#### **Description:**

We removed sight-singing and dictation requirements, and instead added the choice of two different aural skills courses. We added an introduction course and a foundational music history course, to give students a more foundational understanding of music. In addition, we added a research seminar to ensure that students have research experience within the discipline. We added a keyboard course, to ensure all majors are able to play keyboards. The numbers of electives changed due to the foundational requirement credit counts changing.
