Peter P. Muirhead, associate commissioner for higher education, U.S. Office of Education, will speak on "Higher Education and the Federal Interest," Monday, May 8 at 8 p.m. in the State University of New York at Albany Dutch Quad dining lounge, uptown campus.

A former Albanian, Muirhead is considered the second ranking person for higher education in the country. His address is sponsored by the School of Education, SUNYA.

Before accepting his current position, Mr. Muirhead was connected with the New York State Department of Education and with the State University of New York in a variety of teaching and administrational assignments.

His present job, which he began in 1959, is to carry out the Federal Higher Education assistance programs included in several congressional acts. He has been credited with getting the Federal Student Loan Program started and has been involved in other significant legislation.

Suraj Bhan, vice-chancellor of Panjab University, Chandigarh, India, will be on the State University of New York at Albany campus Thursday and Friday (May 4 and 5) speaking with faculty and student groups.

Mr. Bhan will address a group of college professors interested in Southeast Asia, Thursday evening in room 367 of the Campus Center. At 1:30 Friday afternoon, the Indian educator will speak in the Campus Center Assembly Hall at a meeting sponsored by the Forum of Politics and open to the public. The title of his address will be "The Emerging Pattern of Student Involvement and Higher Education in Indian Universities."

An excellent speaker in English, Mr. Bhan also is familiar with Hindi, Urdu and Sanskrit. He holds Masters degrees from the University of the Punjab, Lahore, and from London University. Mr. Bhan has a distinguished career in education in his homeland, having served as principal of five different institutions and in other positions in higher education.

Among his publications are "Dayanland - His Life and Work" (a biography), "Toward a Happier Education" (a study of the principles of mental hygienics, with special emphasis on Indian education) and "Educational Development in India," to which he contributed one chapter.

While in the area, Mr. Bhan will be the guest of Dr. Harold Howes, professor of education at SUNYA, at his Slingerlands home. Dr. Howes spent several years in India.

Mr. Bhan's appearances are being sponsored by the university's school of education.



IMMEDIATE

Dr. Sverre Petterssen, a meteorologist from London, has been appointed to the newly-created post of International Professor of Earth and Atmospheric Sciences at the State University of New York at Albany, President Evan E. Collins announced.

Dr. Eugene McLaren, chairman of the Division of Science and Mathematics at the university, revealed Dr. Petterssen's duties will be international in scope. "Meteorology is truly a world-wide program," stated Dr. McLaren, "and Dr. Petterssen will be traveling extensively in Europe, helping tie together the knowledge in this field. In addition, of course, he will teach courses here as a member of the faculty."

Dr. Petterssen, who lectured at SUNYA Jan. 27, is a former chairman and professor of meteorology at Massachusetts Institute of Technology and at the University of Chicago. Recently, he served as science attache at the United States Embassy in Stockholm. He is former president of the American Meteorological Society and former chairman of the committee on international programs in atmospheric sciences of the National Academy of Sciences.

Dr. Petterssen was a member of the prominent group of meteorologists who advised postponement of the Allies "Operation Overload" liberation of Europe from June 5 to June 6, 1944, a decision which was vital to the success of the strategy. General Eisenhower, Supreme Allied Commander, later wrote to Dr. Petterssen, "This service on your part merits very special commendation as an outstanding contribution to the success of the Allied invasion."

The King of Norway subsequently presented Dr. Petterssen with the Liberation Cross, a rare honor for a civilian scientist, and the King of England gave him the honorary appointment of Commander of the British Empire.

A native of Norway, Dr. Petterssen was naturalized as a United States citizen March 8, 1955. He holds degrees of Bachelor of Science, Master of Science, and Ph.D., all from Oslo University. His honors, public services, memberships and employment run into the scores.

He is the author of a number of books on meteorology, the latest, "Weather Observations, Analysis and Forecasting" in 1957. In addition, he has written several articles for encyclopedias and more than 100 papers on meteorological subjects.

His appointment at SUNYA is effective Sept. 1, 1967.



The first master's thesis production to be presented by the department of speech and dramatic art at State University of New York at Albany will be Samuel Beckett's WAITING FOR GODOT. Directed by Bonnee Scott, the play will run Wednesday through Saturday, May 17-20, in the Richardson Studio Theatre on the downtown campus at 8:30 p.m. The production will be open to the public.

One of the best-known examples of the Theatre of the Absurd, WAITING FOR
GODOT had its premiere at the Theatre de Babylone in Paris during the 1952-1953 season.
Following the premiere came productions in London, Dublin, Frankfurt, Rome and
Helsinki, and its first American production was in New York in April, 1956. Now
considered as a theatre classic, GODOT was presented as an example of new theatre
in the 1956 Arena Theatre. Since its initial production, GODOT has been called
"grotesquely beautiful and utterly absorbing" as well as "one of the most noble and
moving plays."

Miss Scott, director of GODOT, is a 1962 graduate of SUNYA. After teaching for three years at North Syracuse High School, she returned to the university in 1966 to study theatre as a graduate assistant in technical theatre. Her previous directing experience includes an undergraduate production of Albee's THE SANDBOX and a production each year she taught high school. Aside from directing she has gained theatrical experience both as an actress and technician in productions which include LYSISTRATA, THE ICEMAN COMETH, and KISS ME KATE.

Miss Scott chose GODOT as her thesis production because she feels the play is a true test of both actor and director. She expressed the opinion that the play, since it is virtually plotless, demands the total interaction of all theatrical elements if the play is going to communicate. Since neither words, story, scenery, nor lights can carry the show alone, all must be more carefully developed and coordinated than in a play outside the Absurd tradition.

Tickets will be unnecessary for the production, with seating to be on a space available basis each evening. There will be no reserved seats for any performance. Inquiries regarding the performances should be directed to State University Theatre.

The sixteenth consecutive Arena Theatre season at State University of New York at Albany will expand its schedule to include four productions this year instead of the usual three. Jarka M. A broad record of the change in America's way of life has been received by the library of State University of New York at Albany.

Miss Alice Hastings, University librarian, recently accepted a complete set of microfilmed Sears catalogs from 1892 through 1967 from James R. Allison, general manager of Sears in Colonie.

Earliest catalog included in the collection is a watch catalog published in 1888, two years after Sears was founded. In addition, the microfilm set includes every general catalog published from 1892 through 1967. More than one mile of microfilm was required to photograph the catalog pages included in the collection.

In accepting the catalogs Miss Hastings said, "It will be a welcome addition to our collection of Americana. There will be many ways in which the material contained here can be used by students in several departments."

To keep the microfilm sets up to date, Sears has each new general catalog photographed on microfilm as it is published, and furnishes copies to the libraries and institutions which have complete sets. These are used by students, researchers and historians -- as well as Broadway and Hollywood producers -- as a guide to styles, furnishings and events of bygone years.

Dr. Eugene Rabinowitch, noted biophysicist and editor of "Bulletin of the Atomic Scientist", will be presented in a lecture Thursday evening, June 1, by the division of science and mathematics of State University of New York at Albany. His address on "Peace and Development: The Two Challenges of the Scientific Revolution" is set for 8:30 in the ballroom of Campus Center.

In pointing out the importance of the lecture subject, Dr. Eugene H.

McLaren, chairman of the science and mathematics division at SUNYA, said:

"The contemporary explosion of science and technology has placed two challenges before mankind. One is to establish permanent peace on earth, because war with nuclear and other scientific weapons would be too destructive to use to settle disputes between nations. The other challenge is to close the gap between the 'rich' and the 'poor' nations. Introduction of elementary hygiene into the underdeveloped world has led to a population explosion, causing the gap to widen instead of closing. At the same time, new means of communication have made impossible further acceptance by the 'poor' nations of their stagnant existence. Unless the two challenges of peace and development are met, mankind will face within the next two decades the greatest dangers of its history."

Dr. Rabinowitch, whose lecture will be open to the public, has had a long-time interest in the importance of science in public affairs, paying particular attention to the impact of science on the future of man and society. He was awarded UNESCO's annual Kalinga Prize last year for popularization of science.

Two students at State University of New York at Albany, both sophomores, have won \$500 grants for the summer to serve in an advisory capacity for the planning of the new State University College at Nassau. Dr. Bernard K. Johnpoll, for many years a newspaperman and now associate professor at the Graduate School of Public Affairs, State University of New York at Albany, is the editor of a unique publication, "The Canadian News Index", a computerized listing of significant items from 13 newspapers in 10 Canadian provinces. Publisher of the book is the University of Saskatchewan, Regina.

Assistant editors are Dr. Bernard Zagorin, chairman of the history department at Saskatchewan, and A. Richard Allen, also of the Canadian university, who wrote the foreword. They state, "A cumulative index of major Canadian newspapers has long been the wistful hope of scholars in Canadian history and social science, not to mention among many others, librarians and the newspapers themselves. The task was obviously an awesome one. Ironically, but perhaps characteristically, it took an American political scientist to match a computer to the task and produce a plausible offspring.

At the time Dr. Johnpoll designed the project he was assistant professor at the Regina campus. Computer adviser was Lawrence L. Achtemichuk, of the same institution. Regular production of the new index is expected to begin sometime this year.

The sample index covers 13 newspapers chosen with considerations of province, owner-ship, and editorial policy in mind. The first full volume of the index proper will include three major French-Canadian newspapers, and shortly thereafter four further papers representing major population centers will be added. Once the current volumes are well underway indexing significant newspapers will be undertaken on a similar basis.

News indexed covers all significant Canadian news events, and is cross-indexed in as many as 12 categories depending on the scope of the item concerned. The entire task entails careful abstracting of between 300 to 500 stories per day, after duplicates have been eliminated. It is intended that the index give headline, source, date, page and

column, and be published in bi-weekly volumes throughout the year.

In commenting on the origin of the work, Professor Johnpoll said, "In 1966 I began work on a study of Canadian government and politics. I again discovered that there was the same problem in using newspaper material: there was no index that could direct me to the proper section of the proper newspaper for a significant item of Canadian news."

Professor Johnpoll, an alumnus of Boston University, received his master of arts degree at Rutgers University and his doctoral degree from State University of New York at Albany.

More than 100 teachers from New Jersey, Delaware, Pennsylvania, and New York will attend the institute being conducted in conjunction with New Jersey State Teachers College at Montclair.

Approximately \$70,000 will be made available through the National University Extension Association, in cooperation with the U. S. Office of Education, Adult Basic Education Branch, for the institute July 24 - August 11 on SUNYA's uptown campus. The institute's program will not offer academic credit but participants will be stipended.

Dr. John Ether, professor of education and director of the project for the education of the disadvantaged, will be administrative director. Daniel Ganeles, associate professor of education and associate director of the special education project, will be program director. Curriculum specialist will be Joseph Magano, assistant state director of adult basic education New York State. Chief evaluator will be Raymond Ast, of the Montclair college faculty and serving as reading specialist will be Joseph Porter, graduate student in the doctoral program in reading at SUNYA.

The newly-formed program provides for the appointment at the Albany university of a staff specialist who will teach courses in the subject area and, additionally, will serve as consultant to state directors, local adult basic education administrators, and teachers in the region. Emphasis will be on methodology, stressing the use of video equipment and technical aids. Main objective of the special preparation of selected teachers will be to enable them to assist adults in overcoming English language limitations.

Flinton, dean of the School of Graduate Studies at SUNYA.

Interested applicants are advised to apply also for a local fellowship which may be held concurrently with the Burke fellowship. Dr. Randolph S. Gardner, Dean of the School of Education, will accept applications until June 15 for consideration for the 1967-68 academic year.

Dr. Earl G. Droessler, vice president for research at State University of New York at Albany, has been elected a trustee-at-large of the University Corporation for Atmospheric Research, the board of which serves as the management group for the National Center for Atmospheric Research at Boulder, Colo. His term is for three years.

Supported by the Federal government, mostly through the National Science Foundation, NCAR has a \$10.7 million budget for the current fiscal year. It was established in 1960 to conduct and to foster basic research in the atmospheric sciences and to work toward increasing the effectiveness of the atmospheric sciences as a whole.

Requirement for membership within the UCAR is an approved doctoral program in the atmospheric sciences. Each participating university, of which there are now 23, in the corporation names an administrative representative and a scientist to corporate membership. From these, 12 institutional trustees are selected to serve on the board. Others are three trustees-at-large and one trustee ex officio; namely, the director of NCAR. Dr. A. Richard Kassander, Jr., director of the Institute for Atmospheric Physics at the University of Arizona, currently is chairman of the board.

Dr. Droessler, who came to SUNYA last year, formerly was head of the Section on Atmospheric Sciences, National Science Foundation. He has served as a member of the National Academy of Sciences Delegation to International Union of Geodesy and Geophysics Congresses at Oslo, Rome, Montreal, Helsinki, and San Francisco. He is a Fellow of the American Geophysical Union for which he has chaired several committees. Dr. Droessler also has served as chairman of a number of American
