# Prochilo Sweeps Presidency By Wide Margin; Gains Office By Two-Thirds Of Votes Cast

## Two-Thirds Vote Appoint Editors Makes Eade VP; To Publications Maguire Secretary For Next Year

### Substantial Margins Registered In Elections

Anthony Prochilo was elected President of the 1949-1950 Student Association in the first distribution. He defeated his only opponent, Harold Vaughn, by receiving over two-thirds of the votes cast. Last year's Secretary, Mary Eade, will continue to be active in Student Association affairs in her new position as Vice-President. Miss Eade won her campaign against Evelyn Wolfe by a margin of 369 votes.

Maguire Edges Out Borys The race for the office of Secretary was closer. Mary Maguire gained the lead on the first distribution and kept it until she edged out her closest competitor, Mary Borys, on the fourth distribution. The race for this office was so close that Miss Maguire could not reach the quota of 45.751, and was therefore elected by elimination.

Another close election was that for Grand Marshal. Florence Kline was the victor in this election, polling 449 votes to the 403 received by Renee Harris.

Koch Elected Songleader Audrey Koch has been re-elected by the Association to serve as its Songleader. Miss Koch won her second term by receiving a total of 429 votes on the fifth distribution.

Name Finance Board Members Election of the new members of Student Board of Finance was complicated by the fact that only two Juniors were among the candidates. Since the Board must have two Juniors, Beverly Kulkkin and Theodore Bayer, both class of '50, were automatically elected. Senior members of the Board will be Bert Jablon, Philip Malofsky, John Morley, and Lloyd Taylor.

Moving-Up Day Schedule Student Council will sponsor an afternoon dance in the Commons from 2:00 to 5:30 p. m. Moving-Up Day skits will be presented by the rivalry classes in the auditorium, with the Sophomore presentation to begin at 6:45 p. m. Immediately following the skits, all classes will form in front of Draper for the Moving-Up Day sing. In case of rain, the sing will be held in the gymnasium. Awarding of the rivalry cup will climax events, and the Seniors will conclude ceremonies by marching away to the tune of "Great Fires."
