CSEA Group Life Plan Conversion Now Open

Any actively employed insurance member of the Group Life Insurance Plan of the Civil Service Employees Assn. who became age 50 on or after January 1, 1965, or whose 55th or 60th birthday is during 1965, may convert \$1,000 or \$2,000 of

this Group Life Insurance to a permanent form of individual Life Insurance, which contains cash and paid-up values, without medical examination. Group Insurance would be reduced by the amount converted, and the payroll deductions of such insurance would be reduced accordingly. The amount of insurance an insured member is entitled to in the future under the Group Plan would be reduced by the amount converted.

Premium waiver is available to female employees who attain age 50 and male employees who attain age 50 or 55 during 1965. Double indemnity is also available. These benefits can be obtained only at additional cost.

Requests for this conversion, on forms furnished by the Civil Service Employees Assn., must be received by the Association at its headquarters, 8 Elk Street, Albany, New York 12224 prior to

September 1, 1965. The effective date of the converted insurance will be November 1, 1965, contingent on the premium payments for the converted insurance to be made directly by the individual to the Travelers Insurance Com-

Any insured member interested should secure information and the required form for conversion from CSEA.



Good Manners & Good PR

GOOD MANNERS are inseparable from good public relations. You can't have one without the other. Yet all too many people in government overlook these fundamentals of human behavior.

THERE IS SELDOM a dollarspensing as little of it as possible, ple take the attitutde: "I'm not one would think that good manners could be equated with the family jewels.

WE HAVE AN immediate case in mind. Some of the "thank you" letters written by one department within the City of New York sound more like a bag of ice cubes than an expression of warmth and thankfulness. Letters that are more in the nature of a 'brush-off" are better left undictated untyped and unmailed.

INSTEAD OF GENERATING good public relations, "brush-off" letters stir resentment and a negative attitude, which can be reflected in these words: "Just let them ask for my cooperation and they'll see the answer in one word-no."

WE COULD UNDERSTAND the lack of good manners if it were an expensive budget item, the funds for which had to be husbanded and guarded like radium. But when the item is as free as air, we are puzzled.

WE THINK THE lack of good manners is attributable to two

and-cents cost to good manners. things. First, people are inclined The way some people in civil to be thoughtless about the feelservice hoard good manners, dis- ings of others. All too many peopaid to make anyone happy." This attitude is nonsensical because it hurts the entire image of government and civil service.

> THE SECOND REASON could be sheer laziness: "It's just too much trouble to be nice, so we'll just be neutral. We can't be criticized for not taking sides for or against good manners."

> UNFORTUNATELY, THE criticism will not be contained in an annual efficiency report. It will be felt in the hardening of the taxpayers attitudes toward civil servants. Let's not forget that the cost of government is increasing by leaps and bounds. Sooner or later the taxpayers will

WATERTOWN, Aug. 23-The New York State Civil Service Commission has denied a unanimous request of the City council to place the police and fire chiefs in this city in a civil service exempt classification and Atttorney Norman F. Ward, secretary of the local commission has asked City Manager Ronald G. Forbes to present his nominations of can-

didates to take non-competitive civil service examinations.

The State commission offically disapproved the request of the Watertown City Council to make the chief posts exempt from examination. The action came after City Manager Forbes had appointed Fire Chief George S. Bates to head his department and was preparing to name John L. Touchette, Police Chief without benefit of civil service tests.

After the City council approved a request for the State commission to change the chiefs' examination requirement, the Watertown Civil Service Commission approved by a split vote of 2-1 submitting the council's proposal to the State commission.

Participation In Health Plan Grows

ALBANY, Aug. 23 - Nearly 82 per cent of all State employees, as well as 51 per cent of municipal employees, are enrolled in a State-run health insurance plan, according to Mary Goode Krone, Civil Serivce Commission president. The three private corporation plans are administered by the Department of Civil Service for State and local Bake Of New York

The end of 1964 figures show that of 123,641 State employees, 101,363 were enrolled. On the municipal level of governmentexclusive of New York City and Buffalo-100,528 of 196,910 employees were enrolled.

More than 18,000 retired workers are also enrolled in the health insurance program, including 5,961 who retired before the service was begun in 1957.

The Director of the Bureau of the Budget, Charles D. Shultz, testifying before the Senate Post Office and Civil Service Committee, made official the Administration's objection to the pay proposals of the House subcommittee

well trigger inflationary salary demands throughout the country. This official stand. which first came out in a talk the President held with congressional leaders recently and was reported in this column last week stresses the irony of the president signing a pay bill which could easily begin a wage-price inflationary spiral after a four year effort by he and his predessesor to set guidelines among the leaders of private industry to prevent such problems.

Before the same committee, Civil Service Commission Chairman John W. Macy noted the specific objections of the Administration to the House bill and presented, in detail, the President's plan for Federal employee salary reforms. They included a semi-automatic annual pay raise beginning with a raise next April 1 after acceptance of the three percent raise effective Jan. 1. Macy said the Administration believes the House bill contains four major flaws. They are:

· The failure to include permanent continuing reform elements which would allow the President to recommend virtually automatic annual pay adjustments for classified employees and quadrennial adjustments for Congress, the judiciary and upper-level executives. The recommendations would become law unless Congress decided otherwise within 60 days after the President send them to Capitol Hill.

· The four and one half percent proposed hike proposed by the subcommittee is based on 'anticipation of what the latest Bureau of Labor Statistics survey will show private industry pay

scales to be for 1965. The report is not out yet. The second step report raise in October, 1966 also is wrong for the same reason.

The proposals for overtime and Sunday pay within the regular workweek "go well beyond general practices in private industry." Employee unions have made storng statements in favor of the overtime provisions okayed by the House Committee. The Administration has backed overtime for work over 40 hours, but not for work over eight hours in a single day or for Sundays when a Sunday is within an employee's regular five-day work week.

Macy said the acceptable level of competence standard - much opposed by employee groups-is designed to eliminate the incentive for mediocrity or the tendency to do just well enough to get by with a satisfactory rating.

Macy then went on to outline the Administration's plan for pay reforms. According to the Civil Service Commission Chairman this is how officials say the plan would

The Bureau of Labor Statistics will complete in November its annual review comparing Federal and private industry pay rates as of March of this year.

President Johnson will get the facts on it by Dec. 31 and he'll have until Jan. 31 of next year to recommend to Congress adjustments that would go into effect automatically April 1, unless either House or Senate vetoed them.

This increase would have to be a flat across the board amount (for reasons to be explained later) and all signs point to it being 3 per cent as a new Bureau study revealed private rates up slightly less than that amount for the year ending last July 1. The same procedure and another flat amount would be effective April 1, 1967.

These annual raises would have to the flat amounts until Congress changes present relationships of pay systems and revises their structure.

But the President's second reform provides a system for overhauling them. Mr. Johnson has asked Congress to set up a four years, starting next year, to man.

fix all Federal pay policies and relationships, including those of executives.

The Commission would set the pattern for annual adjustments until its next quadrennial review.

The first commission would make its report to the President by Jan. 1, 1967, and Mr. Johnson would have until March 31 of that year to make recommendations to Congress.

The President's proposal for Congressional, judicial and executive salaries could be lower but not higher than those proposed by the Commission. The new executive rates would be effective July 1 of that year unless either branch of Congress disapproved them.

Changes proposed by the commission in relationships and structures of the different pay systems would not be covered by the semi-automatic provisions; they'd be considered through the normal legislative process, which means Congress would retain its control over Federal salaries.

The President's 3 per cent plan provides 1964 comparability for employees in the lowest grades; 1963 comparability in the middle grades and 1962 comparability in the top grades.

These pay-fixing reforms were rejected by the House Civil Service Committee in writing its bill because many of its members did not understand them. But it did approve a provision to tie exexecutive salaries to classified rates and to boost them by similar percentages as carried in the bill as of Jan. 1, 1967.

The House bill also would give Federal employees a second raise but not until Oct. 1 of next year, an increase that would reduce half the lag and range from 3 to

This second-step proposal is being fought hard by the Johnson Administration and the Senate was asked to kill it. Employees like it because they feel it will assure them pay comparability faster than the Administration

A Good Proposal

E VERY year, the State Division of Classification and Compensation prepares a study comparing the pay rates paid for similar positions in public and private employment. Purpose of this study is to help the State in keeping its own wage levels in sufficient balance to offer proper competition in the labor market for desirable personnel.

It would appear, therefore, that this wage survey would be of great assistance both to the State and to employees bargaining for raises since it would establish, at the minimum, a position from which to start negotiations. The truth of the matter is that the figures are released sometime in early March, by which time all salary negotiations have been completed for all practical purposes. As a matter of fact, the hard core bargaining is now usualy determined by no later than December.

To make these State studies truly useful, the Civil Service Employees Assn. has asked that they be released by October 1 and this makes sense. If the pay survey is to have any meaning and value it must appear at the essential time, not after the fact.

Since this CSEA proposal has merit for all concerned we feel that there should be no doubt that it will be accepted.



SOCIAL SECURITY Questions and Answers

MALLY OF STREET, AND VELLEN

My uncle could probably qualify for disability benefits but he is bedfast and there is no social security office in the town where we live. How can I make sure he gets started toward aplying for disability insurance payments?

You should ask at your local post office for the address of the social security district office serving your town. You or your uncle should then write or telephone the social security office and indicate he is disabled and interested in applying for social security disability insurance benefits. The district office wil take whatever steps are necessary. It is not necessary that your uncle personally visit the social security office. You or some other friend or relative can do it for him if he is too

Is there a short-form tax return for domestic employers?

Yes, and the form number is 942, which is a simple, envelope reporting form. If you wish to retain a copy of the return for your records, it is suggested that you file Form 941 with the iDstrict Director of Internal eRvenue.

I hired a part time maid last month and payed her \$10 a week. I don't want to be bothered with the red tape of making a report of her wages every three months. Will it be all right if I just make living with her husband to receive rective was briefly ignored last one report for the year?

No. Your report must be made by the end of the month following each calendar quarter. A person must have a certain number of quarters of work to get social seeurity payments. This is why the report must be made each quarter. If you do not file your report on time, you will have to pay interest and a penalty for late fil-

My 16-year-old daughter plans to work part-time after school and she does not have a social security card. Will she need a card before she starts working?

She should have her social security card to show her employer the day she starts working. She can get a social security card by going to her social security office, or by picking up a Form SS-5, "Application for Social Security Number," from the local post office. Complete this form and mail it to your nearest social security office and she will be issued her social security account number

My husband and I are separated, but not divorced. Will this keep me from getting social security benefits on his account as his wife?

No. A wife does not have to be monthly benefits.

We are told that our employee patient ratio at Brooklyn State Hospital is as good or better than most Mental Hygiene Institutions. Yet we find that at numerous times our buildings are improperly manned, resulting in inadequate patient care and hazardous and overburdened employee working

We therefore must assume that if this be true at our institution we must believe that the situations in other institutions must be much more precarious than those existing here.

Can it be that the secrecy of statistics is due to inadequacy?

Rangers In Bondage

Editor, The Leader:

Four years ago the Forest Ranger Civil Service chapter of the Civil Service Employees Asan. originated an appeal for a realiocation to a higher salary grade, based on the only premise that will allow an appeal to be considered, i.e. new duties to the extent that basic work structure is considerably changed. The appeal contained sufficient merit to be whole-heartedly approved by the three-member Civil Service Board, (Commission) a group set up specifically for the purpose of reviewing such appeals. Subsequently, this approval was denied by the Director of the Budget, no reason was ever given to the Rangers for this denial. One of three smallest chapter in the CSEA (there are only 112 Rangers, give or take one or two) with absolutely no bargaining power, with no close ties with influential politicians or statewide sportsmen organizations to intercede in their behalf, the Rangers feel that this paricular cause is utterly hopeless. So much for that

In the meantime, while this four-year epic of futility was taking place, two completely unrelated events occurred that multiplied the already crushing problems of the Ranger force considerably. First, the entire Northeast was suddenly in the grip of the worst drought in recorded history, and second, the State overnight blossomed out with a gigantic outdoor recreation program focused primarily on the Catskill and Adirondack Forest Preserve areas. The first event affected the number, the size, and difficulty of suppression of fires by increasing each of these phase manyfold. The second was felt when recreation appropriations doubled and tripled, and with them the workload skyrocketed also. In both cases the Ranger force has been the chief beneficiary of the staggering increase in labor required

For several years the Rangers have been working overtime, counted not in hours, not in days, not in weeks, but in months!! And the irony of it is that the Rangers are not eligible and are not entitled to compensation for overtime work, due to a directive issued and originated in the office of the Budget Director!! This di-

Civil Service Law & You

THE CITY OF New York, through the Department of Health, operates many fine facilities for the maintenance of public health. Dental clinics staffed by civil service personnel, are only one example.

DENTISTS WITH the civil service title of Dentist, Part Time, work at the clinics for about four hours daily. The rest of the time they are free to

engage in private practice.

ON MAY 31, 1965, at the Riverside Dental Clinic, located on Old Broadway, in Manhattan, the normally calm procedures of the clinic were interrupted by a violent struggle starting in the treatment room and ending in the waiting room. The protagonists were two dentists, part time, and a dental assistant.

ACCORDING TO the dentist who was subsequently selected from among the three to face charges of misconduct pursuant to Civil Service Law, Section 75, the dental assistant, for all the staff and patients to hear, loudly berated the dentist for omitting to initial his work card. He corrected the omission, but the assistant's loud regaling continued. The dentist walked over to her with the card to point out his initials. At this point the assistant kicked his shins, punched his eyes and scratched his nose and hands. While this was happening, a colleague grabbed him from behind and punched him. All thre fell to the ground with the assistant at the bottom, the dentist on top of her and his

HIP Proposes Bill To Improve Quality Of Hospitalization

A bill to reduce needless hospitalization and improve quality of patient care was proposed to a State Senate hearing on hospital management last week by James Brindle, president of the Health Insurance Plan of Greater New York (H.I.P.).

Testifying before the Committee on Public Health, chaired by Sen. Seymour R. Thaler of Queens, Brindle urged that group prepayment medical insurance plans be permitted to own and operate their own hospitals and nursing homes.

Brindle cited H.I.P.'s hospital utilization rate, 20 per cent below that of fee-for-service insurance plans in the New York City area. He predicted that implementation of the recommendation made by the Governor's Committee on Hospital Costs, for plans such as H.I.P. to "have the opportunity to offer a broad range of services under their own auspices and within their own facilities," would lead to an even lower hospital utilization rate. The Governor's committee was chaired by Marion B. Folsom, former secretary of Health, Education and Welfare.

H.I.P. provides prepaid group medical care for 700,000 subscribers in the Greater New York area through some 1,200 physicians who practice in 31 H.I.P.-affiliated medical centers.

THE PRINCIPLE charge preferred against the dentist was that he had assaulted the dental assistant This charge was accompanied by half a dozen others involving allegations of inability to get along with co-workers.

AT THE departmental hearing, photographs of the dentist's injuries were introduced showing his gouged shins and other injuries, signs of which were still obvious. The Department's principal witness, the dental assistant, removed her sun glasses and pointed to still visible traces of a black eye.

THE CLASH was traced to a query by the dental assistant as to whether the dentist intended to work on Yom Kippur. Actually the question should not have been asked because the Dental Health Program for the School Year 1964-1965 stated, "September 16 (Wednesday) Yom Kippur, part-time dentists off duty." According to the testimony of the dental assistant, the dentist's answer was, "Do you work Christmas and New Year? Listen, just because you are black, you do not push me around." The dentist denied the statement attributed to him.

THE COLLEAGUE who had grabbed him from behind testified that the accused dentist had initiated work on a tooth which had actually been previously extracted. This accusation of false record entry was not sustained by the hearing officer, a physician on the staff of the Department of Health. However it is this discrepancy which the colleague testified led to the violence.

THE PHYSICIAN commented critically upon the dentist's defense to a chronic lateness charge which revealed that part-time dentists at the clinic fill out their time cards on Monday for the entire week to come.

THE PROSECUTOR for the Department of Health presented the testimony of numerous witnesses to establish that the dentist was hostile and suspicious. Such witnesses were not limited to the staff of the Riverside Dental Clinic, but were brought over from the Brownsville Clinic to give illustrations of the dentist's violent language and unfriendly attitude when he worked there.

SHORTLY AFTER the conclusion of the hearings, the dentist was discharged from his civil

service position.

WHEN THREE employees are involved in mutual assaults under circumstances such that it is impossible to know who are guilty, is it fair to single out the one who was most seriously injured to bear the brunt of disciplinary proceedings because he is generally disliked anyway?

Summertime Sharpens Thoughts Of 13 State Aides Earning \$265 From State Suggestion Program

ALBANY, Aug. 23 - Not even the lull of the summer months can keep State employees from thinking of ways to do their work better and at less cost to taxpayers. Thirteen workers shared \$265 granted in July for work-improvement

ideas submitted to the Employees Suggestion Program, according to Mary Goode Krone, president of the Civil Service Commission.

An Albany employee of the Department of Labor received a \$50 award. Michael Pomidoro, a senior workmen's compensation examiner in the Workman's Compensation Board, noticed that unnecessary correspondence was frequently being sent to employers. The instances involved compensation cases which had been closed for seven years or more; and where the employers were no longer liable.

Pomidoro suggested that the Board stop sending notices of decision to these employers, since they no longer had a "need to know" of further developments. Annual postage savings alone amounted to approximately \$500. New Forms

Another \$50 award was granted to Edmund J. Owczarzak of Buffalo, a senior X-ray technician for the Department of Health. He designed a diagnostic case record form to help physicians make comparison studies of X-rays. The new form takes it possible to duplicate the photographic conditions of a previous X-ray, so that an exact "before and after" comparison can be made following treatment of the patient.

Two Albany area women shared \$30 for designing a clearer, more complete form letter and other material relating to the waiting period for disability payments. Thelma M. Chamberlain of Wynantskill, and Ellen L. Nash of Latham, assistant workmen's compensation examiners in the Workmen's Compensation Board, eliminated unnecessary correspondence as a result of their sug-



Only questions of general interest can be answered here.

- Q. My son, who will be 19 next month, will be attending college this year. Can I continue to cover him as a dependent on my Statewide Plan?
- A. Yes. Under the Statewide Plan, if you have unmarried children 19 years of age or older, but under 23 years of age, who receive more than half their support from you, and are full time students at an accredited secondary or preparatory school or college, and are not otherwise eligible for employee group coverage, you may apply for a student contract (full coverage) at a small additional premium.
- Q. Mental or nervous disorders are limited to 30 days coverage under the Blue Cross part of the Statewide Plan. Would any coverage be available over the 30 days under the Major Medical part of the Plan?
- A. Yes. Major Medical will cover mental and nervous disorders after the 30 days provided by Blue Cross have been used, if the treatment is given in any hospital which meets the definition of hospital that is written into the contract. Under this condition, both room and board as well as other benefits are covered expenses. If treatment is given in an institution that does not meet this definition of hospital, all covered benefits are provided except room and board.

Free Vocational Training Offered To Youth, Jobless; Grants To \$70 Available

Vocational training courses preparing youth and unemployed adults for a variety of jobs are continuing in New York City under the direction off the Board of Education,

These programs include courses given, with federal aid under the Manpower Development Training Act, Operation Second Chance and the Economic Opportunity Act.

They have all been established | as a part of the Borad of Education's part in the war against poverty and are designed to provide adults with the necessary training and skills to become em-

The former Girls High School in Brooklyn is one of 25 centers for about 2,400 student taking courses under the Manpower Development Training Act (MDTA). Short-supply Skills

Thirty-two separate occupational skills all in short supply in today's market-are currently being taught to youth and adults in his program.

(Continued on Page 7) Fall for a period just prior to the woods closure till the woods reopened, when checks were issued to all Conservation Department employees who put in overtime on fire duty during that period, blithely ignored the fact that the Rangers had put in far more overtime during the summer months and for which they received no compensation whatsoever. Instead, they were told to take an equivalent amount of time off whenever possible in the future. Ha! Ha! What a joke! If every Ranger in the State were to suddenly embark on a program of using up compensatory time owed him there wouldn't be a man back on duty until sometime in 1968!! (Incidentally, the overtime checks issued were computed on a straight time basis, not the time and a half or double time traditional in private enter-

Every day that the drought continues, every day that the recreation program accelerates, the Rangers problems are compounded, and still not one word from "the powers that be" to alleviate the effort, or the financial strain brought on by a salary that is marginal by any standard of comparison and the lack of opportunity to augment it by part-time employment because of the hourly demands. Careers are becoming life sentences, and the Ranger is doomed to serve the time completely unless he takes the standard advice handed down thru every channel appealed to for assistance, "If you don't like it, Quit!". Far from sage advice to a man who has spent a considerable part of his life in a job that takes a lot and gives little . . .

At the present time the Forest Ranger is the one man standing between the forests in this state and the segment of the public who would burn them flat, desecrate them with their leavings, cut them to the last stick of timber. Who knows when the attrition of the spirit will reach the point where this man says "to hell with it" and begins to shed whatever dedication to the job he may have left, and who can say that he's not justified? Certainly not I!!

imagination and responsibility. As Mayor, I will want to get the City moving and that means I will be calling on all of you to help. But I know that men and women work best when they are accorded a measure of dignity and respect.

The fastest growing business in this country is the business of government. As we move into the "Great Society." we will need more government employees. But even with additional civil servants greater demands will be placed on all to see to it that our programs in education, welfare, water, air pollution control and housing improvement are adequately carried out.

One of the major problems facing New York's civil servants is lack of internal communications. Many jobs are done twice, or not at all, because of confusion of plete overhaul of the different City departments, with a sharper definition of authority, and the means ot coordinate related fields.

Modern technology can make it possible for the civil servant to meet the demands of the future. It is not just that computers are required to process data, but such rudimentary aids as dictating machines, modern office duplicating machines and even adequate working space are required. It is absurd for the professional civil servant to be forced to waste his time on needless paper work. I believe that these aids together with adequate stenographic and typing assistance will do more to assure professional work performance than time clocks and requisitions in triplicate.

By adopting modern personnel practices and through the use of modern technology. I intend to free the civil servant from menial chores so that he can do a job. Part of this job will be to bring government to the people. I plan to set up a series of neighborhood "City Halls" to deal with neighborhood problems. Decentralization, where feasible will make it possible for the civil servant to see the results of his work and this achieve a greater sense of accomplishment.

Among the up to date personnel policies which I favor is recognition of the value of collective bargaining. As long as there are those who supervise and those who are supervised there will be conflicts which can best be expressed through the collective voice that bargaining provides. A responsible union can be a great aid to an administration which believes, as I do, that the reforms we seek must come
