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State Peds Face Siena Indians In Annual Battle Tomorrow

For the fourth consecutive year, State's varsity basketball squad will play Siena College tomorrow night at the Washington Avenue Armory. This contest is expected to draw more Albany area basketball enthusiasts than any other game played in the Tri-City area this year. The preliminary contest between State's Freshmen and Siena's JV will begin at 6:30 p.m.

Background
The series between the two schools began in 1939. In the 1939-40 season Siena nipped the pre-war Peds by seven points in the initial encounter, 52-45. In the following season the Loudonville Indians emerged victorious in two meetings, winning one game by three points and taking the third game of the series by the wide margin 62-27. Due to the Second World War, the series did not resume till 1946. The Peds still suffered defeat. In 1957 the Peds lost 75-66 in what proved to be the most exciting game of the season. Since then, the traditional rivalry has made this game the main attraction of the year in State sports.

Casey Hurt
The absence of Rog Casey, due to a charley horse in the hip, will hinder the team offensively and defensively. The Delmar product has seconded Cohen in shooting and rebounding this season.

The Starters
Starting at center for the Indians will be John Smith, leading rebounder. Flanking him on the forward line will be Pat Martone and John Legasse. At the guard position Siena boasts Gary Smith, top scorer of the season averaging nine points per game, and Joe Healey, Deputy Johnson. Don Cohen, Sherwin Bowen, Jim Greene will be starting for the Peds. The fifth man, if Casey is still not able to play has not yet been picked.

State Fair Proceeds to Send Student Abroad for Summer

Senate began its proceedings with a State Fair report by the Co-Chairmen, Camie Everett and Lou Wolner, Juniors. They asked for Senate's approval of the suggestion to use a portion of the proceeds from State Fair to participate in the Experiment in International Living plan. Through this plan a State College student, having completed his Junior year, will spend a summer in Europe. This student will be chosen by a board of three faculty members and two students. In addition, a foreign student will be brought to State College for a complete school year. Senate unanimously approved this plan. The financial success of the plan depends upon a \$1200 profit from State Fair.

Students to Elect 'Campus King'

"Campus King" to equal more money for State Fair. Who will be this year's most popular man—not by his secret ballot appeal, but by his money drawn, appeal? This statement was released recently from State Fair Co-Chairmen Camie Everett and Lou Wolner, Juniors.

Campus King, a relatively new idea on campus, will be chosen from six Senior on the night of State Fair, February 6.

Nominations for this high position will be held January 11, 12, 13 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. with declaration to follow on the 14 and 15. Then the preliminary election to narrow the field to six will be January 28 and 29. All students at State are eligible to nominate and vote.

The final vote will consist of contributions from the student body and the person receiving the largest amounts of money donated to Campus Chest will reign as the first Annual Campus King.

State Fair is held annually to provide funds for foreign students to come and study on State's campus. Funds from last year's Fair are currently benefitting several students attending State this year.

According to Wolner and Everett, thirty different organizations have offered to assist the fund raising campaign by having concessions at this year's Fair. The faculty will inaugurate the first annual faculty opening show.

Everett and Wolner have predicted that this year's Fair will be the largest and most profitable of any Fairs up to date.

Cheerleaders to Sponsor Dance

Cheerleaders will sponsor a dance to be held in the Braucher Game Room tonight from 9 p.m. to 12 midnight.

A feature of the dance is a pep rally led by the cheerleaders. The pep rally is in preparation for the Albany State vs. Siena basketball game tomorrow night at the Armory.

In order to legislate on this motion it was necessary for Senate to meet as it in a committee of the whole. It was decided by a majority vote to take the entire amount from surplus.

The President then reported that the pending Student Association election would be run according to the election bill drawn up by last year's Senate. Nominations will be held February 23-30, in New Jersey.

The trophy will be presented by the team captain, Dennis Johnson '60, to Robert Helwig '60, President of the Student Association, and will be on display in the Student Union following the presentation.

Robert Sauers, Assistant Professor of Physical Education, will be present to give a short speech.

Chairman of this event is Jacqueline Lindsay '63.

It has also been announced that SUB is at the present time making plans for an Inaugural Ball which will be held on February 20. Present plans include a dorm Dining Room as the place where this Ball will be held.

State Opens Skating Rink

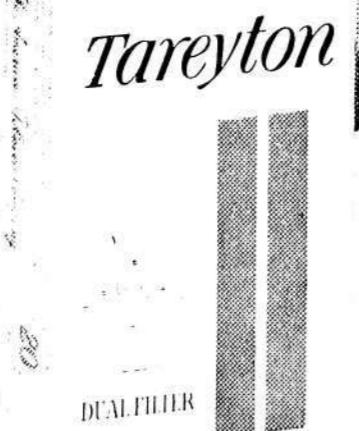

Impeachment Trial Results In Dismissal Of Battaly '60

Myskania's first impeachment trial under the new Student Association Constitution and the first trial by the 1959-60 Myskania resulted in the removal from Student Senate office of Robert Battaly '60. According to the SA Constitution, Myskania must try impeachment cases while others to be tried are left to the discretion of Myskania members.

The charge against Battaly was absence from four Senate meetings unexcused. According to the Senate Rules of Procedure, Battaly had violated Rule 1B (Should a Senator have 3 unexcused absences, the secretary shall notify the Senate in session at which time a motion of impeachment shall automatically be moved and seconded.) A two-thirds vote of the Senate is necessary for the bringing of impeachment charges against an association officer.

Inter-Fraternity Council has deprived Sigma Lambda Sigma fraternity of the right to issue bids for this semester. This was decided at a meeting of the Inter-Fraternity Council on Wednesday evening.

According to IFC Sigma Lambda Sigma has infringed Section 4 and 4d which state that "each fraternity shall have a maximum of one Formal Rush Party per school year," and that "all informal rush party dates must be approved at a meeting of Inter-Fraternity Council."

Violation of the resolution adopted by Inter-Fraternity Council May 5, 1959 concerning the social probation of Sigma Lambda Sigma has incurred the suspension of all SLS bids for one semester following the infraction. IFC reports that sections A1 and B of this resolution which state respectively that "at parties with mixed company, no alcoholic beverages shall be served," and "at each stag party, a representative from each of the three fraternities must be invited."
