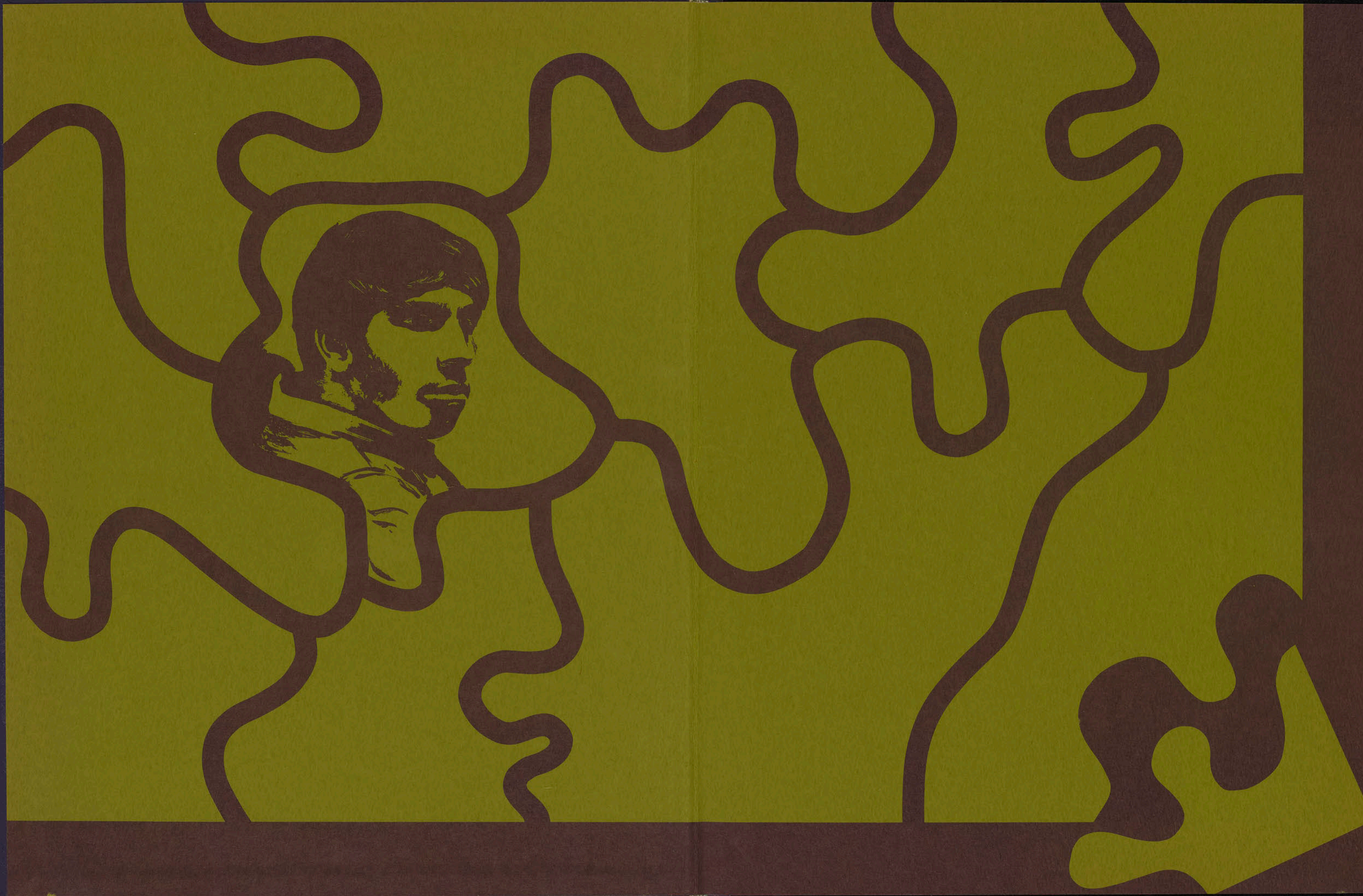

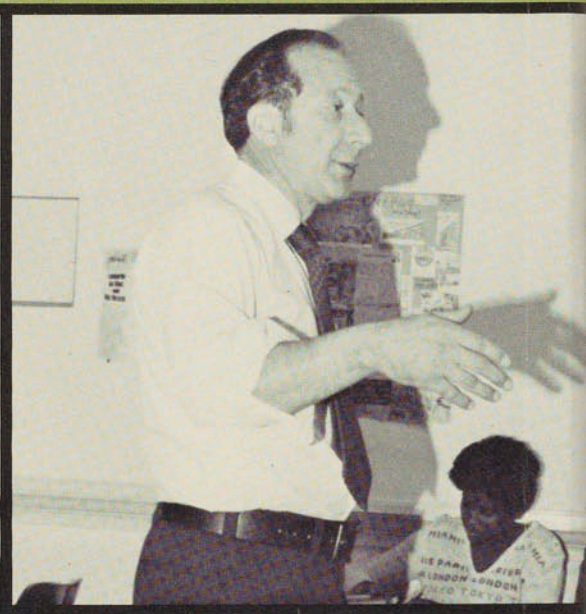

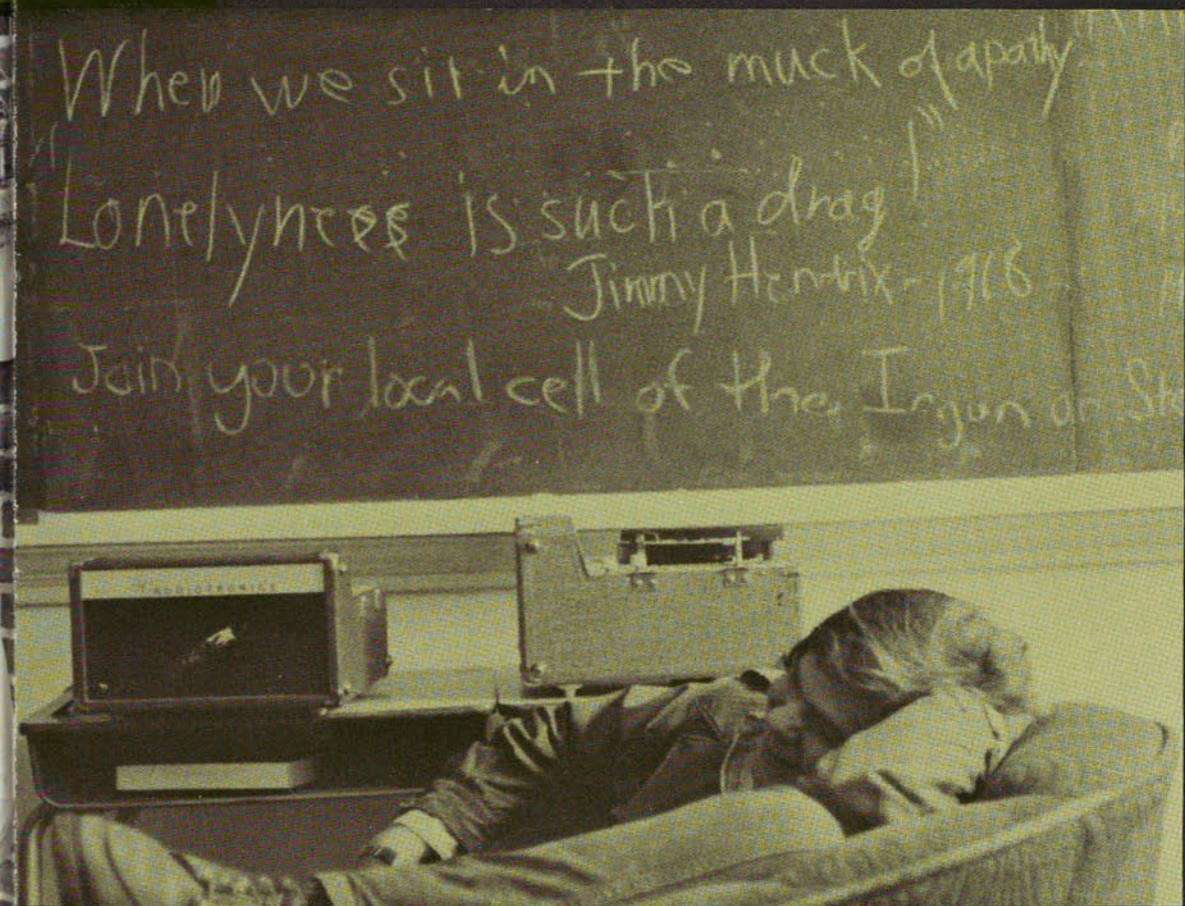


Juniors prepare to graduate early.

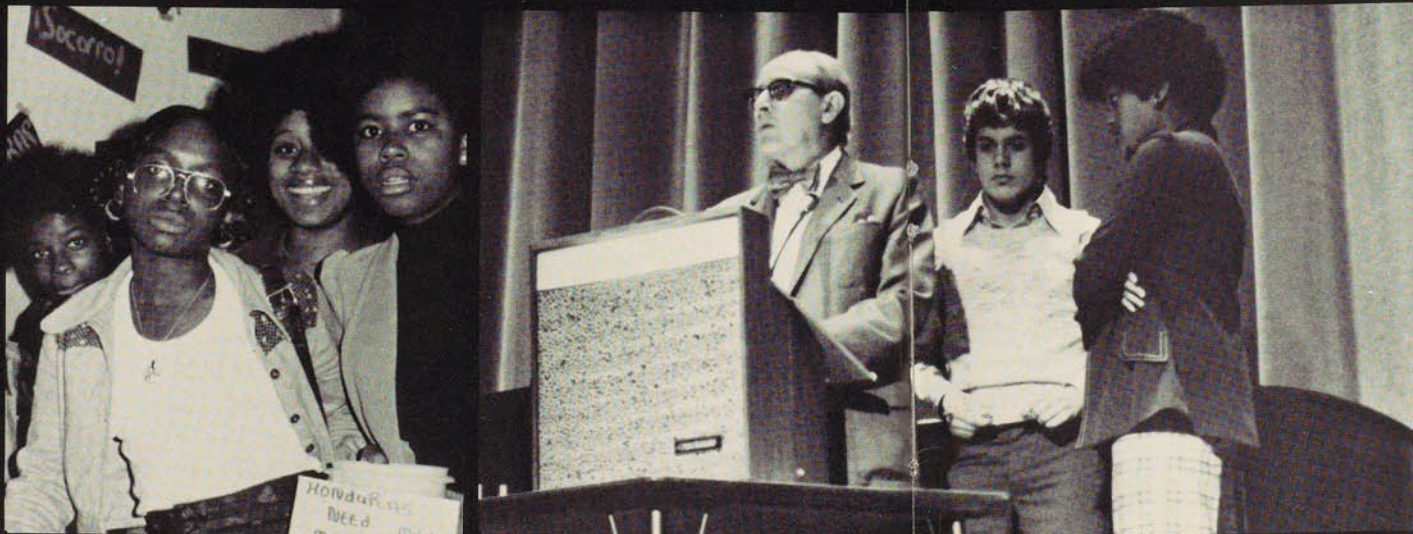
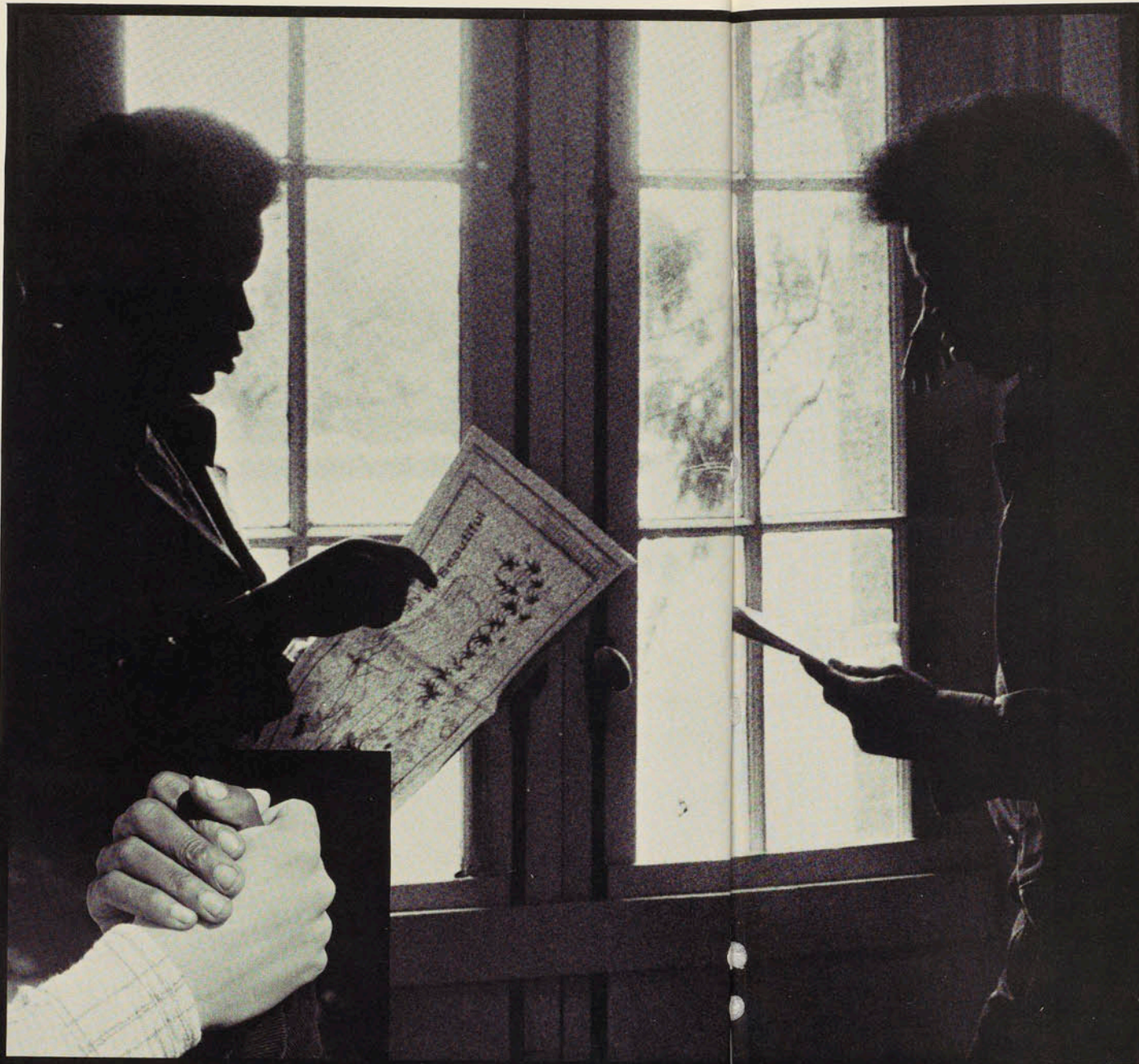


A Troubled World

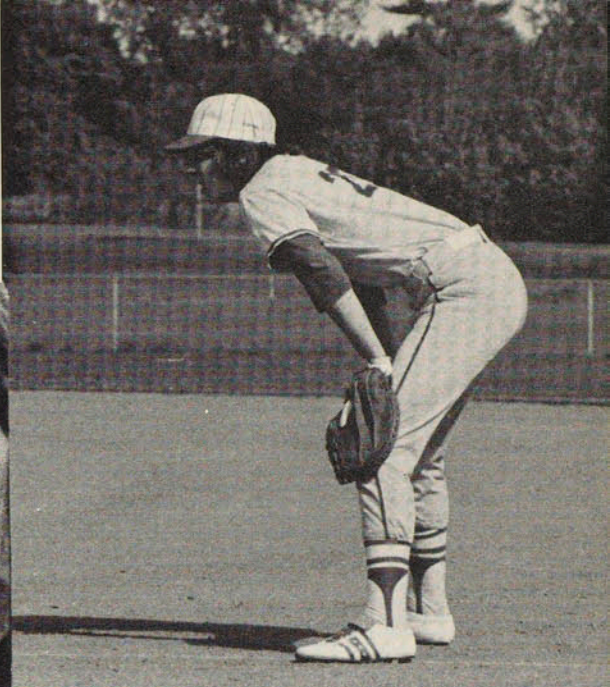

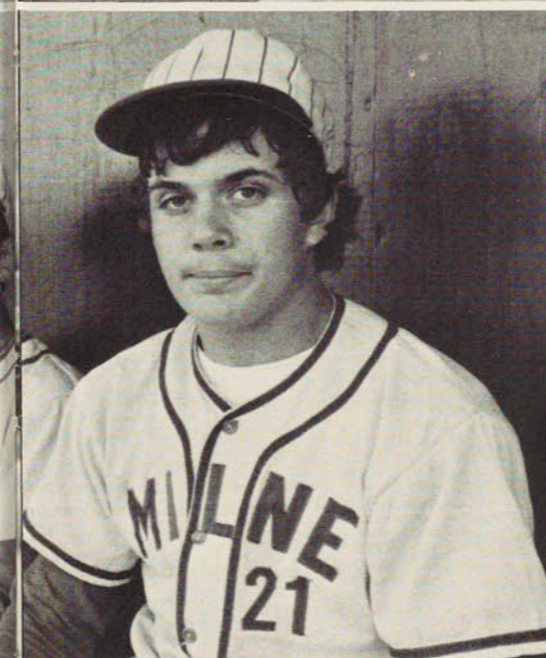
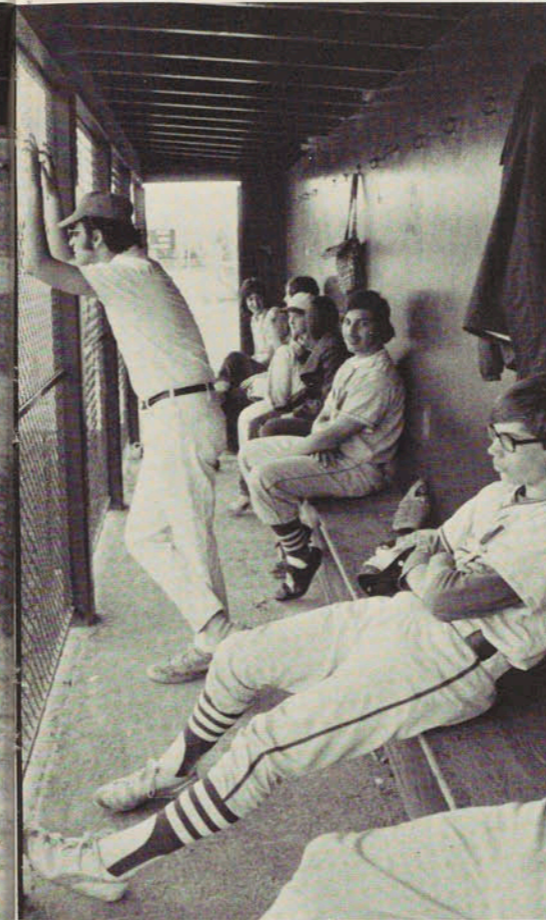
Bases Loaded

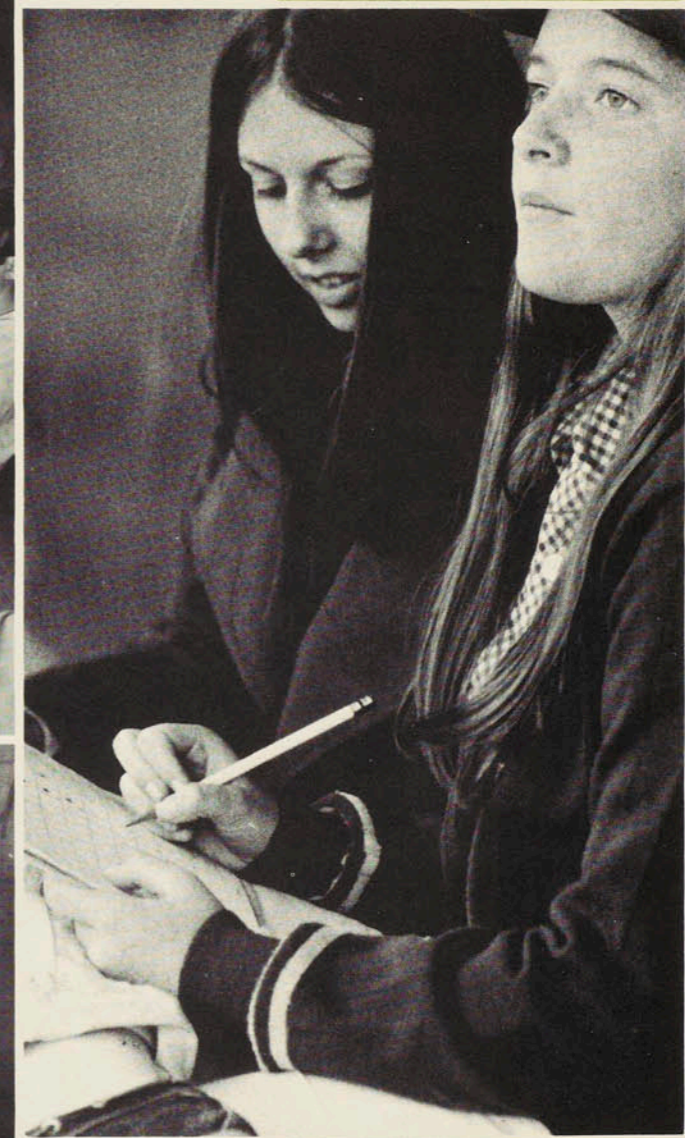
It's hard to tell how the 1975 team will come through. The team will be made up of ace veterans, so the outlook is hopeful.

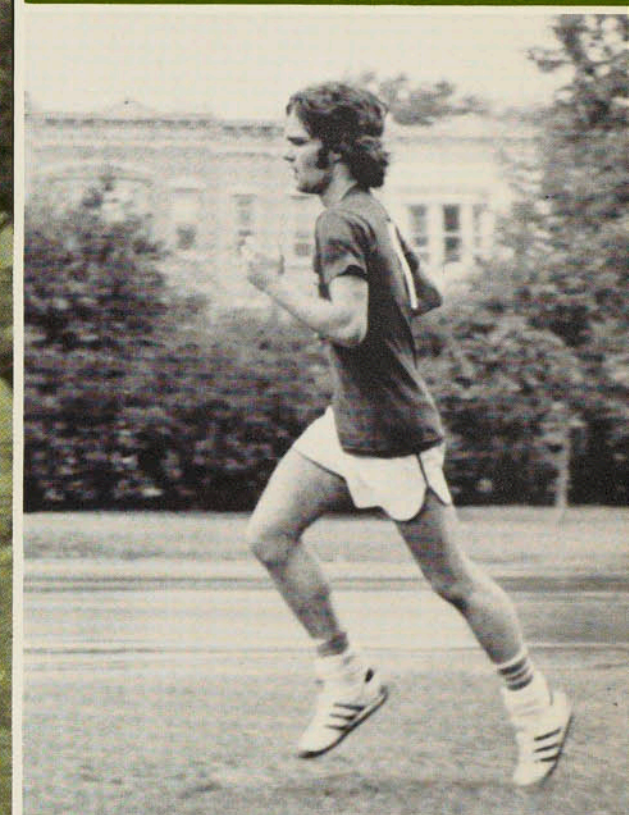
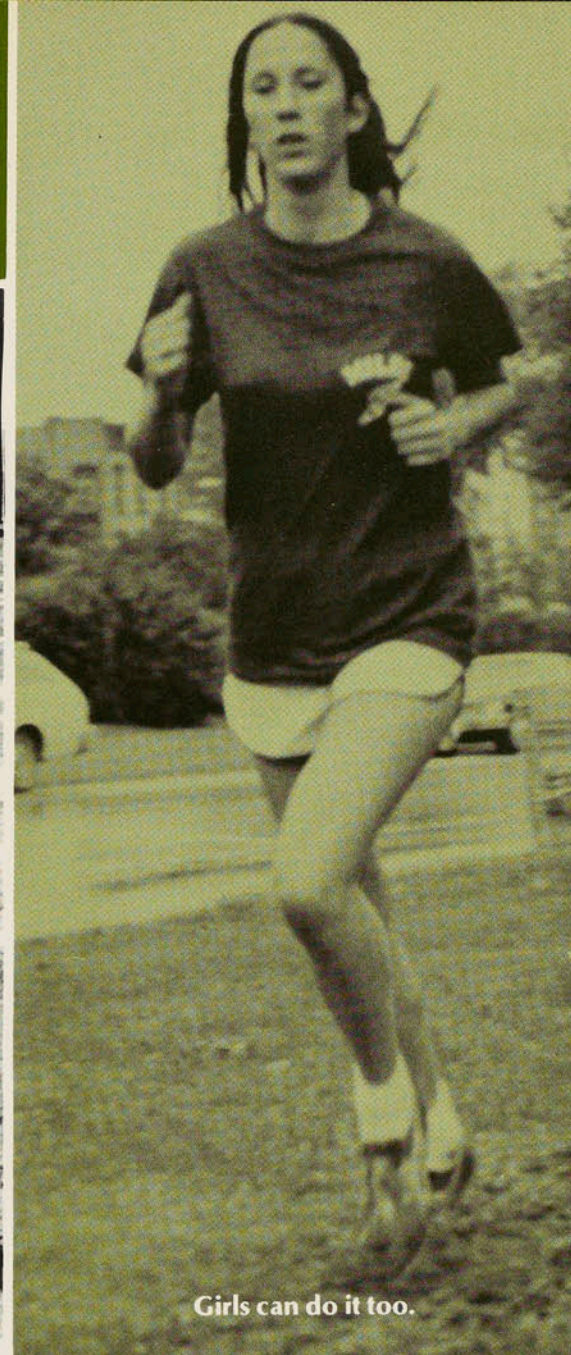

This year Cross Country was overshadowed by student interest in other areas, and hurt by the drop in student body. There was no team this year.

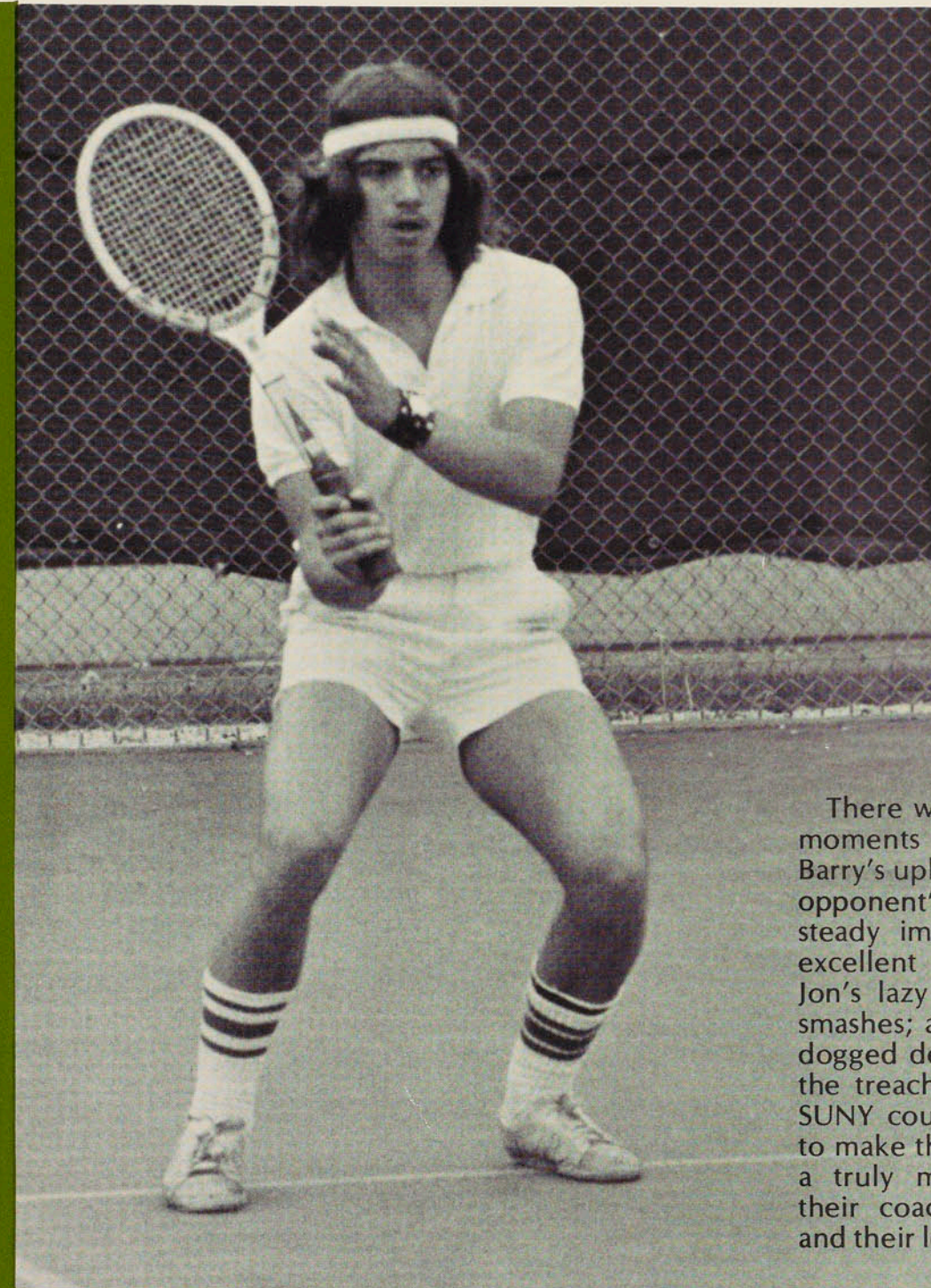
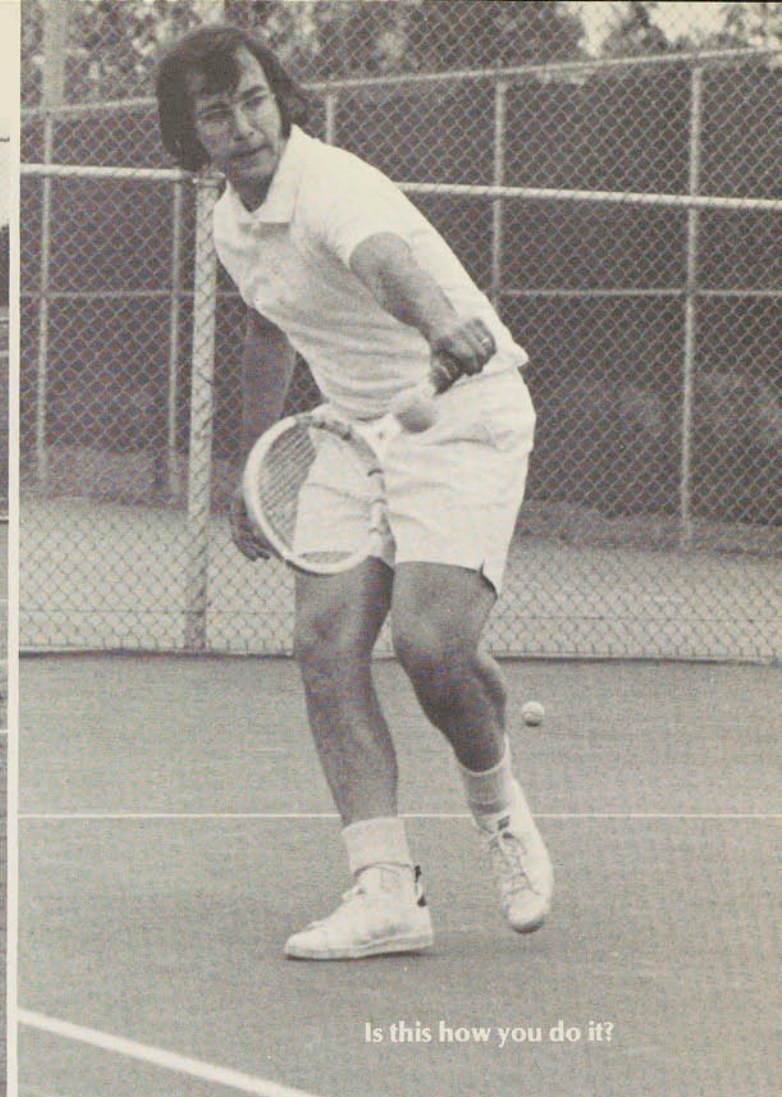
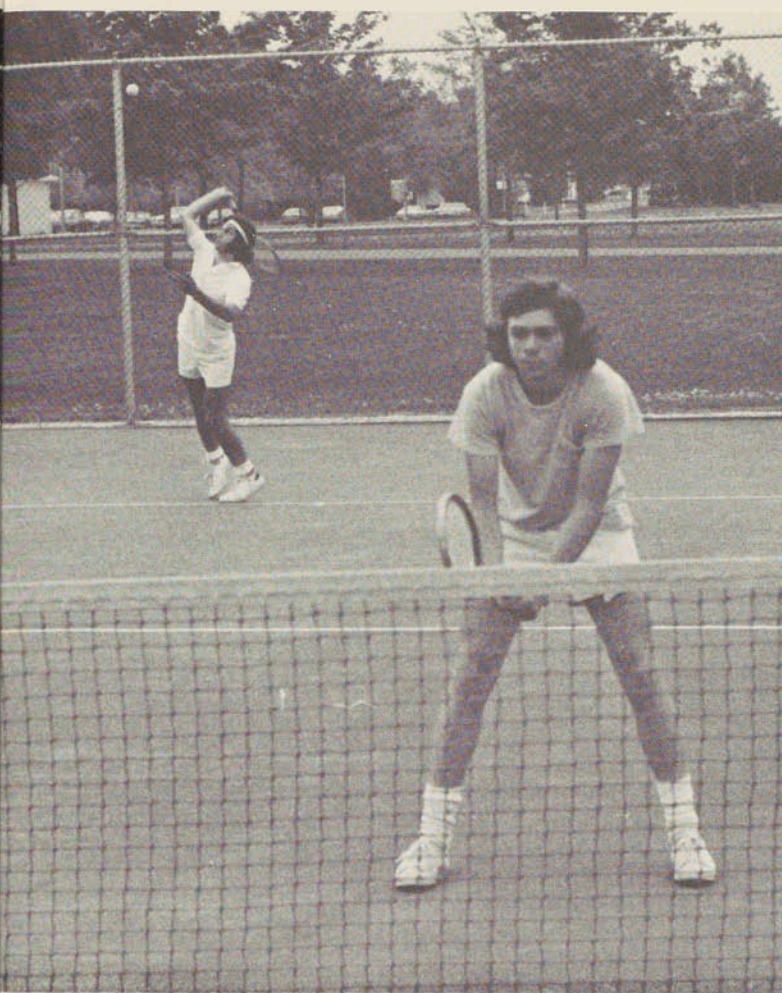

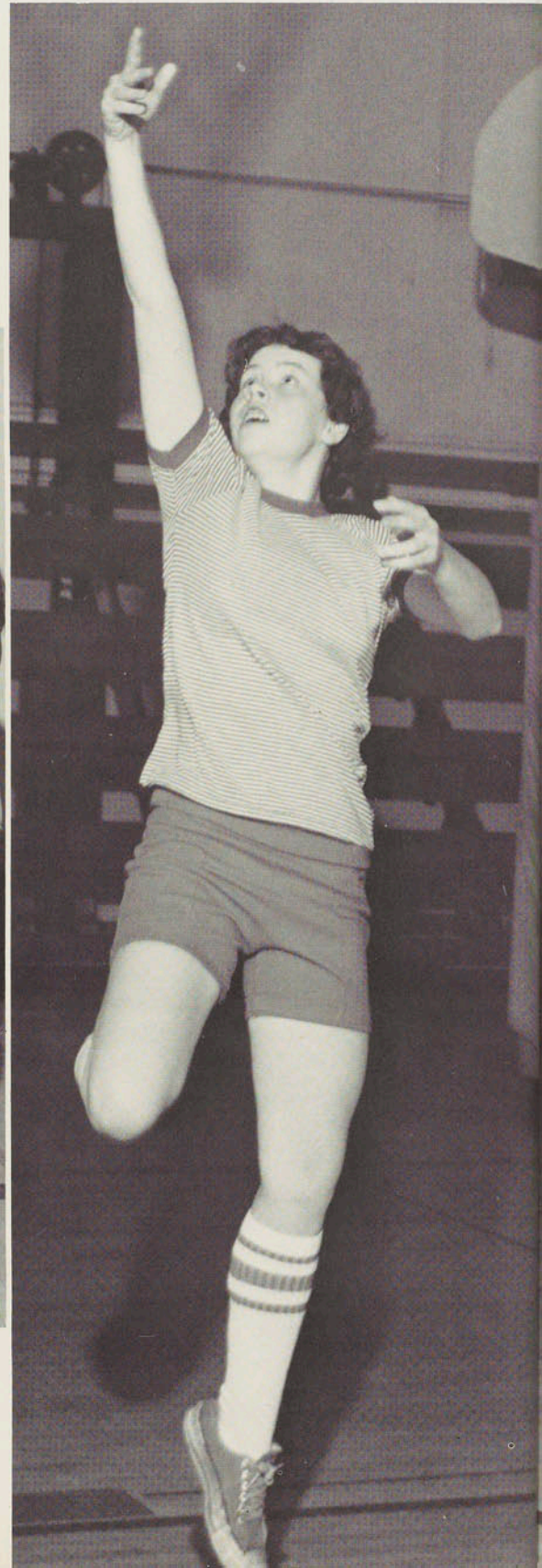
In the alley

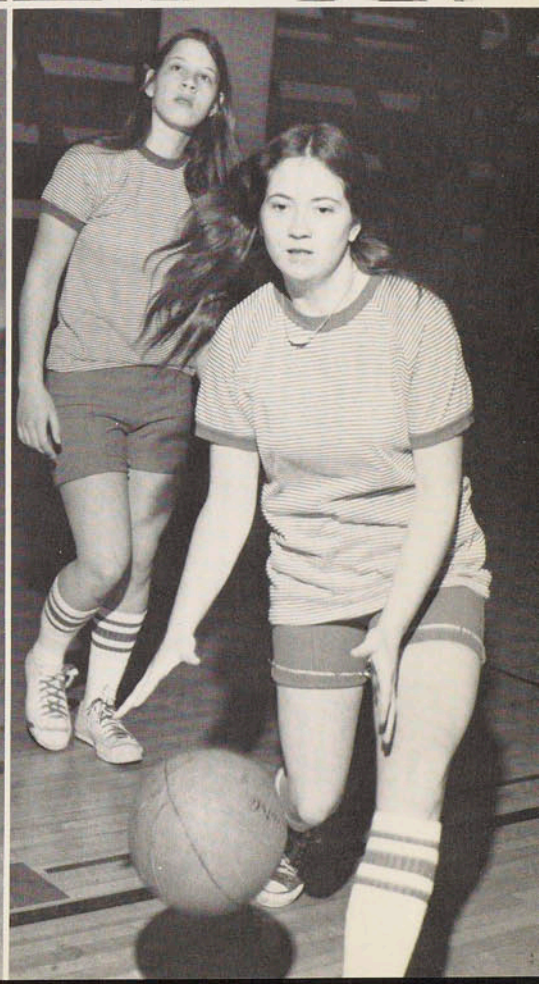

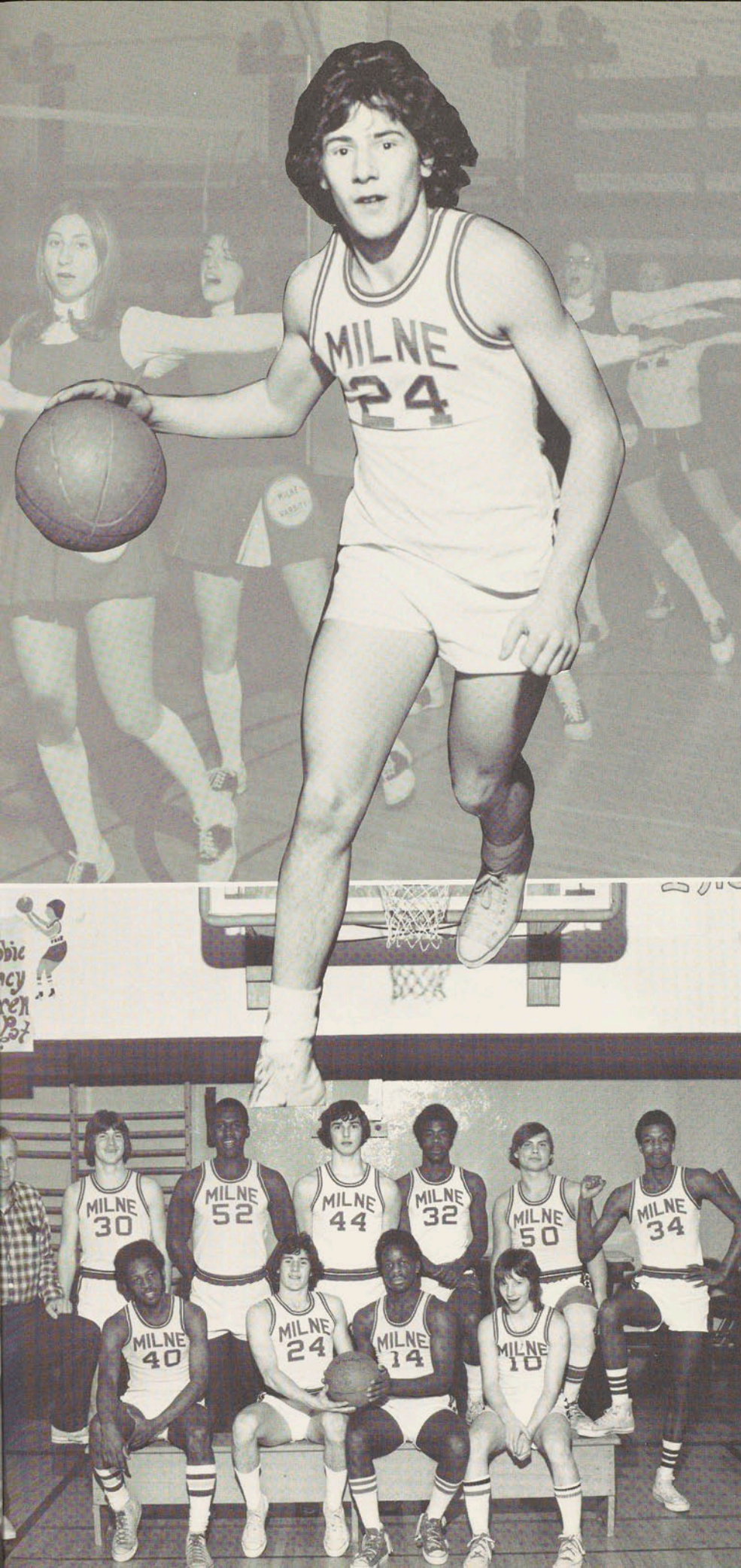


Varsity Wins Title

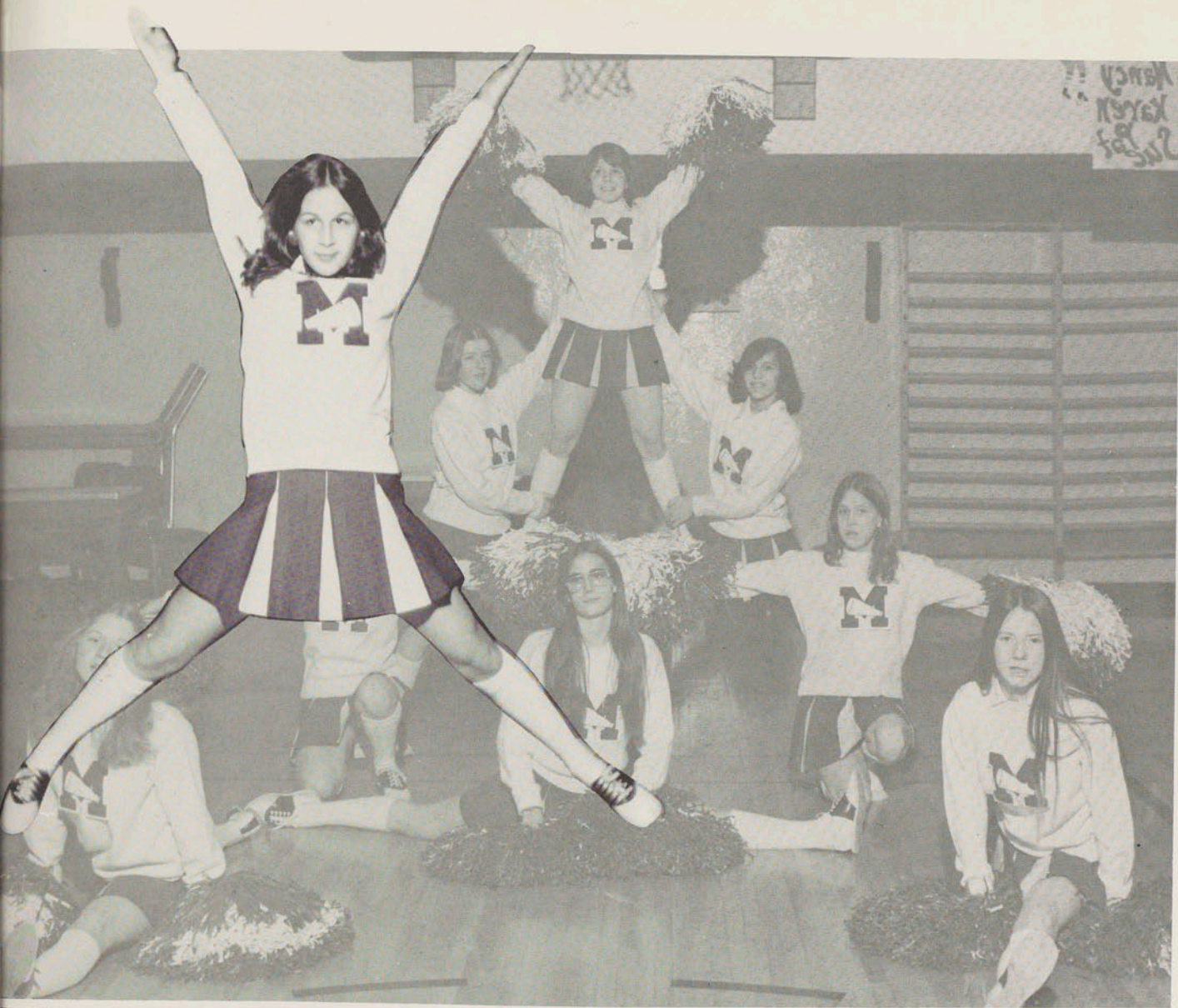

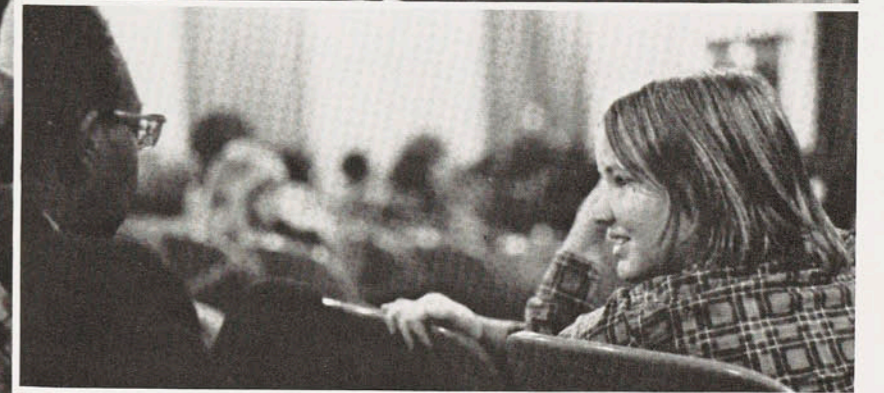


Students Speak Out in Forum

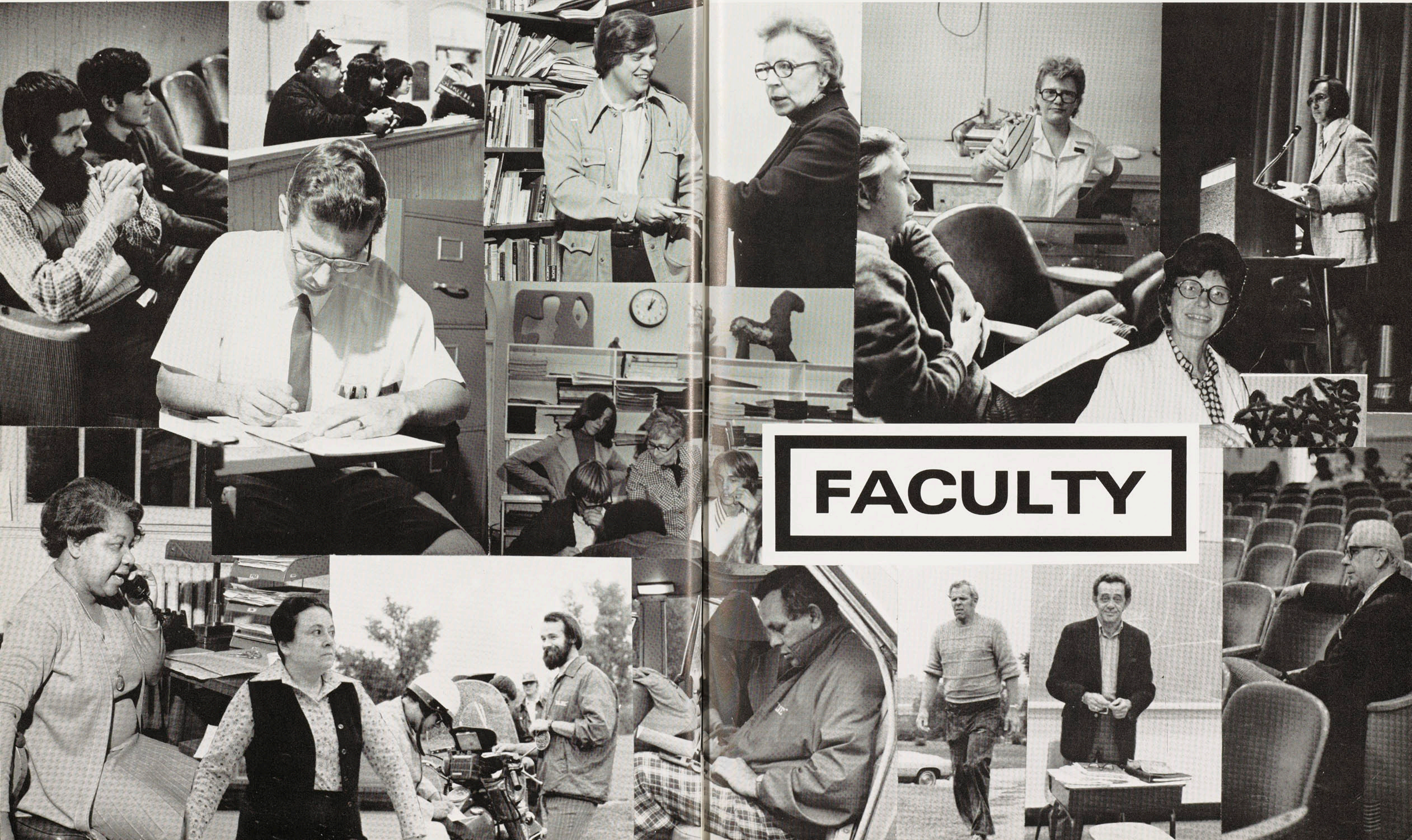

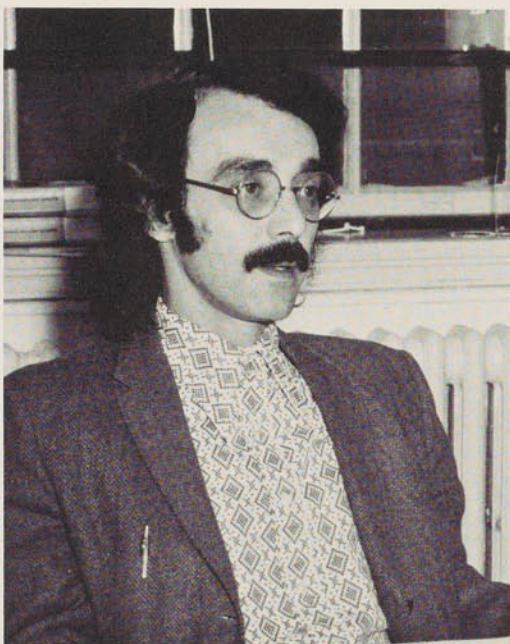


FACULTY
