Rutnick, who had 12 points and six rebounds, converted a layup.

"We had a below-average defensive effort, and consequently they shot above their season average," stated Patterson, whose team won the battle of the boards, 39-28, but committed 26 turnovers.

Hutcheson led Albany with 20 points, one off her career-high, and eight rebounds. McGinlay and Hemlock had 15 and 13 points, respectively. Sophomore forward **Maree Jones** pulled down a career-best 10 rebounds to go with seven points. **Brooke Kelly** scored 12 points for the Pioneers, who shot 45 percent on 24-of-53 from the field.
