
# A Troubled World


Students saw a troubled world. They responded and gave for the hurricane victims of Honduras, and for a black college student seeking equal justice.


#### **Bases Loaded**

Because Milne does not have a girls' track team, several girls ran with the guys during practice, but only Debbie Brothers did well enough to compete in events.


This year Cross Country was overshadowed by student interest in other areas, and hurt by the drop in student body. There was no team this year.






# CHVL champions at last







# **Students Use Their Skills**


