# C-U DAY, HOMECOMING A WEEKEND SPECTACULAR

Have you ever seen the nuclear accelerator? Do you even know what or where it is?

Well, now is your chance. The nuclear accelerator, along with many other facilities, will be open for tours and explanations as part of Community-University Day this Saturday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Although its primary goal is to encourage people from the surrounding community to visit and get a feeling for the campus, C-U Day's promise is "something for everyone," and that by no means excludes students, faculty, and alumni.

As a matter of fact, several campus buildings which are normally off-limits will be open, including the steam plant, the motor pool, and the maintenance shops. In addition, you will be able to visit areas of the campus and see aspects of university programs which you might not have had a chance to experience before. Tours will be conducted in the Computing Center, Performing Arts Center, Fine Arts Building, Library, and greenhouse, among others. Off-campus visitors will be able to take bus tours around the perimeter road and guided walking tours of the podium. A wealth of special presentations are scheduled throughout the day, with schools and departments sponsoring films, lectures, displays, and demonstrations.

Both the bus and walking tours will be led by a corps of student volunteers recruited and supervised by seniors Aralynn Abare and Ron Daniel. Other students under their direction will man information booths around the campus. Student and alumni efforts to make the day a success will also be evident in the assistance with school and department presentations and in the planning and coordination of the Homecoming Weekend events which coincide with C-U Day.

Massive publicity efforts have been underway for weeks, aimed at saturating the community with posters, flyers, radio, television, and newspaper promotions. Both the *Albany Times-Union* and the *Knickerbocker News/Union Star* have donated a page of space for the C-U Day program, and the *Albany Student Press* will devote two pages to the day's schedule of events on Friday. Other notices will appear in many of the area's weekly newspapers.

C-U Day television "spots" were aired last week on WTEN's "Dialing for Dollars" and "Town and Country" and on WRGB's arts program with Bill Fortune. Appearances are slated today on WAST's "Coffee Break" and Wednesday on WRGB's "Pick-A-Show." WGY's radio programs with Sandy Grear today and Steve Fitz this evening will feature C-U Day. In addition, all local radio and television stations, including WSUA, have received copy and/or audio-visual materials, such as tapes and slides, to use as public service announcements about the day.

Nothing can beat personal enthusiasm and individual initiative for promoting the day, however. So come, bring your friends, neighbors, parents, relatives, everyone. It should be a spectacular weekend.



# Friday to Sunday Events Offer Homecoming Variety

The general public won't be on campus until Saturday, but for students and alumni, Homecoming Weekend action begins on Friday at noon with a folk gathering in back of the Campus Center.

At night a wine and cheese reception sponsored by the Alumni Association will be held in the Art Gallery from 7 to 9:30. Doors open at 9 for a University Concert Board concert in the Gym featuring Kris Kristofferson and Rita Coolidge. A pizza party follows, 10 p.m.-2 a.m., in the CC Cafeteria.

"Nostalgia" is the theme of the annual Homecoming Parade on Saturday at 1 p.m. Judging of the floats will begin at noon. Cross-country and football action surround the parade and events of Community-University Day will be 10 a.m.-4 p.m.

An Alumni Tent will open on the CC Mall at 11 a.m. to dispense food, beverages, music, and hospitality until after the football game. An Alumni Reception Center will operate in the Patroon Lounge from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The evening's entertainment will be provided by a Cabaret in the CC Ballroom from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m. Music will be supplied by the Going Concerns Trio. There will be a cash bar; food will be free.

Sunday's events include a picnic and hayride at the Mohawk Campus, 2-5 p.m., at no charge. A coffee house in the CC Cafeteria from 8-11 p.m. that night will feature entertainment by Claudine and Ron. It is sponsored by Campus Center Governing Board.

### Harriers, Gridders Face Tough Foes

A football game with Brockport and the State University of New York Athletic Conference (SUNYAC) cross-country championships highlight sports action on Community-University Day/Homecoming Saturday.

Albany will be defending its 1971 championship in the SUNYAC meet and is rated a strong contender to do so successfully. Coach Bob Munsey's harriers won nine of their first 10 dual meets to assure the sport's 11th consecutive winning season since its beginning in 1962. Munsey already has called this team "the best we've ever had at Albany."

The race will begin at 11 a.m. near the baseball fields on the southeast corner of campus. Joining Albany at the starting line will be conference members Buffalo State, Cortland, Geneseo, Fredonia, Brockport, Plattsburgh, Potsdam, Oswego, Oneonta, and New Paltz.

At 2 p.m., coach Bob Ford's gridders will host their second four-year varsity opponent of the season. They previously defeated RIT, 28-7. This will be the first meeting of Albany and Brockport, a fellow SUNY school which has had an established football program for some years.

Albany had exhibited a rock-ribbed defense and strong running attack going into Saturday's battle of unbeatens with Hudson Valley. At least four men have displayed strong running abilities: Carvin Payne, Lonnie Davis, Marvin Perry, and McCoy Allister. John Bertuzzi has ably directed the triple-option offense.

The defense has been outstanding. It allowed only 17 points in the last six games (dating back to last season), prior to Hudson Valley. Additionally, it helped cause 21 opposition turnovers by interceping 13 passes and recovering eight fumbles.


WALKING TOURS: all day - leaving from main entrance in front of the Administration Building. These tours will leave every 15 minutes and will take approximately one hour.
