### Arena Theater Cites Audition

The State College Arena Summer Theatre will present its tenth season of plays this summer. Participation in Arena is open to all qualified and interested students, particularly for those enrolled in the credit college credit courses in Arena Theatre. 

Station WPTZ Tuned Off Air By Rockefeller

Governor Rockefeller vetoed a bill on Tuesday that would have allowed the erection of a television tower for TV Station WPTZ of Plattsburgh on public lands at the summit of Whiteface.

Response From State

The response the Governor received from President Hamilton, Dr. Paul Lemon, Chairman of the Biology Department, Dr. Vincent Schaeffer, head of the Weather Control Project, and the letters from the members of the Biology Club stating their objections against the tower placement influenced the Governor's decision.

Dr. Paul Lemon urged the Governor to veto the Senate Bill as "an installation of a TV transmitter would prevent the State University from carrying out fundamental research on the nature and possible control of weather."

Whiteface Mountain is the last major mountain in the East that is readily available for such research by a University. It is anticipated that millions will be channeled through State University by national and other governmental agencies concerned with atmospheric science research. The tower will contaminate the entire atmosphere of the mountain electrically and chemically, thus preventing the use of the site.

The Governor's Assembly measures of objection to the bill contained many of the points expressed by Dr. Lemon.

Roy To Talk On Geology

Dr. Chalmers J. Roy, Chairman of the American Geological Institute Educational Committee, will speak to the students of Albany State on Monday, May 1, at 1 p.m. in Draper 319. Dr. Roy, speaking under the auspices of the American Geological Institute Visiting Scientist Program, will speak on Geological Sciences in General Education.

Dr. Roy was born in Oranogo, Missouri on April 2, 1907, and did his undergraduate work at the University of Missouri. In 1933, Dr. Roy received his Ph.D. from Harvard. During this time he served as an instructor of geology. In 1936 Dr. Roy was an instructor of geology at Louisiana State University, and in 1938, he was appointed to the position of assistant professor. An appointment to the position of associate professor followed in 1941. Since 1948, Dr. Roy has been serving as professor of geology and department head at the Iowa State College.

Dr. Roy has also taken part in many geological surveys. In 1929, he was part of a team which searched for petroleum in Alberta, Alberta, from 1937 to 1940. Dr. Roy served in the capacity of research consultant for the Louisiana Geological Survey. He is presently the consulting geologist for a number of oil concerns in Louisiana.

Dr. Roy, a member of Phi Beta Kappa, is the author of a laboratory manual entitled Physical and Historical Geology, which was printed in 1950.

I cannot believe that there are students who would not avail themselves of the Library during term paper sessions, exams or times just to get away from a noisy dormitory room. Another argument against having the Library open Friday and Sunday is: who would staff the Library during the extra hours? Our librarians are certainly entitled to time off on weekends, but can't student teacher librarians be used? What about just having one floor open? True, arguments there are plenty of other libraries available, use the State Ed. Library. We'd love to except it and even our library is closed on Sunday. If State is an institution to promote learning, and facilitate study and research, not hinder it.

### Just The Facts


Anyone and everyone who goes around and underlines State as a good college is invited to leave or get his facts straight. It is filled of people who say State is only a state supported college and therefore can't compare with the Ivy League colleges. It is true, we can't compare—we are much BETTER. Of the full-time faculty, State has 94.4 percent holding Ph.D. and Masters degrees. Of the part-time faculty, 75 percent have at least a Masters and Doctors degree. We do not suffer from lack of qualified personnel. The academic standing of students enrolled at the College places them in the ninety-fifth percentile nationally according to admissions tests. The Class of 1965 received the highest median and national percentile scores on the Selective College Admissions Test and Good Reading Comprehension Test of all the classes at this College since these pre-admission tests were begun in 1954. Comparison is seen here at State and anyone who graduates from here has a great deal to offer school systems and students. The community esteem of the College is high. The college lectures, dramatic and musical performances are well supported. During the summer, the Arena Theatre has a splendid event each and student attendance alone does not count the packed audience. From a recent questionnaire sent to 225 schools employing Albany graduates, it was determined that 8 percent of the schools rated State above average, none rated State below average.

State faculty and students are all above average and everyone who is associated with State should take pride in the qualifications it takes to be a part of this team. It's about time for us all to take pride in our school, our faculty and ourselves.



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


