## FIRST SCHOOL PAPER IN ANERICA HAD NO INEWS

The first hish school newspaper published in this country started in 1829 at the Boston Latin School, the first secondsry school in America.

It can not resilly be cialled a newspaper because it contained no news, and hid only one pace on which were two storios, one beginning:
"There are some who question the propriety of pullins noses and call it in unmanly snd unhandsome propensity; but in my opinion it is the noblest satisfection a man can take on another man Who has done him an injury," and ending with the moral, "Acquire impudence by some mesns or other and you will rise to ominonce."

Comparison of that first newspuper with a modern high school newsperper Gows the vast amount of progress made in 101 yeurs.
