In an attempt to reinterpret nine classic eighteenth and nine-teenth century English novels, Dr. Robert A. Donovan, professor of English at State University at Albany, has recently written The Shaping Vision:

Imagination in the English Novel from Defoe to Dickens, which will be published by the Cornell University Press on May 13.

Dr. Donovan, in his treatment of novels by Defor, Richardson, Fielding, Sterne, Smollett, Austen, Scott, Thackeray, and Dickens, has approached the subject with a new critical perspective. His underlying assumption is that these novels are to be studied as imaginative constructs, that the novelist gives form to his subject matter in the very act of imagining it. Two chapters of the book have already been published; the chapter on Dickens was printed in A Journal of Literary History in 1962, and the chapter on Richardson appeared in Studies in English Literature in 1963.

The research for The Shaping Vision, which was supported by the Research Foundation of State University of New York, took five years to complete. Dr. Donovan has recently received another grant from the Foundation to undertake a study of the image of the hero in Victorian literature.

He received Ph.B. and M.A. degrees from the University of Chicago and the Ph.D. degree from Washington University in St. Louis. Before coming to the University in 1962, he taught at Cornell.

Dr. Donovan has published numerous articles and reviews in periodicals across the country. During the past eight years, he has been

a regular contributor to <u>Victorian Bibliography</u>. He has served as editor ial consultant to <u>Victorian Studies</u> and the Cornell University Press.

He resides in Slingerlands with his wife, Hope, and his three children.

4,248 selected mathematics students in 381 schools in Upstate

New York were among more than 250 thousand in the United States and

Canada who participated in the 1966 Mathematics Contest sponsored Nationally by the Mathematical Association of America and the Society of Actuaries.

Upstate headquarters for the contest are at the State University at Albany. Nura D. Turner, associate professor of mathematics is contest director. (Upstate sponsors of the contest are listed on page 4 of the enclosed summary report).

Highest single score in the contest was earned by Richard W. Fancher, of Sidney High School; second by William Braden, Linton High School; third Linda Lippett, Brighton High School, Rochester. These students were awarded \$100. cash awards as were 13 others who scored in the top one percent. (See page 6).

Rosalie Valvo, Guilderland Central, highest ranking girl in the Capital area, won a \$25. cash award and a weekend at the College of St. Rose.

Awards were made to ranking students in Broome and Onondaga counties. (See page 9).

Highest team scores went to Brighton High School, Rochester; Irondequoit High School, Rochester and Linton High School, Schenectady. (Team rankings appear on page 11 of the Report).

Over 300 students representing colleges and universities throughout New York State will gather in Albany on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday of this week to hold the Annual New York State Intercollegiate Legislative Assembly. Sponsored by the New York State Debate Association, the host for this year's assembly is the Debate Council at State University of New York at Albany. All sessions will be held in the DeWitt Clinton Hotel.

Following the pattern of the New York State Legislature, the group will be divided into two parties. Committee hearings will be held to discuss four major subjects on Thursday afternoon. The groups will be concerned with narcotics, family planning, water pollution, and divorce.

In the main assembly on Friday evening, nominations for committee offices, speaker and clerk, will be held. Committee hearings will continue on Friday morning with an assembly session scheduled for 2 p.m. at which time elections will be held and bills introduced. The annual banquet will be held at 5:30 in the Crystal Room at which time Percy Sutton will be guest speaker. Assemblyman Sutton will be named Assemblyman of the Year by the student group.

Following party caucuses in the evening the party will reconvene Saturday morning to take action on the bills.

The Sixth International Conference on Condensation Nuclei will be held at the State University at Albany and Pennsylvania State University, May 9 - 12.

Condensation nuclei are tiny solid or liquid particles normally found in the atmosphere. They are so small, a microscope is necessary to see them. Industrial smoke and gasses, sea salt particles, and certain pollen and spores are sources of these nuclei which serve as the center on which atmospheric water vapor can condense to form tiny cloud droplets. Without them there would be no clouds, and thus no precipitation. One measure of air pollution is the number of condensation nuclei in the air. Research reports being presented will deal with pollution and weather modification.

Atmospheric scientists from twelve countries will gather here May 9, 10, for the first four sessions after which the group will go to University Park, Pa., for the second half of the conference.

While in Albany, the meetings will be held in the Health Department building on Holland Avenue to take advantage of the special facilities available. One session will be held at the Research laboratory of the General Electric Company in Schenectady.

During their visit the world scientists will be greeted by Governor Rockefeller at their opening session Monday morning, and will be guests of the University at dinner on its new campus on Tuesday evening.

Among the 57 researchers are six young men who are being brought here by funds provided by the National Science Foundation.

Held every 2 1/2 - 3 years, the conferences are designed to bring together the leading thinkers in the field of atmospheric science and weather modification.

Earl G. Droessler was appointed vice president for research at the State University of New York at Albany by the State University Board of Trustees at its meeting yesterday. Dr. Droessler will plan and coordinate the development of research at the Albany University. Graduate study and research programs at the University are scheduled to increase ten-fold in the present decade according to the current State University master plan. The new vice president will join the University staff in August.

Dr. Droessler is currently head of the Atmospheric Sciences Section at the National Science Foundation, a position he has held since 1958. For six years prior to that he served as deputy head of the office of research, assistant secretary of defense and executive director, committee on geophysics and geography, research and development board.

The new vice president has been a Fulbright fellow at the University of Oslo and a visiting research fellow in the Radiophysics Laboratory, of the Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research Organization, Sydney, Australia. He was formerly head of the meteorology program and geophysics section in the Office of Naval Research (ONR was a pioneer in awarding government support for University research programs).

Among his activities, Dr. Droessler has been: member, U.S.

National Committee for the International Geophysical Year, National Academy of Sciences, 1955-64; member, Governing Council, American Meteorological Society, 1960-62; member, Executive Committee, American Geophysical (more)

Union, 1957-63; and chairman, Incentive Awards Committee, National Science Foundation, 1959-63.

A frequent contributor to scientific journals, Dr. Droessler is author of sections in several encyclopedic resources. He holds a B.A. and an honorary Ph.D from Loras College and has done graduate work in the Navy Post Graduate School and at the University of Oslo.

Dr. Droessler sees his role in the University as one of encouraging the faculty to conduct research. He will assist in planning and coordinating efforts as well as locating sources of support. He expects the facilities and staff of the new university will lend themselves readily to the extension of research in all fields of study, using the natural, industrial, and economic resources in the capital area.

Dr. Droessler's appointment brings to three the number of posts established to deal specifically with major University concerns. Other posts deal with academic affairs and student affairs.

Dr. Droessler was born in Dubuque, Iowa and received his early education there. He is married to the former Carol Stoops and is the father of four daughters and a son.

Dr. Curtis Hemenway, chairman of the department of astronomy and space sciences at State University of New York at Albany, will present a paper, "Rocket And Balloon Borne Exposure Experiments of Unprotected Microorganisms in Space," at the Seventh Annual Space Science Symposium in Vienna, Austria, May 11-17. He will also apeak on, "High Altitude Balloon Top Collections of Cosmic Dust".

These annual symposia are held by the Committee on Space Research of the International Council of Scientific Unions and are attended by an international corps of science writers for periodicals and other news media in the United States and Europe.

Dr. Hemenway, who became director of the Dudley Observatory in 1956, has served as consultant to the Atomic Energy Commission, as a research fellow at Harvard Observatory and as a consultant to the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory.

He handled the first research team to recover micrometeorites with the Aeorbee-Hi rocket at White Sands, New Mexico, and has worked with the Meteoroligical Institute of Stockholm in sampling noctilucent clouds in northern Sweden.

More recently he has been involved with experiments conducted with space programs conducted by NASA. Equipment developed by Observatory and University personnel was involved in the Gemini 8 project and will be on the Gemini 9 being launched next week.

One of the papers being read describes the results of survival studies of terrestrial microorganisms exposed directly to the space environment. The purpose of this experiment is to determine the effect

of space exposure on living organisms. Working on this experiment was

John Hotchin and Peter Lorenz of the Observatory staff and Aletha

Markusen, assistant professor of science at the Albany University.

Another paper dealing with the collection of cosmic dust will be read. In this project, closely related to the Gemini experiments, the collected material is analyzed to determine its composition. Henry Chessin, professor of physics at SUA, participated in the analysis using x-ray techniques designed to discover if the material has a crystalline structure.

The School of Social Welfare, State University of New York at Albany, has been awarded a \$28,432 grant from the Children's Bureau of the United States Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. The School, which admitted its first class in September 1965, received the Child Welfare Training grant under a new policy of HEW Children's Bureau to assist new schools, prior to establishment on full schedule or completion of accreditation.

The funds will be distributed between a staff member designated as a field instructor and four traineeships. Four student stipends of \$2,100 each are included in the grant. A training unit will be established in two county public welfare offices, in each of which two students will be placed under the supervision of the Instructor employed under this grant. The use of public welfare offices in this way is evidence of close cooperation between the state and county public welfare offices, and the School of Social Welfare.

The School of Social Welfare was established by the Board of Trustees of State University of New York in response to a recognized need to provide professional social work personnel for state and local public and private agencies. It serves the capital district area and the upper Hudson valley region, which extends approximately seventy-five miles south from Albany.

The current twenty-seven first year students are receiving field instruction in sixteen agencies in the capital district and upper Hudson Valley area. The child welfare field instruction settings include six

public and private institutions serving children with specialized needs (emotional, behavioral disorders, delinquents, and pre-delinquents), two guidance clinics, one family service agency which operates an adoption program, one school-social work setting, and one public welfare agency.

The HEW grant will enable the School of Social Welfare to establish a field instruction unit in public child welfare by utilizing several small local welfare agencies as field instruction centers. Next September, the School of Social Welfare will admit its second class, which will consist of 35 full-time students.

Antonio Buero Vallejo, Spain's most outstanding living dramatist, will spend two days at State University of New York at Albany,
May 18-19, as part of his tour of the United States as a participant in
the International Visitors Program. In this visitors program, which is
sponsored by the Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs of the United
States Department of State. Buero Vallejo has been touring the country
from March 25 and will be in the country until May 23.

While at the University, he will attend a tea in the Faculty
Dining Room, May 18, at 3 p.m., and that evening, at 8 p.m. he will give
a formal lecture on "The Problem of Tragedy," in Draper Hall 349. Mr.
Buero's lectures will be given in Spanish because his knowledge of English
is very limited. Accompanying him on his visit to the University, will
be Bernard Packer, a Department of State escort-interpreter.

Mr. Buero will attend a luncheon with members of the Art and Drama department on May 19. The engagement will be devoted to informal talks on Velasquez and post-war Spanish Theatre. At 2 p.m., he will del deliver a lecture on "Valle-Inclan: The Dramatist Point of View," in Alden Dining Room.

Mr. Buero painted as a living for several years. He began to write for the theatre in 1946. Among his most famous plays are "Hoy es fiesta," "Un sonador para un pueblo," and "El Concierto de Sah Ovidio." Several of his plays have been awarded the National Theatre Prize and other major awards for drama.

Dr. Arthur A. Ekirch, Professor of history at State University of New York at Albany, has recently had his newest book, <u>Ideas</u>, <u>Ideals</u>, and <u>American Diplomacy</u>, published by Appleton, Century, and Crofts. The professor, who is considered one of the leading scholars in the field of American intellectual history, has previously written five other books in this field.

In this 220-page work, he describes how contemporary ideas have influenced American foreign policy and how foreign policy has influenced ideas. In treating the role of ideas and ideologies in American foreign policy, this concise volumne offers a critical evaluation of diplomatic history from 1776 to the present day.

Dr. Ekirch states early in the book: "Foreign policy, like domestic policy, has to be considered in relation to a nation's history and culture. From its establishment as a free and independent nation, through its rise to a position of primacy in the world, the development of the United States has been affected by internationalism, peace, and democracy. The book explores each of these streams of thought by discussing the material in a topical and chronological framework.

Dr. Ekirch received his B.A. in history from Dartmouth in 1937. He received his M.A. and Ph.D degrees in American history from Columbia, in 1939 and 1941 respectively. Before coming to State University of New York at Albany in September 1965, he had taught at American University since 1947. In 1953-54, he received a Guggenheim Fellowship.

O. William Perlmutter has been named dean of the College of Arts & Sciences at the State University at Albany beginning in September 1966. He will replace Dean Josiah T. Phinney, first dean of the college, who will return to full time teaching.

Dr. Perlmutter, who has been dean of the College of Fine and Professional Arts at Kent State University, Kent, Chio, has been professor of political science at the University of Santa Clara, California and visiting professor at the University of Minnesota. He served as Academic Director for the Institute of European Studies, and academic vice president at Saint Xavier's College, Chicago, Illinois. He is currently an educational consultant for the office of economic opportunity, and project director, Peace Corps Training Programs in Ecuador and Bolivia. He served for some time as personal adviser to Sargent Shriver when Mr. Shriver served as chairman of the Board of Education in Chicago.

Numerous articles have appeared in several journals.

Dr. Perlmutter's undergraduate work was done in German Area Studies at the University of Wyoming. He holds both M.A. and Ph.D degrees from the University of Chicago.

The College of Arts and Sciences provides a core of liberal studies for undergraduate and graduate students upon which is based work in the six graduate professional schools at the University. Currently offering more than 700 courses, the college has 245 on its teaching faculty.

Miss Wood played the title role of CBS-TV's "Mama" in a weekly live series from 1949 through 1956, then starred in 26 TV films of "Mama" in 1957. During this period she found time for other appearances, which included starring in a TV dramatization of "Skin of Our Teeth" and in a revival of "Charley's Aunt" at New York's City Center.

concurrently with her acting career, Miss Wood has written several books (her latest, title "Arts and Flowers," a delightful commentary on the last 20 years, was published by William Morrow in 1963) and numerous magazine articles. She has also recorded song albums and has made countless appearances for benefits and civic groups. Meantime, she has worked strenously to advance the couse of the arts and the artist, and has been honored by her colleagues for her untiring efforts.

In March, 1964, Miss Wood received the tenth annual Kelcey

Allen award "for unselfish contributions to the American theatre," and in June, 1964, she was given the degree of Doctor of Humane Letters (her third honorary degree) by Hamilton College.

President of the American National Theatre and Academy from 1959, to 1965, Miss Wood is also a vice president of the Episcopal Actors Guild. She serves too on the Advisory Committee of the Arts for the National Cultural Center in Washington, D.C., and in May of 1966 received a citation from the National Council on Arts and Government for her service to the Theatre.

Senator Wayne Morse, outspoken critic of the Administration's Vietnam policy, will speak on "Congress and Vietnam," in Page Hall of State University of New York at Albany, Sunday, May 22, at 6 p.m. Tickets may be obtained by student tax card or \$1.00.

Speaking at the invitation of Forum of Politics, the Democratic Senior Senator from Oregon is expected to discuss reasons for his vehement opposition to American actions in Vietnam. The Senator, who has been in the news a great deal recently as a participant in the Senate Foreign Relations Committee's hearings on Vietnam, recently stated:

"...in my judgment the President of the United States is already losing the people of this country by the millions in connection with this war."

Wayne Morse holds a Ph.B degree from the University of Wisconsin, M.A. and LL.B. degrees from the University of Minnesota, and a J.D. degree from Columbia University.

While studying law at the University of Minnesota, Morse carried a full teaching load. Receiving a teaching fellowship to Columbia after completing law school, he taught there while working on a doctoral dissertation on the American grand jury system. His study has become the standard work on the subject.

In 1931, the future senator became a professor of law and dean of the University of Oregon Law school. During the New Deal, Dean Morse often acted as an arbitrator in labor-management disputes. In 1941, President Roosevelt named him chairman of the National Railroad Emergency Board, and, shortly thereafter, the President appointed him to the National War Labor Board.

Morse was first elected to the United States Senate in 1945, on the Republican party ticket. In October 1952, disillusioned with the prospects for liberalism among the Republicans, he resigned from the party. After a period as an independent, he joined the Democratic Party in 1955. Senator Morse was re-elected, by decisive margins, as a Democrat in 1956 and 1962.

A workshop in "Language for Learning" for primary teachers, reading specialists, and elementary supervisors or administrators from public and non-public schools, will be held at State University of New York at Albany, for three weeks from July 11 to July 29. The course, Psychology 265W, Workshop in Psychology and Language, will be offered for three (3) semester hours of graduate credit.

These credits are applicable to a graduate degree program at the University for students admitted to candidacy in fields for which the course is appropriate. No participant may register for additional courses in the regular summer session, July 5 - August 19. Dr. Morris Eson and Mrs. Doris H. Flinton will be the instructors.

The workshop will consist of lectures on the relation between beginning language instruction and children's cognitive learning, examination of various reading programs, demonstration classes of children at the primary level and preparation by the teachers of materials for children of differing abilities. The workshop will run from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. five days a week.

The aim of the course is to impart a greater appreciation of the English language in its linguistic and cognitive aspects. Participants may use the knowledge gained and materials examined for teaching beginners in reading and language usage, especially for the culturally deprived, for remedial reading, for teaching English as a second language or for teaching illiterate adults. Instruction in the use of new teaching machines will be given.

During the 1966-67 academic year, the services of the instructor will be available for consultation and help to area teachers in implementing what they learned at the workshop.

Applicants for the workshop will be expected to meet the academic and professional standards in effect at the University for admission to graduate study. Also, each participant must have regularly assigned positions for 1966-67 in one of the following fields: primary teaching of reading and language arts, remedial reading, teaching of English as a second language, elementary foreign language teaching or supervision or administration of these fields.

The Department of Educational Psychology of State University of New York at Albany, in conjunction with the State Education Department, will select five graduate trainees for a unique graduate program for specialists in educational research. Beginning in September 1966, the two-year program will include course work, field experience, and an internship in a school-based study. The program will lead to State certification as Director of Educational Research.

The University's program was set up under Title IV of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, from which a total grant of\$1,335,750 was allotted to the State Education Department and ten of the universities in New York.

To qualify for the program, a candidate must have three years' teaching experience. Those admitted to the program will receive free tuition, an annual stipend of \$2,500 plus \$500 per dependent, and additional subsistance allowances depending on their internship placements.

Each candidate will be expected to complete 60 hours of graduate study, approximately 14 of which are to be devoted to fieldwork and internship. The remaining hours are to distributed among the following areas: principles, methods, and designs of educational research (9-15 hours), educational and psychological statistics (9-15 hours), use of computers (3 hours), educational and psychological measurement (9-15 hours), psychology of learning (3-6 hours), and research in Substantive Area (3-12 hours).

The selection of courses will be done under the advisement of Dr. Reuben Rusch, Professor of Educational Psychology. The "Research

in Substantive Area" category allows a candidate to focus his research interests in fields such as curriculum, guidance, administration, special education, and other related areas.

Candidates may apply to enter the doctoral program in educational psychology. Most of the work taken in the Specialist in Educational Research Program will be applicable toward the doctorate. Persons interested in the program should write to Dr. Rusch or Dr. John Rosenbach,

Dr. John Winkelman, a specialist in German lyric poetry from the Middle Ages to modern times, has been appointed chairman of the Department of Germanic and Slavic Languages and Literature at State University of New York at Albany. Dr. Winkelman is currently Professor of German at the University of Waterloo, Waterloo, Ontario, Canada.

He received his B.A. from the College of the City of New York in 1933. In 1938, he received the M.S. degree in Education from City College, with work equally divided between German and education. He was awarded the Ph.D. in German from the University of Michigan in 1952.

Dr. Winkelman has taught most phases of German literature: Enlightenment, Romanticism, Realism, and modern German literature. He has given graduate seminars on Heine, Kafka, and the Novelle. While at the University of Nebraska, from 1953 to 1963, he directed the first year courses and supervised the German language laboratory. At the University of Waterloo, in addition to his teaching duties, Dr. Winkelman was the director of the language laboratory for all departments.

He has published numerous scholarly articles and contributed chapters to two books of literary criticism. His literary articles have dealt primarily with the works of Erich Kaestner. He has also written extensively in pedagogical journals on various phases of language teaching. In 1959, Dr. Winkelman co-edited a cultural reader, Reporter in Deutschland, which was published by Holt, Rinehart & Winston.

He is married and has three children. While he taught at the University of Nebraska, his wife was the Director of Education of the

State University of New York at Albany has received a grant of \$20,181 for a summer Institute for the Teachers of Disadvantaged Youth from the State Education Department. The major objective for the proposed Institute is to provide teachers and supervisory personnel with the specialized knowledge and skills which will help them to work more effectively with disadvantaged youths in their own schools.

The courses offered will be Education and Cultural Deprivation and The Home and Community of the Disadvantaged. There will be no credit offered for either course. The Institute has been specifically structured to meet the needs of teaching of the disadvantaged child in four distinct areas: knowledge concerning the disadvantaged individual himself, his psychological background, his problems, his thought processes, his symbols, play, and other activities; knowledge concerning the disadvantaged's home and neighborhood, his status symbols, roles systems, and other outgrowths of his environment; information concerning curriculum, methodology, and materials particularly effective in teaching the disadvantaged; and experience in working with and observing these disadvantaged youth in their home environment.

The participants in this Institute will be limited to thirty teachers and supervisors (with the maximum of five supervisors). In order to qualify for consideration as a participant in the Institute, a person must be a certified teacher of grades 3-9, have completed at least one year of teaching at one of these grade levels, possess at least a bachelors degree from a recognized institution, and be presently working,

or have definite plans for working during the coming school year, either as a classroom teacher or in a supervisory capacity in a school with classes having substantial numbers of disadvantaged children.

Dr. Gerald W. Snyder, professor of education, State University of New York at Albany, and chairman, social studies department, The Milne School, will direct the Institute.
