



AHISTORICY ALBANIA



Historic Albany: Its Churches and Synagogues

is a year-long series of programs presenting religious worship through sight and sound. Funded by the National Endowment for the Humanities, and coordinated by the University Libraries of the State University of New York at Albany with Project Director, Dr. Anne F. Roberts, the series looks at the unique features of art, architecture, liturgy, and music found within the broad range of traditional faiths represented in the city of Albany during 1985-86.

Albany's Religions, October 20, 1985.

Series 'tour guide' Warren E. Roberts will provide an historical perspective on the participating churches and synagogues, highlighting their salient characteristics. Distinguished Professor of History at the State University of New York at Albany, Dr. Roberts specializes in cultural history and has led a number of successful church tours in Albany.

Dominant Dutch, November 17, 1985.

The oldest congregation in upstate New York, First Church in Albany has an extensive collection of documents and artifacts dating back to 1652. Philip Hooker's spare Augustan architecture reflects the austere Calvinist heritage of the Dutch Reformed Church. The organist and the choir will provide music to complement the presentation.

Albany's Anglicans, December 22, 1985.

Among the treasures housed by St. Peter's Church are Queen Anne Silver, a Tiffany Rose window, and a Burne Jones window. Designed by Richard Upjohn, St. Peter's is the second oldest Protestant Episcopal Church in America and is the burial site of Lord George Howe. The organist will play music appropriate to the Christmas season in the traditional "Festival of Greens" setting.

Famous Faithful, January 26, 1986.

Established in 1649, First Lutheran Church is the oldest Lutheran congregation in America with a 1680 Albany deed in Dutch signed by Robert Livingston. A Bach organ piece and a chorale will reflect the flavor of the service.

Protestants Proliferate, May 4, 1986.

Established in 1862, this congregation has a long history of cooperation with other religious groups in ecumenical endeavors. The present edifice is representative of English country architecture; its interior has an elaborately carved reredos by Irving and Casson. The 1977 Allen Digital Computer Organ played by organist Alan Mills, will reflect its powerful exuberance.

Albany's Blacks, May 25, 1986.

This congregation was established in 1828 when the more conservative Dutch were influential in Albany. As the earliest Black church in Albany, this congregation has a significant history and an interesting service. Both the service and the music will be detailed.

Baptist Beginnings, June 1, 1986.

Built in 1871 in the Victorian Gothic style, Emmanuel Baptist Church traces its roots back to 1834. Of particular note are the curving pews, open aisles, and twelve foot baptistry surrounded by walls of gold leaf.

Lutherans Leaving, June 8, 1986.

With records dating back to the 1790's, First Presbyterian Church boasts such famous members as Aaron Burr and Alexander Hamilton. Graced by noteworthy Tiffany windows, the church is designed in the Romanesque style. The choir will demonstrate the eclectic approach to music representative of many Protestant groups.

Many Methodists, February 9, 1986.

Successor to the First Methodist Society, Trinity United Methodist Church was founded in 1789. Built in 1932 at the zenith of American church architecture, Trinity is in the English Perpendicular style. An organ piece and hymn on the antiphonal organ will demonstrate the unusual features of this instrument.

Religion and Culture, March 2, 1986.

Temple Israel is viewed in light of its history, building and congregation. Israeli music and dance with Director Lorraine Arcus will be featured along with commentary by Rabbi Kieval and Cantor Marcus.

Images of Change, March 16, 1986.

The blend of the old and the new is explored in this presentation featuring a liturgical music program with a professional choir directed by Cantor Howard Stahl.

Church Catholics, March 23, 1986.

St. Mary's Church reflects ties to Rome, particularly the Vatican, in its exuberant Baroque architecture and interior. The congregation was founded in 1796 and is the oldest Roman Catholic group in upstate New York. The church was built in 1869.

Guardians of the Tradition, April 13, 1986.

Featuring a children's choir and a commentary by Rabbi Bomzer, this event explores the history of the synagogue at its original site on Herkimer Street.

Elements of the Old and New, April 20, 1986.

While an offshoot of Congregation Beth Emeth, this new Reform congregation has retained the original ark from the earlier structure. A new, modern building houses the 1888 solid oak, carved ark. Rabbi Cashman will conduct a discussion.

St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Church is a Missouri synod congregation representing one segment of the split in contemporary Lutheranism. Founded in 1838, St. Paul's possesses archives from that date in German.

Shaking Quakers, July 6, 1986.

Also known as the United Society of Believers in Christ's Second Appearing, the Shakers established "Wisdom's Valley" in Watervliet in 1775. Although the Society dissolved in 1975, the local Shaker Meeting House has been restored. This event will feature a re-enactment of parts of the historic service.

Peaceful Pilgrims, July 27, 1986.

The Society of Friends, more commonly known as the Quakers, had its beginnings in Albany in 1839. The simplicity of the Friends meetinghouse parallels the simple dress, manners, and service of the Quakers.

The Synagogue and the Jewish Community, August 17, 1986.

A slide presentation focusing on the synagogue as central to the Jewish community in Albany will be given.

Gracious Greeks, September 7, 1986.

Established in 1922, St. Sophia Greek Orthodox Church combines traditional Byzantine architecture with that of the 20th century. Of particular note are the mosaics and wall paintings. The service itself is an expression of the ancient Eastern faith in modern times.

Catholic Cathedral, September 14, 1986.

Modeled after the twin-spired cathedral in Cologne, the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception was dedicated in 1848 before a group of Irish immigrants newly arrived from their homeland during the potato famine.


Singing Saints, September 21, 1986.

The Cathedral of All Saints was constructed in 1884 on land donated to the Episcopal Church by Erastus Corning, Sr. This formal presentation will feature the cathedral's well-known "Choir of Men and Boys."
