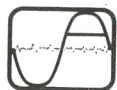

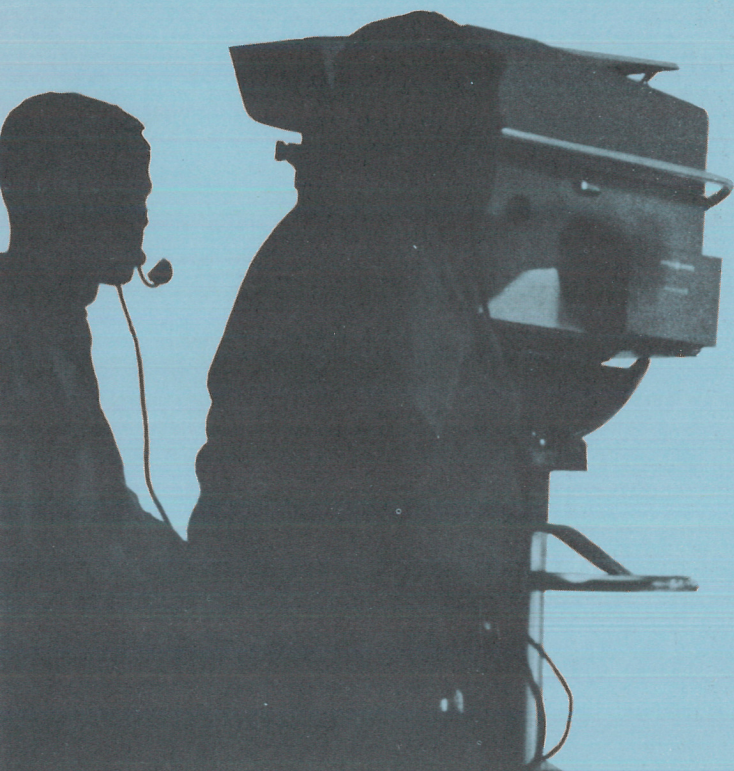
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

The University of the Air is a program of televised college courses giving you the opportunity to "attend" college at home while earning credit which may be applied toward degree requirements.

Presented by the State University of New York and the City University of New York, the University of the Air offers seven spring semester courses ranging from astronomy to German. Courses will be broadcast weekly, beginning January 25, 1969, on six educational television stations in New York State.

If you would like to earn college credit through television, you may enroll in University of the Air courses at one of fourteen participating campuses in New York State. With the help of a course study guide which summarizes each television lecture and provides study hints, you will watch weekly broadcasts, complete written assignments and take required examinations.

If you prefer to follow any of the courses on an informal, self-study basis, you may purchase a course study guide to increase your understanding of course content. Self-study students do not take examinations nor submit written assignments. Special non-credit enrollment is available through Queens College for viewers who wish to follow a course on more than a self-study basis, but who are not concerned with earning credit.

EYE ON THE UNIVERSE

3 Credits/Spring semester
Professor Harry Crull



Long before Galileo raised the first telescope skyward and offered the hypothesis that the Earth was not the center of the universe, man was fascinated by the stars.

A course in descriptive astronomy, Eye on the Universe presents a thorough study of the celestial universe, emphasizing our knowledge of the solar system, the stars, the Milky Way and the galaxies beyond our own. Eye on the Universe also considers some of the unanswered questions at the frontiers of modern astronomy.

GUTEN TAG

3 Credits/Spring semester
Course developed by Professor Gunther Gerlitzki



A highly unusual approach to a beginning language course, Guten Tag familiarizes the student with the German language through dramatized dialogues filmed on location throughout Germany.

The film sequences, capturing the romance of the German countryside and introducing the German language in true-to-life situations, are followed by instruction and reviews of grammar and syntax. The television presentations are supplemented by long-playing records for home practice.

THE RISE OF THE AMERICAN NATION II

3 Credits/Spring semester
Professor James Shenton



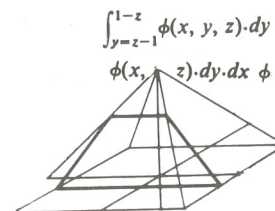
With the spectre of a "divided house" finally banished and the nation immersed in repairing the wounds of civil war, the United States was on the eve of the most dynamic and dramatic hundred years in her history.

The Rise of the American Nation II focuses on the major themes of American development from the post-Civil War era to the present, including the emergence of the United States as a world power after World War I, the continuing transportation and communications revolution and the advent of a thermonuclear age. Special emphasis is placed on the struggle of black Americans for first-class citizenship.

CALCULUS AND ANALYTIC GEOMETRY II

3 Credits/Spring semester
Professor Frank Crippen



For students who have completed the first semester of calculus or are familiar with the fundamentals of differential calculus and their application to algebraic functions, Calculus and Analytic Geometry II offers a more advanced study of differential and integral calculus.

Calculus and Analytic Geometry II focuses on differentiation and integration of algebraic, trigonometric, inverse trigonometric, exponential and logarithmic functions. Second semester topics also include plane areas, volumes, arc lengths and work problems.

HUMANITIES II: THE DISCOURSE OF WESTERN MAN

3 Credits/Spring semester
Professors Bernard F. Huppé,
Aldo S. Bernardo, Christian P. Gruber

The Renaissance signaled the intellectual and scientific dislocation of the prevailing belief in an Earth-centered universe. Medieval man's dependence on faith was eclipsed by a heightened self-consciousness and reliance on reason that characterized the Renaissance and gradually evolved into the Existential glorification of individual worth.

Humanities II traces the development of modern Western thought by sampling representative art, music and literature from the 17th century through the present. Emphasis is placed on the works of major writers including Shakespeare, Goethe, Voltaire, Dostoevsky, Faulkner and Camus.

THE HISTORY OF LATIN AMERICA II

2 Credits/Spring semester

As the peoples of Latin America aspire toward social change and economic modernization, they are confronted with the staggering obstacles of poverty, illiteracy, economic instability and unresponsive, often ineffective, governments.

The History of Latin America II traces the tortuous political, social and economic evolution of contemporary Latin America's countries and peoples. The semester highlights the clash of Latin America's cherished heritage of Indian, Iberian and Negro cultures with the values of the super-powers that woo her nations.

MAJOR AMERICAN BOOKS

3 Credits/Spring semester
Professor Harold C. Martin

A survey of American literature, Major American Books explores the works of fifteen major American writers and poets who have illuminated such fundamental concepts as the conflict between reason and passion, the blossoming of idealism in a world of change and the alienation of the individual in an increasingly urbanized, industrialized world.

The course presents literary concepts of the American hero as he responds to challenge, to temptation and to crisis. The student is introduced to the tragic hero in Hawthorne's *The Scarlet Letter*, Thoreau's glorification of transcendental man in *Walden* and Twain's child-hero of *The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn*. Other selected readings include Fitzgerald's *The Great Gatsby*, *The Sun Also Rises* by Hemingway and Wolfe's *Look Homeward, Angel*.

Credit Students

GENERAL INFORMATION

When you enroll in the University of the Air, you will have the opportunity to take credit courses equivalent to some of the courses offered during the first two years of college. There are no prerequisites for spring semester courses. If you did not take the first semester of a course, you may still enroll in the second semester.

University of the Air courses will be televised each week from January 25 through May 17. Written assignments can be completed at home. Throughout the semester, you will be able to consult with a professor assigned to work with you at your local campus. The fourteen campuses offering University of the Air courses are listed in this catalog.

As a credit student, you will be expected to devote as much time to your television courses as any undergraduate attending classes normally spends on his studies. In addition, some campuses include regularly scheduled on-campus meetings as part of the credit requirements for certain University of the Air courses.

Examinations are a part of University of the Air courses. All examinations are administered at the campus where you have enrolled or at other locations nearby. The date, time and location of examinations will be announced early in the semester. At the discretion of the local campus, individual arrangements will be made if you are unable to take an examination at the campus because of illness or disability.

When you complete a course with a passing grade, you will receive credit from the campus at which you are registered. Accumulated credit for University of the Air courses will be accepted toward a degree at that college if and when you apply and are accepted for regular admission.

There is a moderate tuition fee for each course you take, payable to your local campus. A table listing course offerings and tuition fees of the participating campuses is included in this catalog.

There is a specially-designed study guide for every University of the Air course. The study guide describes the general scope of the course, summarizes television lectures, outlines assignments and provides review questions. You will need a study guide for each course you take. The guides cost \$2.00 each and may be ordered by using the Study Guide and Book Order Form enclosed in the catalog.

Every course also has a list of required reading. While these texts are generally available at bookstores and libraries, you may order your books directly from the University of the Air by using the Study Guide and Book Order Form.

HOW TO ENROLL

You can enroll in the University of the Air, order your study guides and, if you choose, purchase your course books by filling out the two forms at the back of this catalog.

1. Decide on the course, or courses, you would like to take for credit (pages 4-6).

2. Select a nearby campus offering the courses that you have chosen and determine the tuition fee for the campus at which you plan to enroll (Campus Course Offerings and Tuition Table on pages 10-11.)

3. Complete the Credit Student Enrollment Form (page 23). *Be sure to fill in all requested data.*

4. Enclose a check for tuition, made out to the campus at which you plan to enroll, with the Credit Student Enrollment Form and mail it to the campus you have selected (campus addresses are listed on pages 10-11).

5. Note the study guides that you will need and check the appropriate boxes on the Study Guide and Book Order Form (page 21).

6. Check the books required for your course (pages 14-15). If you choose to order books through the University of the Air, complete the Study Guide and Book Order Form using the table on page 21 to determine book set prices and sales tax.

Your Credit Student Enrollment Form must be postmarked no later than midnight, Friday, January 31, in order to meet the deadline for credit enrollment in the spring semester.

Although you can purchase study guides and books at any time during the semester, order these course materials early as delivery takes 7-10 days.

PRE-ENROLLMENT COUNSELING

Each campus University of the Air office will provide pre-enrollment counseling to prospective credit students. If you are planning to enroll in a community college and you live outside the county where the campus is located, or if you are not a New York State resident, check with your local campus for special tuition regulations. If you are a matriculated student at the State University or the City University, consult your local University of the Air campus to determine your eligibility for tuition exemption or reduction privileges. When you enroll, you will be notified of regulations concerning tuition refunds and withdrawal from courses.

If you have any questions about enrollment procedures, courses or local campus regulations, do not hesitate to contact your nearest University of the Air campus (campus telephone numbers are listed on pages 16-17).

NOTE: Queens College is offering special non-credit enrollment to viewers who do not wish to earn college credit but would like to participate fully in one or more University of the Air courses. A flat fee of \$18.00 per course (not including the cost of study guides and books) entitles you to corrected study assignments, access to course professors and counselors, participation in on-campus study sessions and the prerogative of taking course examinations and having them corrected. Non-credit students can order study guides and books by using the form on page 21.

Telecast Schedule Spring Semester, 1969

University of the Air courses are broadcast by the six independent educational television stations in New York State that are interconnected by the New York Network. With the exception of WNDT (Channel 13, New York City), all these stations broadcast on an ultra-high frequency (UHF) channel. In addition, many viewers can receive these stations on their local cable antenna system. As of April, 1964, all television sets are, by law, capable of receiving UHF channels. If your set was manufactured before 1964 and you do not subscribe to cable television, you will need a UHF converter to receive University of the Air courses outside the New York City metropolitan area. These converters are reasonable in cost, readily available and easily installed.

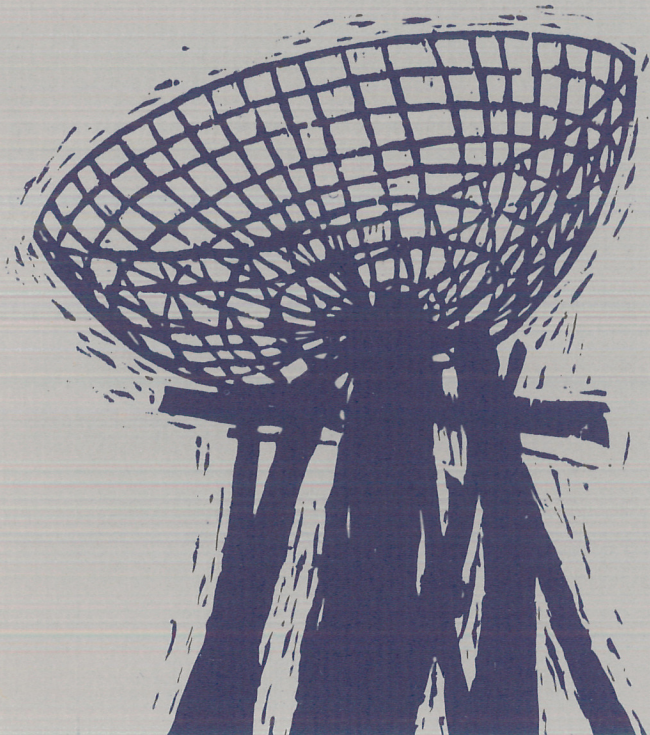

COURSE DESCRIPTION

"Eye on the Universe" is an undergraduate college course in descriptive astronomy. The course develops a general description of the celestial universe—a thorough account of our solar system, the nature of stars as individuals and as groups, the Milky Way, galaxies beyond, and unanswered problems at the frontiers of modern astronomy. The student who carefully completes each lesson will develop an understanding of the universe in which he lives. He will appreciate the relative sizes of celestial bodies, the distances between them, their mathematically predictable motions, and the wealth of known facts about their individual natures.

The course consists of 43 half-hour television lessons. It is taught by Dr. Harry Edward Crull, Planetarium Director and Professor of Astronomy, State University of New York at Albany. "Eye on the Universe" offers three hours of college credit to everyone enrolled for credit who completes the course successfully.

ENROLLMENT

Credit: Enrollment for credit is open to secondary school students, college students, and all adults who feel that they can perform satisfactorily on the rigorous mid-term and final examinations. Elementary and secondary school teachers who wish to take this course for "in-service credit" must obtain prior approval of their superintendents or local Boards of Education. To enroll for credit, simply fill out the attached Enrollment Form and return it with your check or money order to THE STATE UNIVERSITY COLLEGE in your area. (STATE UNIVERSITY COLLEGES offering credit for this course are listed on the reverse side of this folder.) When your application has been accepted, you will receive a syllabus containing a synopsis of each lesson, instructions for studying via television, titles of required texts and a bibliography. You will also receive a set of instructions for taking examinations and obtaining credit at the college in which you enroll.

Non-Credit: Persons who wish to follow these television lessons without taking this course for credit may enroll as non-credit students. Enrollment for non-credit is open to any person

who wishes to preview a college-level course or deepen his current knowledge of a vitally important subject.

Scotia Board Weighs Water Dist. Needs

The same matter which took up most of the discussion time during Glenville's town board meeting last night also took a prime position at the Scotia board of trustees meeting.

A proposed water district, which would be contiguous to the Glen Oaks area of Glenville but would use water from Scotia's system, was explained by Kenneth T. Gibbons, representing Stanley Szymczak, owner of the 35-acre site, at both sessions.

But at the Scotia meeting, Gibbons asked for "something in writing" indicating Scotia's intention of supplying water to the new district, which is not within the village.

Richard A. Best, village clerk, was directed by the board of trustees to write a letter to the town board explaining the village's compliance with Szymczak's proposition.

Maps—showing routes for a proposed drainage line from the Sacandaga road-Toll street intersection, the scene of severe flooding during heavy rains—have been prepared and the village is now in the process of obtaining easements for the

to the village for off-street parking on Third street was accepted by the board during last night's session.

Although a cost estimate for the work has not yet been determined, the trustees agreed to review the budget in an attempt to provide funds for the work and directed the village engineer to prepare plans for the project.

Trustee Alfred J. Lussier, in thanking St. Andrew's, said "it's a wonderful gesture... a wonderful opportunity."

Another offer — to purchase in rem lots, 19, 21 and 23 Wilmarth street for \$125 — by George Malizia, 14 Concord street, was rejected by the board, which felt the land was worth more.

In other matters, the board authorized Otto Lehman and Robert J. Mahoney to attend sewage treatment plant operators' courses next month.

A public hearing on proposed amendments to the village traffic ordinance will be held at 8 p.m. Oct. 18.

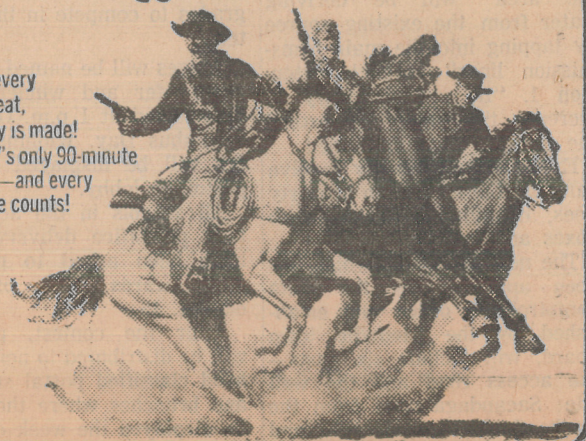

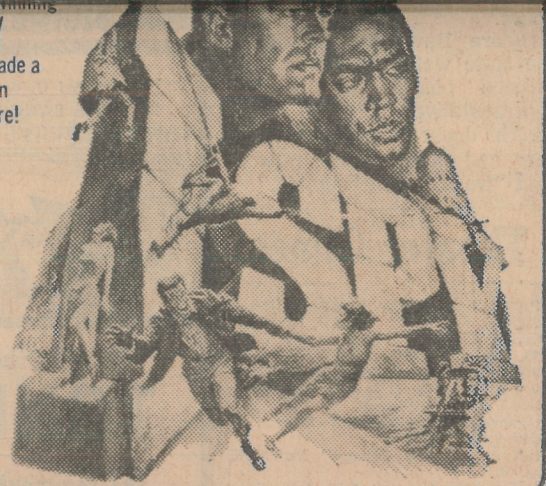

COURSE DESCRIPTION

"The History of Latin America II" is an undergraduate college course that traces the political, economic, social and cultural evolution of the peoples and nations of Latin America.
