CIO Leader Hails Veto of Case Bill

William Mastriani, president of the Capitol District Industrial Union Council, telegraphed President Truman that the Council welcomed his veto of the Case Bill "as a step toward safeguarding democratic liberties threatened by the wave of hysterical anti-labor legislation."

"We trust your action indicates a decision to reconsider your own strike control bill," the telegram stated.

Another Vote To Remember In November

Congressman Bernard W. Kearney, who represents Schenectady in the House of Representatives, voted to over-ride President Truman's veto of the Case Bill.

Newspapers quoted him as saying he voted against the bill when it was first introduced into the House as "too severe," but that the Case Bill as sent to the White House "contains nothing that decent organized labor can kick about."

So you can put another black mark on the Kearney record.

Action Urgent to Salvage OPA

The U. S. Senate has voted a wage cut for every worker in the country by passing the bill to wreck OPA. As the House passed an almost identical bill, the measure will be in President Truman's hands as soon as the House and Senate Committee "iron out a few differences."

The bill eliminates enforcement provisions. It ends all price controls on meat, poultry and dairy products by June 30. It increases prices of building materials to undermine the whole veterans' housing program. It permits rent control to be scrapped. It removes price controls on cigarettes and gasoline as of June 30.

Local 301 officers have urged all members to flood President Truman with messages asking him to veto it.

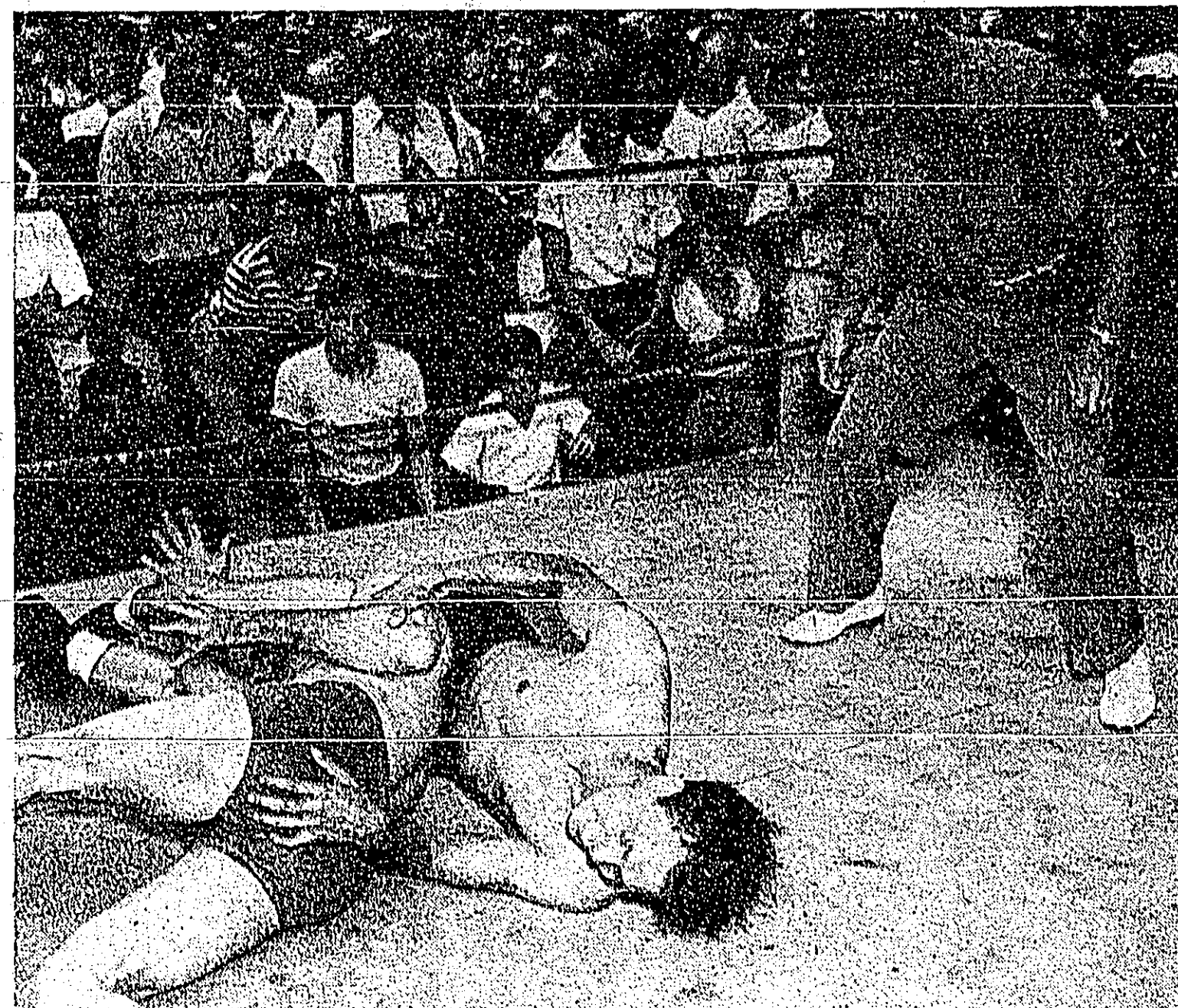

Looks As Though Pinky Will Have Job on Hands

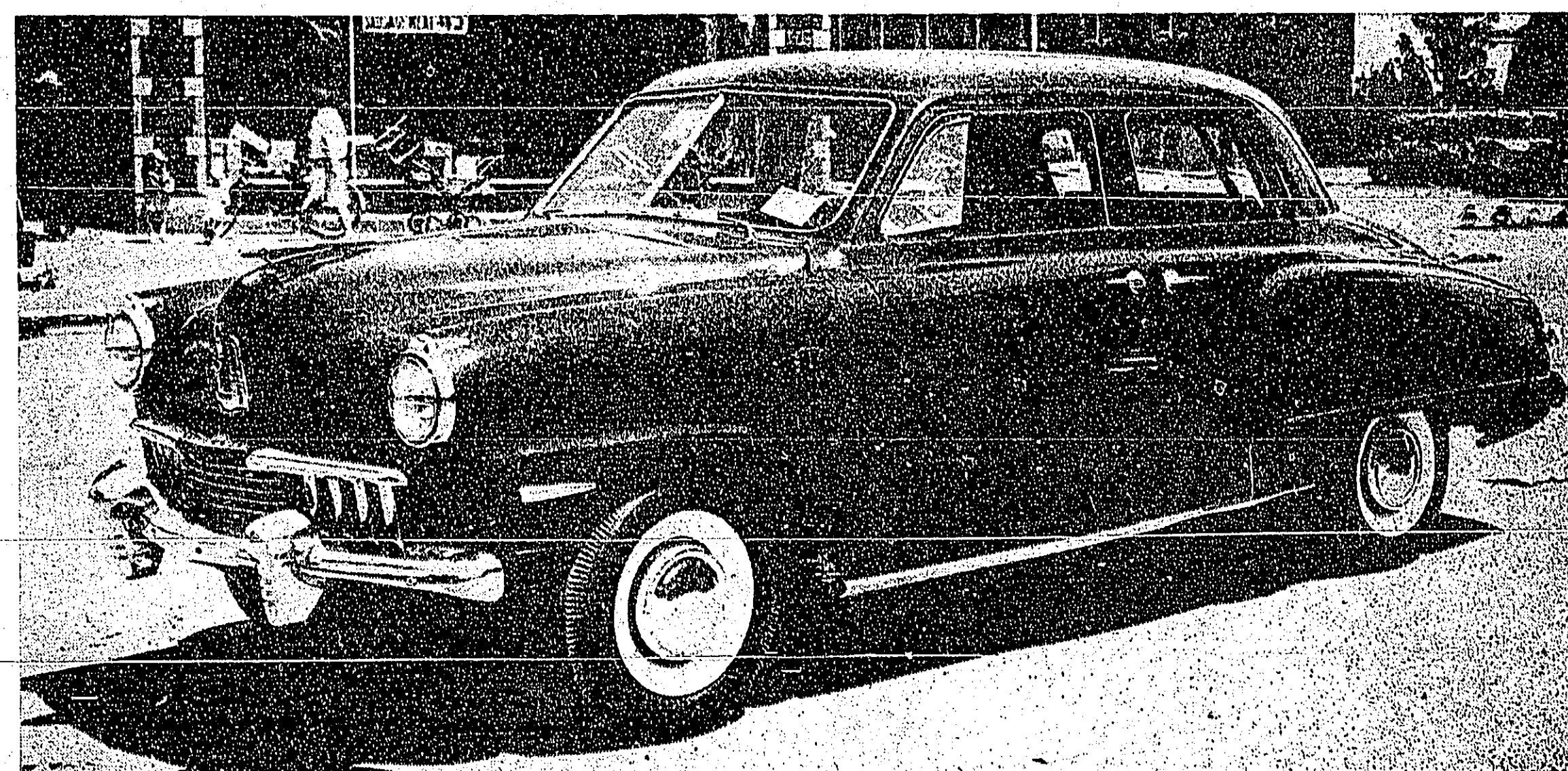

The Field Day card includes a wrestling match between Sailor Jack and Stratus and another featuring Young Bull and Tony Zaban.

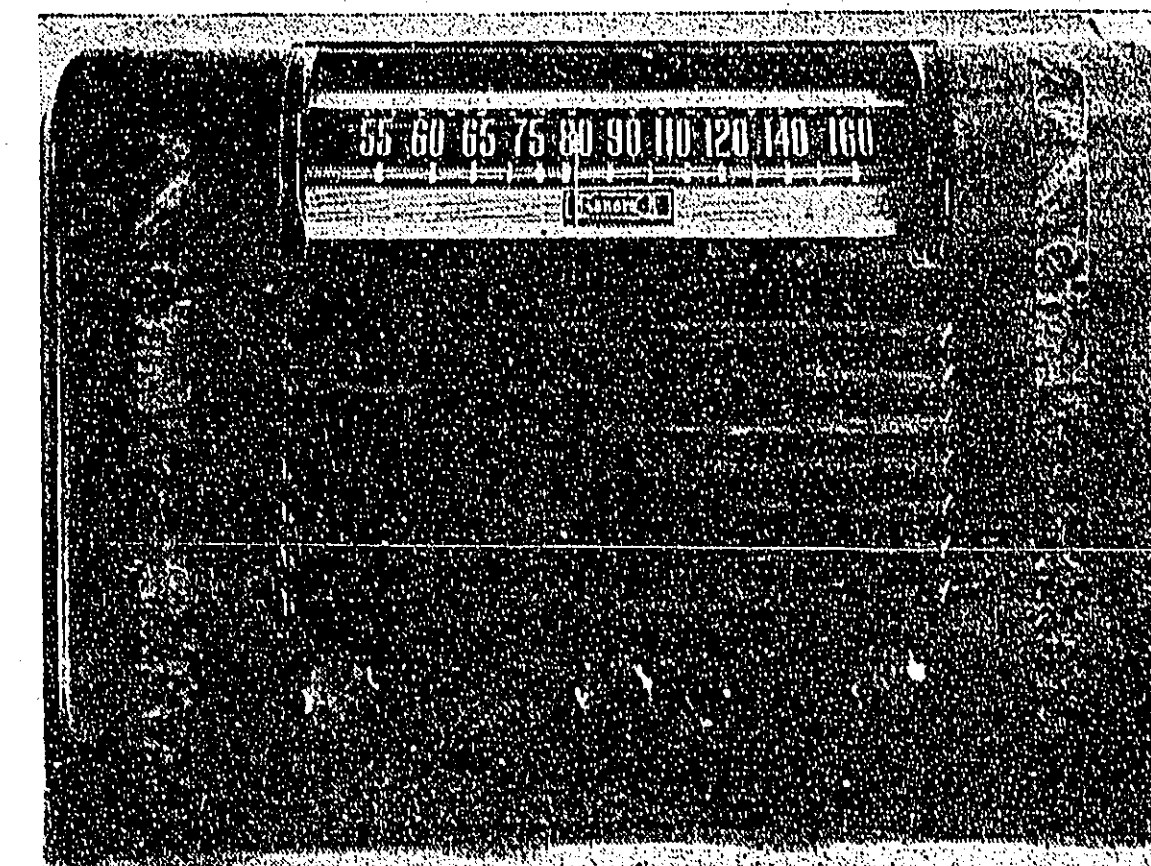
